


Mr. Elliott was born July 19, 1934, in Cleveland, Ark., and moved to East Texas at the age of 11. He began his career in the Air Force in 1952. He served in Vietnam, Thailand, Spain, Australia, Okinawa and Guam. He was awared numerous military honors. He retired after 20 years of service as a master sergeant. After his retirement from the Air Force, he became a mail carrier for the U.S. Postal Service, retiring in January

He married Naomi "Dutch" Scribner on April 30, 1956. He had been a resident of Pampa since 1972. He was active as a volunteer and groundskeeper for the Old Mobeetie Jail Association. He was also emcee and a major fundraiser for the Mobeetie Music Fes-

He was preceded in death by his parents; five sisters; and two brothers.

Mr. Hink was born March 4, 1921, in Clarksville, Arkansas. He was reared in Wheeler County and was a 1940 graduate of Kelton High School. He briefly attended Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. He joined the U.S. Navy in July of 1942. A veteran of World War II, he served as motor machinist mate on the USS LST 374, a transport ship that landed supplies and tanks. From July 1942, until December of 1945, he participated in invasions of Sicily, Italy, France and the D-Day Invasion of Normandy on June 6, 1944. He married Betty Jones on February 24, 1951, in Clovis, New Mexico. Hefarmed in Wheeler County, and was employed by Cabot Corporation for 32 years, retiring in 1979, as a warehouse foreman. 

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


