Erosion On The Grandfield

SOIL SERIES

Wheeler County is composed of 34 soil different soil series. Of the 34 series, the most abundant is the Grandfield series. Almost 27% of Wheeler County is included in the Grandfield series. The Grandfield series lies in three main layers. The surface layer is a fine sandy loam about 8 inches thick. The subsurface layer is a sandy clay loam to a depth of about 40 inches. The underlying layer is a fine sandy loam and a loamy fine

The subsurface layer is tighter than the surface or underlying layers and restricts water percolation into the soil. As precipitation falls, it is readily absorbed by the surface layer but slowly absorbed by the subsurface layer. The surface layer eventually becomes super-saturated and slushy. Additional rainfall causes the soil to erode with the runoff water. The erosion occurs as gullies, sheet erosion, or a combination of the two.

As gullies develop, water concentrates in the channel and begins to erode through the subsurface layer. The gully eventually erodes through the subsurface layer to the less restrictive underlying layer, From there the gully will erode up the hill, sometimes to within a few feet of the

Erosion of this kind is difficult and expensive to control after it begins. The best way to prevent erosion of this sort is to maintain a good grass cover. The grass helps hold the soil and help rain percolate deeper into the soil.

If you need help with erosion problems, contact your local Soil Conservation Service.



shopping trips. CANNED FOOD QUESTIONS AND

A west coast food company recently discovered a supply of 40-year-old canned foods in its warehouse. When tested, the cans of creamed corn, fruit cocktail, and green beans proved to be completely safe and nutritious.

These old cans had a thicker tin coating and were much heavier than those used today. And certainly no one recommends keeping canned products for four decades! But the advantage of canned foods is that they can be kept for up to a year or two if stored properly.

Here are some of the common questions about canned food that Extension agents receive:

Where should I store canned goods? The best storage for canned foods is in a fry place at moderately cool, but not freezing temperatures. Avoid storage near radiators, furnaces and kitchen ranges.

How long will canned foods keep? That will depend on the type of food, the processing it received, how it was handled and the storage conditions. In general, if the cans normal in appearance, the food inside should still be wholesome. However, a regular turnover about once a year is recommended.

Is it safe to leave unused protions of canned foods in the can after opening? Acid foods, such as tomato juice, fruit juices and other fruits, should not be stored in cans after opening. Storage in opened cans increases iron accumulation. Metallic off-flavors also result from acid foods left in the opened cans. If you are not going to eat food left in cans immediately, empty the contents into a glass or plastic containers and place in the refrigera-

Texas A&M University scientists will report research results on increasing onion yields while maintaining large bulb size, gaining access to new potato markets, onion varities that do not bolt even when fall seeded, and irigation systems that save labor, machine costs and increase yields.

Texas Tech University scientists will report research results on growing herbs for spices and essential olds and the implications of interspecific onion crosses in upgrading onion varities.

A very useful technique for the successful production of early bell peppers from grower-produced bareroot transplants will be described in detail by Extension vegetable specialist Roland Roberts. Bill Weeks, executive vice president of the Texas Citrus & Vegetable Growers Association will discuss legislative matters of vital concern to Texas vegetable growers, multicrop multiperil crop insurance, transportation, labor, pesticide regulations and the progress of the marketing agreement.


