We have been enjoying some beautiful weather for the past few days. I was told Tuesday that "a mild January meant a mild February". We will see if the individual is correct.

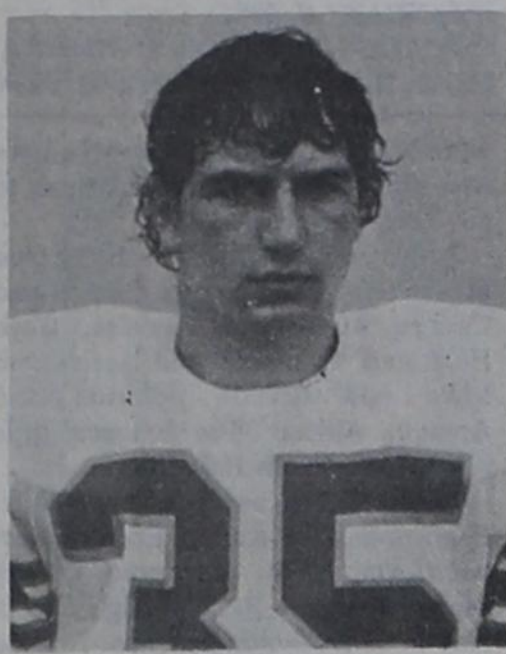
A card for ordering onions came in the mail; I hope we have better luck with the onions this year. Ed and Erma Riley should be making their annual trip to south Texas for the onions before long.

## Terminal Fed Heifer Program Gets Underway Sat., January 25

The Panhandle Terminal Fed Heifer Program will get under way, January 25. Any 4-H or FFA member is eligible to participate in the program. Those Wheeler County members who plan to feed heifers are asked to contact Van Baize at the First National Bank in Wheeler, Don King in the Wheeler County Extension office, or their vocational agricultural teachers. A close estimate of the number of heifers to be fed is needed very soon so arrangements for feed can be made according to Don King, County Extension Agent. The Panhandle Terminal Fed Heifer Program is designed to teach the basics of beef cattle selection feeding and evaluation. Several educational activities have been planned to accomplish this goal. The program will stress the economics of beef cattle production and should allow participants to make a profit from the cattle they feed. Entries in the program will consist of a pen of two heifers and each 4-H or FFA member may enter up to two pens. The member will select and purchase his heifers as a commercial feeder would. The heifers will be fed for 140 days. They will go on feed January 25, and come off June 4. All of the heifers will then be slaughtered and carcass data will be collected and the carcasses will be ranked. Final placings in the program will be based on carcass quality, rate and cost of gain, and on a record book and a quiz taken by the feeders. The cattle will be sold on the rail at market price. The program was planned to be as close to a commercial enterprise as possible. The heifers will not be fitted and shown as show cattle, however, they will be put on exhibit June 4, to give the feeders recognition for their work. An effort was made to develop a program that will enable participants to make a profit. Feed will be mixed especially for this program. Premium money and other awards will be presented to those participants with the top placing entries. The program has been well received by many firms associated with the cattle feeding industry. Several companies have donated products that will be sold at the County Stock Show auction sale to raise money to be used as premium money and to defray program expenses. Those companies that have already donated include Anchor Laboratories, Norden Laboratories, American Cyanamid, Ceva laboratories, Pfizer Laboratories, American Hoechst Corporation, and Hi Pro Feeds.

## Pair Arrested In Rural House Burglary

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department solved a house burglary in the Mobeetie area; two men were arrested. Bobby Joe Remy, 43, and David White, 22, were taken into custody. The items recovered were estimated to be worth \$900.

A ranch headquarters located five miles southeast of Mobeetie was burglarized between December 17 and December 22. The incident was reported on December 22. The house, the old Simms place, is kept furnished for use when ranch work is being done. The property taken in the burglary was valued between \$900 and \$1000. Taken were a 14" color television, electric chain saw, electric skill saw, kerosene heater, battery charger, box of tools, spare tire and other items. The recovery was made by Sheriff Lonnie Miller and Deputy Robert Judd.

