Wheeler ISD ENROLLMENT AUGUST 14

Wheeler ISD will have enrollment from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Friday, August 14.

All students will need to fill out an enrollment/information card.

New students to Wheeler ISD also need to complete a Home Language Survey, Student Health Information, and a request for release of records from your previously attended school. Please bring a copy of your child's immunization records for the school nurse.

If you child is enrolling in public school for the first time, bring an official copy of their birth certificate.

If you feel that you may qualify for free or reduced breakfast/lunch, you may apply for this service also.

School will begin on Monday, August 17 at 8:15 a.m.

Wheeler ISD Elementary And Junior High Registration

Registration for Wheeler Elementary and Jr. High Students will be on Friday, August 14, from 9:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. Students new to the District must provide their Birth Certificate and Immunization Records and Social Security Number.

High school students new to the district please report to the high school principal's office any business day between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to enroll.

Classes will begin on Monday, August 17, at 8:10 a.m.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION PACKET

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten will become available Thursday, August 6, and may be picked up in the hall outside the Superintendent's office on business days: Monday through Thursday 8-12; 1-3 and Friday 8-12.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/emergency card; 2. Student health information (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home language survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names, before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Lt. Roby Stephens Is Buried In California

Lt. Roby Stephens, whose humor was as recognized as his crime fighting during 30 years with the Pomona Police Department, died Tuesday at a Fontana hospital. He was 52.

Mr. Stephens, who planned to retire to Victorville in February, had been ill for several days, according to friends. His wife, Sandra, drove him to Kaiser Permanente Medical Center Monday evening as his illness intensified.

He died about 6 a.m. Tuesday, the exact cause will be determined by an autopsy.

Mr. Stephens' family moved to Pomona from Pampa, Texas just a year after his birth. It was his hometown pride that kept him here.

Following graduation from Pomona High School in 1958, Mr. Stephens spent four years in the Marine Corps. Honorable discharged at the rank of sergeant, he returned to Pomona and within six months had joined the Police Department.

Mr. Stephens was promoted to investigator in 1970, and it was there that his human relations skills blossomed.

"A sense of humor was his pot of gold and he shared that with everybody," said Sgt. Dale LaFleur, a co-worker and friend for 22 years.

Mr. Stephens was assigned to juvenile investigations when LaFleur signed on as a rookie officer in 1970.

"He could talk to some of these kids and really relate to them," LaFleur said Tuesday. "He would inject that humor into whatever incident he was working on and the kids would warm up to him and he'd get his point across."

Capt. Ron Hargett joined the department in 1971, and worked as Mr. Stephens' subordinate, partner and supervisor.

"He had a unique knack of being able to talk to people in all walks of life and create a trust and he solved a lot of cases because of this," Hargett said. "He was quick-witted and had a common sense approach to everything in life."

Mr. Stephens purchased a fairway home in Victorville five months ago and planned to play golf with his father after retiring. He and his wife planned to travel after her retirement in a few years, friends said.

"You always understood Roby," LaFleur said. A few years ago, Mr. Stephens gave LaFleur an inscribed coin which described his personal philosophy. "I resist what I can change, I accept what I can't change and feel good, the choice is mine."

Flags at the Police Department have been lowered to half staff and officers badges are covered by black bands in honor of Mr. Stephens.

Mass was Saturday at the St. Josephs Catholic Church in Upland, Calif. Interment was in Forrest Lawn Memorial Park, Covina Hills, Calif. Todd Memorial Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Sandra, of the home, a son, Daryl, of Upland; a daughter, Teresa Schriener of Upland; two grandchildren, Ashley and Alissa; his mother, Lavelle Stephens of Wheeler and father and step-mother, Robert and Helen Stephens of Victorville Calif.

Dr. Bob E. Riley New ETBU President

East Texas Baptist University has named Dr. Bob E. Riley as its new president.

The action came Thursday during a meeting of the university's Board of Trustees. Riley will assume his duties by Sept. 1, according to Dr. Helen Williamson, chairman of the ETBU board.

Riley is currently president of Howard College in Big Spring. His name as a candidate for ETBU president first surfaced publicly last Friday.

Riley becomes East Texas Baptist's 11th president. He succeeds the late Dr. Robert E. Craig, who died in March, and Dr. Harvey D. Lewis, who was serving his second term as interim president.

