Once again, the sounds of banjos, fiddles, guitars and mandolins will flow across the grounds where Bat Masterson, Temple Houston and other Old West characters once lived and died many years ago; the Old Mobeetie Texas Music Festival promises to be the best yet. Sponsored by Mobeetie Jail Museum, this year's festival will take place Friday, July 29 through Sunday, July 31 on the grounds of the Old Mobeetie Jail and Museum at Old Mobeetie, Texas. Mobeetie is 30 miles east of Pampa in the NE part of the Texas panhandle.

The festival is a family oriented event and the promoters stress that it is good, old fashioned family fun. You are invited to bring the entire family and your lawn chairs and enjoy the music, food, and fun. Wheeler's Centennial Celebration Starts Mon.

The Wheeler Centennial Celebration is fast approaching and finalization of the plans is underway. The activities will begin on Monday, August 1, 2005, and continue through August 6.

Entertainment and sack lunch dinners are planned at noon each day, Monday through Friday. Those wishing to participate are urged to bring a brown bag lunch, prepared at home or at the local restaurants, to the courthouse square and be entertained by two top performers, Richard Smith and Julie Adams. The performances will be from 12 to 1 each of the five days. Bring your own chair, sit on the curb around the courthouse, or the court

house steps.

Wagons will be on hand to take individuals from the square to the Wheeler Cemetery, where the tombstones will come alive with information on Wheeler citizens of the past, who have played a part in the history of Wheeler. In many cases, the part of the deceased will be portrayed by a descendant or other family member.

Richard Smith

Richard Smith was born in Beckenham, Kent, England in 1971. One day, at the age of five, Richard was watching his father fingerpick "Down South Blues" (an Atkins-Travis recording) on his guitar. The boy begged his dad to show him how to play it, and finally he did. Despite the fact that Richard is left-handed and his dad's right-handed guitar was not designed for tiny hands, by the end of that day, Richard learned and played both the chords and the melody. Within no time, the toddler outstripped his dad's six-string prowess and it was clear to all who saw or heard him play that Richard was one of those rare phenomena — a child prodigy.

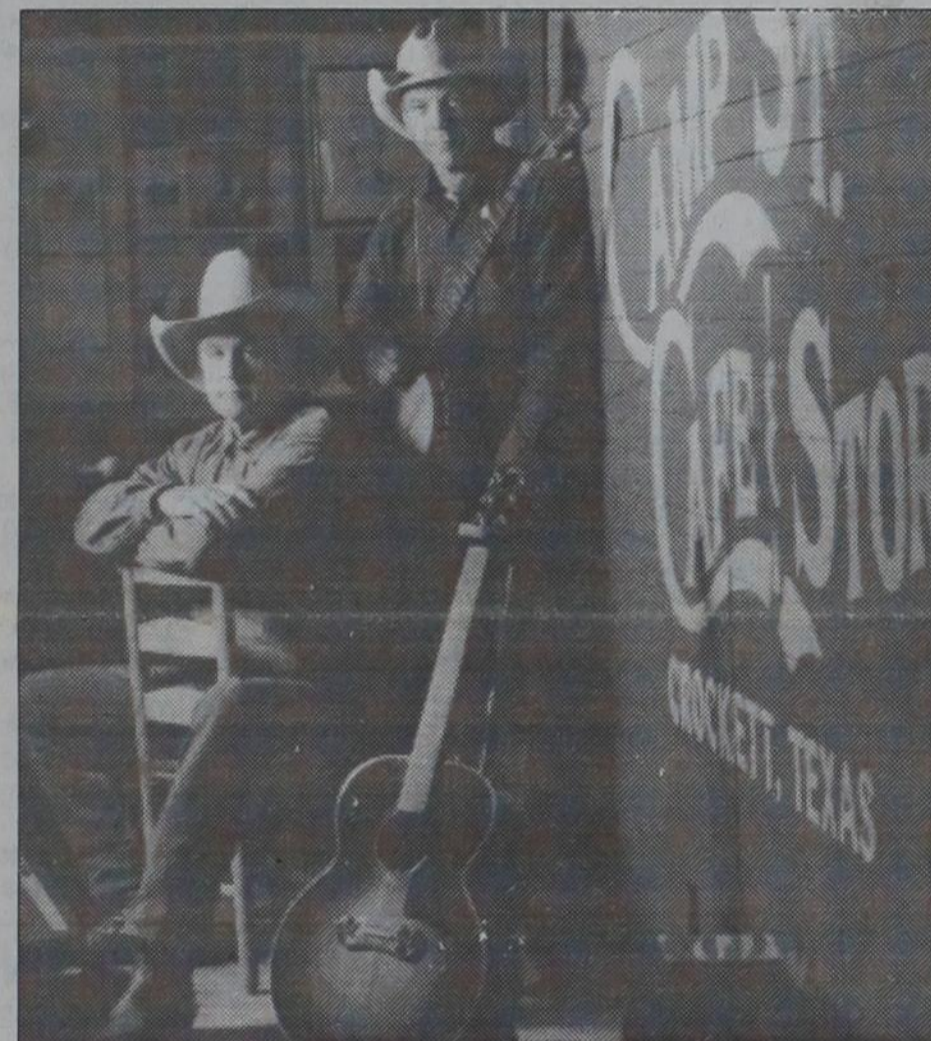
Concentrating initially on the music his father loved — the country blues — young Richard digested everything he heard, learning even the most complicated of these tunes with ease, and confounded everyone with his dexterity. It seemed that, not only did the boy possess amazing physical skill, but a photographic musical memory as well. Often, a single hearing was all it took to get a piece under his fingers.