At the arraignment, bond was set for White at \$1000. Remy was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$400. White again appeared before the judge on Tuesday morning; he pled guilty, was fined \$22, sentenced to 5 days in jail with 6 additional months probation.

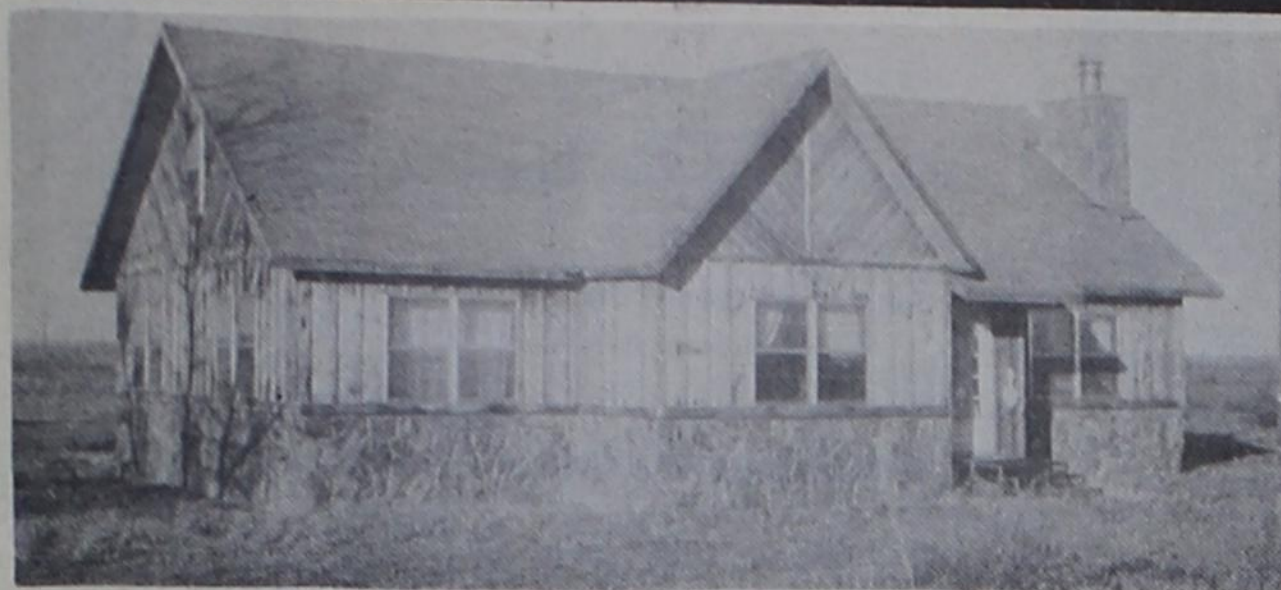

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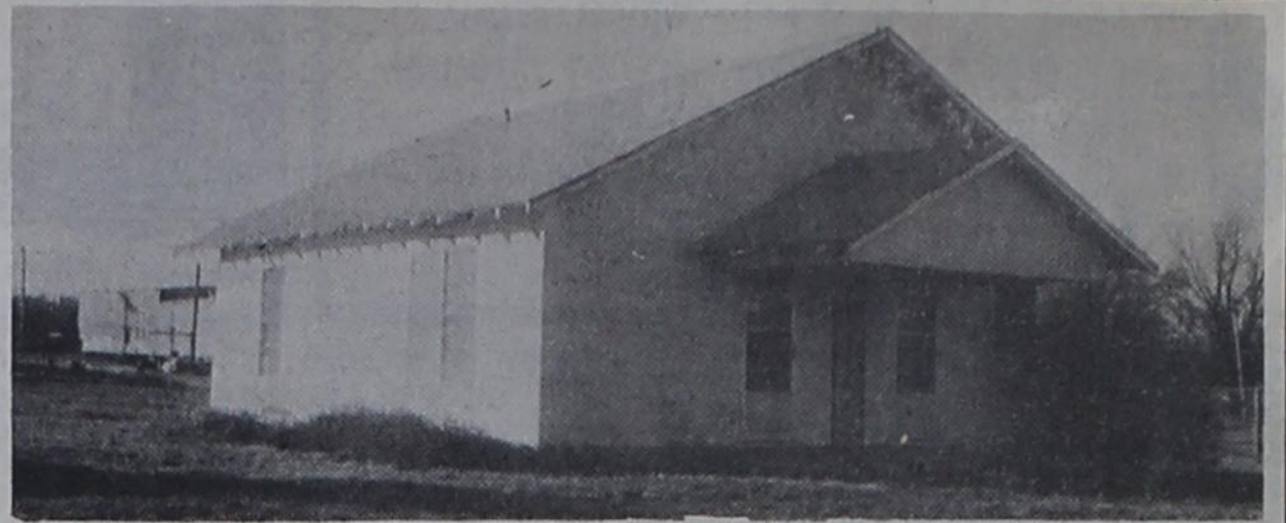

