## 'The Real McCoy Steak' Wins 1992 Texas Beef Cook-off

A food lover's "Real McCoy" beef and potatoes won the 1992 Texas Beef Cook-Off April 24 at Wichita Falls. The award winning recipe was entered by Merline McCoy, a housewife at Village Mills, Texas. The championship recipe featured marinated, broiled top sirloin surrounded by new potatoes.

The contest's panel of five judges rated "The Real McCoy Steak" tops among 15 finalists. They praised the recipe as a return to the comfort foods of days-gone-by with the nutrition, convenience and flavor for the 1990s.

"I'm always playing in the kitchen to make good-tasting, low-calorie, healthy foods," McCoy said. "My husband likes beef, and so I focus on that. We feel if you have a good meat, you can add the other accompaniments easily."

The recipe takes five minutes to prepare, two hours to marinate and 25 minutes to broil to medium-rare doneness. Its nutritional analysis shows it has 192 calories, 7.3 grams of fat and 77 milligrams of cholesterol per serving.

"The recipe is good tasting and low calorie," McCoy said. "Anyone serving it just needs to add a salad, a vegetable, hot bread and a glass of milk. You've got a nutritious, delicious, balanced meal."

The recipe's unique flavor come from the natural taste of beef and a marinade based on garlic, pepper, salt, soy sauce, instant coffee, Worcestershire sauce, blue cheese and cooking oil. The retired Dupont employee said the blue cheese almost universally pleases human palates. She added it to the recipe because during her career she noticed professional people overwhelmingly selected blue cheese dressings for their salads.

McCoy's recipe was one of more than 500 entered in this year's Texas Beef Cook-Off. Besides the overall championship, she also won the "Budget (less than \$2 per serving) Beef Meals" and "Best under 300 calories per serving Beef Recipe" categories. Her total winnings amounted to \$5,000.

Her championship also won her the right to represent Texas at the 1992 National Beef Cook-Off Sept. 17-19 at Sacramento, Calif.

Dr. Lorraine Chiu of Fort Worth won second place in this year's Texas Beef Cook-Off with her "Waikiki Ribs in Fruit Orchard." Her recipe uses lean beef chuck ribs, a low cost cut, that is marinated for flavor and tenderness.

Chiu's recipe was praised by one judge who said: "This dish, accompanied by in season fruit in a tangy dressing, was just gorgeous. You know it was good just by looking at it."

Chiu also won the "Meals that Kids Like" and "Beef Recipes for Entertaining" categories. Chiu took home \$4,000.

Lisa Stephens of Richardson also won \$1,000 for the "Most Convenient Beef Recipe" category with her "Sizzlin' Chuck Eye Steaks Sonora."

The Texas Beef Cook-Off is sponsored by Texas CattleWomen with support from the Texas Beef Industry Council.

### The Real McCoy Steak

Preparation time: 10 minutes  
Marinating time: 2 hours or overnight, if desired

Cooking Time: 30 minutes  
2 pounds top sirloin, cut approx. 2 inches thick

- 2 Tbs. blue cheese
- 1 Large clove garlic, chopped fine
- 1 tsp. coarse black pepper
- 1 Tbs. soy sauce
- 1 Heaping Tbs. powdered instant coffee
- 1 Tbs. worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup cooking oil, plus oil for brushing on potatoes
- Vegetable Cooking spray
- Red potatoes, cut into 1-1 1/2 inch wedges
- Onion flakes, salt & pepper (or your favorite seasonings to taste)
- Parsley

To prepare marinade, mix cheese, garlic, pepper, salt, soy sauce, coffee, worcestershire and oil in food processor or blender. Pour marinade over steak and rub into the surface; refrigerate excess for basting. Marinate steak several hours or overnight in the refrigerator. Prepare potatoes by brushing with oil and seasonings. Spray rack of broiler pan with vegetable cooking spray. Place steak and potatoes on the rack and broil 6 inches from heat. Cook for 30 minutes until steaks are medium-rare (150 degrees F) and potatoes are tender, turning once. Carve steak across grain into thin slices. Serve with red potatoes. Garnish with parsley. To complete the meal, add green beans and sliced tomatoes. Serves 8.

