Twenty-six persons were presented certificates Wednesday night at the Bailey County Fire Department for successfully completing a 16-hour course designed to train individuals in methods and techniques of using radiological instruments, reading and recording radiological data, evaluation of radiological information and reporting procedures.

Charley Scott, training officer from the Lubbock Fire Department conducted the school on successive Wednesday nights in lieu of the regularly scheduled fire practice. The required course included monitoring techniques; monitoring operations; radiation injuries; protective measures; dose rate and calculation and radiological instrument familiarization.

During their studies, those taking the course had a supply of Cobalt 60, training instruments, and instructor's kit, and workbooks and handbooks. They did actual work with radio-

Lazbuddie Longhorns Slate Homecoming

Lazbuddie is busy preparing for a gala homecoming next Friday night.

Festivities will be kicked off with a barbecue to be served in the Lazbuddie School Cafeteria at 5:30 p.m. Tickets are available at \$1.75 for adults and \$1.25 for children. A full meal will be offered.

Lazbuddie students are selling mums for the homecoming and they may be purchased at the school.

At halftime, Lazbuddie will crown their homecoming queen and football hero. Candidates for queen are Elaine Jesko, Raygana Treider, Lee Ann Harlan and Delayne Steinbock. Hero contestants are Monte Barnes, Larry Hodges, Terry Scott and Derrell Matthews.

This year, Lazbuddie will play Amherst at the homecoming game. The Longhorns will be going into the game with a 3-1 record. Bovina downed the Longhorns two weeks ago in their only regular season loss in two years. Last year, when Lazbuddie played the Amherst team, they defeated Amherst, 46-19.

In 1968, Lazbuddie amassed an eleven win, one loss record. Their loss was in the regional game played at Post when the Longhorns were downed 27-6 by Throckmorton. They totaled 473 points during the year, giving up 102 to their opponents. Points per game average was 39.4, while hold-

ing their opponents to an average of 8.5 points per game. Some of their records include most points against an opponent in the Matador game last year, when the score was 74-6; most points in a single season was also 1968 with their 473 points; most blocks on a touchdown punt return was also in 1968 at Whiteface with seven; most points scored in one half was 50 points in the 1968 Alamo Catholic game; longest punt was 1968, a 65 yard punt by Barnes; and longest punt return of TD was an 88-yard run in the Alamo Catholic game, the runback by Troy Steinbock.

Highest individual rushing in a single game was 196 yards by Frank Hinkson in the Matador game; most points in one game were Monte Barnes, 30, in the Alamo Catholic game. Frank Hinkson had 210 points racked up during his high school football career, with 210 points and Steinbock added a total of 22 touchdowns in the 1968 seasons.

These are some of the statistics, with many others not related here, run up by Coach Pat Casey's football team during the past year.

On the night of Lazbuddie's homecoming, it will be an open night for the Muleshoe Mules. Lazbuddie school officials have said "Anyone from the surrounding area is invited to attend the homecoming activities."

harvested corn. Valentine said they are checking out the effects of micro-nutrients on corn yields. The micro-nutrients include iron and zinc. These were applied in a combined solution of iron and zinc at three different times and at three different locations on nine different corn plantings.

He said the plantings represented several different types of corn and the corn was spot harvested throughout the furrows and are being checked for yields as affected by water distribution down the furrow. Soil moisture samples are being checked at four locations down each furrow to determine the difference in soil moisture content at these locations.

Yields will be determined, said Valentine, according to how the corn is influenced by soil moisture differences. He said the tests were arranged by Clarence Christian of Texas Sesame and conducted under Christian's supervision, assisted by Bailey County Agent J.K. Adams.

Amazingly enough, at the large, modern Texas Sesame Plant, the tests are being conducted on a small antique corn sheller. No one seems to be sure just how old the corn sheller actually is. It belongs to Jesse Robles, who works on the W.G. Harlan Farm, Robles told Harland that the machine has been in his family for many years. Some time ago, the old hand crank was removed and an electric motor was installed. Other than that, the rusted machine functions as it was originally set up.

Jaycees Refute Athiest O'Hair's Religious Suits

Curtis Walker, president of the Muleshoe Jaycees, said the local organization, in conjunction with the state organization, is requesting letters objecting to actions by athiest Madalyn Murray O'Hair.

