

Wheeler Mustangs Host Gruver Friday Nite

The Wheeler Mustangs open the 1992 high school football season Friday night by hosting the Gruver Greyhounds at 8:00 p.m. What are a few changes to look at in Wheeler's '92

season? Here's a couple:
(1) The 'Stangs have moved out of rugged District 1-1A. Last year's toughest 1A district in Texas into teacher-

ous District 2-2A, this year's toughest 2A district in Texas. This new district features Class A State Champ Memphis and 1991 Class AA quarterfinals Wellington - the only teams to hand the 'Stangs a defeat in the regular season over the last two seasons as well as Panhandle, which has qualified for the playoffs every year for the last thirteen years and a big fast Clarendon Team.

(2) Wheeler, for the first time in two years, has very little experience to help soothe the sting of realignment. Only three starters return on each side of the ball and one of those, a senior fullback and inside linebacker Genaro Meraz, is out indefinitely with a knee injury.

Fortunately though, Coach Ronnie Karcher can count on two other returning starters to lead the way into a tough season. Senior runningback Mark Marshall has gained close to 2,000 yards over the past two seasons and is arguably the fastest athlete ever to play football for WHS. Returning senior defensive end Joe Dan Ledbetter has shown his versatility by manning both the quarterback and wingback position over the course of the '90 and '91 seasons, respectively, before making his final offensive evolution to tight end for '92.

Coach Karcher is counting on these two Mustangs as well as standout junior quarterback Chad Dunnam to spearhead the 'Stangs into their season opener against Gruver. This game should be a tough test early for WHS as Gruver returns a large nucleus of its 1991 team that the Mustangs soundly trounced 48-0 last year. Be sure that the memory of that beating will be a strong motivating factor for this year's Greyhounds.

However, Gruver has also been through a few changes of their own. Assistant Coach Doug Frick was promoted to the head coaching position in the off-season and has installed a new 27 look on defense that will take time for the Greyhounds to adjust to comfortably. And, like Wheeler, Gruver has been realigned by the UIL into the higher Class AA and will be taking on a totally new district of opponents.

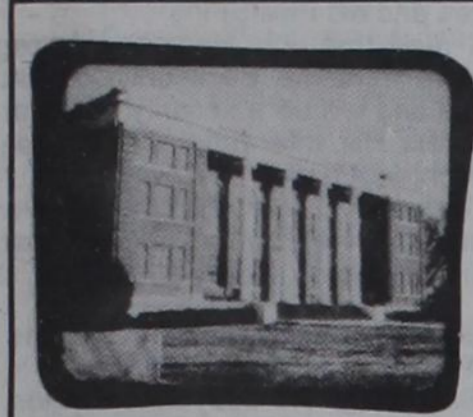

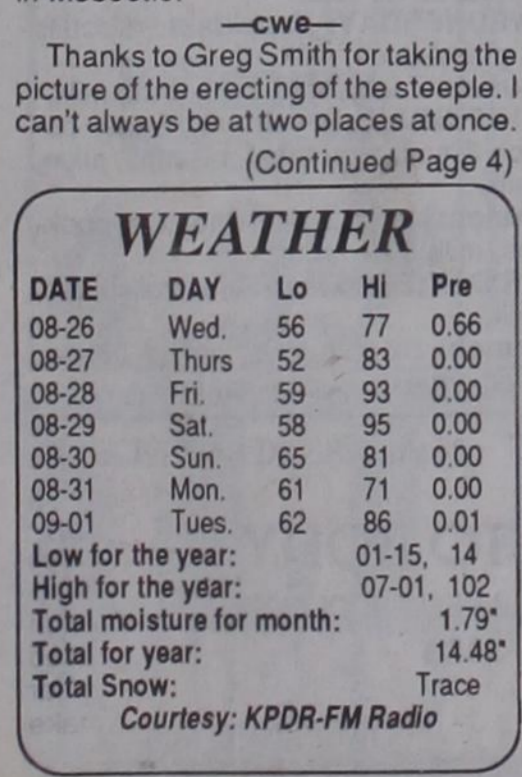

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Weight Loss Puzzles Scientists

WASHINGTON --A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that weight loss with plant colloids was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. 
had just went to Shamrock it wouldn't have been so bad—35 miles not like 120.

