The United States Achievement Academy announced today that Jason Boydston from Allison, Texas has been named an All-American Scholar.

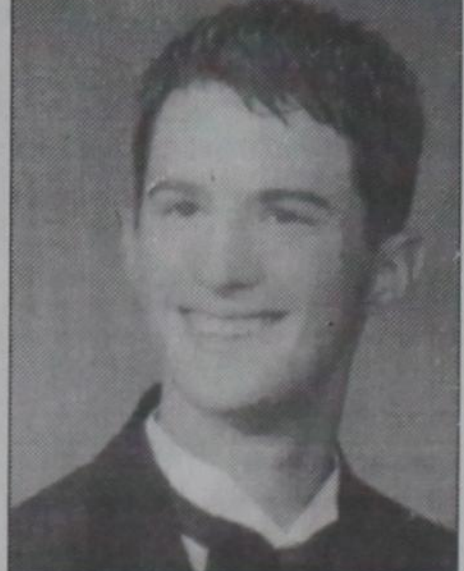

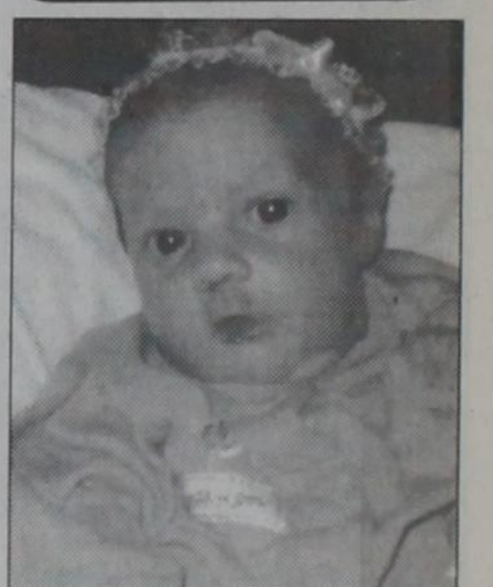
Disaster Training Is Offered April 19

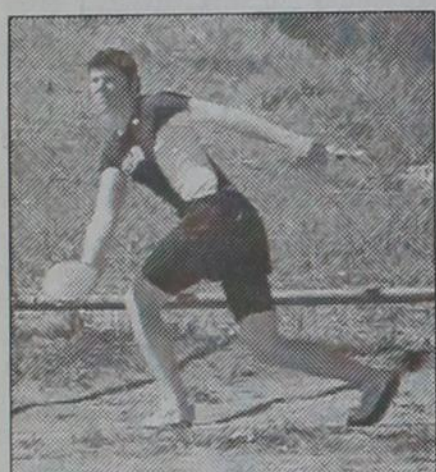

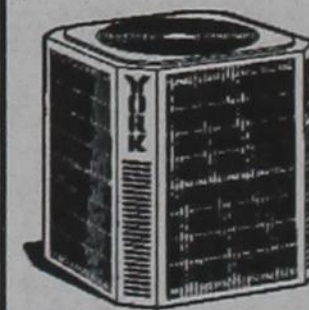

This parable is adapted from an article written by a preacher-friend of mine from my hometown of Cedar Hill, Steve Lewis.

Don't get hit with a penalty!
"Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Who must file a rendition?
You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?
The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2004. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2005.

What's the deadline?
The last day for filing 2005 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

Una "declaración de propiedad" es un reporte para el distrito de valoraciones en donde Ud. enlista toda la propiedad que poseyó o controló el día 1º de enero de este año.

¿Quién debe hacer una declaración de propiedad?
Debe hacer una declaración de propiedad si Ud. es dueño y gana ingresos de una propiedad personal—por ejemplo, el inventario y equipo utilizado en un negocio. Si usted no declara a tiempo, o si presenta una declaración incompleta o falsa, se le puede imponer una multa de un 10 hasta un 50 por ciento.

