

Gruver Surprises Mustangs

IN SEASON OPENER, 22-14

Final score: Gruver 22, Wheeler 14

That's right. Double-check that if you want, but inside-out and up-side-down the score remains the same — Gruver 22, Wheeler, 14.

But while the score may be all Gruver's, Wheeler did play a modestly good game considering what little they had to work with. The Stangs suited out only 16 kids, played without starting fullback and inside linebacker Genaro Meraz and starting running back and safety Mark Marshall, who were out with a knee injury and the flu, respectively, and were severely outweighed on both sides of the ball by a big experienced Gruver team.

The 'Stangs started out strongly with outstanding coverage on the opening kickoff. Greyhound return man Fabian Royal bobbled the kick on the 15 and finally picked up the ball on the 10 where he was immediately tackled. A penalty moved the ball back to the 5, where Gruver tried three consecutive runs then punted back to their own 44.

Things started looking good when quarterback Chad Dunnam bootlegged around the left side for 17 yards on Wheeler's first play for a first down on Gruver's 27. The Mustangs continued to roll toward the end-zone, as they pushed the pigskin down to the two yard line for a first and goal. Two plays put the ponies on the one where disaster struck. Wheeler was called for a five yard delay of game penalty. Then Dunnam was thrown for a three-yard loss back to the nine. Dunnam's fourth down pass for wingback Jarrod Ledbetter was incomplete and Gruver took over on downs.

After a trade of possessions, Gruver got its first big play of the game. On the second play of the second quarter, Gruver quarterback Jace Dawson threw a flair pass to sophomore running-back Aaron Frick. Frick tipped the ball into the air, then grabbed it and raced 74 yards into the end zone untouched. Frick lined up to kick the PAT but an errant center snap put the ball back into his hands and he coolly pranced around the right end to give Gruver a 8-0 lead.

Undaunted, the 'Stangs bounced right back. They drove down to Gruver's eight yard line on the strength of Dunnam's 32 yard bootleg and a nifty over-the-shoulder grab by Senior tight-end Joe Dan Ledbetter on a pass from Dunnam that picked up 25 yards and a crucial first down. However, on the ensuing play, Dunnam coughed up the ball and Gruver gained possession. Gruver then fumbled back on the next play and Joe Dan Ledbetter came up with the recovery. On the next play, (yep, you guessed it) Dunnam fumbled the snap. Luckily for Wheeler, Dunnam managed to jump on the loose ball. Three plays later, the quick junior quarterback snuck in from the one for the Ponies first score of '92. But on the attempt for two points, Dunnam was shut down and the Greyhounds maintained the lead 8-6.

The Mustangs finished off the first half with two defensive stops. Directly after the Ponies' first touchdown, junior cornerback Heath Sabbe made an outstanding juggling pickoff on Gruver's first play from scrimmage.

MUSTANGS LOOK TO BOUNCE BACK AGAINST SUNRAY FRIDAY NIGHT

The Wheeler Mustangs look to avenge last Friday's season opening loss to Gruver with a long trip to Sunray this Friday night. Sunray gave Wheeler its toughest pre-district battle last season as the 'Stangs had to fight back from a first half deficit to eke out a 28-21 victory.

Both teams look to be a little down for the '92 season as each squad lost several key players to graduation. Also, both Sunray and Wheeler suffered opening game losses. The Ponies were downed 22-14 by Gruver while Sunray was thrashed by Texhoma, OK 34-6.

Sunray runs two basic offensive schemes—the ground-based wish-bone and the mix-it-up Pro-1. Defensively, Sunray switches from the 27 to the 52. They are led by 6'2", 215 pound senior center and defensive end Brent Shoulders, junior runningback and free safety Justin Childers, and 6'3", 190 pound senior

tight end and defensive end Wes Gill.

Meanwhile, Wheeler will warmly welcome back speedy runningback Mark Marshall who missed last Friday's game with a brief run-in with the flu. Fullback Genaro Meraz is still nursing a knee injury but may be able to go next week in Spearman. Junior Jason Hink will continue to capably fill in for Meraz. Coach Karcher is looking to possibly make a few new offensive

changes. Junior quick tackle Todd Baize could move to a new role at tight end. That switch would place senior tight end Joe Dan Ledbetter back to his '91 position of wingback. Either sophomore Brad Harrison or senior Ryan McNeil could take over Baize's tackle position. If McNeil does move over to the quick tackle slot then his guard role would be resumed by freshman Charlie Flanagan.

Game time will be at 8:00 p.m. Friday night in Sunray.

After the 'Stangs offense was shut down, Sabbe's counterpart, junior right cornerback Marcus Hardcastle killed a Gruver drive by picking off an errant pass on Wheeler's 10 with 18 seconds left in the half.

Gruver jumped right out to open the second half. The 'Hounds went straight down the field and capped off the drive with a flurry.

Sophomore runningback Victor Lopez burst straight up the middle and outran everyone 45 yards to the end zone. Frick added the point after to give Gruver a 15-6 lead.

