The Panhandle is divided into three areas, and we will be voting in the South Area, which includes: Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Deaf Smith, Briscoe, Hall, Oldham, Wheeler, Gray, Donley, and Collingsworth. One representative will come from this area. I will try to represent the 11 counties in our area. Though we are separated by many miles, our concerns are one.

Voting places will be designated for each town. A voter must be registered to vote in Texas and be 60 years of age or older on Jan. 1, 1986.

The Swisher County Senior Citizens Association and the Retired Senior Volunteer Program Association have endorsed my candidacy and pledged their support.

2 ARRESTED IN DRUG BUST

A 'drug bust' Thursday by the Wheeler County Sheriff Department and other law enforcement officers resulted in the arrest of two Wheeler women. The arrests resulted in one charge of felony possession and one misdemeanor possession.

On the morning of February 27, 1986, Sheriff Lonnie Miller received enough information from a confidential informant to obtain search warrants for two residences in Wheeler, Texas. The officers gathered at the Sheriff's office at 2:00 P.M. in preparation for serving the warrants.

Deputy Ted Boedeker, Constable Steve Walker, Duane Cates of TSCRA and Twyla Owens were dispatched to the residence of Dwight and Susie Erwin. Owens was involved to deal with the female involved.

Deputies Robert Judd and Carl Knoll and Shamrock officer Art Taylor were sent to the residence of Steve and Debbie Alexander.

The crew headed by Ted Boedeker arrived at the Erwin home to find the residence occupied by Susie's mother, daughter and granddaughter; they were advised of the search warrant having been issued for the search of the home to look for marijuana. The officers were told of Susie's absence; they waited and served the warrant upon her arrival.

The actual search of the Erwin home began and around 2:55 P.M. a red Gott cooler was found in the closet. After the lid was removed a large bag (approximately 1 pound) of green leafy substance, presumably marijuana was found in the cooler; an additional large bag contained twelve small baggies of the same substance.

Susie Erwin was placed under arrest, her rights were read and she was taken to the Wheeler County Sheriff's office and placed in jail. Friday morning Mrs. Erwin was released under \$2,500 bond.

While the search at the Erwin's was being conducted, the other officers with search warrant in hand were at the residence of Steve and Debbie Alexander of Wheeler. The warrant to search the house was presented; the search revealed a reddish upperware bowl, containing a baggie of marijuana. The bowl was found in a drawer in the back bedroom. A misdemeanor possession charge was filed against Debbie. Mrs. Alexander plead "no contest" in county court on March 4, 1986, and was fined \$275.00 plus all court costs.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Office personnel is still investigating other possible searches for more residences of Wheeler County. In his bid for election to the office of County Sheriff, Miller promised to rid the county of drugs; the ground work has been laid, arrests will be made and charges will be filed.

State Publishes Unclaimed \$ List

The publication of the Texas State Treasury's Unclaimed Money Fund newspaper insert March 9 is impressive in several ways.

First, with 150,000 names and accounts worth \$117 million, it is the largest list of unclaimed property ever printed in the United States. It is also the largest single printing job ever done by the State of Texas, with 2,706,219 issues printed at three newspapers.

Included in the advance copy received by "The Wheeler Times" is a list of names from Wheeler and one from Mobeetie. Wheeler names printed were Calcote, Goldie Vee; Cox, Claud R.; Cushman, Jeff; Davis, David Mike; Dyer, Oma H.; Hatcher, Jack; Hinnenkamp, Dale; Landley, Johnny; Millet, San and Patricia; Mitchell, William D. EXR F.; Saddy Marilyn W.; Saucedo, Thomas R and Thurman, Rick. Bill Raines Pumping Service was the only listing from Mobeetie.

The publication lists the names of individuals and businesses that have unclaimed property reported in the Texas state Treasury. Owners are able to redeem their property by notifying State Treasury by mail (P.O. Box 12608 Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711) or by toll-free telephone service (1-800-321-2274).

The Harte-Hanks Communications, inc., printed the 34-page insert at the corporation's newspapers in Wichita Falls, Abilene, and San Angelo. The print job was the largest single