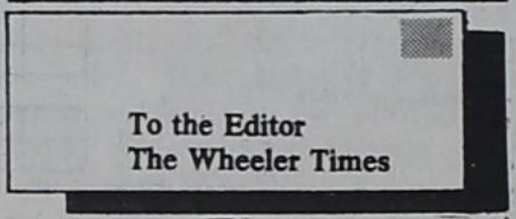

To the Editor: Today's papers and TV brought back memories of the past. The death of Ricky Nelson made me recall seeing his mother and father in a program in Amarillo, Texas, before they were married. To me, they were great and raised good children.

The airport from which Ricky left for Texas, Guntersville, Alabama, was named after my ancestors, I think. I have been told that the Gunters were so good to the Cherokee Indians that one chief gave a daughter to them. My grandmother Gunter, part-Cherokee, reared 14 great children. Several attended college. One aunt received her doctorate while teaching in Fort Worth.

The Cotton Bowl Parade had a group from the Masonic Hella Temple in Dallas. In 1919 my father received the highest Masonic award in Texas at the Hella Temple. He received a gold Masonic ring with a beautiful diamond set in it.

The Cotton Bowl game made me recall the first two years at A&M when it was a military school. Enrollment was about 3000. There were no females nor Blacks. Our rooms and campus were spotless. All students had to be neatly dressed. One of my instructors told his class that Prairie View State College an all-black college, was as clean as our college.

Texas A&M and Auburn today had many good Black players. Bo Jackson from Auburn, lived up to his rating as Heisman Trophy winner. A&M's Black quarterback did a fantastic job, as well as many other Aggie players.

Once, many years ago, A&M played Michigan State in San Antonio. They would not let a Black player participate. I expressed my opinion about this. I was taught to respect all people, assuming they earned respect, regardless of "race, creed or color", else my parents would have "spanked" me.

I have been a teacher and coach starting out at the age of 19 when I had to drop out of A&M because I ran out of money. As a coach I would not permit what I see today, "show-offs" and poor sportsmanship. Today, I saw much of what I would call "show-offs" and poor sportsmanship, slamming a football down after making a touchdown. Once when my team was playing for the county championship, my first team was not adhering to my rules. Luckily, my substitutes did not let me down. We won the championship in Baily County in softball.

If today's parents implied rules upon their children as my parents used, this would be a better world. I feel that the Nelsons did a good job in rearing their family.

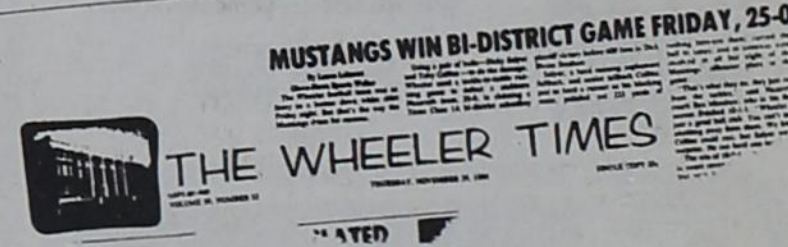
