Samantha Chapman and Bo Compton will present a Senior Slide Show Presentation.

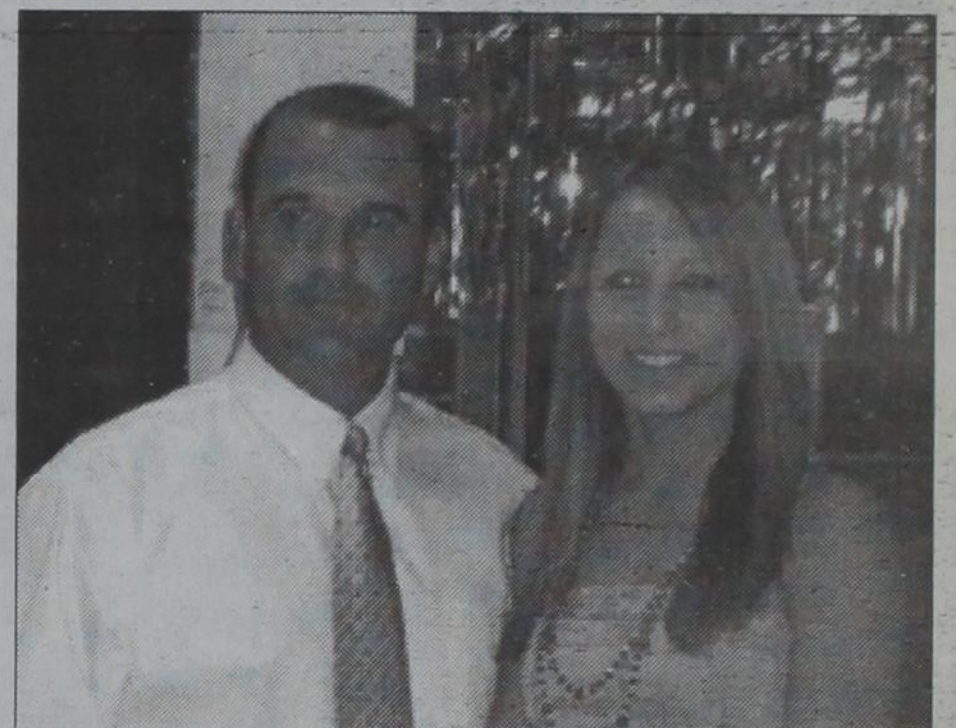
Class certifications and the presentation of the class will be by Toby Tucker.

Dr. Mike Smith, president of the Wheeler School Board will present the diplomas to the seniors.

