Mobeetie Jail Opens **New Antique Display**

The Mobeetie jail Museum, through the courtesy of Southwestern Public Service Company is now featuring a display called "Appliances of Yesteryear.'

SPS is providing the museum with a number of historical electrical appliances which will be on long-term loan, said Marshall Andis, SPS manager for the Mobeeite/Wheeler area.

"Electricity has changed life a great deal since the 1800's," he said. "SPS is pleased to demonstrate some of the changes by sharing antiques which the company has collected through the years."

A few of the historical electrical items on display at the museum are: a very unusual Universal electric heater from the 1900's, a pre-1919 light bulb, a 1930 General Electric bakelite clock, curling irons from the 1900's and 1920's, an American Beauty iron dated 1916, a 1900's electric heater, early dated electric fans, and many other items. Some of the objects are so unusual, it would be difficult for many to identify them without the accompanying label cards.

Numerous All State and Honorable Mention All State high school stars dot the roster of the 1992 North and South squads that will assemble in Childress Tuesday, June 2nd to go into two-aday conditioning and training for the 43rd annual Childress D.S.A. Greenbelt Bowl All Star game to be played Saturday, June 6th starting at 6:30 p.m.

Old timers still talk about high school stars like Frank Ryan from Houston who played in one of the earliest games and went on to Rice and later played quarterback in the pros at Cleveland.

Local people might remember Ray McKown, the "Dumas Dandy" who came to Childress without a scholarship but Abe Martin took him to TCU where he made All American. The best story is that Ray was just an ordinary player until he was backed up in his own end zone facing a 30 mile per hour wind.....whistled a 60 yard low driving punt that got the Horned Frogs out of danger. Coach Martin said, "Ray can't pass....he can't punt....he's slow....all that kid can do

is beat you!" Others will remember Mike Hargrove from Perryton....the most valuable player in the game who threw the winning touchdown pass to Craig Smith of the Jacksboro Tigers. Mike now manages the major league Cleveland Indian baseball team. Five or six years ago, Mike sent \$100 check to Childress with the note "playing in the Greenbelt Bowl was a highlight of my young life and I will never forget meeting the other young men who have remained friends in my memories. Thanks for giving all of us the chance

to play. Craig's father, Don Smith is now with D.S.A., the sponsor of the Greenbelt Bowl, who fondly remembers that proud moment. And, in fact, Ray Williams, Cliff Holden and Don, when asked whey they would sponsor the "smallest bowl game in the world" simply said in unison, "the game might be small compared to the pros and college bowl games....but it's the biggest thing that ever happened to those eighteen year old youngsters."

Similar stories are too many to share in this article, but the men listed on the Wheeler,

attached rosters are going to be the leaders of their respective communities some ten years from now...and this football game will live in their memories forever.

The Greenbelt Bowl game is a civic undertaking by the citizens of Childress. We have only 2800 seats in our beautiful rock stadium with perhaps the best grass turf of any high school stadium. Briscoe Graduatates Express Gratitude


The 1992 graduating class of Briscoe High School would like to express its gratitude to the community for its support of the class' various money-making projects through the years. They had a very good senior trip.

"The recipe is good tasting and low calorie," McCoy said. "Anyone serving it just needs to add a salad, a vegetable, hot bread and a glass of milk. You've got a nutritious, delicious, balanced meal."

The recipe's unique flavor come from the natural taste of beef and a marinade based on garlic, pepper, salt, soy sauce, instant coffee, Worcestershire sauce, blue cheese and cooking oil. The retired Dupont employee said the blue cheese almost universally pleases human palates. She added it to the recipe because during her career she noticed professional people overwhelmingly selected blue cheese dressings for their salads.

McCoy's recipe was one of more than 500 entered in this year's Texas Beef Cook-Off. Besides the overall championship, she also won the "Budget (less than \$2 per serving) Beef Meals" and "Best under 300 calories per serving Beef Recipe" categories. Her total winnings mounted to \$5,000.

Her championship also won her the right to represent Texas at the 1992 National Beef Cook-Off Sept. 17-19 at Sacramento, Calif.

Dr. Loanne Chiu of Fort Worth won second place in this year's Texas Beef Cook-Off with her "Waikiki Ribs in Fruit Orchard." Her recipe uses lean beef chuck ribs, a low cost cut, that is marinated for flavor and tenderness.

Chiu's recipe was praised by one judge who said: "This dish, accompanied by in season fruit in a tangy dressing, was just gorgeous. You know it was good just by looking at it."

Chiu also won the "Meals that Kids Like" and "Beef Recipes for Entertaining" categories. Chiu took home