ETBU's new president has been president of Howard County Junior College District and chief executive officer of the Southwest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf in Big Spring since 1984. Enrollment at Howard College has grown from 1,100 in 1984 to more than 3,000 today, earning it the title of Texas' fastest-growing college.

Former Harrison County Judge E.N. Smith Jr. headed ETBU's search committee. The university said in a news release that the committee unanimously recommended Riley to the Board of Trustees. Sixty-five persons applied for the post.

"Dr. Riley shares our vision for ETBU, and our goal of having our campus recognized as one of the leading Christian campuses in the nation," Smith said.

"It is an honor and a privilege to be selected as president of East Texas Baptist University. I am very humbled by the confidence that the board has shown in me and my abilities," Riley said.

Riley said he looks forward to working with ETBU's faculty and staff.



"I believe there is much work to be done in order to build the enrollment and continue the improvement of the campus. The prospect of being associated with a private, religious university—a college with the background of history such as ETBU—is thrilling to my wife and I. We have wanted to get into private higher education for a number of years, and we think that the opportunities that ETBU is providing us is certainly matched to our interests and goals," he said.

Riley is married to the former Gayle Gladman of Plainview. She is an elementary school teacher with a master's degree from Southwest Oklahoma State University. They have three daughters: Lisa, 23; Leigh, 21;

and Melinda 17. Riley is a graduate of Wheeler High School in Texas. He holds a bachelor of science degree in social science and education from West Texas State University in 1966. He also received his master of education in psychology and physical education from that institution.

Most-master study in counseling and guidance came from Texas A&M. He took his doctorate in education administration and secondary higher education from East Texas State University. Riley has conducted post-doctorate study in higher education administration at Texas Tech University.

Dr. Riley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Riley of Wheeler.

The Gillette Brothers, Real Singing Cowboys

Crockett, TX—Guy and Pipp Gillette are involved in several aspects of the cattle business. Since taking over the running of the family ranch nine years ago, they have found that diversification is not only a necessity, it keeps things interesting.

Besides taking care of their own cattle operation (horned hereford bulls on brahman cross cows), they day work for neighbors and work two and a half days a week at the two sale barns in Crockett, East Texas Livestock Auction and Houston County Livestock Auction. "Before we began ranching, Pipp and I were professional musicians for fifteen years and although we had worked with our grandfather as kids, and I had cowboied for Watt Matthews on Lamshead Ranch in Albany, Texas for six months in 1964, we had a lot to learn," says Guy. "By working with our neighbors, we get a chance to see the different ways they run their operations, and by working at the sale barns, we can keep up-to-date with the market and make contact with buyers." The brothers have contracted the major part of their calf crop for the last several years.

Good bulls and getting the cows to calve close together have made a big difference in their operation. "Our contract steers averaged 629 pounds right off their mothers last year," says Pipp. "We were kinda happy about that."

The recent interest in cowboy music and poetry has allowed the brothers to combine their life long interest in the history of the west and its music with their musical experience. They have just recorded and released an album of cowboy songs, "Home Ranch", on their own Big Daddy Records. The album was recorded at

Sumet-Burnet Studios in Dallas and co-produced and engineered by Bob Sullivan known for his work with Bob Wills, Merle Haggard, Asleep at the Wheel, and Don Edwards among others.

"Working with Bob was a very satisfying experience and we're real happy with the results," says Pipp. Joining the Gillettes in the studio, fiddle player, Alex Stratman adds just the right touch of authenticity to their acoustic gui-

tars. "Alex was playing cowboy music on live radio back in the '30's," Pipp adds, "and his playing is great!"