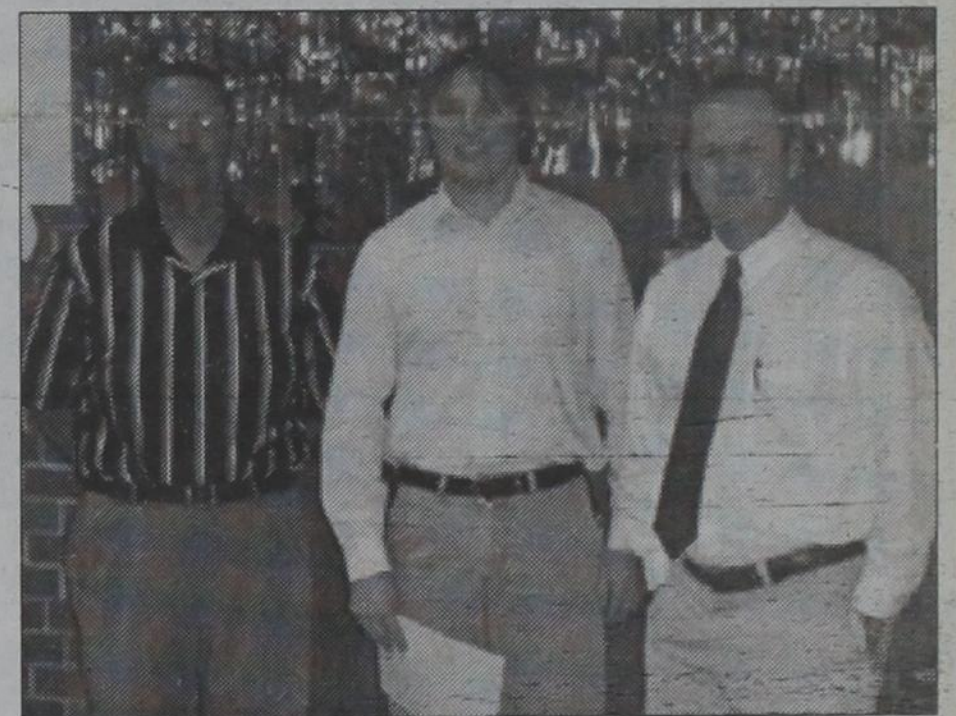

Lohberger Outstanding Grad

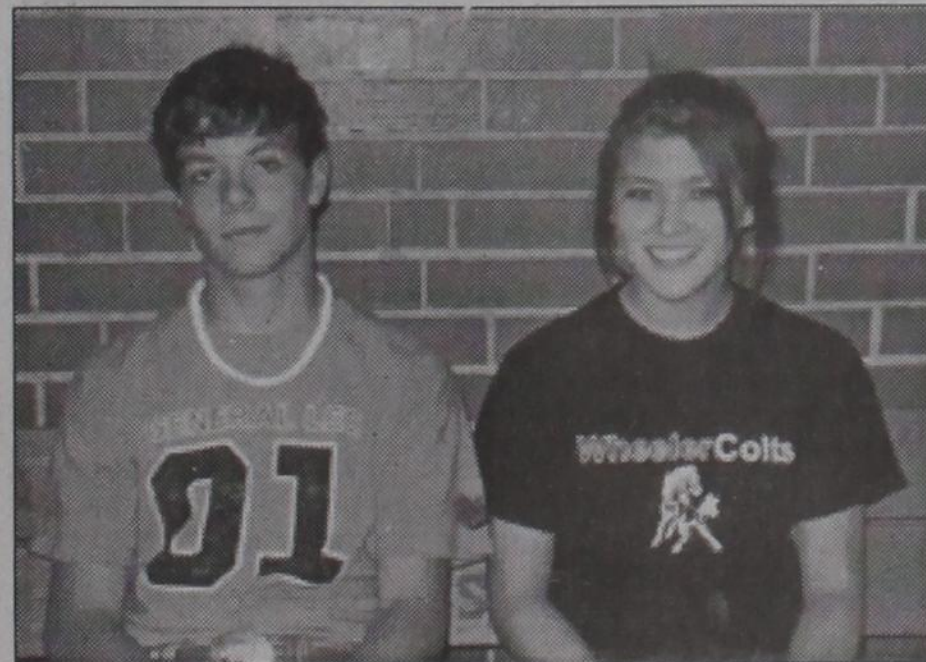
Alicia Lohberger, receiving 2006 Outstanding Graduate Award from McMurry University President Dr. John Russell during the graduation awards ceremony.

Wheeler County Commissioner's Court met in regular session on Monday, May 22, 2006, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom in the courthouse in Wheeler.

Eleven items were on the agenda.

The hourly payroll was approved as presented.

The bills presented for payment were approved.

Commissioner Daryl Snelgrooves was given permission to transfer \$5,000 from Road Maintenance and \$10,000 from Equipment into Lateral Road Repairs and Supplies. County Treas-

urer Juana Benfield asked permission to transfer \$5,957.85 from the Sheriff's Reimbursement fund to the Sheriff's salary fund. Both transfers were approved.

No action was taken on the burn ban. We do not have a fire danger at the present time.

Last week I mentioned that I was preaching one sermon for each of our graduating seniors and I wrote a small amount about three of those four lessons. The reason I skipped over the one J'Shay McCasland asked me to preach was that I hadn't done as much lesson preparation for it since I would not preach the sermon she asked for until May 28th. By the time that sermon is preached she and the other seniors will no longer be seniors, but instead High School graduates.

Anyway, in this space this week we will look at a few things from the sermon J'Shay has asked for, an overview of the book of I John. When I was a college freshman taking the classes that all other Bible majors took, I was in first year Greek. At the end of two semesters of this class we were finally ready to translate from the original language the easiest book of the New Testament: and it was I John. The book is easily translated, and for many reasons, also very easy to comprehend (although there are a few difficult things thrown in, too). I John is a very practical book, where the author John offers "parental advice" (I would call it parental advice since John addresses his audience frequently as "dear children."). The advice offered is on such categories as trying to walk in the footsteps of Jesus, recognizing that we are all people who sin, we should strive to follow the desires of God instead of the desires of man, and that we should love one another. That last advice about loving one another receives the most amount of space.

I John 4:7-8 says "Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love."

Sun Safety: "Ban the Burn"

At Kelton ISD Mrs. Schafer's classes learn about sun safety. Karen Tellman, Wheeler County Extension Agent presented a program on Sun Safety to the 3rd, 4th, 7th and 8th grade. The youth learned the importance of Sun Safety and steps to take to stay safe.

Your skin is also an excellent detector of ultraviolet (UV) radiation. When you expose bare skin to sunlight, your skin will either turn brown (a suntan) or red (a sunburn). These responses by your skin are a signal that the cells under your skin are being assaulted by UV radiation: UV radiation wavelengths are short enough to break chemical bonds in your skin tissue and over prolonged exposure, your skin may wrinkle or skin cancer may appear.

