





The Tax Reform Act of 1985 (H.R. The minutes of January 13, 1986 and 3838) passed by the House on December 17, 1985 and currently under consideration by the Senate Chairman Tipps asked for the Finance Committee (in its version) includes fundamental changes to the Internal Revenue Code. If enacted into law, these changes, which relate to municipal bonds, will adversely Chairman Tipps asked for the impact political subdivisions that issue such bonds, including, but not

Compliance with the law will result in additional costs to the taxpayers of the entities issuing such bonds. The law will require continuous monitoring of investments and expenditures and the expensive services of He asked that the Kelton voting accountants and lawyers to determine the amounts and prepare the documents to be sent to the U.S. Treasury. Additionally, in the event of noncom-Board member Tommy Puryear pliance, the interest on the bonds will be taxable, retroactively to issuance date, in the gross income of owners of the bonds; thus forcing higher interest the election clerk and Mrs. Kenneth rates to be charged to the entity.

As you know, schools, communities, and especially local taxpayers have already endured all the "reform" we can "enjoy" in Texas with the passage of the School Reform second and voted that salaries be set Act of 1984 (H.B. 72) by the Texas Legislature. The delivery of quality education is costing local taxpayers more every year. This law, if enacted, will once again reach into the taxpayer's pocket which is already depleted from increased local taxation and the declining economy.

I urge you to actively work for the defeat of H.R. 3838, and, when afforded the opportunity, cast a "NO" vote against the law. This action will benefit the taxing entities and taxpayers of the State of Texas. We are depending on your support in this matter.

Ronald Carter, with farming interests between the Lutie and Samnorwood areas, crop yield 61.39 bushels per acre for 241 percent of Collingsworth County yield. Mr. Carter's high production placed him third in the state.

On February 17, Carter will be presented a state award in a meeting to be held in Dallas.

The contest is based on this year's yield against the past three years in the respective county. Wheeler County average for the past three years was 28.2 bushels per acres and the Collingsworth County average was 25.4. All yields are converted to 0% moisture instead of the 14% moisture content accepted at eleva-

National Grain Sorghum Producers Association was established in 1955 by grain sorghum farmers. Their objective was and continues to be, to increase the profitability of grain sorghum production through: (1) market development; (2) research and education and (3) legislative representation. National GSPA has members in twenty-nine states with state organizations in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Members in Missouri and Arkansas are developing plans to establish state GSPAs at this time.

John McDowell was elected board member to represent Wheeler County and Ronald Carter to represent Collingsworth County, GSPA has a pyramid structive for representations. Members elect a director to represent a county or district. These district directors then elect regional directors who mke up the national board. Each state organization has one director on the national board plus additional directors according to the number of members within that state. GSPA is financed primarily through membership dues.

The main endeavor of GSPA has always been to work for better prices through greater markets. GSPA was the first to conduct foreign market development for U.S. feed grains, establishing market in Europe, Japan and South America in cooperation with USDA Foreign Agriculture Service. This work led to the formation, in 1960, of U.S. Feed Grains Council. Subsequently, GSPA has supported the Council, both as a member and by advocating and sponsoring the three state sorghum checkoff program which has provided significant Council funding. Since 1960 GSPA has promoted grain sorghum exports through the council and also conducts specific sorghum promotion and deals with some unique problems of sorghum export promotion which cannot be done through the Council.

GSPA has promoted the use of grain sorghum in the U.S. by: (1) promoting the development of the cattle feeding industry in the sorghum belt; (2) sponsoring research and demonstration projects to prove the nutritional value of U.S. Yellow Sorghum; (3) iniating and cosponsoring 14 biennial Grain Sorghum Research and Utiliation Conferences and other conferences and symposiums and (4) publishing and distributing information about grain sorghum value and utilization in livestock feeds.

GSPA has sponsored research in: (1) disease and insect control; (2) proving the value of weatherdamaged sorghum; (3) searching for new processing methods and for new or expanded uses of sorghum and (4) numerous projects dealing with identiffcation and effect of tannin of sorghum.

Another function of the National GSPA is to represent sorghum execution of legislation which affects them. Legislative policy recommendations originate in county and local district meetings, are passed from the district directors to the national board which adopts legislative policy for the association. All lobbying activities just be in accordance with the policy adopted by the board. GSPA legislative activities are financed by membership dues.

U.S. Yellow Sorghum is a high quality feed grain. Most of the grain sorghum produced in other parts of the world is a high tannin inferior grain. Because of this difference, prejudice and misinformation hamper sorghum promotion. U.S. grain sorghum simply will not be sold at profitable prices until its quality is made known. The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association is dedicated to that purpose.