¿Que ventajas me da?
Las ventajas de hacer una declaración de propiedad son:

- Ud. registra su opinión sobre la valoración de su propiedad. El distrito debe avisarle por escrito y explicarle como protestar el nuevo valor y el cambio ante su junta de revisión.
- Registra su dirección correcta para que le puedan mandar sus tarifas de impuestos. Según la ley, Ud. es responsable por pagar sus impuestos sin demora o de pagar cualquier multa que resulte por haberlos pagado tarde—aunque la tarifa se haya mandado a una dirección equivocada.
- También puede someter un "reporte de valoración disminuida" para avisar al distrito de cualquier reducción significativa en la valoración de su propiedad en el 2003. El distrito examinará su propiedad antes de designarle un valor en el 2004.

¿Cual es la fecha límite?
El 15 de abril es el último día para mandar sus declaraciones para el 2005. Puede obtener una extensión automática hasta el 15 de mayo si la pide por escrito en o antes del 15 de abril. El jefe de valoración/tasación puede extender su plazo otros 15 días después del 15 de mayo si usted puede mostrar una razón justificada para la extensión.

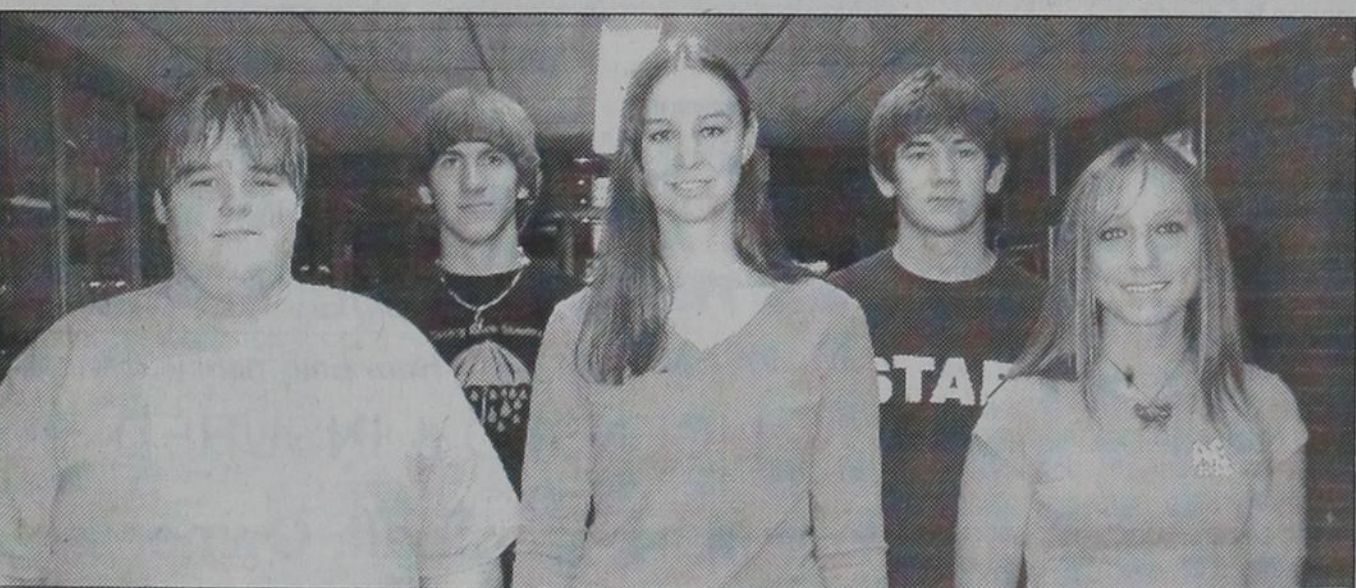

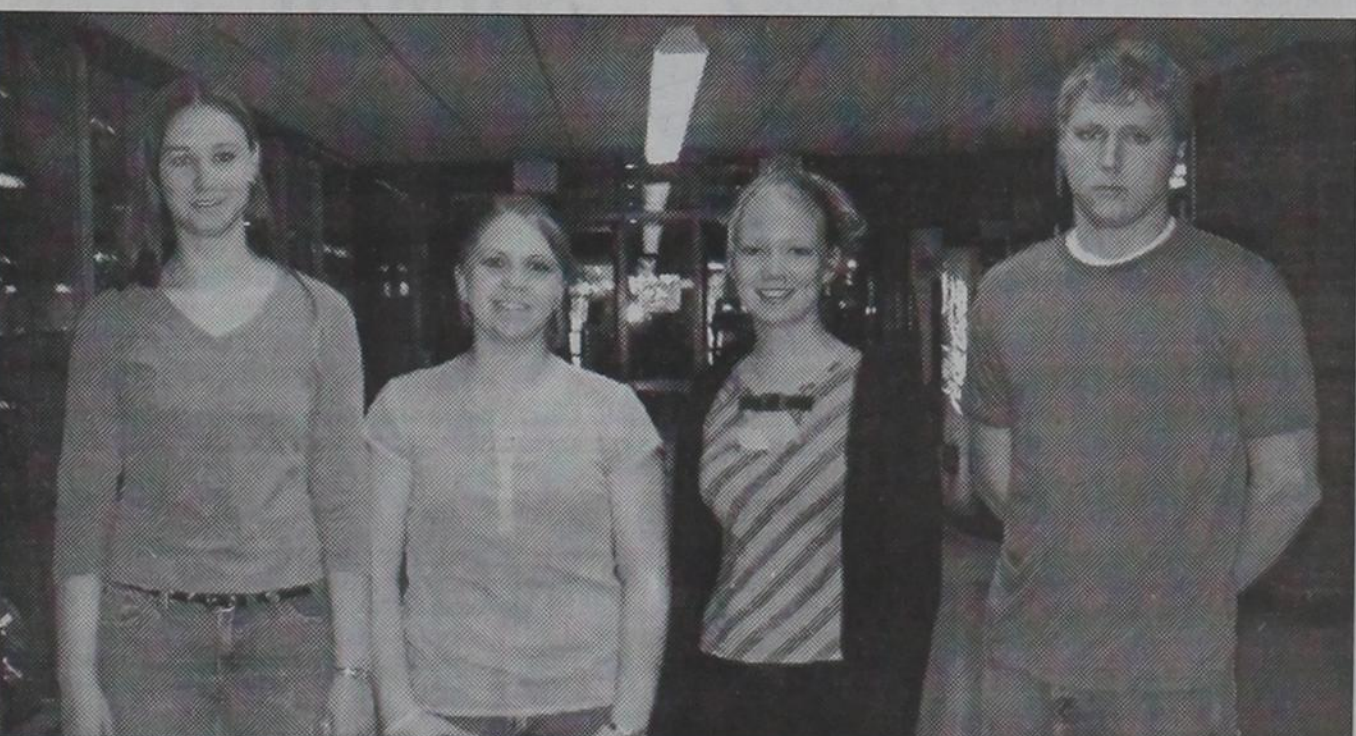

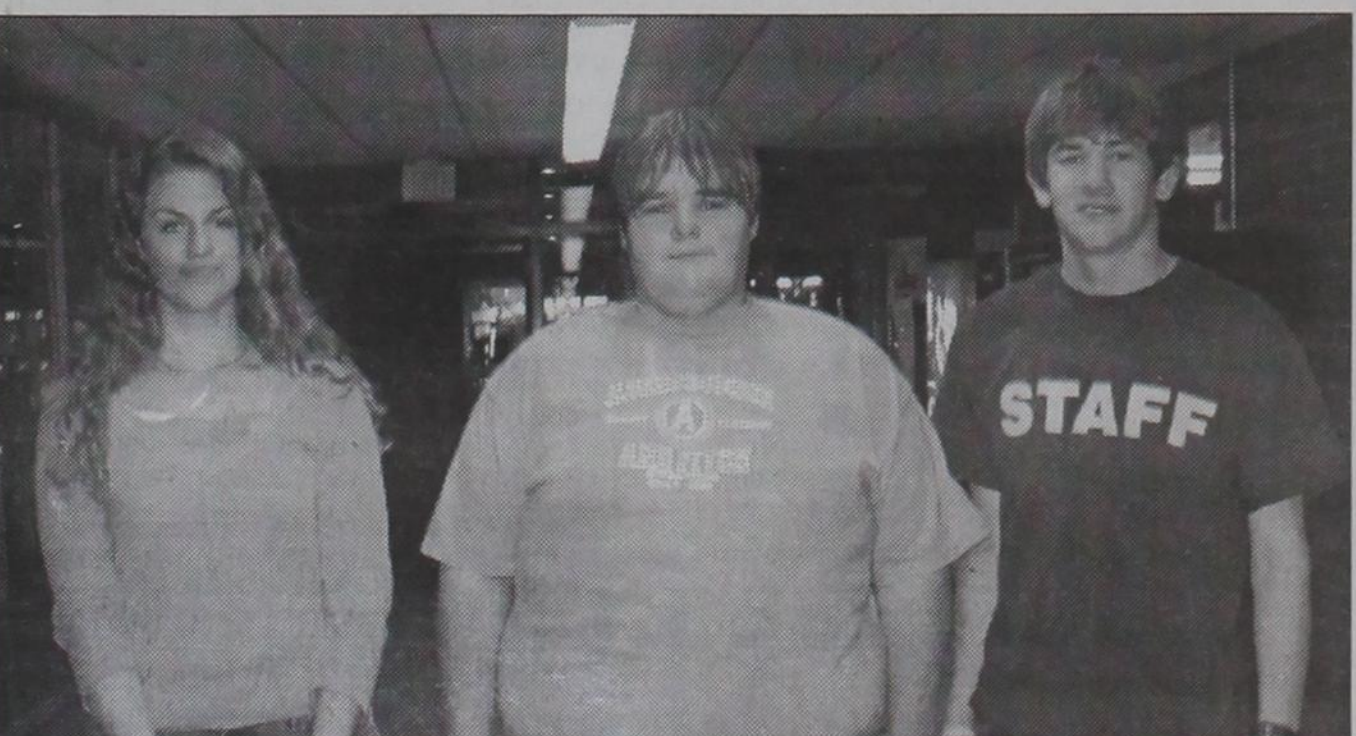

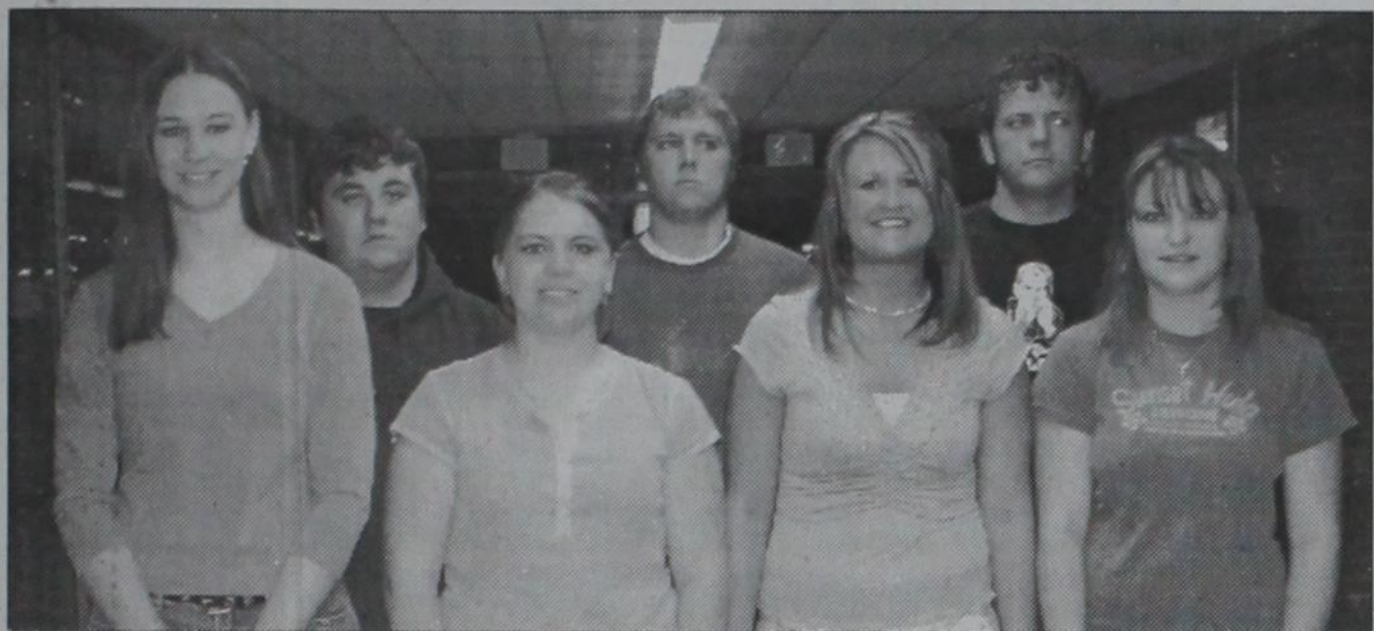

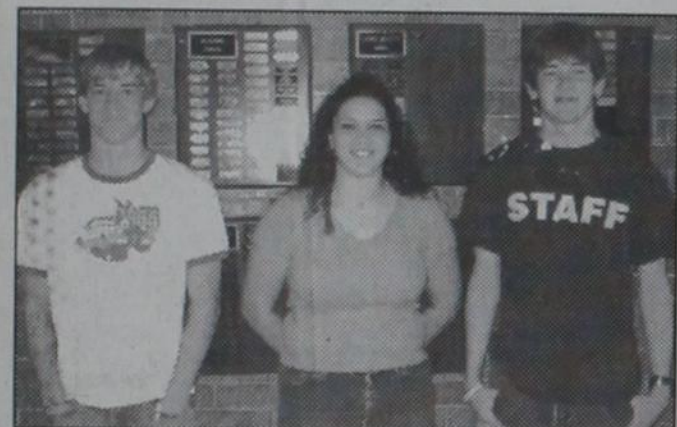

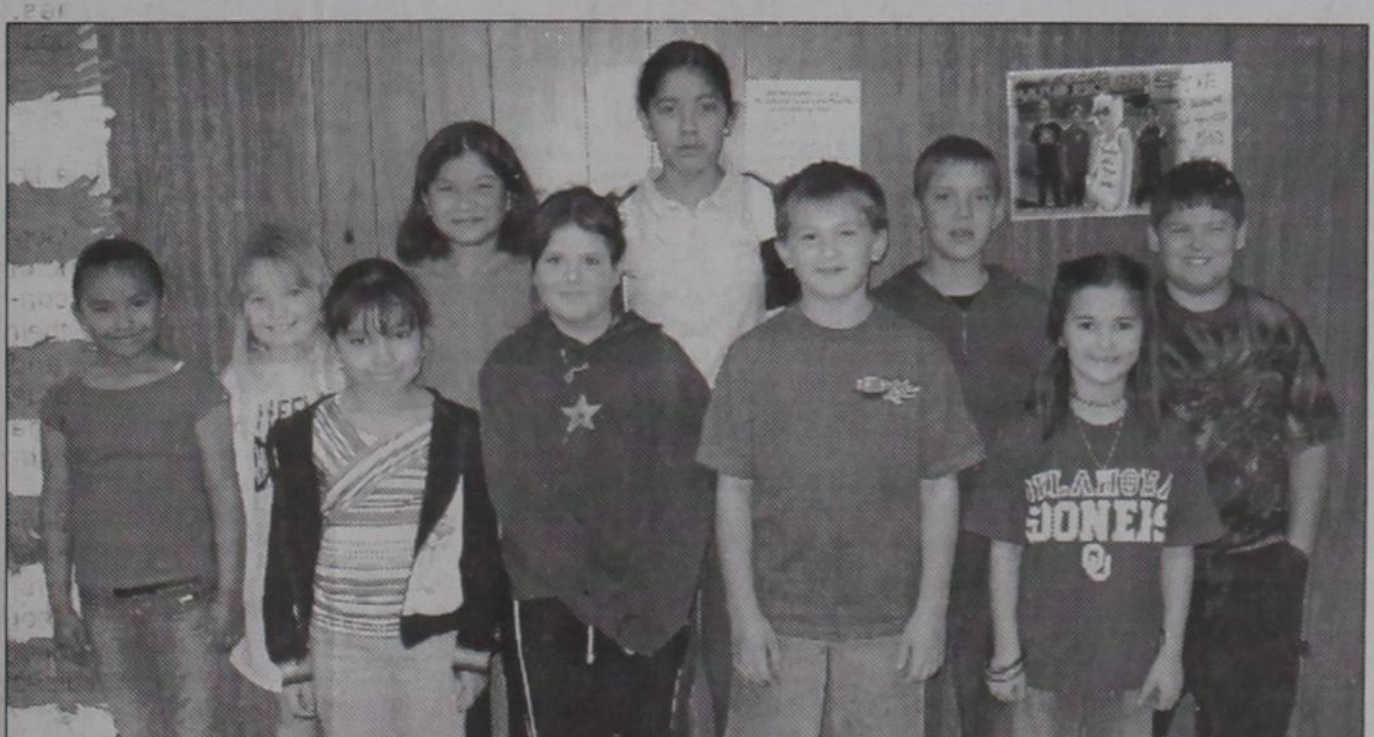

USDA Rural Development Has \$8.9 Million Available in Broadband Funds

