Motion by Jauna Benefield, second by Dr. Hillhouse, to approve the Superintendent's contract as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

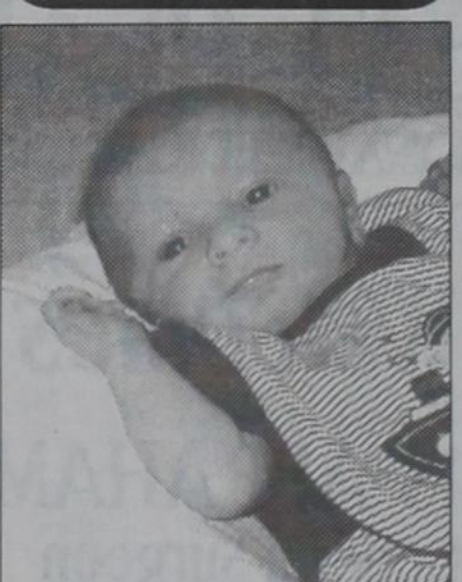

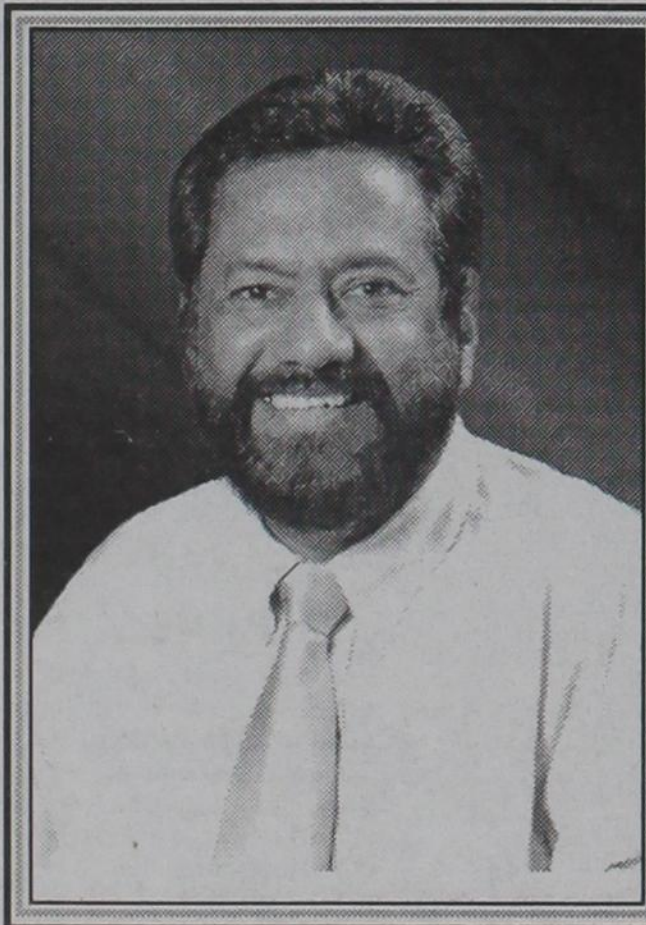

Ms. Fagan-Cook presented financial statements, investment report and statistics for March 2005. After some discussion among the members, Dave Britt made the motion to approve the reports as presented. Sue Chandler seconded this and the motion carried unanimously.

Bad debt and charity care write-offs were presented by Fagan-Cook. After review of the accounts, Dave Britt made the motion that was seconded by Thomas Helton to approve the write-offs. Motion carried unanimously.

QAPI minutes and scorecards were presented and discussion followed. Dave Britt pointed out that despite using direct quota-

tions from patient satisfaction surveys, nicknames should not be included because of HIPAA regulations. Ms. Fagan-Cook pointed out that QAPI minutes and records are not public information, but this will be referred to the QAPI committee. Jim Batton made the motion that was seconded by Sue Chandler to approve the minutes and scorecards. Motion carried unanimously.

Chairman Dean Tipps asked if there had been any opposing candidates for the three open board seats. Ms. Fagan-Cook stated that there was only one candidate for each position and such candidates were timely in their request to be on the election slate. Chairman Tipps then requested a motion that the election be cancelled and the candidates declared the winners

for their districts. Dave Britt made the motion that was seconded by Thomas Helton and the motion carried unanimously. Ms. Fagan Cook was instructed to post the appropriate notices in the local newspapers.

Ms. Fagan Cook presented a renewal service contract for the Lason imaging system used to store medical records. Sue Chandler made the motion that was seconded by Jim Batton to approval renewal of the contract. Motion carried unanimously.

Fagan Cook then presented a renewal service contract for the Vitros Lab Analyzer.

Ms. Fagan Cook led a discussion regarding image storage and reproduction of CAT scans. Our new system stores images only on the hard drive and should a problem occur we would have no way to retrieve images and reproduce them. We also have no way to reproduce sonograms at this time. Western Medical Systems prepared a bid to install appropriate software to store images on CD as well as reproduce images on CD for sending to outside physicians. Some board members thought that our current system had this capability. Fagan Cook reported that she was also of that opinion, but in fact, this is not the case. After some discussion Dave Britt made the motion that was seconded by Thomas Helton to purchase the system and have it installed immediately. Motion carried unanimously.

Members discussed our current cellular phone usage policy within the hospital. We have a new cardiac telemetry system in place that is supposed to be on a different frequency from cellular phones, but the manufacturer will not guarantee it to work without interference from cellular phones. The telemetry system is wireless and is used throughout the hospital and the Emergency Department. Despite signage all over the building asking people not to use cellular phones, some individuals still do this. After much discussion and input from Sue Stiles, RN, Director of Nursing, and Ms. Fagan Cook, Jim Batton made the motion that was seconded by Sue Chandler to continue the ban on cellular phone usage in the hospital and Emergency Department. The motion carried unanimously.

Mrs. Stiles made a presentation on the current state of the beds within the hospital. She presented a list of all beds and the functions that do not work on each. She also stated that we have had numerous complaints that the mattresses

were extremely hard and uncomfortable. We also have no beds that will support traction equipment or even an over-bed apparatus to provide a trapeze for hip fracture patients. There is no capability to weigh patients who are not capable of standing up or sitting in a wheelchair and we frequently have physician orders for daily weights on these patients. Ms. Fagan Cook reported that new beds had been donated for the assisted living facility and that the plan was to combine pieces and parts of all of the beds to have 16 functioning beds in the hospital. Mrs. Stiles also presented bids for Stryker beds that would also have new mattresses. After much discussion among the members, Sue Chandler made the motion that was seconded by Jim Batton to purchase one new bed with a scale and one additional bed and mattresses for both. Motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Fagan Cook requested that the Board review the current policy for fuel cost adjustment. The current policy was put into place in 1980. After considerable discussion, Dave Britt made the motion that was seconded by Thomas Helton to revise the current policy to reflect the cost of fuel at \$2.00 to be effective with the payroll beginning April 6, 2005. No other changes to the policy are included in the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Physician contracts have all been signed and no Executive Session was called.

Chairman Tipps declared the meeting adjourned at 7:25 p.m.
