

Wheeler Christian Academy Wins First Over All

Students from across West Texas gathered at the Big Country Baptist Assembly near Leuders, Texas, last week for competition in the West Texas Student Convention of A.C.E. Christian schools. Eight major categories of competition, each with numerous specific events were entered.

Nineteen students from Wheeler Christian Academy attended the Con-

vention. These students did so well that W.C.A. received the first or second place trophies in each of the eight categories. The students here brought back the first place trophy in Academics, the first place trophy in Arts, the first place trophy in Photography, the first place trophy in Athletics, the second place trophy in needle and Thread, the second place trophy in Music Vocal, the second place trophy in Music Instrumental and the second place trophy in Platform Events. W.C.A. did so well that a total amount of points in all areas of competition earned the highest award presented at the Convention. Wheeler Christian Academy was the winner of the first Place Over-all trophy.

Yancy Galutia won 5 first place awards in the area of photography and 3 second place awards in the area of photography. He also won the first place award for a theoretical science exhibit.

Jason Brittain won second place in chess and also second place in the 800 meter run. He won third place in the theoretical science exhibit.

Jeremy Pfeil won first place in Bible memory and in Pentathlon. Pentathlon consists of 5 athletic events. He also won second place in a photography category and third place in another photography category.

Dan Langdon won first place in Famous Speech and second place in Pentathlon.

Brandon Griffin won first place in the mile run, first place in preaching, and was part of the team from W.C.A. winning first place in a radio program. He won second place in woodworking with power tools and second place in woodworking with hand tools. He also won third place in essay writing and third place in table tennis.

Anna Marie Griffin won first place in female solo, first place as part of a small ensemble from W.C.A., and she was part of the second place female duet. She won third place in table tennis.

Crystal Gilmer was the first place winner in one of the photography categories. She was also part of the second place female duet and the first place small ensemble. She won second place in photo journalism. She was also part of the third place female trio.

Misty Zybach was the winner of the first place in crocheting. She was part of the small ensemble that won first place. She won second place in sportswear and formals. She took third place in a Photography category, counted cross stitch and she won third place with a dress she made.

Tyle North was the first place win-

ner in poetry writing and metal working. He won second place in colored pencils and in preaching. He was the third place winner in tennis.

Junita Rose was part of the first place small ensemble, and she won third place in crocheting and was part of the third place female trio.

Drew Mackey was the third place winner of Bible Memory.

Jason Mong won a second place award in a science collection exhibit.

Heather Dean was the first place winner in piano solo and was part of the small ensemble taking first place. She won third place in checkers and was part of the third place female trio.

Rebecca Hall was part of the first place duet and the first place small ensemble. She won second place in female solo and second place in piano solo.

Julie Dean was part of the first place female duet and the first place small ensemble and the first place radio program. She also won first place with her twin brother in mixed duet. She took second place in spelling and third place in sportswear.

Rejino Garza was the first place winner in woodworking with power tools and won second place in high jump.

Tim Bryan was the first place winner in woodworking with hand tools and won first place in high jump.

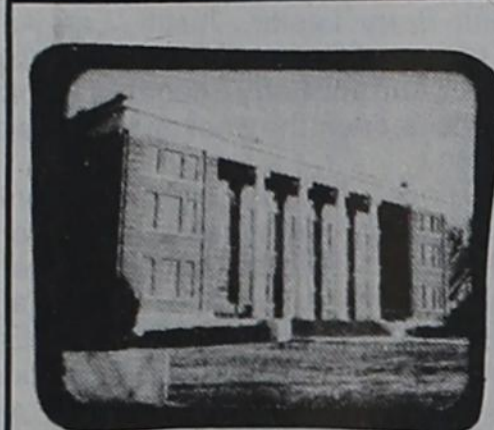
Aaron Laughlin won second place in the mile run and in tennis. He won third place in metal working.

There were several fourth, fifth and sixth place awards earned by these students. The staff of Wheeler Christian Academy is proud of these youngsters for their performances. They won 29 first place awards and 22 second place awards. All these first and second places will be entered in the International Convention next month in Denton at North Texas State university.