The Gillette Brothers have played from Maine to Florida, Minnesota to Texas and most of the states in between. In 1979, the Gillettes were invited to the Soviet Union by the Forum for U.S.-Soviet Dialog, a non-profit organization which strives for peace through understanding by bring-

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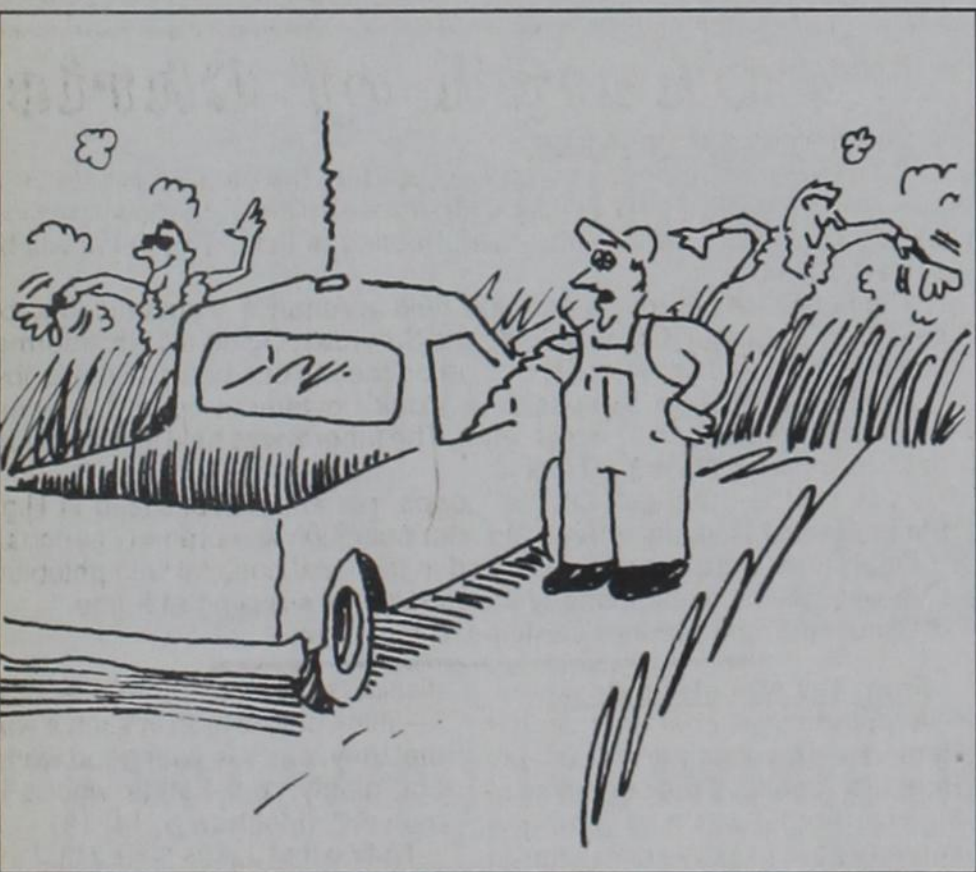
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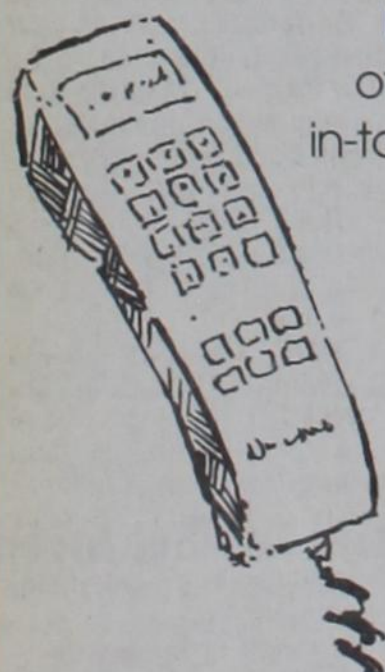
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church, in school and the community. My good wishes go with them.

Spring and summer are the best times for fresh produce. Select produce that is not damaged, bruised or wilted since rough handling leads to vitamin loss. Choose dark green, orange or yellow fruits and vegetables. They are the highest in beta-carotene which has been associated with lowering cancer risk. Shop on the days when your grocer receives its produce shipment and eat fresh foods soon since vitamins begin to degrade after four to five days. Select fresh or frozen products more frequently than canned.

From The Minister's Desk:
A paradoxical character in the American Revolutionary War was Benedict Arnold. At the beginning of the war, Arnold was a general who served with impressive distinction in the army of the Patriots. But he eventually became a traitor and served in the British army until the war ended.

Many historians have tried to explain why General Arnold, an officer of outstanding military ability, would "turn traitor". Some have suggested that it was because he thought that General George Washington received more praise from the Continental Congress than he did.

