

Commissioners' Court Meeting; Co. Gets \$500 Per Road Crossing

The first regular September session for the Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met Monday, September 12, 2005, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse

at 401 Main Street in Wheeler. Twenty-one items were on the agenda.

The court approved the minutes of the previous meetings.

Approved the hourly payroll time sheets for payment.

The monthly reports presented by the Justice of the Peace, County Clerk and District Clerk were approved as presented.

Bills presented were approved for payment.

No action was taken on the budget.

No action was taken on the courthouse restoration project.

With the recent moisture, the commissioners did not feel the need for the burn ban to be in effect.

The commissioners voted to charge a fee for road crossings in Wheeler County, effective August 29, 2005. The fee will be \$500 for each road crossing; only cashier's checks accepted.

Items 9, 10 and 11 were road crossings. Enbridge Pipelines (Texas Gathering) L.P., was given permission to cross County road 22 for installation of an oil and gas pipeline and allowed to cross County Road E for installation of an oil and gas pipeline. Chesapeake Energy Marketing, Inc. was given permission to cross County Road A for installation of an oil and gas pipeline.

The court voted to adopt a resolution to participate in the Texas Building and Procurement Commission Cooperative Purchasing Program.

The court voted to renew a contract with the Texas Attorney General's Office to receive grant money for the Texas VINE Program on the recommendation of Sheriff Finsterwald.

Tracie Simpson presented her Registered Texas Assessor/Collector (RTA) Certificate. It was accepted by the commissioners.

David Baker was added to the county payroll as a full time maintenance employee. His salary will be \$1475.00, as of September 16, 2005.

Daryl I. Snelgrooves, Commissioner Pct. 1, requested the court's permission to remove Luke Horton from his payroll, effective September 6, 2005.

Commissioner Snelgrooves ask the court's permission to allow third party to accept electronic payment for vehicle registration renewal VIA the internet and the RTS online renewal event. Permission was granted; county citizens may now register their vehicles via internet.

Ken Daughtry, Emergency Management Coordinator asked the court to adopt the Annex P—Mitigation Action Plan and Wheeler County Hazard Analysis. The plan was adopted. Daughtry was commended for the job he has been doing for the county.

The commissioners voted to accept Margaret Dorman's recommendation to use the DRE voting machines. The machines use a paper ballot, which may be marked by hand or through the computer; it also indicates if the voter failed to mark the ballot properly at the time the vote is cast. The county will have 10 machines, purchased through grant money. The commissioners voted to spend \$6,000 over the grand funds in order to have ten counting machines. Delivery is expected around the first of the year.

An immunization clinic sponsored by the Texas Department of Health will be held Monday, September 19, 2005, from 10:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. in the Wheeler ISD Auditorium. The following immunizations will be available: DTP, Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hib, Hepatitis, and Varicella.

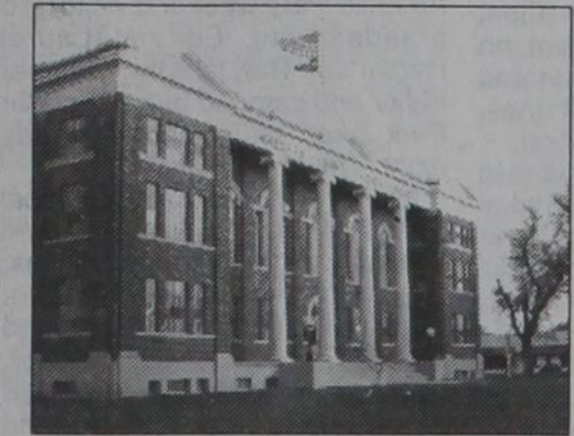

We spent the weekend at OKC with the Bryants and Ronal Jr. Julie Schmidt also visited and we got in some game playing.

