Citizens Request Help From Commissioners On Wild Hogs

Item 13 was the first to be addressed by the court. A group of citizens from the Shamrock area met with the court to call attention to the wild hog problem in Wheeler County Precinct 4. Wild hogs have been killed within the city limits and the northern edge of Shamrock. The hogs are a danger to the well being of the citizens and are capable of an estimated \$2500 crop damage in one night. The group request an ordinance from the county commissioners to make it unlawful to capture and/or transport into and within the county for relocation. It is believed some of the hogs killed have been handled prior to their disposal. The hogs travel in packs and can have a range of 5-7 miles. The sport of



I sometimes think that we live in a wicked world today with the preponderance of murder, drug and alcohol abuse, easy abortion, immoral behavior, and the lackadaisical attitude that goes with all of that. Certainly the world was never more wicked than in the time in which we live - right?

I'm not so sure anymore. Yes, we have a number of problems that we need to straighten out in our own time, but problems just like ours plus others can be seen clearly in the Bible. Even those tiny biblical letters were written because of wicked problems. Il John was written because there are antichrists (those who are anti Christ) who are trying to deceive Christians into thinking that Jesus was not who he claimed to be. If Christians can become convinced

that Jesus was a liar then what is the point of following him? The church can be destroyed if they don't believe Jesus. In III John there is one man

who is trying to make a power play to run the church with him in charge. He is making the church his own private kingdom with him as the dictator. The church belongs to Christ and no one individual can claim this type of authority. Those who are so power hungry are dangerous and should be avoided. In Jude Christians are urged

to remain faithful even though godless people are surrounding them. So Jude reminds the church of how God has always come to the rescue of those who are faithful and destroyed those who are wicked. Several examples and illustrations are provided, but if this book will be listened to, the Christians will reject those who oppose God and remain faithful. Even in these small New Testament books, valuable lessons can be learned that help us nearly 2,000
