Ft. Elliott Pre-K & Kindergarten Notification

Any child who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1 of this year is eligible to attend kindergarten. Any child who will be four years old on or before Sept. 1 of this year may attend pre-kindergarten at Fort Elliott CISD.

The State of Texas requires these things for a child to be registered for public school: 1. Copy of Child's Official State Birth Certificate 2. Copy of Child's Immunization Record, and 3. Copy of the child's social security number.

Fort Elliott CISD starts on August 16, 2005.

Wheeler Co. Commissioners Meet; Unpaid Taxes Down By \$64,000

Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on August 8, 2005, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom. Sixteen items were on the agenda.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented.

The monthly reports of the Justices of the Peace, County Tax Assessor and County Clerk were presented and approved.

Approval of hourly payroll time sheets.

The bills were approved for payment.

Item number five had to do with the budget. The item was tabled.

Also tabled was "consideration of the courthouse restoration project".

The burn ban will remain in effect.

Items eight through twelve had to do with crossings of county roads for pipelines. Enbridge Pipelines (Texas Gathering), L.P., asked to cross County Line Road and County Road B. CenterPoint Energy asked permission to cross County Road 26. O'Ryan Oil and Gas was given permission to cross County Road T. Newfield Exploration will cross County Road 15. Dominion E&P will put a line across County Line Road and County Road 17.

The county adopted resolution to enter into an agreement with the State of Texas for the County's estimated costs for three (3) TxDOT road projects in Wheeler County. Road construction involves Hwy 83 south from Wheeler for four miles—\$1,023,000. Hwy. 152 east will be from the city limits to the state line—\$7,941,000. The cost to the county for Hwy. 152 west from the city limits—\$5,842,000.

Joel Finsterwald, Wheeler County Sheriff was given permission to apply for a STEP Grant. The grant would help pay cost of more patrolling by deputies. The state pays a certain percent of the costs.

Joel Finsterwald asked and was given permission to place non-exempt tags on the new Chevy pickup. This would allow the Sheriff to have a lower profile when

needed. Scott Porter presented the Delinquent Tax Roll. The total of the delinquent taxes was down by \$64,000 from last year; total delinquent taxes are \$580,477.06.







Meeting For Beef Producers

Beef producers wanting to know about marketing options for finished cattle can attend the Beef Grid Marketing 101-North seminar Aug. 16 at West Texas A&M University here.

"Marketing Strategies for Finished Cattle" will begin at 8 a.m. in the Agriculture and Natural Science Building, and include a noon lunch. The program is jointly sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and West Texas A&M.

Dr. Ted McCollum, moderator and Extension beef cattle specialist, said, "Basically, beef or carcass grids are established so you can differentiate among cattle by discovering a value for individual carcasses rather than a group of live cattle. There is continued interest, so we're providing opportunities for producers and cattle feeders to become more familiar with carcass grids to discover value for finished cattle."

Attendees will get a virtual packing plant tour, during which they will learn about beef carcass grading, carcass quality defects, and carcass and animal maturity. There will also be a discussion on understanding grids.

Marcine Moldenhauer, strategic supply chain manager for Cargill Meat Solutions in Wichita, Kan., will explain how base prices, premiums and discounts are determined.

Dr. Ted Schroeder, noted livestock marketing economist, will compare live and grid marketing and discuss marketing trends for feedlot cattle.

Dr. Dan Hale, Extension beef cattle specialist in College Station, and Mike Brown, West Texas A&M assistant professor of ruminant nutrition, will present an interactive "picking the right marketing method" demonstration and competition.

Other speakers, including a panel of cattle feeders, will address trends in marketing finished cattle and matching them to different marketing options.

Wheeler ISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Breakfast & Lunch Program. Each school has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) only have to list their child's name and food stamp or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application. Households that do not list a

food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the Social Security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a Social Security number, the household member must indicate that a Social Security number is not available by writing the word "NONE. No Number," or some indication that the person does not have a Social Security number. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy, the reviewing official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Roy Baker 826-5241.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above. In accordance with federal law



Reasons Given For Pruning Of Trees

People commonly prune trees to remove dead branches, remove crowded or rubbing limbs, or to eliminate hazards. Trees also are pruned to increase light and air penetration to the inside of the tree's crown or to surrounding landscape. But in most cases, mature trees are pruned as a corrective or preventative measure. Since each cut has the potential to change the growth of the tree, no branch should be removed without a reason, Skiera said.

"Urban environments are not 'natural' conditions for trees, so trees usually have to be modified in some way," Skiera said. "But homeowners need to remember that heavy pruning can severely stress a tree. They need to exercise caution and a little common sense when they prune."

Have you ever wondered about entering a cooking contest? Well, wonder no longer.

The Potter County Beef Education Task Force will host "The Best of Beef" Cooking School from 10 a.m. to noon Aug. 27 for individuals interested in entering the Bob Givens Memorial Lean Ground Beef Contest at the Tri-State Fair this fall.

The cooking school will take place at the Potter County Extension Kimble 4-H Center, 3301 E. 10th Ave., Amarillo.

Melina Amarillo, Market Street Cooking Cottage chef, and Becky McKinley, contributing foods columnist for the Amarillo Globe-News, will be presenters for the cooking school.

Pennington will share techniques for transforming a basic recipe into an original dish. Herbs and spices that enhance the flavor of beef will be discussed. She also will suggest ways to reduce the fat content in recipes.

A variety of cooking techniques for lean ground beef which will be the focus of McKinley's presentation, as she shows how to make dishes ranging from appetizers to main dishes. Food safety issues also will be addressed as McKinley talks about properly measuring the temperature of different dishes. Additionally, she will cover the basics of marinades.

Abandoned Wells Are A Problem

An estimated 150,000 abandoned water wells exist in Texas, and each one poses a threat to water safety, said Dr. Bruce Lesikar, Texas Cooperative Extension agricultural engineer here. "An abandoned well is a direct channel from the surface to the aquifer below," Lesikar said. "Contaminants that enter a well are introduced directly into the aquifer with no opportunity for natural filtration by soils or geologic materials."

If the abandoned well is uncapped, a contaminant can easily enter and potentially pollute the underlying aquifer.

Plugging abandoned wells is not just a smart move to keep water safe, but it's also the law, said Dr. Monty Dozier of College Station, Extension soil scientist. Texas law holds landowners responsible for plugging abandoned wells and for any contamination or injury the well caused.

"Abandoned water wells need to be properly closed," Dozier said. A well is considered abandoned if it has not been used for six consecutive months.

In some cases, landowners can close the well themselves. Landowners can generally plug both water wells with less than 100 feet of standing water, and large diameter, hand-dug wells, Lesikar said. But before any work is done, they need to contact the Water Well Drillers Program of the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation and get a plugging method approved, he said. A well plugging report must be completed and filed with the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation and the local Groundwater Conservation District.

To plug the well, the dimensions are taken, debris is removed, and the well is disinfected with bleach. Some of the outside casing is removed, and the well is properly filled. The last step is completing the well plugging report. Filing this report is critical to documenting

by the panel of presenters.