Mrs. O'Hair has begun a letter campaign to NASA asking that the Apollo eleven astronauts be censured for reading from the Bible while in space and that such religious activities be banned from future space flights. Mrs. O'Hair's campaign has resulted in a reported 27,000 letters to date. Walker said, "We did nothing as an organization to stop her from removing religion from our Public Schools, and she was successful."

"According to newspaper accounts for the past few days, she is planning to file personal damage suits against numerous schools and ask \$50,000 damages because the schools either have never stopped daily prayers or have resumed the prayers as part of the school program." "In 1960," continued the Jaycees President, "Mrs. O'Hair was successful in having the daily prayers banned from the school program. A court fight over a Baltimore, Md., school policy requiring daily recitation of the Lord's Prayer led to the highest court in the land and landmark ruling." "She now claims a following of more than 30,000 families for her Society of Separationists (SOS) and has become involved in numerous legal issues involving athiests' rights." "As we believe that 'faith

in God does give meaning and purpose to human life," then we must do something to preserve the rights of all Americans to freedom of religious choice and expressions. "It has been proposed that we have our own letter campaign to NASA expressing our belief that the astronauts have the right of religious expression," continued Walker.

Cecil Cole

Succumbs Heart Attack

Cecil Cole, 57, died at 6 a.m. Thursday morning in the Cochran County Hospital at Morton. He was taken to the hospital Wednesday afternoon after being stricken with a heart attack at his farm in the Stegall community.

Cole had lived in Muleshoe six years, moving to Muleshoe from Stegall. He moved to Stegall in 1944 from Welch, Tex. He was born November 7, 1911 at Lamesa. Cole was a farmer, a member of the Muleshoe First United Methodist Church, a member of the Maple Lions and a member of the Woodmen of the World at Welch.

Ladd Likes Fire Fighting

Although Earl Ladd Sr. moved to Muleshoe from Sudan in 1935, he was a fire-fighter before that time. He became a fireman in 1930 in Sudan and remained a volunteer fireman there until he moved to Muleshoe to work for Muleshoe Elevator.

At the time Fire Chief and Mrs. Ladd moved to Muleshoe, the elevator owned an implement company. In 1940, the Ladds bought the company and opened for business on October 1 on Main Street.

In 1945, they built their present building and moved to their location on American Boulevard.

Shortly after moving to Muleshoe, Ladd joined the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department. When asked his reason for being an unpaid fireman, he answered, "Well, that's a little hard to explain. I feel that there is a certain amount of debt we owe the community in which we live."

"In order to repay that debt, we can do something like that. When we find someone in desperate need of help, we want to help them then, not later on." "I have a sort of a creed," he continued, "To be a good fireman, a man must have a sincere desire to help his fellowman."

"If he doesn't have that desire, he cannot be a good fireman."

During the estimated more than 5,000 fires Chief Ladd has helped fight, he said he has helped remove only three bodies from burned ruins. Only one of these bodies was in Bailey County, and that was just a little more than a year ago following a fire on West American Blvd. The other two fatal fires were when the local fire department called out of county to assist with a fire.

Following Bill Booth's death in 1958, Earl Ladd was named fire chief of the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department. Since that time, he has served

as leader of the department. At the present time, there are 38 firemen on the fire department rolls, they have five pieces of rolling equipment and two portable pumps.

Included are six different fire fighting teams, each headed by a team captain. The fire chief also has one of the teams. The captain in each instance, directs his own team and instructs them on the various methods of fire fighting.

Mrs. Ladd also serves with the fire department. Not in actual fire fighting, but serves an integral part in the functions of the department. When a fire call comes in, Mrs. Ladd alerts team captains of the department, then mans the radio until the time there is an all-clear on the radio.

Fire fighting is only a part of the duties of the Bailey County

Lewis Scoggin Still Director In District

Lewis Scoggin was re-elected Director of Zone One of the Blackwater Soil and Water Conservation District.

Scoggin was re-elected to his second five year term of the West Camp store on Tuesday, October 8. Scoggin has served the district as vice-chairman during the past year.

Henry Stoneham of the district said, "Scoggin was first recognized for his conservation work in 1961 when he was selected as the 'Outstanding Conservation Farmer' of the Blackwater Valley SWCD."