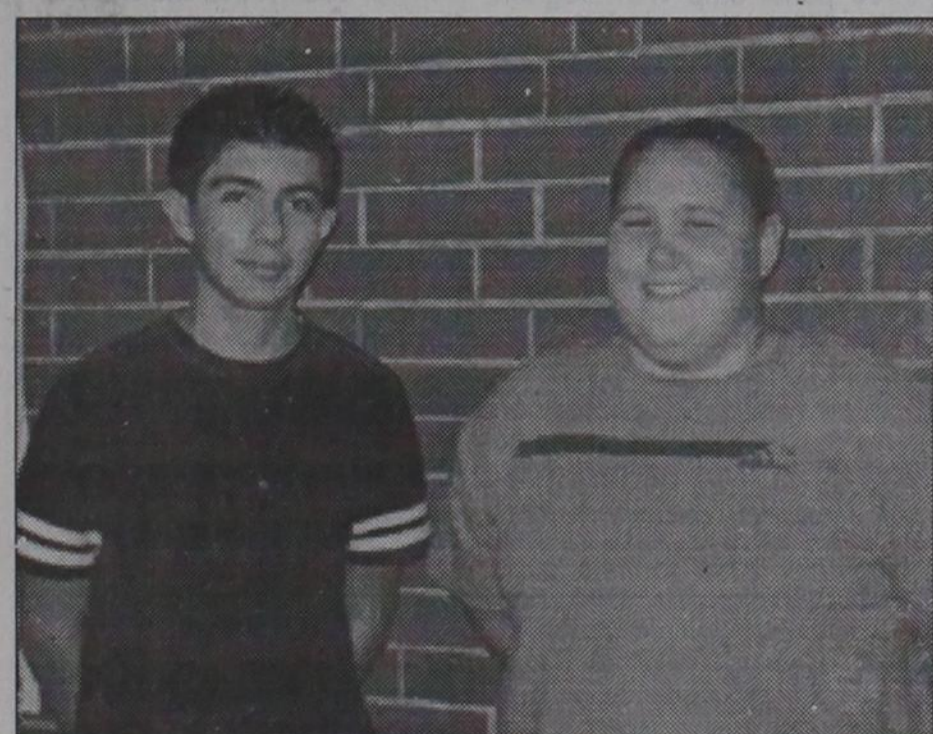

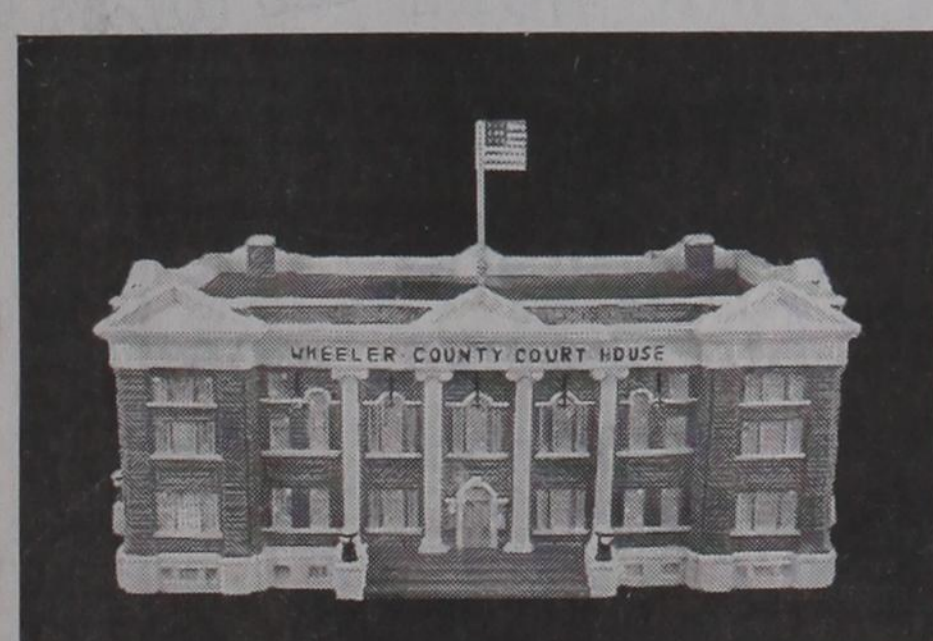

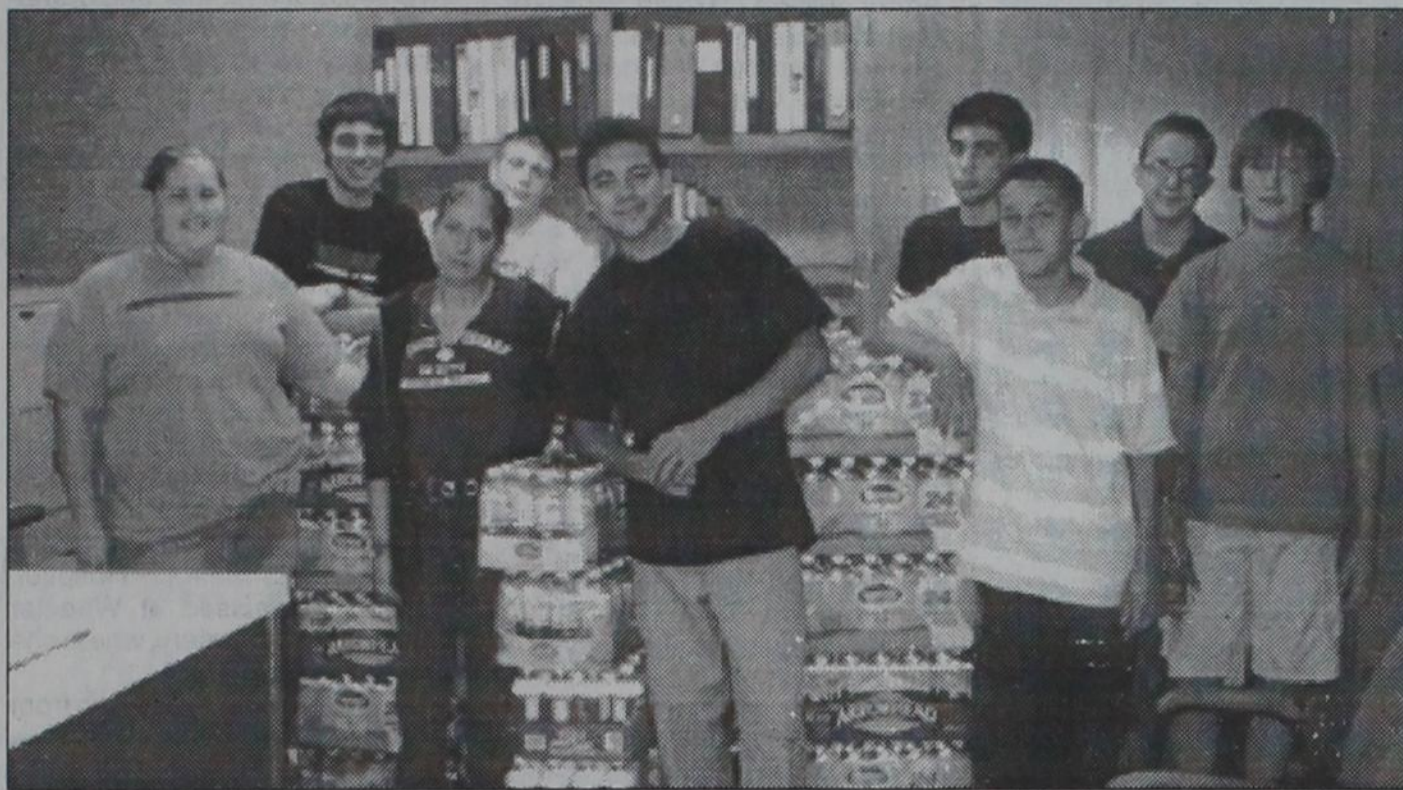

Two Traffic Fatalities Reported

A crash this morning approximately eight miles north of Wheeler has left two from Amarillo dead and two others critically injured following a collision between a bus and a passenger vehicle.

At 9:15 a.m. on Saturday, September 10th, a 2000 Ford Taurus was parked on the shoulder of US 83 approximately 8 miles north of Wheeler. The Taurus was facing north parked in between two other vehicles. An Eagle bus traveling north driven by Jose Garcia, 52 yrs. old of Clanton, Ok, came over a hill and was going to pass the 3 vehicles sitting on the shoulder when the Taurus made a u-turn in front of the bus. The bus struck the Taurus broadside and knocked it into the median. The driver of the Taurus, Stephanie Lynn Fitting 34 yrs. old of Amarillo, was pronounced dead at the scene by the Wheeler County Justice of the Peace-Meadows. Also killed in the accident was a passenger Ruth Barton Hale 80 yrs. old of Amarillo. "Stephanie Fitting and her passengers were reportedly going to a volleyball game at the Fort Elliot school north of Wheeler", said Trooper Daniel Hawthorne, Information Officer for the Texas DPS in Childress.