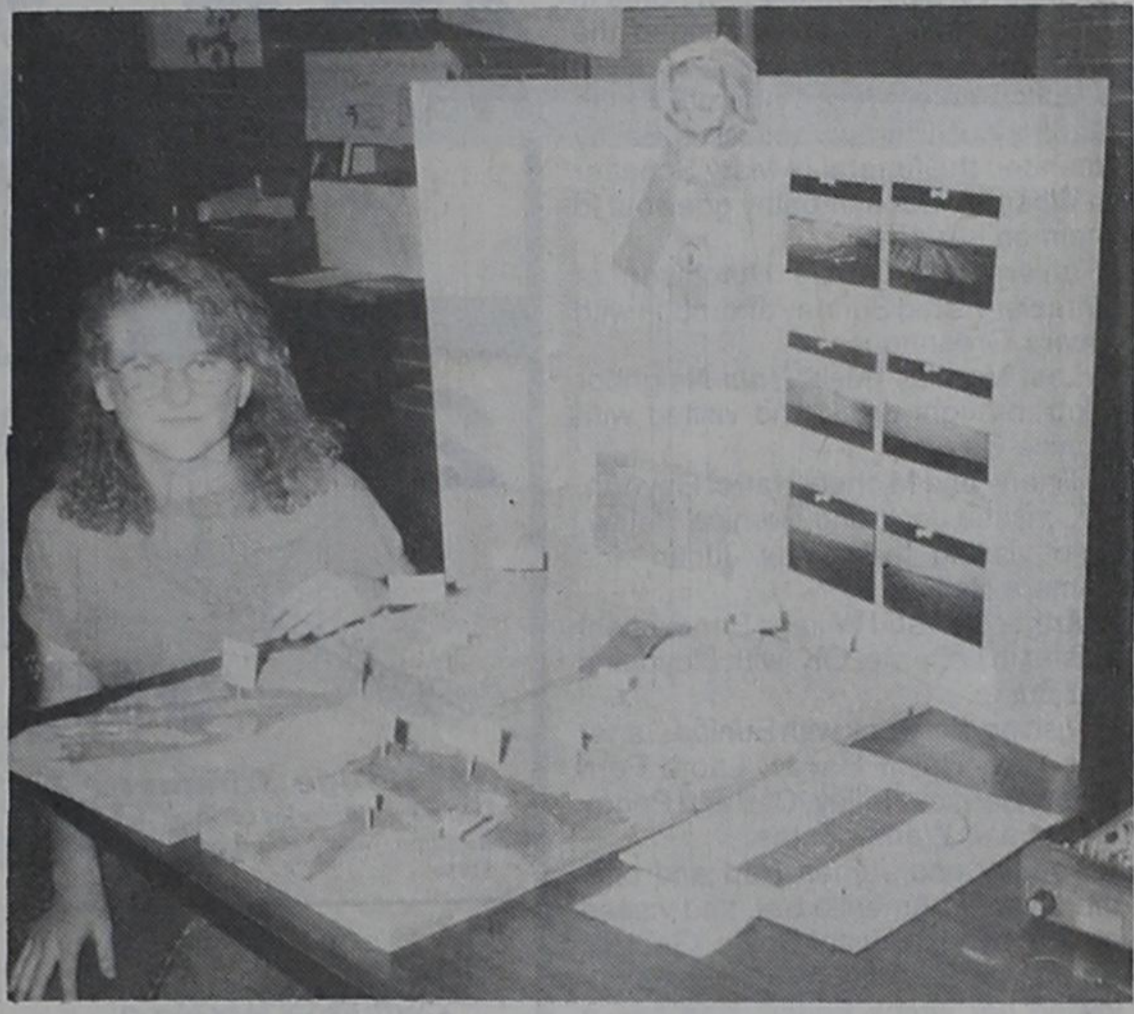

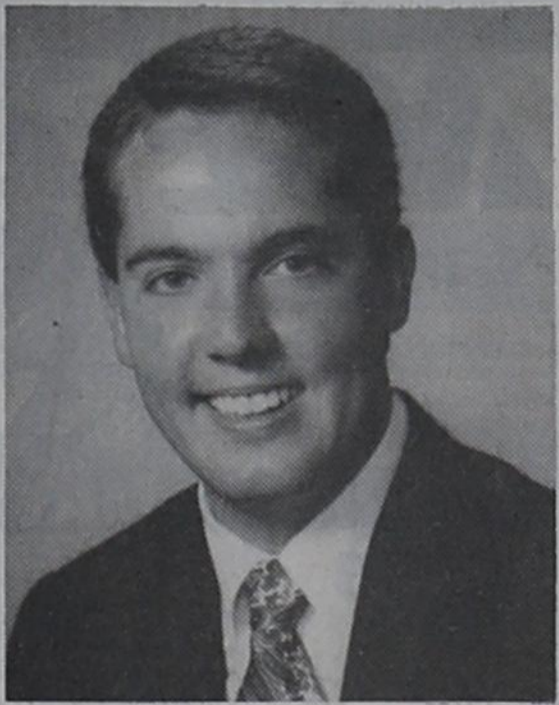

Amanda May Named To Represent Briscoe

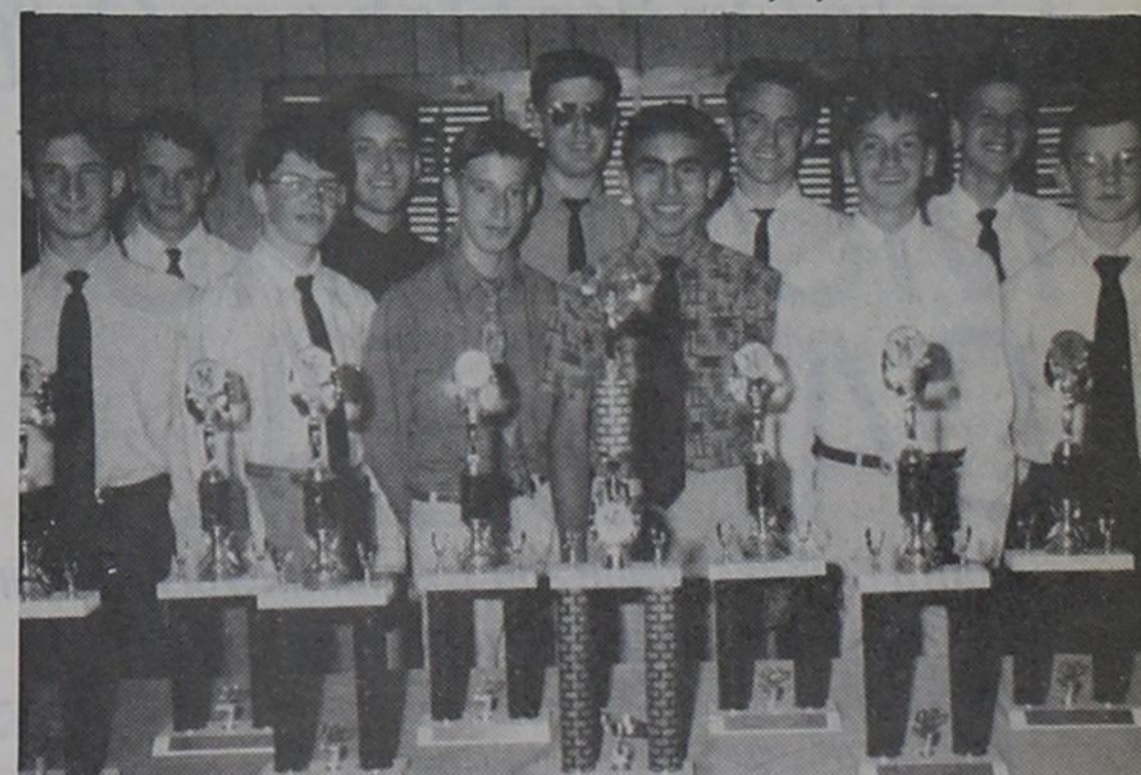

5 REASONS I KNOW GOD WANTS TO HEAL

(PART III)

Two weeks ago I wrote in the newspaper that I know God wants to heal you if you are sick because it is plainly stated in the Bible that He wants you to be in health. Last week, I wrote that another reason I know God wants to heal you is that it is His name. He said He is Jehovah-Rapha, which means "Lord that healeth thee". His name reveals what He wants to do for us.

Here is a third reason why I am completely convinced that God wants to heal every believer. IT IS THE BLESSING OF ABRAHAM, and the blessing of Abraham is provided for all Christians. Many Christians, however, do not know what "the blessing of Abraham" means.

Galatians 3:13-14 says Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us . . . that the blessing of Abraham might come on the Gentiles through Jesus Christ." Chapter 28 of Deuteronomy says that all sickness is a curse. But Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law. Galatians 3:29 says that if you are Christ's then you are Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise. Believers then are entitled to the blessings of Abraham.

In Luke 13:16, Jesus said that a woman who had been afflicted for 18 years ought to be loosed from her problem because she was a daughter of Abraham. He healed her. Notice that He said she ought to be healed because she was a daughter of Abraham, not because He was the Son of God. If that is the reason she ought to be healed and you are Christ's; therefore, one who should have Abraham's blessing, then you ought to be healed (if you are a Christian).

Next week, I will give you a fourth reason why I know God wants you healed. In the meantime, if you are sick or afflicted and would like to have prayer, do not hesitate to call us.
