# **Meet the Mustangs** Thurs., August 27th



St. Jude Children's Research Hospital announced today that Bobby Blackburn will serve as coordinator for the Briscoe "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon September 19, as the date of the event. The ride will begin at the Intersection of highways 83 & 1046 at 9:30 a.m. Contact Becky Blackburn 806-375-2209 for more information.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, which was founded in 1962 by the late entertainer, Danny Thomas, is America's largest childhood cancer research, treatment and education center. The Memphis based hospital has a local impact because it freely provides area doctors and hospitals with assistance in diagnosis and the latest information for treatments and procedures.

The non-sectarian hospital currently follows over 4,500 active patients. Because treatment is provided to all patients regardless of their family's ability to pay, it costs St. Jude Hospital over \$215,000 per day to keep its doors open. These funds come primarily from Public donations.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Ryan Martin of Waxhaw, NC. Ryan was diagnosed in June 1986 with a Wilms' tumor on his left kidney. The kidney was removed and Ryan was given 6 months of chemotherapy at St. Jude. When he was 2 1/2 he developed a Wilms' tumor on his right kidney. Ryan again received chemotherapy and his doctor discovered





Living out in the country is very fascinating to us. We see nature in its finest with all the little creatures and the trees and the flowers and specially our garden. No I am no gardener er horoculturist but I can dig a hole or rototill the garden an then Mama takes over with her green thumb an we have vegetables or flowers or beautiful shrubs. Unbelievable, honest it is. Just now she came in from the garden with a nice Irish potato she had grown an she mentioned as she pulled out the carrots the hole would fill up with water. Been havin a bunch of rain lately an the garden gets a bit soggy. Recon you could say she is a hydrofonic gardener with a bit uv dirt thrown in.

We have a couple of white walnut trees that folks call butternut trees and the trees were planted some years ago by the folks that built the home. One tree has a shade span of over 60 ft. and the other is much smaller and has just now started to produce fruit er nuts. The larger tree last year produced over 400 nuts an we gave the State Forester folks about 200 seed or nuts. Haven't heard if any of the seed have germinated from them but some folks say they have little fellers coming up an someday will be quite large. We've heard from folks that the Butternut tree is becoming scarce in this part of the country for some reason. I've heard the wood isn't very good for furniture or lumber but one person told of some beautiful furniture made from the wood. Why am I tellin you this? Durned if I know but commin from the Panhandle of Texas all trees facinate me cause I see more trees everyday goin to the mall than there is in the whole Panhandle. Now don't jump too quick, I mean native trees that aren't ordered from Monkey Ward or whoever sells store bought trees. As a little shaver there in the Panhandle I've heard many of the old timers tell about wood that was shipped in to the area from Dodge City, Kansas. East of Amarillo, Texas there is a little plot that has a fence around it and it used to have a live hackberry or persimmon tree in the plot. That was a tree that was sort of a landmark cause if you were headin East and wanted to go toward Dodge or Canadian you would go to the tree and turn left or if you were going toward Quitaque you'd turn to the right or if you were going toward Mobeetie you'd just hitail it straight ahead. If you doubt this jes get on I-40 goin E of Amarillo as I call it an not to far from town on your rite side there it is even with a nice marker tellin the story. #### KIDS HAVE A RIGHT TO HEALTHY BODIES

Parents need to exercise authority in the home; therefore talking about "rights of children" may rub against the grain. Where health is concerned, however, children need and deserve for parents to meet necessary standards for well-being.

The critical time for well-baby checkups and immunizations against common childhood diseases is between the ages of birth to 4 years old. Parents hold the key to setting up regular visits to the doctor who is the best source for knowing when and what health practices and immunizations are necessary.

Diphtheria and polio immunizations rates among preschool children in the United States average about 60 percent lower than in many Western European countries. Immunizations are the most healthy and cost effective ways to control communicable dis-

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eases. The following guidelines are provided by the American Academy of Pediatrics' <u>Guidelines for Health Supervision II and pediatrics clinics:</u>

Newborns — A complete physical examination at birth, including metabolic screening for phenylketonuria, hypothyroidism and other inborn errors is conducted. New parents need a lot of information about how to prevent injuries in the home, securing the baby in a car safety restraint seat, methods and schedules for feeding, pros and cons of breast and bottle feeding, what to do when the baby gets sick, sleep practices, bladder and bowel habits, managing the baby's crying, responding to the baby's needs, the importance of holding, cuddling and talking to the baby and the importance of parents spending time together. Both Moms and Dads need special consideration and help to relieve stress during this time. It's important not to be isolated from friends, family and other support givers.

Following the birth of the baby, parents will be told when to bring in the baby for the next visit, including immunization series. Hematocrit or hemoglobin tests and urinalysis may be suggested between 1 and 12 months of age.

At Two to four weeks, a complete physical exam is given. Parents should be informed about the benefits and risks of immunizations, and that the following schedule is required at:

<u>Two, Four, Six and 18 months: Four</u> <u>years</u> —DTP (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis or whooping cough); OPV (oral polio vaccine); HBPV (hemophilus b conjugate vaccine); prevents spinal meningitis; TD (tetanus, diphtheria) booster recommended every ten years following first series of shots. Parents need to know that fever and irritability are common with immunizations.

Twelve months - TB skin test; annual skin tests are recommended.

Fifteen months or at doctor's recommendation - Due to the recent surge of measles in the United States, two shots are required by everyone. First, at 15 months with a booster between 5 and 12 years old. Second, adults born after 1957 need a MMR booster. Hemophilia influenza B vaccine may be given; MMR (measles, mumps and rubella).

Two years — Hemophilus influenza type b diphtheria toxoid conjugate vaccine or H. influenza type b capsular polysaccharide vaccine, as per doctor's recommendation. Parents are encouraged to become involved in parenting education classes. Guidance from an informed leader, and support from other parents with similar concerns, relieves uncertainty at a time when the baby's needs and demands are changing rapidly. Eight years - Mumps vaccine given is not previously or if there is not history of mumps; Rubella vaccine given to girls if there is no evidence or serologic immunity. Summers can provide more time for parents to spend with children in relaxed, fun activities at home or away. These plans can be spoiled, however, by the unwelcome visit of childhood diseases unless parents take necessary steps to prevent them. Remember, kids deserve healthy bodies too.


The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides 13,411 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 16,301 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$ .82/\$100 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.
