Wheeler Boosters Will Operate Concession

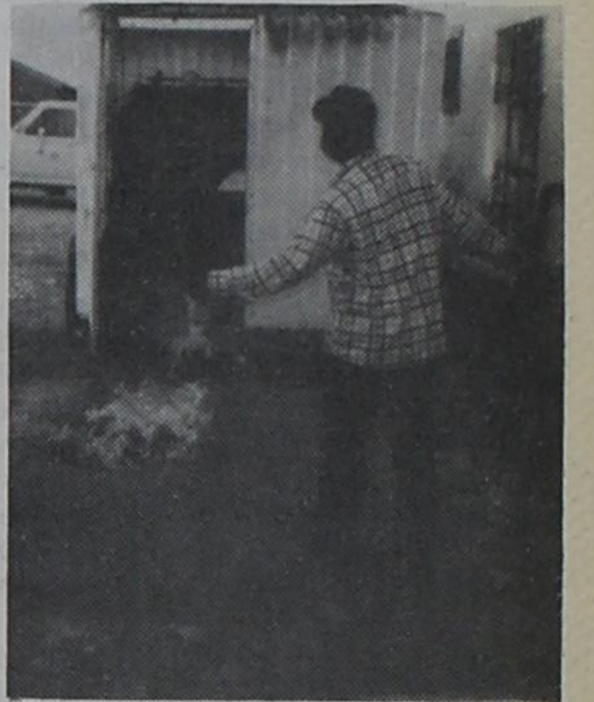
The Mustang Booster Club will again have the concession at the district track meet this Thurs. and Friday.

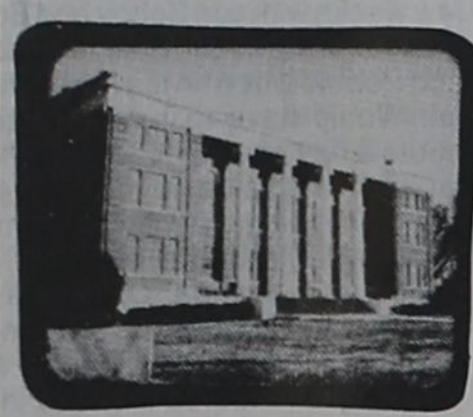

Lewis Lancaster To Be Buried Today At Sayre

Lewis Lancaster was born July 22, 1917 in May, TX. to Albert Newton and Enla (Morgan) Lancaster and passed away in the Sayre Memorial Hospital April 14, 1992 at the age of 74 years, 8 months and 22 days.

Services will be held at 2:00 p.m. today, Thursday, April 16, 1992 at the Sayre First Baptist Church officiated by M. H. Childers, and assisted by Tom Cooksey. Burial will be at the Delhi Cemetery under the direction of Rose Chapel Funeral Service.

Lewis married Catherine Inez Hall on September 27, 1940 in Brownwood, Texas. Lewis entered the United States Armed Forces in October of 1942 and was later discharged in December of 1945. He worked for the J. C. Penny Co in Brownwood, Big Spring and Odessa, Texas. In 1954 they moved to Wheeler, TX and managed a clothing store. In 1964, they bought the store and operated Lancaster Department Store until August 1979 when they sold the store and retired. In 1984 Lewis and Inez moved to Sayre from Wheeler to make their home. He was a member of the Sayre First Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death by his parents, 1 sister and 1 brother.

