Farmers Home Reviews Local Loan Portfolios

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) continues to review its portfolio for possible graduation of borrowers to private credit. FmHA credit programs are administered in a manner that will assure that they will not supplant or compete with credit available to entities from other reliable credit sources.

Nationwide, and on an annual basis, FmHA reviews its loan portfolio to determine if borrowers who have progressed to the point that they no longer need government assistance to obtain credit. These reviews are currently being conducted by the local FmHA offices.

Some of the considerations taken during these reviews are the borrower's present and potential income to meet the rates, terms, loan fees and conditions of other credit, as well as the impact graduation would have on typical user costs.

FmHA borrowers may be contacted to furnish information and to also contact area lenders to ascertain their ability to move their loan to private credit. Borrowers are encouraged to work closely with FmHA personnel during the graduation review process in order to comply with this requirement.
