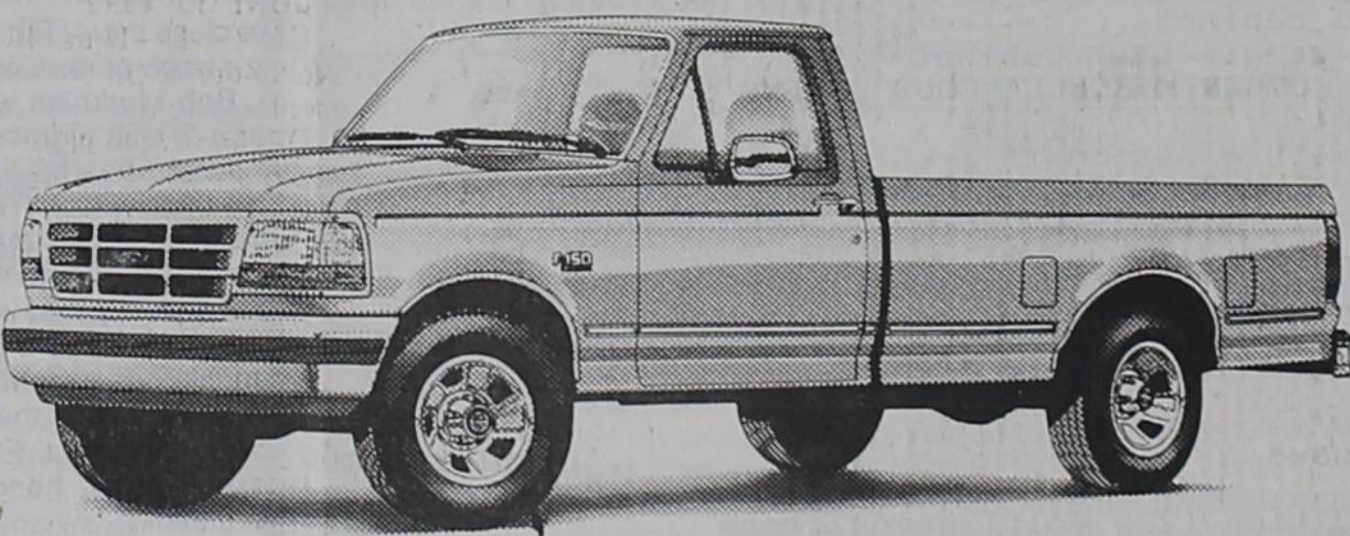
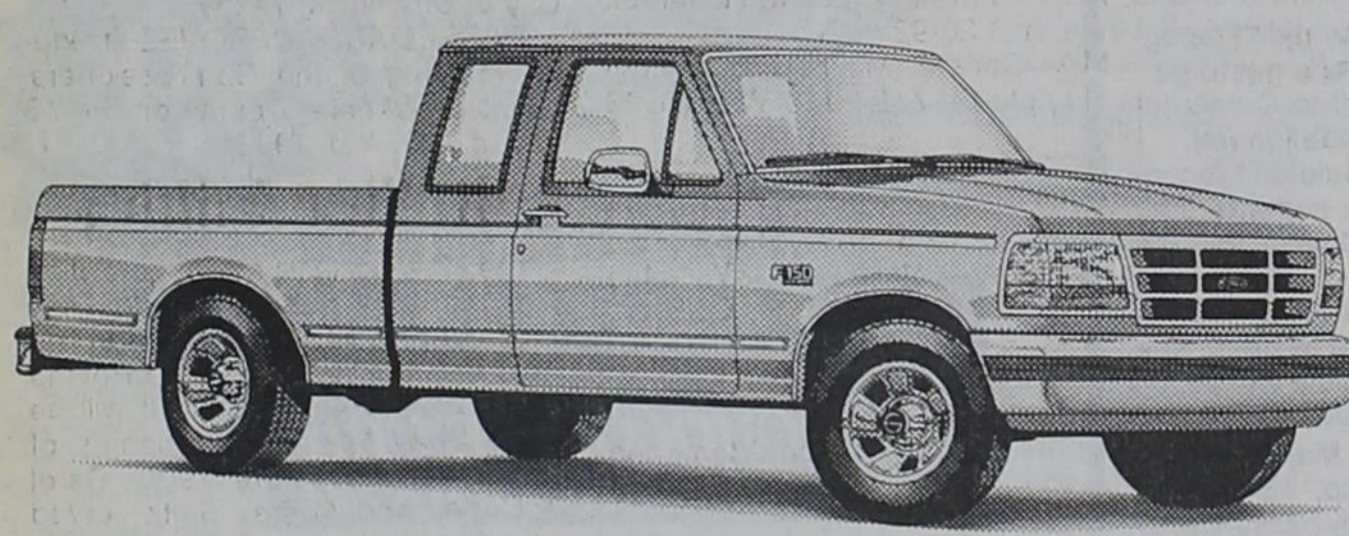

SUFFERING FOR CHRIST
(Part 3)
I Peter 4:19, "Wherefore let them that suffer according to the will of God commit the keeping of their souls to him in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator."
The past 2 weeks in the articles I prepare for the newspaper, I have addressed the matter of "suffering for Christ". I have given you a different verse at the beginning of the article that clearly tells us that Christians do sometimes suffer for the faith. However, many Christians have been taught to believe that sickness is often part of the suffering that is in the will of God. That could not be true.
All the verses I have quoted in all 3 of these articles are in the book of I Peter. That book which has much to say about Christian suffering also says in the 2nd chapter and the 24th verse that by the stripes which they laid on Jesus during His vicarious suffering, we were healed. So, the very book that teaches us that we will sometimes suffer also makes it clear that sickness is not part of the will of God.
Besides that, there are many verses in the Bible that reveal to us that God does not want His children to be sick. In Exodus 15:26, He said He was the Lord that heals His people and that if they would obey Him, He would not permit sickness to come upon them. In Psalm 103: 2-3, God said that we must not forget His benefits which include healing from all diseases. In James 5:14-15, He told Christians that if any of us that are Christians are sick, we should call for the elders of the church and that they will pray in the name of the Lord and anoint with oil, and the Lord will heal the sick one. It is very obvious (if you want to see it), that sickness is not part of God's plan or God's will or Christian suffering. Believe that He wants to heal you. He does.