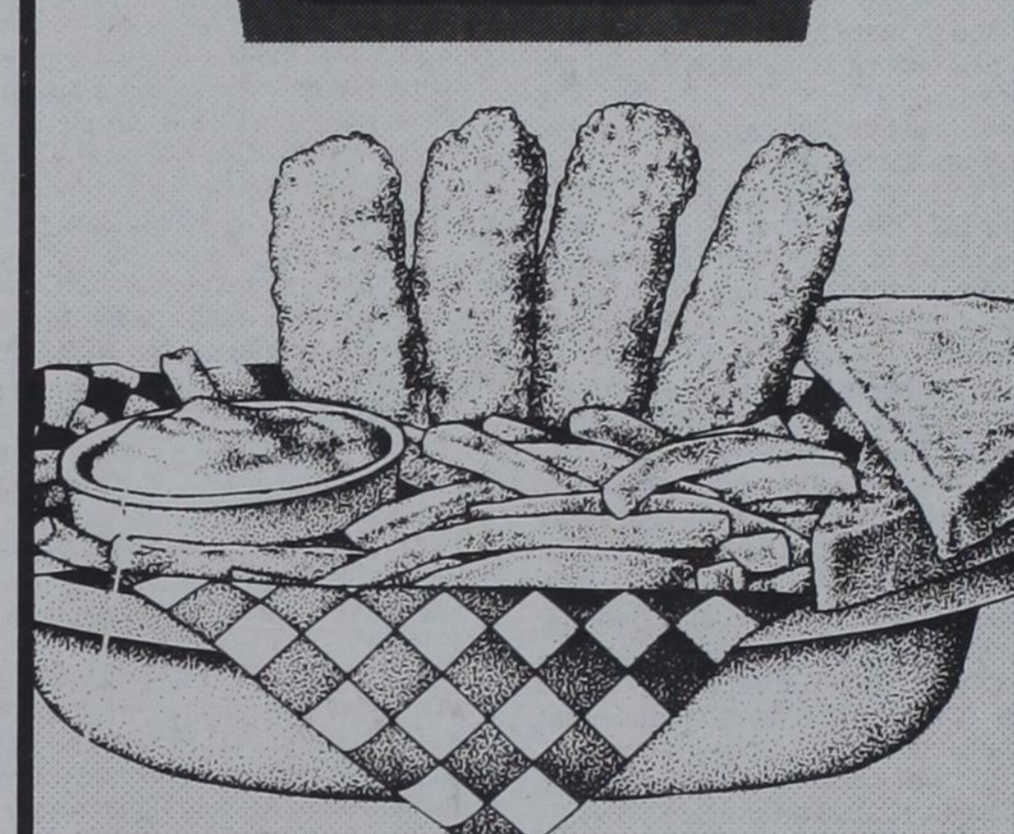

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Righteousness Or Hypocrisy?

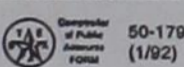

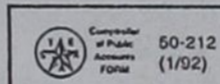

From the Minister's Desk:

During World War II, one of the Navy's finest admirals was Admiral "Bull" Halsey. His nickname, "Bull" was given to him because of the determination and persistence that he demonstrated in his command.

In October of 1942, Admiral Halsey was appointed commander of the Allied Forces in the South Pacific. Under his command, the Allied Forces defeated the Japanese in several decisive battles. In one of these battles, an incident occurred which clearly demonstrated the effectiveness of his command.

Admiral Halsey's staff had intercepted a Japanese communique that revealed the location of a submarine which was carrying an important Japanese general. When Admiral Halsey read the communique, he ordered three destroyers to intercept and sink the submarine. But a member of his staff respectfully suggested that one of the destroyers, *England*, not be sent on this very crucial mission.

When asked about a reason for the suggestion, Admiral Halsey was told that the crew of the *England* had a dismal performance record. He was also told that several members of the crew were brawlers who were often arrested when they were on leave in Honolulu. After hearing this report, Admiral Halsey laughed and commanded that the *England* be sent on the mission, expressing his conviction that the crew would efficiently perform. Three days later, a message was received at Admiral Halsey's Headquarters which reported that the *England* had intercepted the Japanese submarine and had sunk it.

For the duration of the war, the crew of the *England* performed superbly, sinking five other enemy ships. While several explanations could be given for the change in the performance of the crew of the *England*, I believe that the most plausible would be that Admiral Halsey did not make the mistake that the

member of his staff made. He did not merely see what the crew was. Rather he saw what the crew could become.

It is a common mistake to see what people are, but fail to see what people can become. But while it is a mistake that people may make, it is not a mistake that God makes. The attitude of God can clearly be seen in the ministry of Jesus. During His ministry, Jesus did not see an individual as a "bad egg", a "hopeless case", or a "leopard, who cannot change his spots". Jesus always saw what people could become not merely what they were.

For example, He could see the treasonous tax-collector Matthew, but He could also see a man who could write an inspired account of His life. Jesus could see Zaccheus, another greedy tax-collector, but He could also see a man who would say: "Half of my possessions I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will give back four times as much." (Luke 19:8) and Jesus could see a blundering fisherman, Simon Peter, who would deny Him three times, but He could also see a powerful personality who could become a leader in the kingdom of God.

As clearly seen in the ministry of Jesus, God can change people. This change is produced by an obedient faith which is demonstrated by baptism into Jesus. (Roman 6:1-11, Galatians 3:23-29) Then the promise of God is: "If any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come." (II Corinthians 5:17)

Admiral Halsey believed that inefficient brawlers could become superb sailors. And God believes that through faith in Jesus Christ, sinful people can become new creatures who conform to the image of Jesus Christ.

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NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 16,091 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 13,559 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Allison Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .365 / \$100.00 that will provide \$ 13,559 per student in state and local revenues.