Wheeler came back with a vengeance as they powered down to Gruvers 8. The drive was keyed by a 15 yard Chad Dunnam pass to junior running back Ciriaco Meraz, who was plugging for the injured Marshall, that was doubled by a roughing the passer penalty on Gruver. But after moving to Gruver's eight, the drive stalled and the Greyhounds took over on the downs.

Gruver did not let up there either. After picking off the second of three Dunnam interceptions, the 'Hounds powered down to Wheeler's 26 where quarterback Dawson headed up with senior receiver Kevin Spivey for the

third Greyhound score. Frick booted the PAT to boost Gruver's lead to 22-6.

Wheeler refused to lay down and die, though. Junior defensive end Todd Baize jumped on a fumble by Victor Lopez on the Gruver 16 to give WHS great field position. Chad Dunnam put the 'Stangs into the end zone with a hard-nosed six yard run. Dunnam then connected with split end Sabbe on an in-route for two points to cut the Greyhound lead to 22-14 with around ten minutes left in the game.

But Gruver controlled the rest of the game. The 'Hounds drove down into Wheeler territory, eating precious time off the clock, and missed a 47 yard field goal attempt. They then stopped two desperate Mustang drives, the last with 15 seconds left in the game.

Gruver was paced by Frick's 85 yards on 20 attempts and quarterback Jace Dawson's 121 yards in the air. Victor Lopez added 64 yards on just four attempts. With the compounded losses of Marshall and Genaro Meraz, Chad Dunnam was put under great pressure to pick up the offensive slack. He performed well by rushing for 44 yards on 21 attempts and throwing for 80 yards with three interceptions.

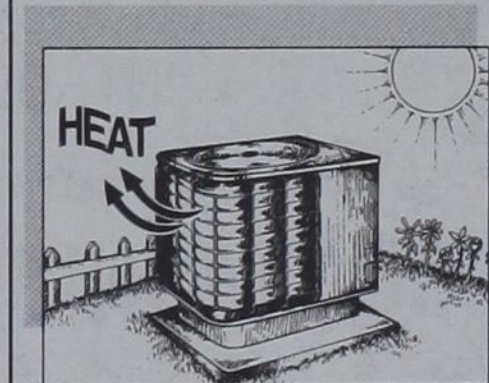
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Energy Management

Some days you wish you could package your child's energy and sell it, or you wish you could borrow some of it. They seem to have more energy than their parents much of the time. However, their energy is limited. Resourceful youth recognize their energy has sources. They realize that they feel better and get the most done when they manage their personal energy.

Explore resourceful energy use with your child. Our energy depends on how much we sleep and rest, what we eat and how much physical activity we have. Healthy eating and exercise habits can also help maximize a child's athletic and academic performance. Also, healthy eating should be fun.

Help your child get the best start with healthy foods for breakfast, children may feel fatigued, sleepy and unmotivated. Promote healthy snacking by stocking the kitchen with healthy choices. For children, snacking may account for 30 percent or more of daily calories and 20 percent or more of nutrients.

Routine physical activity is helpful for several reasons. It burns more calories and allows children to eat more healthy foods during the day. Also, inactivity is one of the biggest contributors to weight gain, obesity and sluggishness.

Even if eating on the run is part of the family lifestyle, children can be taught to make healthier choices from vending machines and fast food establishments. High-fat foods take longer and more energy to digest so a diet heavy in fat may drain energy.

Help youth see how personal decisions about eating, sleeping and physical activity affect their "go power". Make energy banks from seven glass jars. Mark one for each of the following: Sleep, exercise, breads and cereals, fruits, vegetables, milk and cheese and meats. Use dried beans and drop one in for each hour of sleep they get each night, one for each serving of breads and cereals, milk and cheese, fruits and vegetables and meats they eat a day, and one for each hour of physical activity or exercise they get during the day. At the end of the day, have them write on a piece of paper how many beans are in each jar. Have them rate how energetic they felt during the day, with 1 meaning little energy, 5 meaning average level of energy, and 10 meaning super energetic.

At the end of the week compare their ratings for each day with the number of beans in each jar. What seemed to make the biggest difference in how energetic they felt? What was different about the days they felt best and the days they felt they had less energy? If interest in tracking their energy level continues, let them give a monthly report. When they look back over the month, particularly if they changed any of their "energy habits" during the month, what did they find made the biggest difference in how much energy they had to do things that were important to them?

Let them make a big stop sign to put on the door to their room. On the stop sign, have them write each day what they did to stop "energy drainers". Let them share with you about the choices they make to build their energy.

Children's energy can be a real drain on some parents, but when youth know how to manage their personal energy, it can be resourceful to the whole family.