Two other juvenile passengers in the vehicle were critically injured and flown to Amarillo's North West Texas Hospital by helicopter. The driver of the bus was not injured. The conditions surrounding the accident and other details are still under investigation by Texas DPS Troopers.

Competitiveness Workshop Is Held

Over 45 individuals participated in a three day "Hometown Competitiveness Training" workshop field in Canadian August 24th through 26th. The workshop was conducted by speakers from the Heartland Center for Leadership Development, the Center for Rural Entrepreneurship, and the Nebraska Community Foundation. Funding for the training was provided by the North Rolling Plains, High Plains and Wes-Tex RC&D Councils with a grant from the Texas Association of RC&D Councils in partnership with the Ogallala Commons organization centered in Friona.

The purpose of the training was to help rural communities develop economic development strategies geared for small communities. Training included Entrepreneurship, Management of Charitable Assets in a Community, Youth Attraction, and Leadership Development.

The idea behind this training is that small rural communities cannot compete with big cities to attract large businesses that bring dozens of jobs to a community. Instead we need to focus our economic development efforts on retaining and growing existing businesses with an emphasis on entrepreneurship. We also need to find ways to attract young people (and families) back to their hometowns by helping them buy or start businesses and fostering a positive atmosphere for entrepreneurship. We also need to develop a local organization, such as a community foundation, that can be used to transmit wealth from one generation to the next while keeping it in the community to help grow businesses and create jobs. And finally, we need to develop local leadership with an emphasis on getting young people to "step up to the plate" and serve in leadership roles.

