Your medical records are confidential, and a copy can be transferred to another doctor, or for a fee can be released to you. If you choose to transfer your records, for free, to another physician please come to my office as soon as possible to sign a release form, so we can get the records transferred before the office closes.

After May 12, 2006 your records will be on file at Parkview Hospital and you will need to contact their facility for your records.



Area Fire Victims To Protect Your Home From Fires

Wildfire can strike home if you have not taken some steps to protect your house and property. The actions and precautions listed below are designed to help you prepare your home and lessen the threat of wildfire fire damage to you and your property.

1. LPG tanks should be far enough away from buildings for valves to be shut off in case of fire. Keep area around the tank clear of flammable vegetation.

2. Store gasoline in an approved safety can away from occupied buildings.

3. All combustibles such as firewood, wooden picnic tables, boats, stacked lumber, etc. should be kept away from structures.

4. Clear roof surfaces and gufters regularly to avoid build-up of flammable materials such as leaves and other debris.

5. Remove branches from tress to a height of 15 feet or more.

6. In rural areas, clear a fuel break of at least 3 times the fuel length around all structures.

7. Have fire tools handy such as: ladder long enough to reach your roof, shovel, rake, and a bucket or two for water.

8. Place connected garden hoses at all sides of your home for emergency use.

9. Assure that you and your family know all emergency exits from 10. Assure that you and your

family know all emergency exits from your neighborhood. A few things you should be

aware of during the dry, warm period... 1. Know if there is or is not a burning ban in place for your town,

city, or county. 2. If you burn, clear a large area on the ground of any combustible material, such as grass, leaves, and scrap wood, burn only what

3. Do not leave your burn pile unattended and have a hose at the

you want to burn.

Rural Residence

* Create a defensible space of at least 30 feet around your house and outbuildings; closely mow and spaced widely apart.

*Establish fuel breaks along roadways and between buildings and fields or woodlands.

* Keep mufflers and spark arresters on agricultural equipment in proper working order and watch out for rocks and metal when bush hogging or mowng.

* Monitor hay-baling operations closely, dry hay can ignite within the baler.

* Watch out for sparks when using welding equipment to build fences or repair equipment

* Avoid driving or parking vehicles in grassy areas where tall, dry grass comes into contact with hot pollution control equipment under vehicles.

* Postpone outdoor burning until your area greens up, check with local fire department to determine if ban on outdoor burning have been lifted.

* When debris burning is allowed, establish wide control lines down to bare mineral soil prior to lighting your fire. Burn trash in a burn barrel or other fire-safe receptacle covered with a wire mesh or gird that will help contain burning debris. Stay with your fire until it is out.

A Lesson God Taught Me

On April 6, 2006 my mother was awaken and told that grandpa had passed away. His condition had steadily worsened in the last days so the news was not a surprise.

It would be difficult to sum up a life that spanned nearly a decade (90 year) in a single article. But I' wanted to share with you a lesson that God taught me through my

About 8 years ago grandpa and grandma moved from their life on the farm to a retirement center in Amarillo, Texas. My grandma's Alzheimer condition had worsened so grandpa needed help in caring

for her on a daily basis. Grandma was placed in a unit in the facility that primarily housed Alzheimer patients. Grandpa stayed in independent living and walked to visit grandma at least twice daily.

I occasionally would make that walk with grandpa. On one such visit I was profoundly struck by the things that I saw. God took the opportunity, as only He can, opening my eyes to see things I had

never seen before. When we arrived in the room I watched as grandma set up in the bed and my grandpa positioned himself near her in a chair. I then watched as he cleaned her face, combed her hair, held her hand, told her he loved her and gave her a kiss. I watched him and thought, "she has no idea who he is... she will forget this tonight... no, she has already forgotten it... grandma's not even here."

I watched him and realized that he does this at least twice a day. Day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year for four years my grandpa loved a person that did not know who he even was. Every day she forgot him all over again yet every day he returned to love her.

I remember grandma's funeralnear four years ago. You would have thought that after all that care, year after year of tending to her, grandpa would have been somewhat relieved. Finally a release after such a long ordeal. No... my grandpa wept. He loved her to the end and he missed her when she was gone.

In all of this grandpa gave me the greatest gift of all- I saw the true nature of love as I had never seen it before. How many times had I read I Corinthians 13 but not

really understood it at all? "Love is patient, love is kind... it is not self-seeking ...

it always protects... always hopes, always perseveres, Love never fails."

I am understanding God's love in a new way now... how patient and persevering His love is. Day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year for my entire life, and before, God has loved us. And then spiritual Alzheimer's sets in and we forget Him all over again and again and again.

But He loves us still. "But God demonstrates His own

love for us in this; While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:8

My grandpa gave up his life on the farm, the only life he had ever known, to be with grandma in the end because of his great love for her. He gave up his life for her. I understand better now that Jesus loves me and you so much that he left the only home He had ever known to come and love us. He laid down His life for us and now He is loving us still... day after




