

# BASKETBALL TEAMS END SEASON

**PHILLIPS RALLIES TO EDGE WHEELER IN 1A TILT, 40-38**

**[Editor's Note: The following article was taken from the Wednesday, Feb. 26, 1986 Amarillo Daily News.]**

After being shut out in the first half, Phillips' Vic Lemley scored 10 fourth-

quarter points Tuesday night leading the Blackhawks to a 40-38 win over Wheeler in a Class 1A area playoff game in White Deer.

The win sends 22-7 Phillips into regional competition Friday in Levelland against Valley, a 69-49 winner

over Sudan Tuesday.

The Mustangs, who led 21-10 at halftime, ended their season 15-5.

Led by Randall Hugg's outside shooting, Wheeler led by 11 points after two periods. But Hugg was all but shut out in the second half and

Phillips was able to come back.

With 2:00 left and Wheeler ahead 38-35, the Mustangs missed two free throws and were later called for a charging foul. The Blackhawks scored, cutting the lead to 38-37 and scored the winning basket seconds later.

Wheeler had one last chance to win the game, but Cody Wiggins' shot came up short. Phillips' Dave Harville grabbed the rebound, was fouled, and made one of two free throws providing the margin of victory.

Hugg was the only Wheeler player

## 3 Council Races Contested

The voters in Wheeler's city election on Saturday, April 5, will have a choice in each of the positions to be filled. A mayor and two councilmen are to be elected.

Filing for a place on the ballot closed Wednesday, February 19, with each of the incumbents filing for re-election and each drawing an opponent in the race. The races should draw a number of voters to the polls.

Seeking a third term as mayor is Louis C. Stas, editor of The Wheeler Times. He is being opposed by Wanda Herd, co-owner of Maxey's Steakhouse. Stas has been on the council since 1969. This will be the first time for Mrs. Herd to seek public office and states her desire for seeing Wheeler Progress as her reason for seeking the office of mayor.

Place 2 on the Wheeler council is presently held by David C. Cross, a 14-year member of the council and presently serving as mayor pro-tem. Don E. Rose, an employee with Arkla Gas, is asking an opportunity to serve the citizens of Wheeler in this position.

## Mobeetie Voters To Elect 2 Trustees

The Mobeetie School Board will have two Trustee positions whose terms will expire this April. Incumbents, Gene White and Archie Summers, Sr., are presently serving in these positions.

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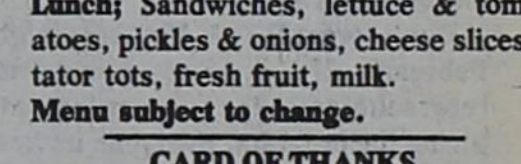