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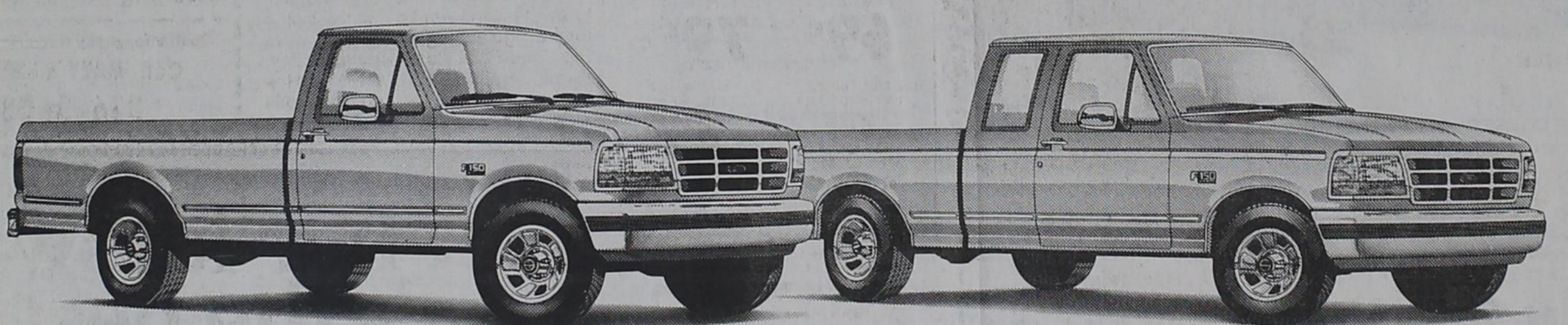
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Isn't It The Truth

Most of us don't know of the hundreds and hundreds of racing stock in the state of the ones I know I find they are fine folks.

I used to keep up with the number of vehicles that came into our state of New Mexico that were heading for the track for the weekend and these folks would buy their meals, lodging an the womenfolkjes had to go into the towns and do a bit of shopping. My job at the track was to go by the stables early in the morning and take the winners circle photos to the winners and also to see that everyone was as content as possible and see if they were keepin things in order. Very seldom did we have any problems an usually the trainers sort of solved their problems among themselves and one thing I found is that they helped each other in sickness er otherwise more than most any organization I have ever been around. They are very competitive but also very close group of folks. I've seen most of our young folks

From The Minister's Desk:

An impressive Biblical truth is stated on the bumper sticker that says: "Christians are not perfect—just forgiven." Yet this impressive truth is misunderstood by many people who are not Christians and it is misunderstood by people who are. The reason for this misunderstanding is that they believe Christians are to be sinlessly perfect.

To correct this misunderstanding, there are two observations that must be made. These two observations are:—

1. The New Testament affirms that salvation is by the grace of God not by the attainment of man. Ephesians 2:8-9 says: "By grace you have been saved through faith and that not of yourselves, it is a gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." There are two phrases in this text that must be emphasized.

The first phrase is: "By grace—". Salvation is by the grace of God which is a demonstration of the love of God that is unearned, undeserved, and unpayable. Salvation is not the result of a business transaction between God and man. It is "the free gift of God—that man receives." (Romans 6:23)

Then the second phrase is: "Through faith—" salvation is by the grace of God which is found and access to this grace is "through faith—" in Jesus Christ. Such a faith is tangible, expressing itself through obedience and service to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. (James 2: 14-26)

Salvation is rooted in the grace of God not the perfection of man.
2. The grace of God is a continuous need in the lives of Christians.

Someone has observed that there are only two types of sinners—lost and saved. Christians are not people who are sinlessly perfect. Rather they are sinners who have been forgiven by their obedient faith in Jesus Christ.

For example, consider the Apostle Paul. This man is usually idolized as a "super Christian". But he evaluated himself by saying: "I was formerly a blasphemer and persecutor—" and then he said: "It is a trustworthy statement, deserving full acceptance, that Jesus came into the world to save sinners, among whom I foremost of all." (1 Timothy 1: 13-15)

Notice the change of tense that the Apostle Paul used. He changed from past to present. He said: "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, among whom I am foremost of all." The Apostle Paul realized that he had daily sins, but he also realized that these sins could be forgiven. He said: "—Yet for this reason I found mercy, in order that in me as the foremost, Jesus Christ might demonstrate His perfect patience, as an example for those who would believe in Him for eternal life." (1 Timothy 1:16)

For Christians, the grace of God is not only the purging power for past sins. It is the purging power for present sins, Christians are saved by the grace of God and it is the grace of God that keeps them saved.

The bumper sticker is correct! Christians are not perfect. But they are forgiven by the grace of God.