There is a safer way to detect UV—by using UV beads. These plastic beads contain a chemical which changes color when exposed to UV radiation. The colors that develop depend on the wavelength of the UV radiation. The youth at Kelton ISD learned how fast the colors in their bracelets would change. They put SPF 8, 15, 30, and 45 and noticed the difference in the change of the beads color. The higher the number of SPF the less color change was observed in the beads.

Select a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 15 or more. The sunscreen should be applied 30 minutes before going outdoors and reapplied every 2 hours. Use a lip balm with an SPF of 15 or more.

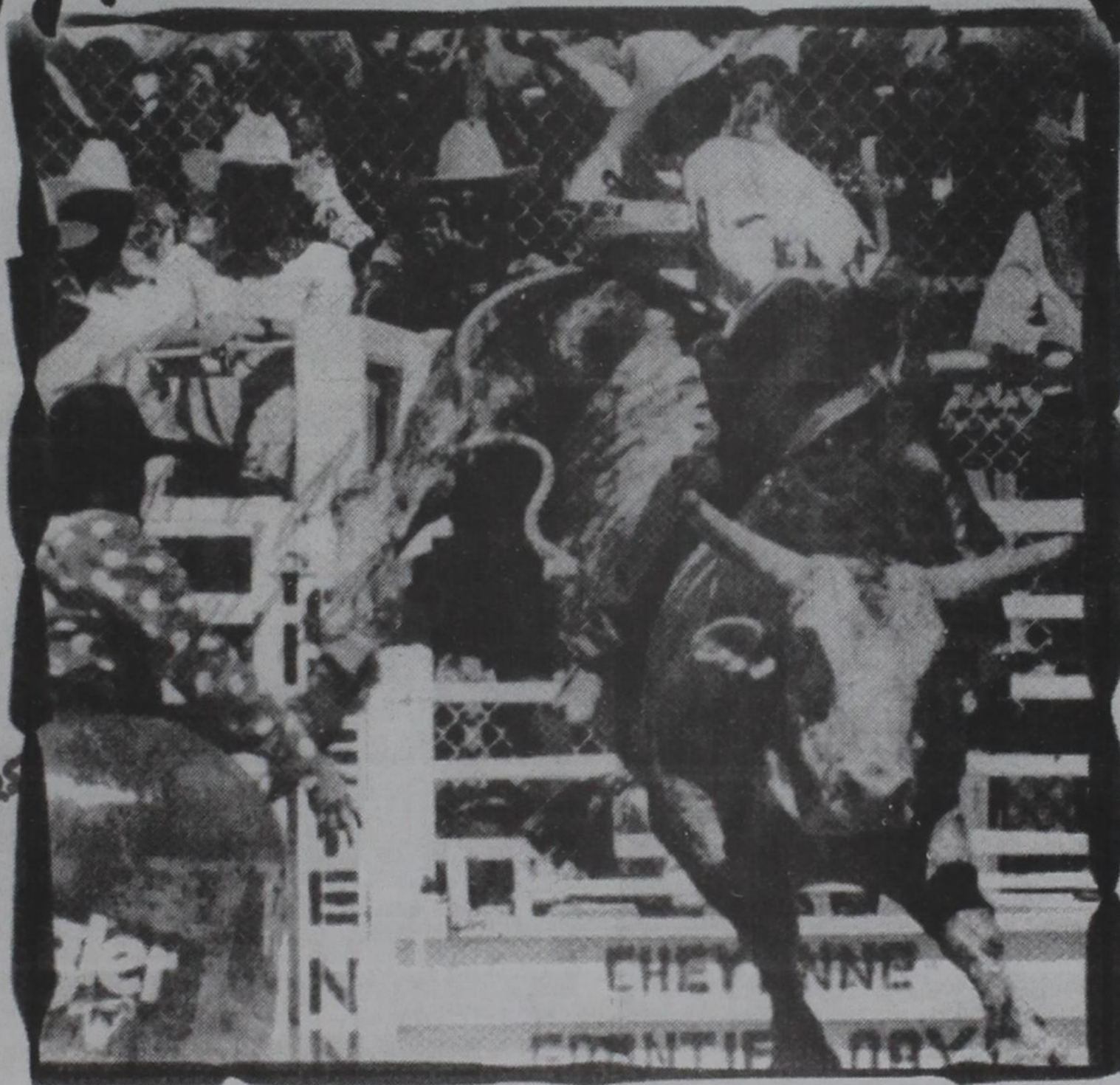

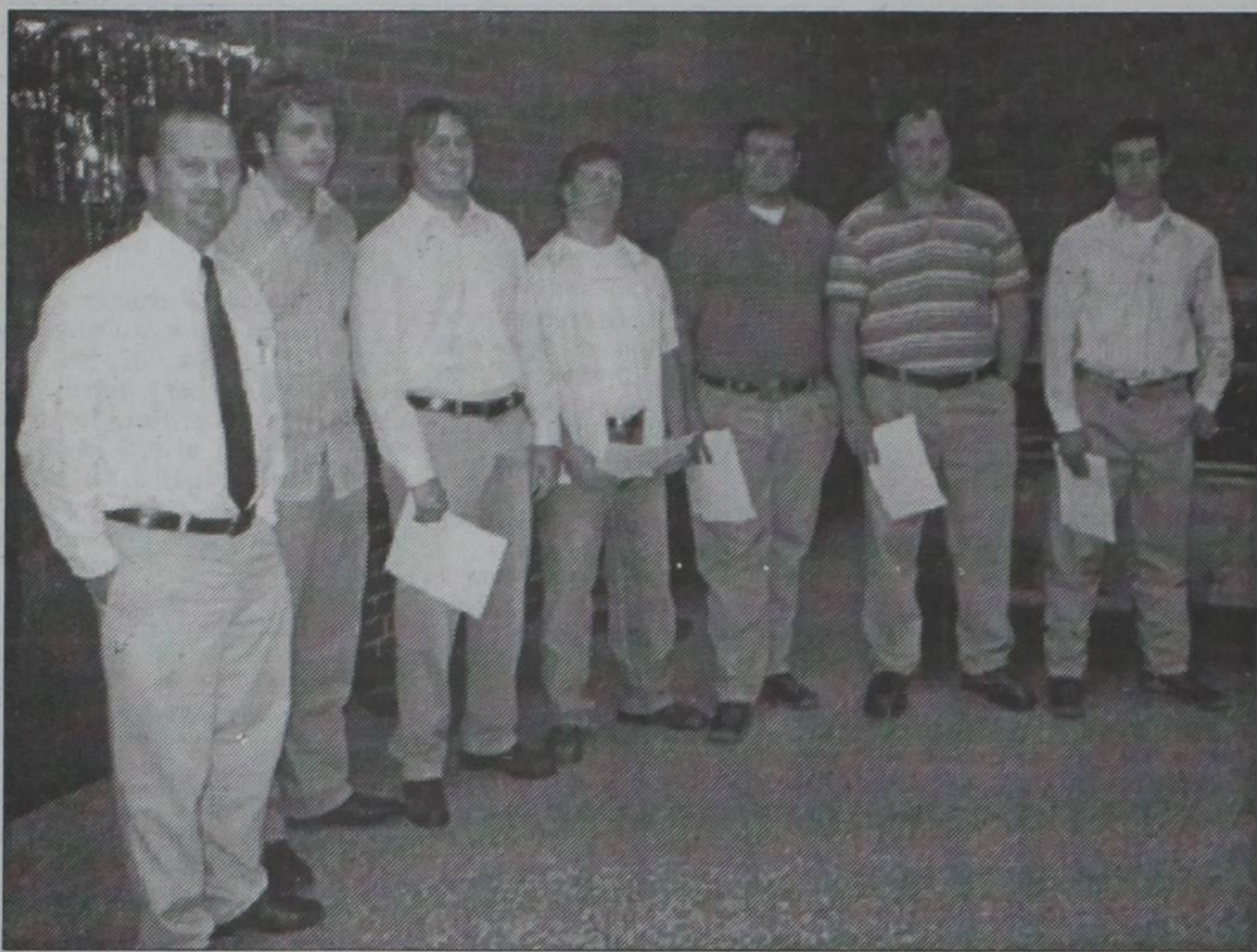

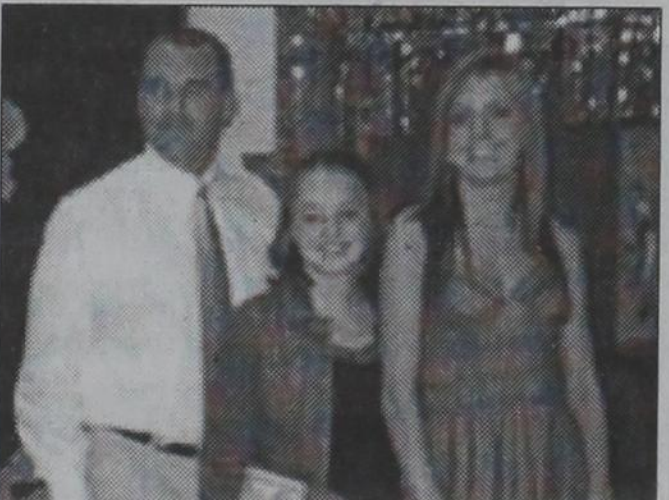
