

on his homestead, he can still take information. advantage of the "over-65 tax deferral" by filing an affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District, explained that once an over-65 taxpayer properly files the tax deferral affidavit, state law prevents taxing units from initiating or pursuing delinquent tax suits on the homestead for as long as the applicant owns and lives at that property.

Copeland said that elderly homeowners can obtain forms for the deferral affidavit at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office. The homeowners should fill out the form and have his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths, she added.

Copeland stressed that the tax deferral only postpones tax payments, it does not dismiss them. "Elderly homeowners should understand that the taxes, penalties and interest will continue to add up," she explained. "Once the homeowner no longer qualifies for the deferral--that is, if he no longer owns or resides at that homestead--all those deferred amounts must be paid. At that time taxing units may sue to collect the delinquent taxes, penalties and interest, and foreclose on the

Diet, fitness and fat just don't seem to go together. Yet nutritionists and medical authorities agree that some fat is a necessary part of the balanced

The question is, how much fat is too

Many health organizations recommend that we should get about 30 percent of our calories from fat.

So if you require, 2,000 calories to maintain your weight, about 600 of those calories should come from fat. About ten percent of that fat can come from saturated fat sources.

* Bake, broil, boil, steam, poach, or stir fry with little or no added fat.

* Trim any visible fat from beef, veal, pork, and lamb. Remove the skin from turkey and chicken.

* Refrigerate gravies, stews and soups - then skim off the hardened

* Drain the fat from cooked foods.

* Select low-fat dairy products, such as skim or low-fat milk, low-fat cheese, low-fat cottage cheese and low-fat yogurt.

* Read the labels on processed foods to determine their fat content.

What's A Three-Ounce Serving of

The USDA dietary guidelines recommend eating six ounces of cooked meat, or an equivalent protein source,

You can get this amount of meat by eating one six-ounce serving of meat at one meal, having two three-ounce servings at two meals or having several small servings during the day that provide the total six ounces.

If you plan to serve a three-ounce portion of meat, remember that cooking losses and the part you discard, like bones and fat trimmings will affect the final weight of what you

One-fourth pound (4 ounces) of ground meat will yield about three ounces of cooked meat. A raw, center loin pork chop, cut 1-inch thick, weighs about 8 ounces. But once it is cooked and trimmed with bone removed, it weighs about three ounces.

Meat is a major source of high quality protein and iron as well as other important nutrients. By learning to judge the recommended serving size, you can serve nutritious meals that are also low in calories and fat.

The brackets show the girls and boys teams play as follows: Kelton vs. Mobeetie, Miami vs. Shamrock, Smanorwood vs. Allison, Briscoe vs. Lela and Wheeler vs. Magic City.

The January 9, 1935, edition showed Canadian boys defeating the Mobeetie boys for first place. The Wheeler boys place third in the tournament. The Mobeetie girls won over the Canadian team by a wide margin. The Allison girls defeated the Wheeler girls in the semi-finals for third place honors. Wheeler county coaches selected the All-star teams; the paper only lists last names of these individuals and their teams. Among the boys named were Dyson and Moore of Mobeetie and Connor of Wheeler; Gunter of Allison and Lee and Dysart of Mobeetie were named to the girl's All-star team.