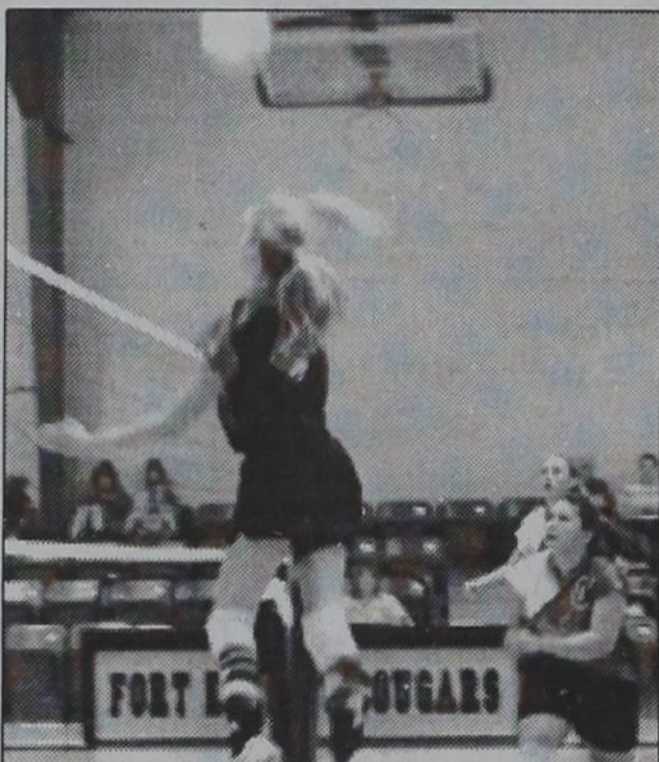

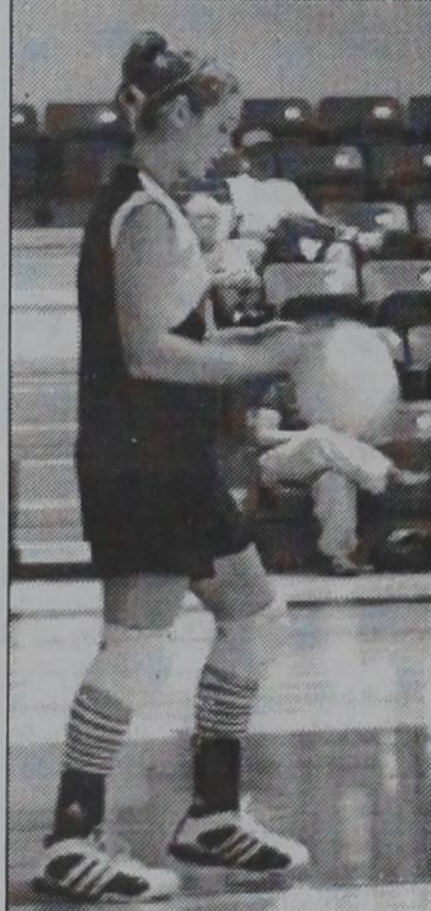

One of my favorite comic strips is Dilbert, by Scott Adams, usually one that deals with office humor. A few weeks ago there was a comic that is both funny and tragic at the same time, with the theme not being about the office, but rather religion. It was a three panel strip with Dogbert telling Dilbert "I decided to start a discount religion. The tithing would only be 5% and I'd let people sin as much as they wanted. The only problem is that I don't want to spend time with anyone who would join that sort of religion." (Reminds me a little of an old Groucho Marx comment: "I wouldn't want to belong to any club that would have me as a member.")
Back to the Dilbert cartoon now. The comic strip is funny and ironic, but it is also quite convicting. How many people actually do tithe (give away 10% of everything they have to help good Godly things)? How many people just keep on sinning regardless of their public desire to be perceived as a good Christian? Christian dedication seems to be dwindling among many professing Christians. The word for a person who claims to be a Christian but doesn't live like a Christian is an ugly one: Hypocrite! And almost everyone would say the same thing: "I don't want to be a hypocrite or be around a hypocrite." Jesus, on this subject, quoted from an Old Testament passage in Mark 7:6 concerning hypocrites: "These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me." 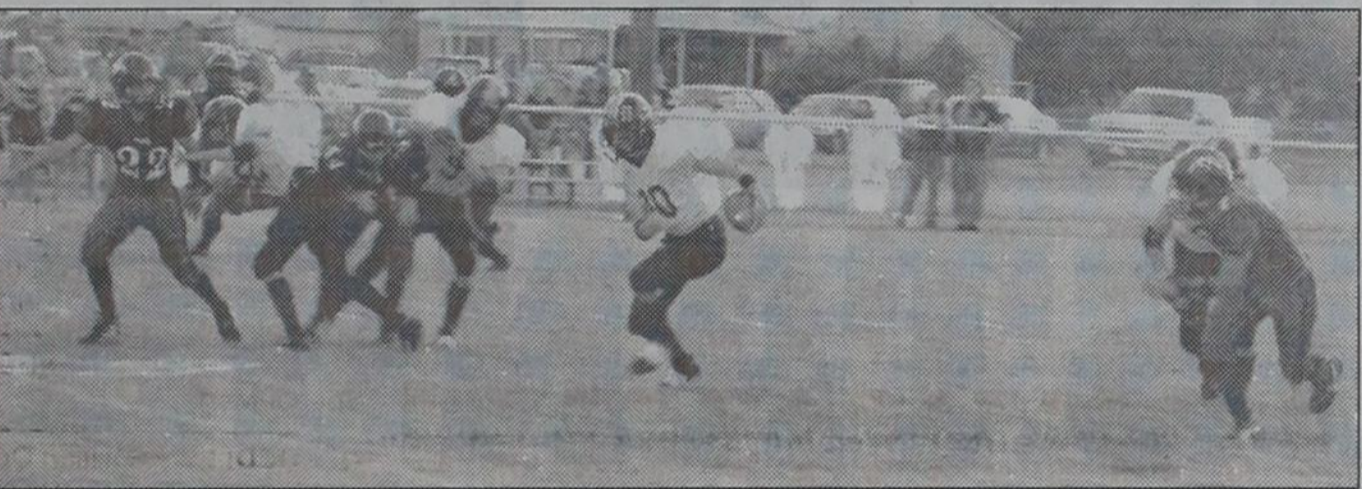

PUBLIC NOTICE
BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 2005

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would create a Texas rail relocation and improvement fund in the state treasury and would authorize grants of state revenue and issuance of public debt to relocate, rehabilitate, and expand privately and publicly owned passenger and freight rail facilities and to construct railroad underpasses and overpasses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas rail relocation and improvement fund and authorizing grants of money and issuance of obligations for financing the relocation, rehabilitation, and expansion of rail facilities."