### Waikiki Ribs in Fruit Orchard

Preparation Time: 30 minutes  
Marinating Time: 6 hrs. or overnight, if desired



Cooking Time: 1 1/2 hours  
4 lbs. lean beef chuck short ribs, cut into 4 inch pieces marinade\*  
1 package (16-ounces) fresh ripe pineapple  
2 medium oranges, unpeeled, cut crosswise  
1 pint ripe strawberries, hulled  
3 kiwis, peeled, cut crosswise  
Fruit Dressing\*\*  
1 Bunch curly green leaf lettuce

Prepare Marinade\*. Trim fat and lightly score meat. Put beef ribs and remaining marinade in a 9 x 14 inch baking dish. Cover tightly with foil. Marinate in refrigerator 6 hours or overnight, if desired, turning occasionally. Move ribs to the oven and bake at 400 degrees F for 30 minutes. Turn beef, cover again and bake another 30 minutes.

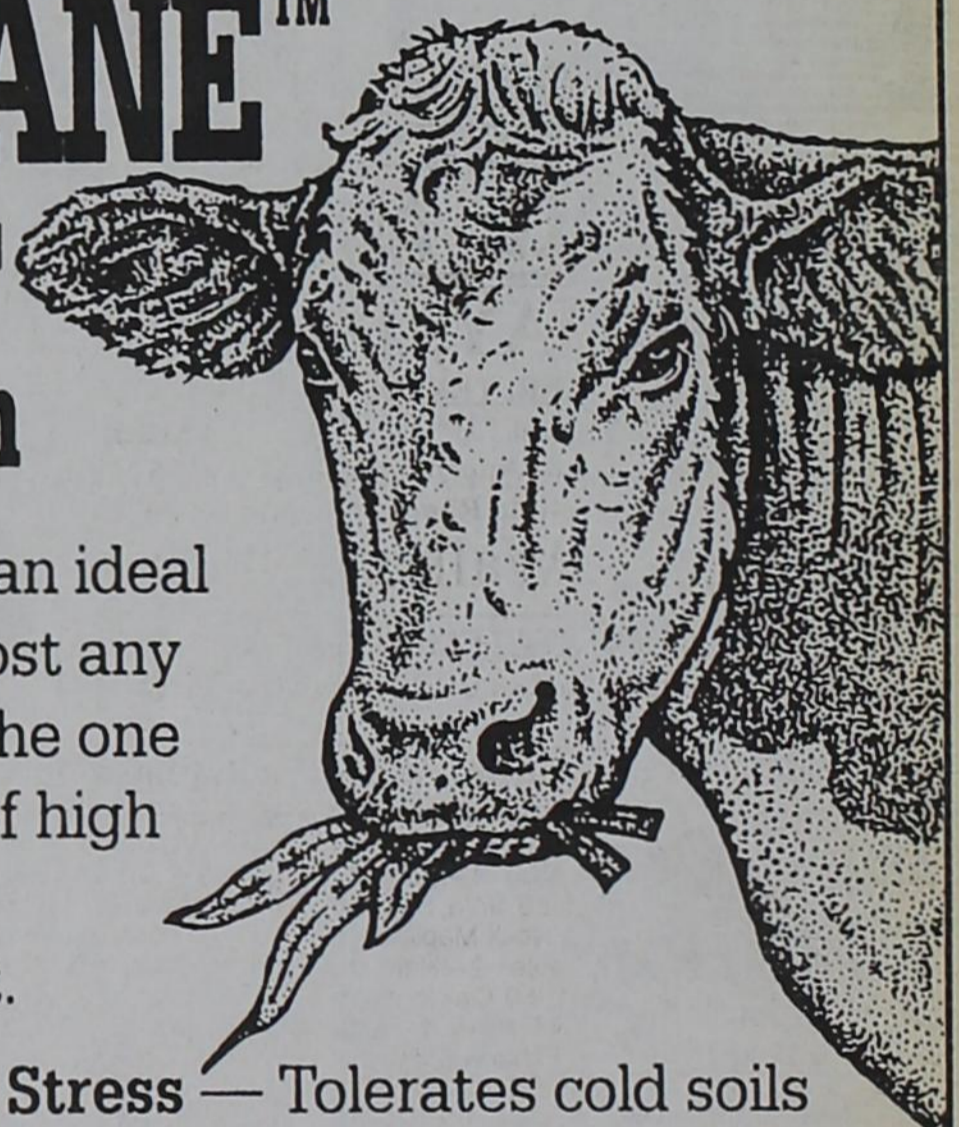

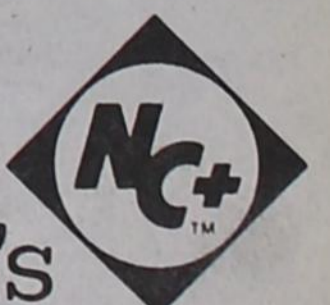

# KELSO'S HOOKED ON BULLS

(Editor's Note: The following story was taken from the April 27, 1992 Pampa News. Written by Alan Brzyz, Managing Editor.)

Ross Kelso is riding a dream - and cantankerous rodeo bulls - for all its worth.

So far it's paying off handsomely.

The 19 year old from Mobeetie currently competes with the Panhandle State University rodeo team and a week ago in the bull riding event won his first intercollegiate rodeo.

A freshman majoring in agribusiness, Kelso beamed with pride when he showed the handmade prize buckle he captured April 18 at PSU's Deke Latham Memorial Rodeo which attracted more than a dozen rodeo teams to the Guymon, Okla. campus.

In the long go-round held early in the morning, Kelso drew a bull with no name-known only by its letter-D brand.

He scored an ample 64 points, good enough to qualify for the short go.

"I went back into the short round in 10th (place)," said Kelso in a recent interview. "I had a bull of Dorenkamp's (Stock contractor Dorenkamp Rodeo Company) called Captain Crunch."

"He was good," said Kelso. "He spun to the left, jumped back out of it, then circled to the right. My score was announced as 75, but the judges raised me to 77 points."

Scores of 77 and 64 were enough to earn Kelson the win in average and rodeo's bull riding title.