Scoggin lives with his wife, Mary, and son, Jerry, 10 miles west of Muleshoe on FM Highway 1760. Scoggin operates approximately 1100 acres of dry and irrigated cropland. He has been a cooperater with the Blackwater SWCD since November, 1949.

Volunteer Fire Department said Chief Ladd. The members also weather watch during storm alerts, help control heavy traffic, assist with firework, help at bonfires, direct traffic for funerals and many other varied duties, not related to actual fire fighting.

During past years, gin fires in the fall kept the fireman hopping. However, during the past two years, Chief Ladd cited a decided drop in the number of gin fires. He said that a combination of weather, ginning improvements and a shorter season has reduced the tremendous load of calls previously coming in to the department.

The chief said that the addition of a volunteer fire department in southern Bailey County at Maple also helps the local department. The Maple unit was organized a few years ago, and area men in the community fill out the department.

Employers have to sign an agreement that their employee will be free to leave their place of work at anytime in case of fire. The prospective fireman's

wife also has to approve his unpaid, part-time profession. Mrs. Ladd commended, "People do not ask to have a fire at a convenient time, some of the fires are relatively convenient and some are not."

"A fire won't wait until tomorrow, when your phone rings, you have to be ready to go then."

The Ladds have two children, Earl Jr., who lives in Muleshoe and is an agricultural engineer. He and his wife have two sons. The Ladds other son, Johnny, lives in La Porte where he is a chemical engineer for DuPont. Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Ladd have one girl and three boys.

Anytime you hear the fire sirens, you can be sure that in just a matter of minutes, fire equipment is rolling and firemen are on their way, whether it is a home fire, grass, business, gin, trash or lumber. No matter what time of day or night or what day of the week, the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department is ready to roll.

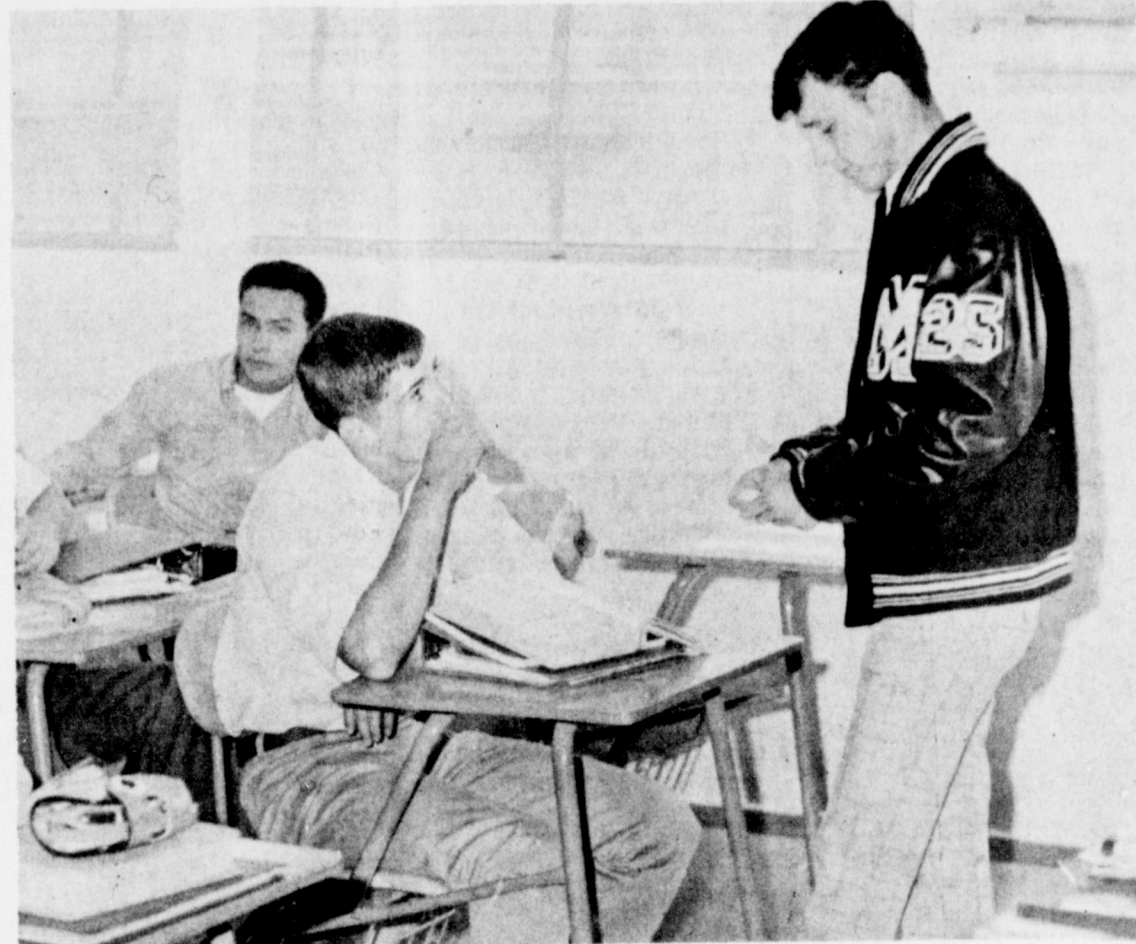
In November, the annual beauty pageant will be sponsored by the Thespians. This is always a festive occasion, and attendance is usually quite high.