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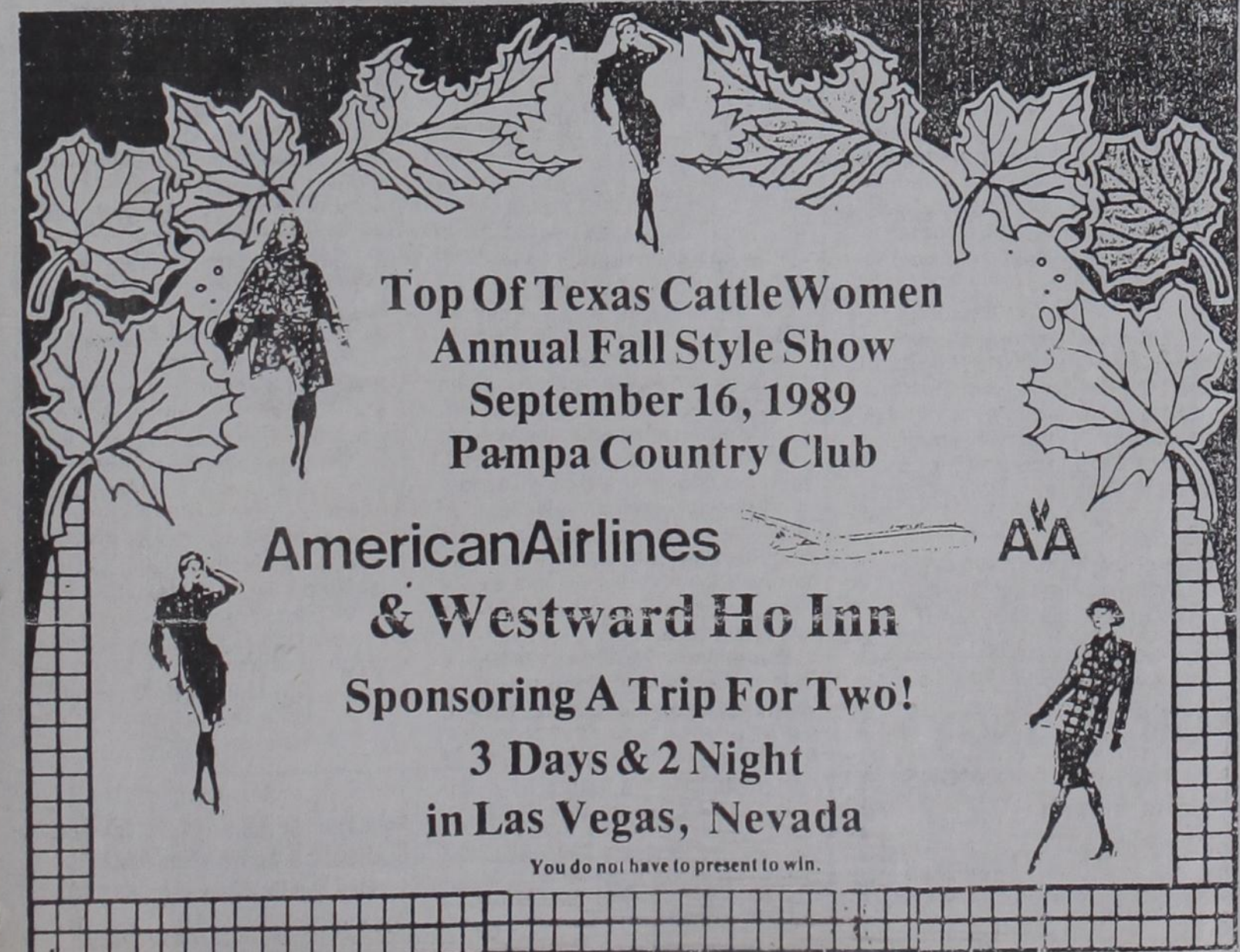

From The Minister's Desk:

On November 29, 1963, President Lyndon Johnson issued an executive order that created a presidential commission. This presidential commission was directed by President Johnson to investigate the assassination of President John Kennedy which had occurred on November 22, 1963. President Johnson also directed this presidential commission to issue a report on its findings when it had concluded its investigation.

This presidential commission was chaired by Earl Warren, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. For this reason, this commission became known as the Warren Commission and its report as the Warren Report.

After a lengthy investigation, the Warren Commission released its report on September 24, 1964, concluding that Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone assassin of President Kennedy.

Since the release of the Warren Report, several books have been written by researchers and historians which openly challenge its conclusion. Some of these researchers and historians in their books even suggest that the Warren Commission conspired to "cover-up" the truth about the assassination of President Kennedy.

While several books have been written which criticize the Warren Commission and its report, only one book has been written which offers some defense of the Warren Commission and its report. This book is entitled, *Conspiracy Of One*, and it was written by Jim Moore, an investigative reporter who has done extensive research on the assassination of President Kennedy. In his book, Mr. Moore candidly questioned some of the objections that critics have raised about the conclusion of the Warren report. For example, he wrote: "From the nearly eighteen thousand pages that comprise the twenty-six volumes, almost any author can select nearly any quote to prove literally any point. The critics have done just that. From the Watergate burglars to zombie CIA agents, they've been able to make the public believe that almost everyone within the Dallas city limits that Friday had a hand in the assassination of President Kennedy."

I think that Mr. Moore made an important observation when he said: "—Any author can select nearly any quote to prove literally any given point." With this observation, Mr. Moore emphasized that the Warren Report should be studied in its context. So should the Bible! The primary principle of effective Bible study is that a text or a portion of a text should never be isolated from its context. When this principle is violated, the meaning of the text will be misunderstood.

For example, Matthew 18:19 is a text that is often misunderstood because it is isolated from its context.