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would provide that marriage in Texas is solely the union of a man and woman, and that the state and its political subdivisions could not create or recognize any legal status identical to or similar to marriage, including such legal status relationships created outside of Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibiting this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 80)

HJR 80 would provide that local economic development program loans or grants (other than debts secured by a pledge of ad valorem taxes or financed by the issuance of any bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes) do not constitute or create debt. Any provision of state constitutional law that may prohibit or limit the authority of a political subdivision of the state to incur debt does not apply to those loans or grants.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying that certain economic development programs do not constitute a debt."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 would authorize a district judge to deny reinstatement of bail or new bail to a person accused of a felony, if the person's bail had been revoked or forfeited as a result of the person's violation of a condition of release related to the safety of a victim of the alleged offense or to the safety of the community.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a criminal defendant who violates a condition of the defendant's release pending trial."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 21)

SJR 21 would authorize the Legislature to exempt commercial loans from state usury laws that set maximum interest rates. "Commercial loans" are loans made primarily for business, commercial, investment, agricultural, or similar purposes and not primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to define rates of interest for commercial loans."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 87)

HJR 87 would increase the size of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct from eleven to thirteen members by increasing from four to five the number of public members and by adding a constitutional county court judge. The additions would ensure that the commission has an odd number of members, which is required by another provision of the state constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to include one additional public member and a constitutional county court judge in the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

PROPOSITION 7 (SJR 7)

SJR 7 would authorize new options for reverse mortgage agreements for senior homeowners allowing them to draw advances at unscheduled intervals, if and when needed, and only in the

amounts needed, during the loan term. These are in addition to options that would allow a lump sum payment after settlement or regular periodic, predetermined equal amounts over a term of years or the lifetime of the homeowner. Additionally, SJR 7 would: (1) prohibit the agreement from requiring the use of a credit card, debit card or similar device to obtain an advance; (2) prohibit the charge or collection of a transaction fee solely in connection with any debit or advance, after the time the extension of credit is established; and (3) prohibit the lender or holder from unilaterally amending the extension of credit.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing line-of-credit advances under a reverse mortgage."

PROPOSITION 8 (SJR 40)

SJR 40 would clear individual land titles by relinquishing and releasing all claims of state ownership interests, including mineral interests, in two local areas, namely, a roughly 4,600-acre area located roughly 14 miles southeast of Gilmer, Texas, and a separate 900-acre area located north of Tyler, Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur County and in Smith County."

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 would authorize the Legislature to provide staggered six year terms of office for board members serving on regional mobility authorities, with no more than one-third of the board positions being appointed every two years.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a six-year term for a board member of a regional mobility authority."