For example, it is reported that he once complained to another officer, saying: "My troops are better trained, better dressed, and better fighters. My troops and I can even march better than Washington and his troops." "But", the other officer replied: "General Washington and his troops can march without a drummer."

To serve with little or no recognition, is more than a characteristic of a good soldier. It is also a characteristic of the disciples of Jesus. Since disciples of Jesus are "the light of the world", they will naturally attract attention. But they should always direct this attention towards God and not themselves. Jesus told His

disciples that they should let their "shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven". (Matthew 5: 14, 16)

Notice that Jesus stated that the purpose of His disciples' "good works" was to glorify God not the disciples who do them. Throughout His ministry, Jesus sternly condemned the use of discipleship for personal glory. For example, Jesus taught: "Beware of practicing your righteousness before men to be noticed by them—" (Matthew 6: 1) With this admonition, Jesus did not prohibit His disciples from practicing their righteousness "before men—" "before men—" Disciples of Jesus are "the light of the world—" "What stars are to the darkened sky, disciples of Jesus are to a world that is darkened by sin. Their righteous lives should shine brightly and distinctly "before men—" But they should resist any temptation to glorify themselves and not God.

As the "light of the world—" the disciples of Jesus should march without a drummer.

SUFFERING FOR CHRIST

(Part 6)
 I Peter 4:14 & 15, "If ye be reproached for the name of Christ, happy are ye... But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters." I have taken a different kind of approach to the matter of "Christian suffering" than is taken by most sermons and books on the subject. While showing you Scriptures that plainly state that we may suffer for the faith at times, I have been sharing with you in these articles concerning certain aspects of suffering that are not part of suffering for the Lord. There is supposed to be a difference in many ways between Christians and non-believers.
 God has provided benefits for believers that are not promised to unbelievers. Psalm 103:2-5 states that God gives to believers these benefits: (1) forgiveness of all iniquities, (2) healing of all diseases, (3) redemption from destruction, (4) crowing of life with loving kindness and tender mercies, (5) satisfaction with good things in life, and (6) renewing of youth like the eagle's. Since these benefits are given to believers by God, there are clearly certain things that we Christians should not suffer. Based on the above reference, we should not suffer with sin in our lives that we can't conquer, we should not suffer with sickness and disease, we should not suffer destruction, we should not suffer in the sense of living an unfulfilled and unsatisfied life, we should not live a lifetime without good things, and we should not suffer things many expect as normal to old age (like loss of mind or memory, inability to be mobile, helplessness, etc.)
 It comes down to either believing the Bible or rejecting the Bible. God's promises and provisions are clean. He's not ambiguous about them. Christians do suffer in life for the cause of Christ, but there are many aspects of suffering that are not related to the cause of Christ. As Christians, we are delivered and protected from certain sufferings if we believe it and obey God.
 The text I quoted in this article at the beginning shows us that Christians may suffer reproach, but suffering that comes due to a lack of character is not proper for children of God. So, we could make a list of things that "suffering for Christ" may include, but we should also make a list of things that are definitely not part of "suffering for Christ". Those things in the latter list should not be in the Christian's life. If they are, you can get rid of them. 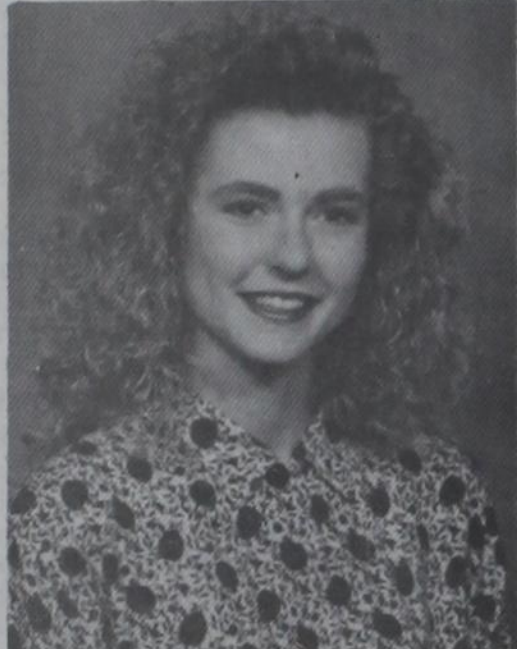
