# THE IMPORTANCE OF GETTING THE MIND RENEWED

Romans 12:2 says we must be transformed by the renewing of our minds in order to prove out the perfect and good will of God. Ephesians 4:23 says we are to be renewed in the spirit of our minds. The biggest hindrance with most Christians in receiving benefits from God that He promised is in their minds. The mind is the biggest battle arena for the devil. If he can get people to believe a lie, he can keep them bound. Knowing truth sets people free according to Jesus Christ. If knowing and believing truth sets people free, then believing lies will bind people.

Some people remain sick and do not receive healing even though God has made provision for it because they don't believe He wants them to be healed. You must learn the truth to have freedom from what binds you. Sickness certainly binds people. The sicker you are, the less you can do. Men teach us to accept sickness as part of God's plan for us. God never said that. In Jeremiah 29:11, God said, "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, saith the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you an expected end." I believe that the ultimate goal of Bible study is application and not merely knowledge. The Apostle
