Roberta Amanda (Wales) Adams was born July 8, 1920 in Tucson, Arizona to Robert Wales, an employee of Western Union from Chicago, and Ima (Hawkins) Wales of San Diego, Calif.
She was the oldest of three children. By a quirk of fate (the stock market crash of 29) her family settled in Amarillo, Texas where her father was manager of Western Union.

Roberta attended Amarillo Public Schools, graduating from Amarillo High in 1938 and from West Texas State in 1942 majoring in P.E. and Biology.
She married Carroll Adams whom she met in college in 1942. She taught school in Galveston, Houston, and Spearman. Then she and Carroll moved to Wheeler Co. began providing the minutes of the regular Commissioners Court meetings to the county newspapers for publication.

A microfilm machine was installed. All the deeds, probate records, deeds of trust, attachment records, abstract of judgements and power of attorney records were updated; these records are now updated monthly and are stored in security vault in El Paso, Texas. In an emergency the records can be retrieved from the vault. Other records that may be necessary to obtain in an emergency are recorded in Austin, such as birth and death certificates, etc.

During the time served in the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector, Daughtry was assisted by Hester Dodson, then chief deputy, set up a complete new record keeping system, resulting in fast service to the taxpayers. Within one year after completion, most of the counties in Texas were using part of the same system.

A number of projects were completed during the time Daughtry served as mayor of the City of Wheeler. The water and sewer system was extended and one new water well was drilled. An underground water storage facility was constructed, the city limits were extended and several streets were paved. Mercury vapor lights were installed in the downtown area, a swimming pool was constructed and help was given with the construction of Parkview Hospital.

In closing, Daughtry commented: "I have enjoyed working in the elective positions that I have been privileged to serve. My appreciation is extended to the City Councils of the City of Wheeler, the Commissioners of the Wheeler County Courts I have worked with over the years and to the voters of Wheeler County."




