Decidedly broader uses of land retion in a letter from George E. court house, Saturday, June 23. Adams, special cotton agent, of Colreached Jake Tarter, county agent, early this week. The letter reads as follows:

'Dear Mr. Tarter: "Replying to your recent letter and in answer to your first question: 'May a producer who has signed a cotton acreage reduction contract plant the rented acres to feed crops or grain sorghum for home consumption?' the answer is, he may do so.

"In your second question you wish to know that if the producer had other land on which he could plant grain for home consumption, whether this would be permitted. The answer is that he may, provided his rented acres) does not exceed the total acres to crops in the years 1932 | fifth.

"Of course if the producer grew more feed on the rented acres than ne could use in 1934 or 1935, there could be restriction or objection to Mae Newsome, fifth. his holding the feed until he needs

it. He may feed the feedstuff produced on the rented acres to his work stock or other stock not held for sale, or whose products are not held for sale. He shall not produce feed on the rented acres for sale directly or indirectly.

"GEORGE E. ADAMS." It is pointed out by Tarter that this ruling permits a much more liberal use of the acres than was at first allowed. However, emphasis is laid on the fact that the feed produced, must be used according to the regulations outlined in the foregoing let-

"No system is perfect," said Cassius E. Gates, past president of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce recently. "Certainly wrongdoers should be punished. Abuses should be corrected. Germany, Italy, Russia, come to mind-and the fact that unbiased observers forecast that present systems of government in those powers will either collapse or be entirely overhauled, is significant. Human rights were abrogated, traditions were forgotten, dictatorships with a vast lust for power were set up-and a feeling of rebellion grows constantly in the hearts and the minds of their

We are seeking to do great things in America. We can do them only if we temper the theories of the present with the experience of the past.