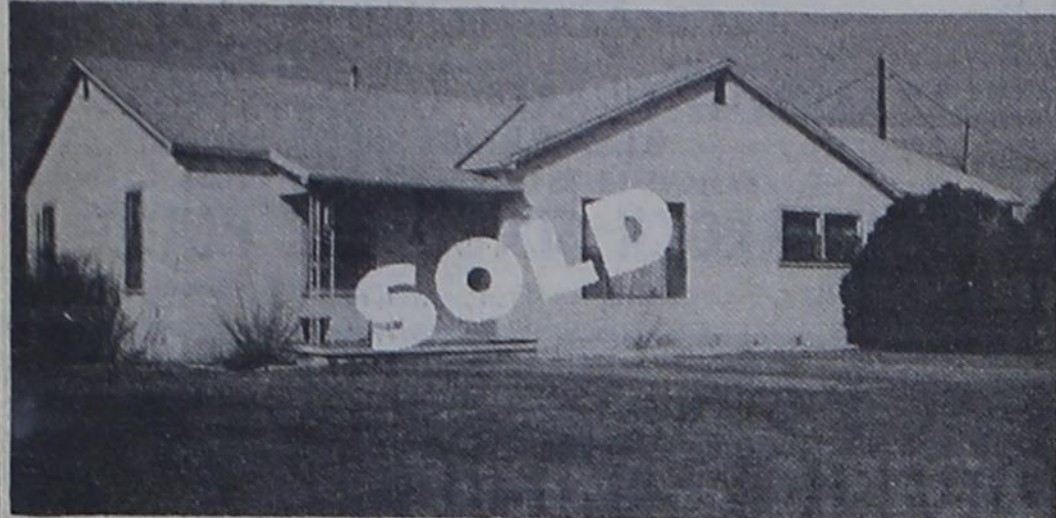

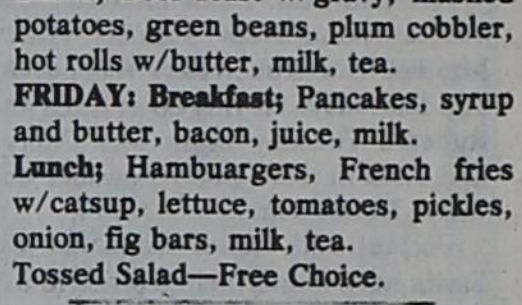

CONDIMENTS ADD SODIUM TO DIET

LINES FROM LINDA
You can carefully avoid the salt shaker and still be getting significant amounts of sodium from the condiments and sauces you use to flavor food. A sodium intake of 1,100 to 3,300 milligrams daily is considered safe and adequate for a healthy adult according to Mary K. Sweeten, Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist. One teaspoon of salt contains 1,938 milligrams of sodium or almost two-thirds of this daily amount.

While the specific amount will vary somewhat according to brand, recent figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture illustrate the sodium content of many popular seasonings, condiments, and relishes. Among the sauces, soy sauce contains the most sodium with about 1,029 milligrams per tablespoon. One tablespoon of Teriyaki sauce contains 690 milligrams, chili sauce 227, Worcestershire sauce 206, and barbecue sauce 130 milligrams.

Some favorite condiments add smaller amounts of sodium to the diet. A tablespoon of ketchup has 156 milligrams while the same amount of sweet relish contains 124 milligrams. Brined relishes like pickles and olives are another significant source of sodium. For example, one 2-ounce dill pickle adds 928 milligrams of sodium to the diet and four green olives increase the sodium count by 323 milligrams.

Condiments used in cooking will also add sodium. For example, one teaspoon of garlic salt contains 1,850 milligrams of sodium; onion salt 1,620 milligrams, meat tenderizer 1,750 milligrams and MSG, or monosodium glutamate, 492 milligrams.

If your doctor has prescribed a low-sodium diet of 1,000 to 2,000 milligrams per day it will take careful selection of seasonings and condiments to avoid exceeding your sodium allotment. For flavor without extra sodium, try sticking to garlic or onion powders, which contain only 1 gram of sodium per teaspoon.

To avoid hidden sources of sodium in your diet, it's especially important to read the nutrition labels on any commercially prepared condiments and seasonings. Using a home-made mixture of various herbs and spices or flavoring with lemon juice can keep even a low-sodium diet from being bland.

"Producers Should Call For Checks Very Soon"; this the heading of a story in the January 9 issue. The story reads:

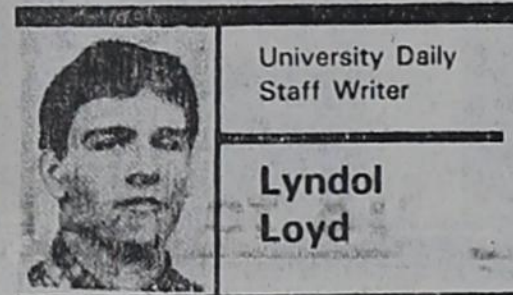

flask, was doubtless much exaggerated—but it remains a statistical truth that the most dangerous drivers are those in their late teens and early twenties. If the menace of automobile accidents can be brought home to these drivers we will have taken an important step in curing the problem.

One of the campaigns is being conducted at Yale, where the Yale News, as distinguished in undergraduate newspapers as the country possessed, has issued a pledge for students to sign. Signers of the pledge agree to follow such simple obvious and yet vitally essential practices as to drive always at moderate speeds, never to pass on hills or curves, to stop at stop signs and not "jump" traffic lights, and to be fair to all other drivers. Any driver, young, middle-aged or old, who follows these rules has a relatively small chance of becoming involved in a major automobile accident, due to his own carelessness.

It would be a great thing for the nation if every university saw the inauguration of such a campaign. During the last two years we have killed more than 70,000 people in automobile accidents, and practically every one of those accidents was preventable. In every one of them human error, human failings, human irresponsibility, were the greatest contributing factors. The university students who are fighting auto accidents are setting an example that should be emulated not only by their fellows, but by their elders.