Richard first met his hero, the "Godfather" of finger style guitar, Chet Atkins when he was only eleven and was invited by Chet to play with him on stage at Her Majesty Theatre in London in front of an audience of about a thousand. He played Chet's arrangement of "Whispering", and Chet played along with him. Then the audience went mad and Chet asked him to play another one. Before Richard could decide what to play, someone shouted "Little Rock Getaway", and Richard played Chet's arrangement of it while Chet, not playing this time watched him in amazement playing to a stunned and appreciative audience. By the time he reached his early twenties, both Chet Atkins and Jerry Reed began to refer to Richard Smith as their "Hero" — and still do.

There seems to be no limit to Richard's ability to quickly master whatever guitar style captures his fancy. The complex styles of many

Wheeler I.S.D. Pre-K & Kindergarten Registration Packet Information

Any child who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend kindergarten. Any child who will be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1 of this year may attend pre kindergarten at Wheeler ISD.

The State of Texas requires these things for a child to be registered in Public School: 1. Copy of Child's Official State Birth Certificate. 2. Copy of Child's Immunization Record. Wheeler ISD requires a copy of the child's social security number card for record keeping purposes.

Registration packets for children who will be attending the Wheeler ISD Pre K or Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the Superintendent's Office on business days.

This packet contains information necessary for enrollment and all the required forms. The estimated length of time needed to finish the forms is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example...the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to get the packet then and fill it out in the cafeteria.

Pre-Kindergarten & Kindergarten Registration will be in the Wheeler School Cafeteria on Friday, August 15 from 9:00 A.M. until 11:00 A.M.

ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

On this 25th day of July, 2005, the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas met in Regular Session, and found that circumstances present in all the unincorporated area of Wheeler County, Texas, create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning, therefore,
The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, by this Order, hereby prohibits outdoor burning in all of the unincorporated area in Wheeler County, Texas. This burn ban takes effect **JULY 28, 2005** and will terminate **OCTOBER 28, 2005**, Ninety (90) days from that date.
A person who violates this prohibition will be charged with a Class C misdemeanor pursuant to Section 240.906 of the Texas Local Government Code.

Summer Heat Can Be Hard On Tires

Summer heat can be hard on vehicle tires

It may be summer time, but the "living" is not easy for your tires. Motorists should use caution during the summer to make sure their vehicles are in shape.

According to a 2004 study conducted by the Rubber Manufacturers Association, only 16 percent of Texas drivers properly check their tires - leaving 84 percent who are asking for trouble.

Research sponsored by the tire industry group shows that 32 percent of drivers in Texas wrongly believe that the best time to check their tires is when they are warm after being driven for at least a few miles. Actually, tires should be checked before you hit the road.

TxDOT is reminding motorists that underinflated tires combined with hot weather and a fully-loaded vehicle can lead to tire failure. Underinflated tires generate excessive heat, which can be dangerous.