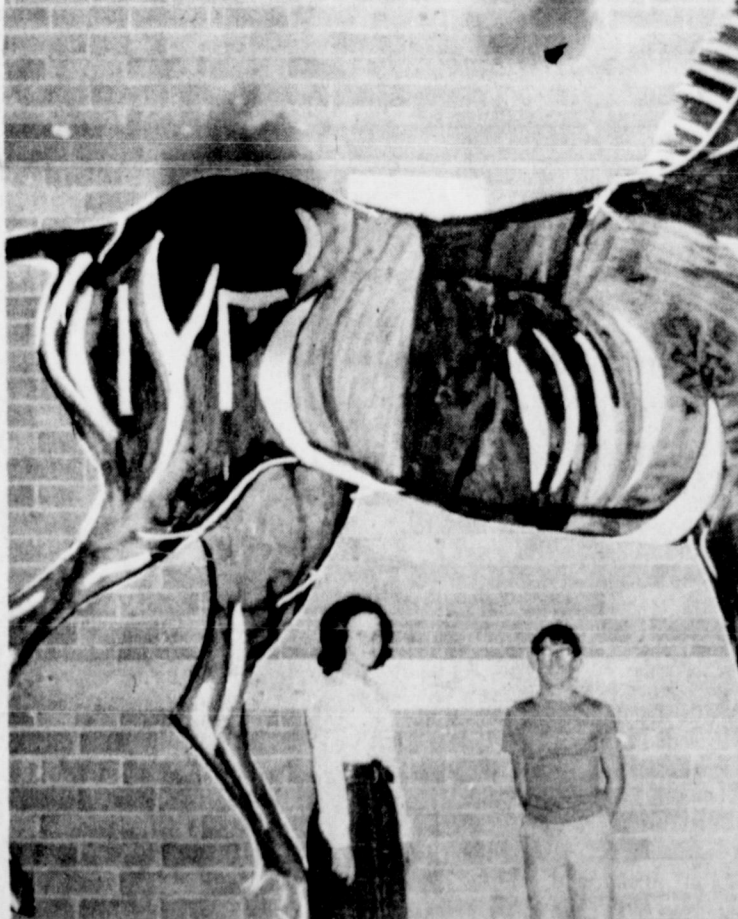
During the meeting, chili supper tickets and money were returned.

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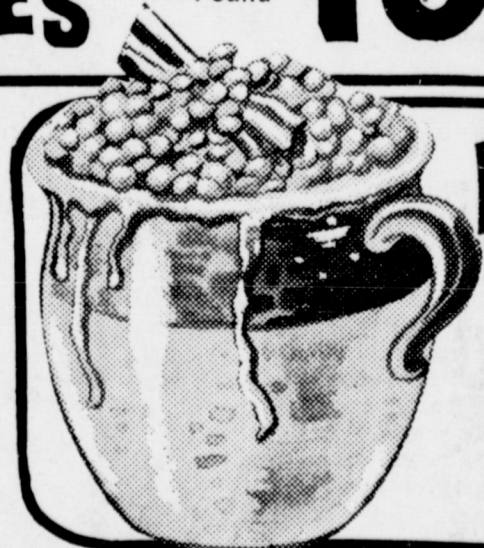
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
