The Wheeler County Farmers' Market will open the 2008 season on Saturday, June 28th at 9:00 am on the west side of the court house in Wheeler. Market will be every Saturday (until gardens payout next fall) starting at 9:00am and going until noon or whenever sold out. Later in the season we will try to have a second day market; last year it was on Wednesdays at 4:00 pm. Notice will be given later.

The Wheeler Farmers' market is open to any Wheeler County gardener with the produce being grown in Wheeler County. There is no table fee at our market, and is an opportunity for young or old alike to make a little extra money,

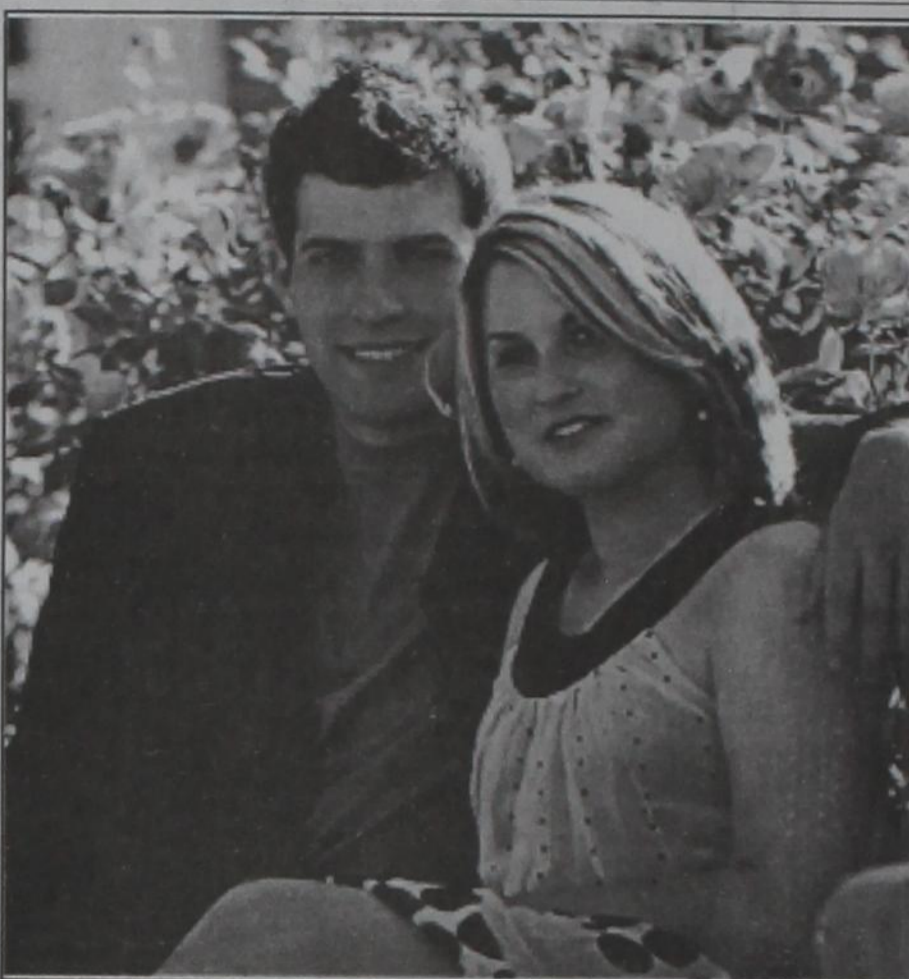
hunting and we talked about quilting, children and our men. They are wonderful people and so nice to be around.

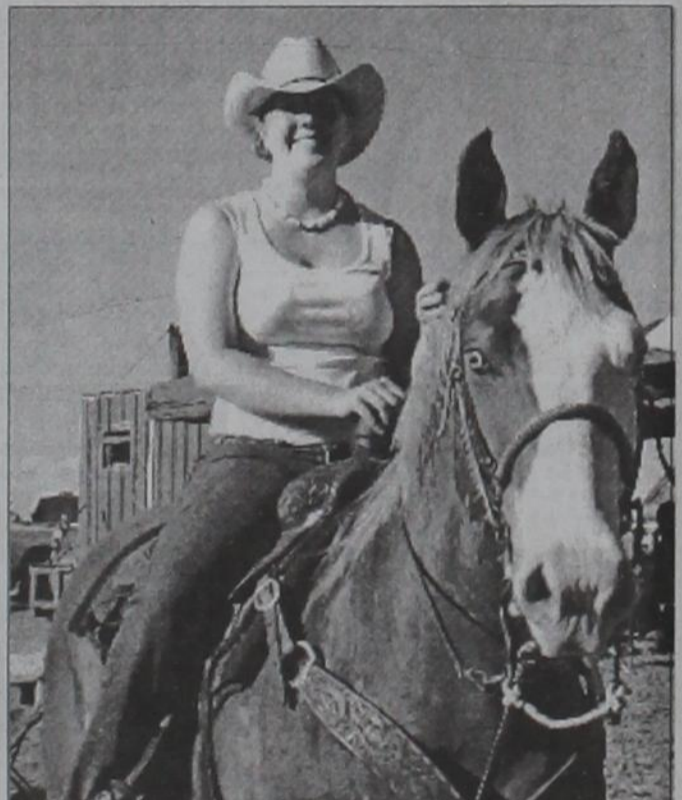

During the Red River War of 1874-1875, as many as 20 engagements between the U.S. Army and the Southern Plains Indians took place across the Texas Panhandle region. The performer's uniforms, equipment, weapons and saddle gear are period replicas and/or authentic originals. "We pride ourselves in recreating the Indian Wars fighters, both U.S. Army and Indian, as they were, NOT how they have been portrayed in the typical Hollywood movies," Northcutt said.