Bryan Daniel, USDA Rural Development State Director, announced today \$8.9 million in broadband grant funds are available for connecting essential community facilities to high-speed telecommunications in rural towns and communities where broadband service does not exist.

"The need to expand broadband service is essential to economic growth in these most isolated communities," said Acting Under Secretary for Rural Development Gil Gonzalez. "Having access to high speed telecommunications for basic community services assists rural communities in meeting public safety needs."

"The expansion of these technologies will better equip our rural communities to enhance opportunities for overall economic development," said Daniel. "The funds from this program will provide community-oriented connectivity services that deliver enhanced educational, health care and public safety services for rural Texas communities."

More than \$30 million in three years have been invested by USDA Rural Development through the Community Connect Broadband Grant Program. To date, 90 communities have participated in the program to connect essential services of police and fire protection, local government, hospitals, libraries and schools to broadband service. For their part of the project, the communities will make at least 10 computers available to the public with set hours and instructions available for use on the internet.

Broadband transmission service is vital to the economic development, education, health and safety of rural Americans. The purpose of the Community Broadband Connect Grant Program is to provide grant funds to eligible applicants that will provide currently unserved areas with broadband transmission services. Incorporated organizations, federally recognized Indian tribes, state, or local governments, profit and non-profit corporations are eligible to apply. Grant funds may be used for the construction improvement, or the expansion of a community center that furnishes free access to broadband internet service.

The minimum award per grant is \$50,000, and there is no maximum. Applications must be completed and submitted no later than May 31, 2005, to U.S. Department of Agriculture, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW, Room 2845, Stop

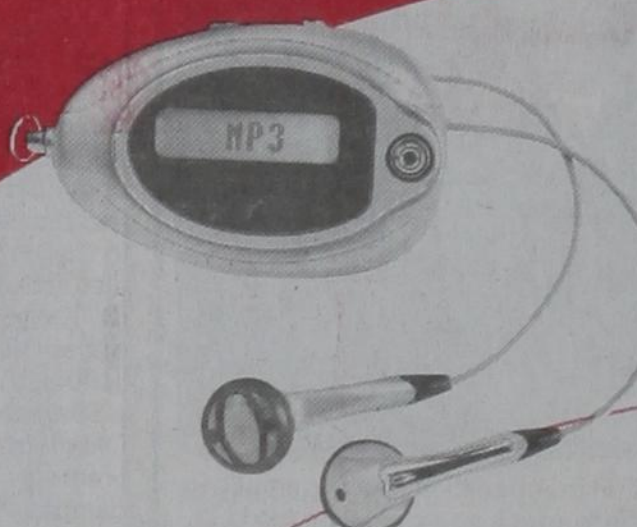

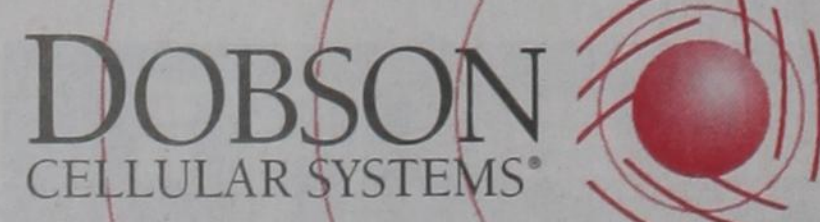
