

Jerry Hefley Announces As Candidate For Co. Judge



Free beef quality training to be beet, explains Dick Sherron, president of Texas and Southwestern

Cattle Raisers Association. "In addition, the program up-

dates ranchers on changes occurring in the industry and what we must do to increase demand for our cattle. It clearly demonstrates how a producer's actions on the ranch have a huge impact on the final beef product," emphasizes Sherron.

Each session involves an intensive eight hours of training, divided into two levels. Level I covers BQA principles, industry update, marketing strategies, record keeping, environmental stewardship and proper management practices associated with genetic selection, cattle handling, culling, vaccine and drug use.

Level II provides a detailed explanation of the requirements needed to receive and maintain full certification as a Texas Beef Quality Producer.

"Certification recognizes an elite group of cattle producers who do things right," asserts Sherron. Cattle producers must embrace BQA methods if they plan on staying in business.

"Consumers-the people who buy our beef to eat-are telling us they want their food, not only delicious, but safe, wholesome and raised responsibly. We must respond if we want a place for our beef to go."



Discussed having a booth at the WRCA Finals in Amarillo.




"We're delighted to recognize the hard work and dedication these teams demonstrate," Dr. Gamel said. "We commend all 203 hospitals that participated in the program this year for their work in advancing the quality of health care in Texas."

TMF Health Quality Institute, the Medicare quality improvement organization for Texas, established the awards program in partnership with the Texas Hospital Association, Texas Medical Association, Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals and Texas Osteopathic Medical Association.

To qualify for an award, hospitals had to take a baseline measurement of their performance on the clinical measures in the first quarter of 2004. They then implemented process changes to improve their performance and remeasured a year later to see if they had maintained or improved their performance. To earn the Award of Excellence, a hospital had to achieve or maintain performance of 90 to 100 percent on all national quality measures within one or more of the targeted clinical areas. To qualify for the Quality Improvement Achievement Award, a hospital had to score at least 70 percent on all national quality measures within one or more of the clinical areas. In addition, they had to improve a certain number of percentage points from their baseline measurement. The quality measures-such as an initial antibiotic dose within four hours of admission for patients with pneumonia-are designed to ensure that hospitals provide care consistent with current medical guidelines. 
