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Coronado Hospital Ground Breaking Set

Construction crews are moving in this week to being the construction of a 30,000 square foot medical office building north of Coronado Hospital, following ground breaking ceremonies Thursday. The two story structure is scheduled for completion March, 1993, according to Bruce W. Reinhardt, administrator.

State Rep. Warren Chisum, hospital board of trustees chairman Vic Raymond, Economic Development Board chairman Bill Waters, and Rene Grabato, MD, chief of the medical staff, participated in the ceremonies with Reinhardt.

The concrete plaster building will be finished to match the exterior of the hospital, and will have enough office space for 10 physicians. Cost for the building, which is being developed by Healthcare Properties, Inc., is estimated at \$3 million, Coronado Hospital is the "master lease holder" for the facility, and has an option to buy after four years.

Several of the offices will be leased by physicians that Coronado Hospital is currently recruiting. "We're offering to let the physician help choose the decor for his or her new office. We've worked with the architects to plan an area that will be most efficient for the physician and the patient," Reinhardt said.

Coronado Medical Building North will be attached to Coronado Hospital by an atrium to provide both patients and physicians easy access to the hospital's ancillary departments. Reinhardt said the second floor of the building is designed to be used for hospital space if the need arises in the future.

The first phase of the new building will be the construction of an employee parking area northwest of the hospital.