"College rodeos are a lot tougher," said Kelso. "You have to ride two head to win."

"You have to ride against people with more experience. It's a good deal. I really like it."

Speaking of PSU rodeo coach Lynn Gardner, who holds a doctorate degree, Kelso said, "He's really taking care of us."

"We really appreciate having him around. He's probably one of the smartest men I've ever met."

Kelso said PSU is "very much a rodeo school."

"Rodeo is probably a bigger deal than football as far as support," he added.

Nearly a year ago, Kelso, son of Bill and Kay Caswell of Mobeetie, pondered his future in an interview as he prepared for the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association (TSHSRA) finals held in June at the Range Riders Rodeo Arena in Amarillo.

"I got an old rope and an old pair of spurs given to me (as a gift)," said Kelso, explaining a friend rode bulls and "I thought it was pretty neat."

Kelso, then a high school senior, said, "I don't know where I'm going to go to college right now, I'd like to get a (rodeo) scholarship."

In the June TSHSRA finals Kelso wrapped up the bull riding champion-

ship for the year.

Several weeks later, he successfully competed in the Texas High School Rodeo Association finals held at Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene.

He placed third in the first go-round with a 75-point ride, coupled it with a 67-point score in the final go-round and qualified for the National High School Finals Rodeo held in July at Shawnee, OK.

"I didn't do that good (at the Nation-

als)," he said, but several weeks later

Kelso picked up a good-sized check at the prestigious XIT Rodeo in Dalhart.

Part of Kelso's dream already was realized when he was awarded a rodeo scholarship to PSU.

However, another important ingredient in Kelso's master plan is a Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) permit, which he hopes to obtain this summer.

"You always dream to go pro," said the always-smiling Kelso in the 1991

interview. "It would be great, but you've got to be pretty good."

A year later, he's a whole lot closer to the achievement.

At 5-foot-6, 150 pounds, Kelso is typical in size compared to successful PRCA rough stock riders.