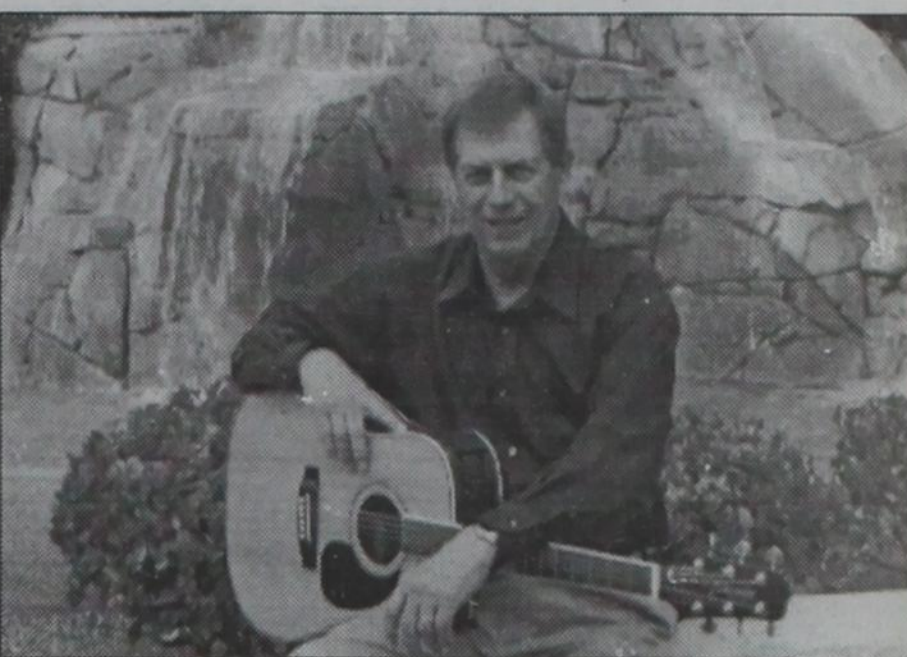

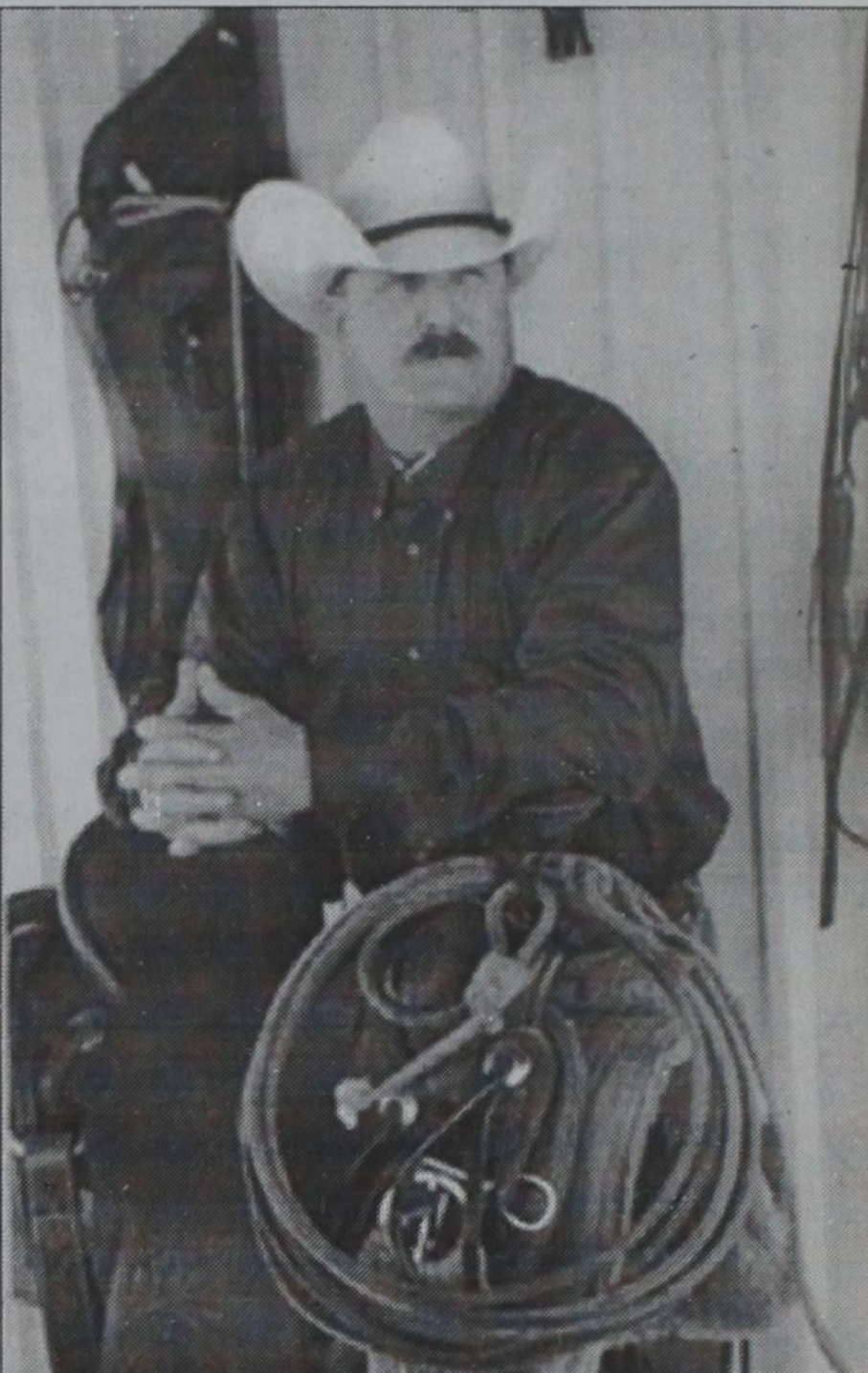

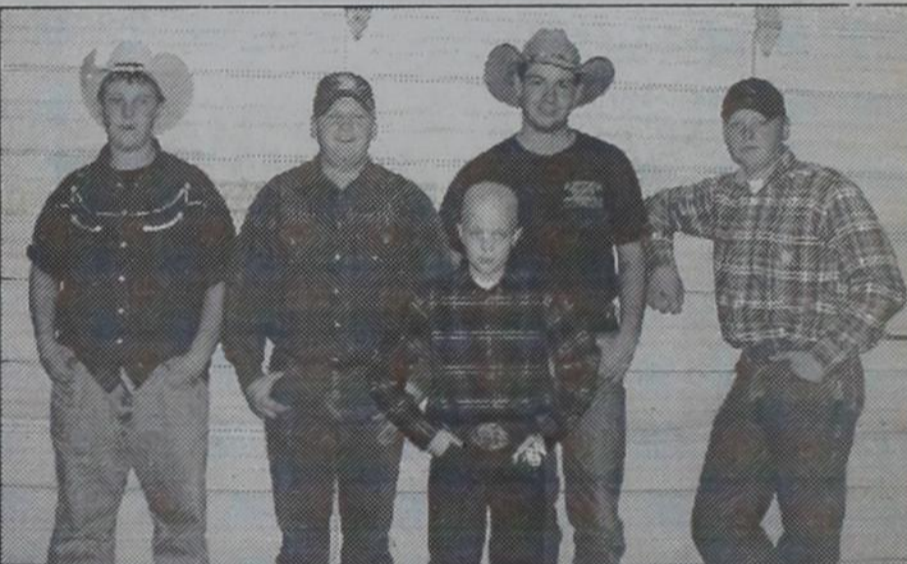

If a tire goes flat while traveling at a high rate of speed, drivers should remove their foot from the accelerator and coast to a stop. Do not slam on the brakes, which could cause a rollover.

Proper tire care and safety is easy. The most important factors in tire care are: proper inflation pressure, vehicle loading, and tire wear, regular inspection, good driving habits and vehicle condition.

The RMA recommends taking five minutes every month and before every long trip to check your tires, including the spare.

To increase safety motorists should also: obey posted speed limits, wear safety belts properly, avoid fast starts, stops and turns, avoid potholes and debris, avoid contact with curbs, and avoid overloading the vehicle.

Motorists can check a vehicle's tire information or owner's manual for the maximum recommended load for a particular vehicle.

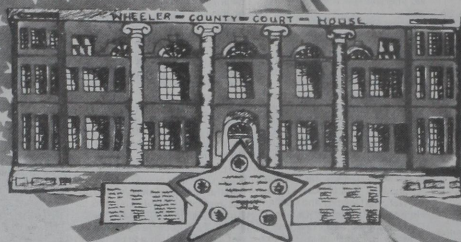

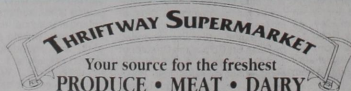