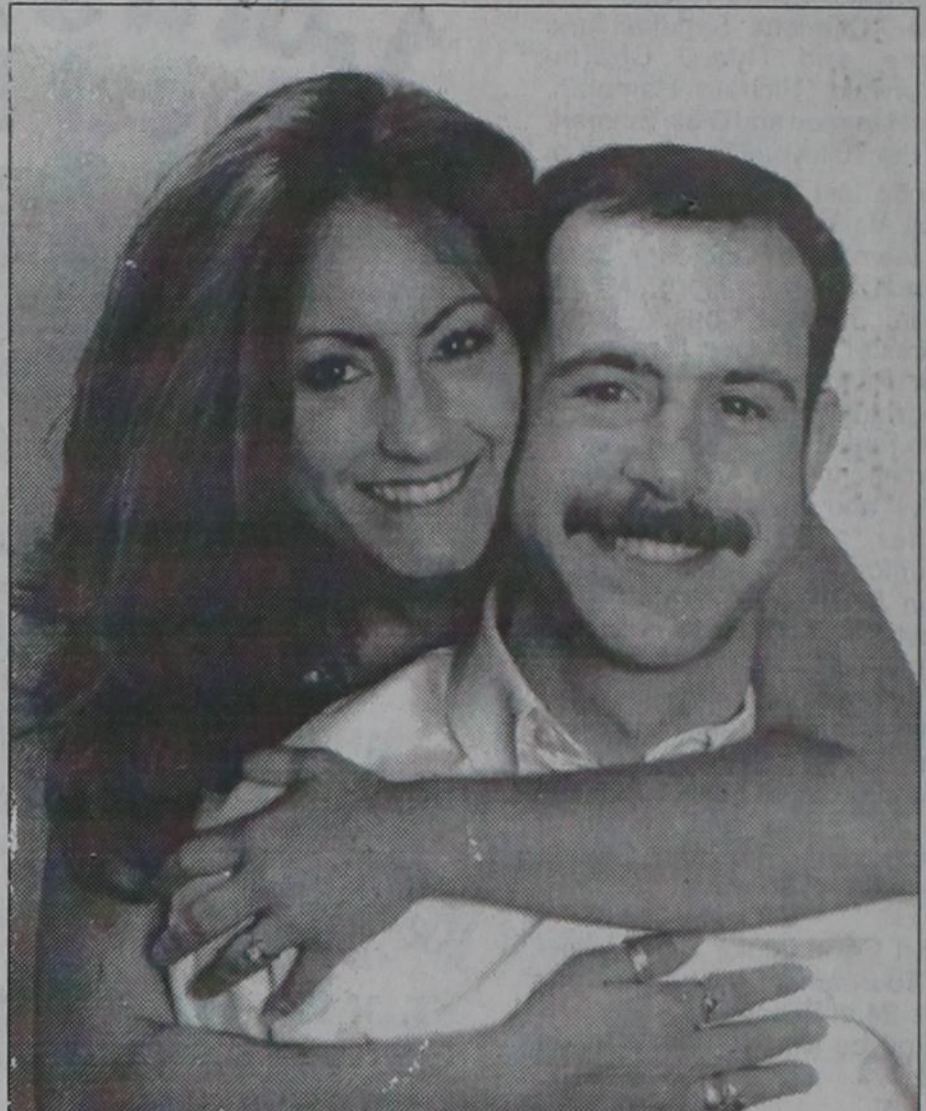

The book titled, "Seitz and Kindred Families" published in 1977 was extensively researched by Alma Totty Seitz and her mother-in-law, Hollie Elliott Seitz. The book is in the Mobeetie museum and may also be ordered from Charles Seitz. The following is taken from "Seitz and Kindred Families" and gives us a glimpse of this family.

The Seitz family came to the United States from Germany in the 1700's and to Texas in the late 1800's. In the early years of immigration to the US, various spellings of the name appeared including Seiz and Sides. The first proven ancestor for this particular family was a George Sides (Seitz) of North Carolina. The Seitz men fought in the Civil war on both sides. The present days Seitz of the Panhandle of Texas are descendants of Abel Seitz. He and his wife, Catherine Gross Seitz had 9 children: Laborn (or Laban), Jones, Darius (possibly Darius David), George Pinkney, Eliza, Jane, Emeline, Katie, and Hester. Laborn married Susan Emeline Sherrill and they had nine children, 5 sons and 4 daughters. Their first three children, Julius Lafayette, born in 1865, Mary Jane born in 1867, and Sara Annie born 1869 were born while the family lived in Catawba County, North Carolina. Later in 1869 the Seitz family left North Carolina with plans to move to Texas. They reached Benton County, Arkansas and settled near Ratskin, Arkansas until 1877. Four children were born in Arkansas; W.J. (Bill) in 1871, B.P. (Pink) in 1872, L.J. (Jeff) in 1875 and Susan Belle in 1877. The family arrived in Texas in the early part of 1880 and lived in Collin or Denton

County where A.G. (George) was born in 1880 and Hattie Pearl in 1882. Eventually the family moved to Montague County, Texas. In 1900 sons Pink and Jeff moved to Wheeler County, Texas. A few years later their father, Laborn Monroe, and wife Emeline moved to this area.

There are numerous relatives of this pioneer family still residing in the Texas and Oklahoma area. The gathering of this family began with a big fish fry in 1907. Because

many of the relatives lived nearby and contacts were numerous throughout the year, it was not until 1923 that the annual reunion was established. Today the custom of gathering on the Sunday before Labor Day continues. Several years ago a new custom was initiated with a church service before the potluck dinner. This custom seems appropriate as the ancestors were devout Christians. Sometimes stories are shared about remembrances of past relatives and occasions.
