Robbery at Porter's Last Thursday Night

Thieves Pry Lock from Rear Door -Take Cash and Quantity of Merchandise

Shortly after opening for business, last Friday morning, George Porter, proprietor of Porter's Department store here, found the place had been entered during the night by burglars who gained access through a rear door after prying off the lock.

Initial survey disclosed the loss of about \$10 in cash and a quantity of men's and women's clothing and shoes.

Sheriff Raymond Waters was notified of the robbery and made an inspection of the premises. Notices to peace officers in surrounding towns, together with thorough investigation of all possible leads, had not discovered the guilty party or parties up to late today.

Subsequent check-up of stocks revealed careful discrimination by the burglars, with a preference for the better grades of merchandise. Men's pigskin and suede jackets, several boxes of socks, the highest priced shoes, women's spring coats, suits, and underwear comprised the loot.





Farmers will be able to sign up under the new Soil Conservation program as soon as the necessary forms arrive. When these forms arrive they will be distributed to the local committeemen and farmers will sign up with their own committee-

with whom a farmer can sign up. In the meantime it will be a good idea for farmers to check the list below which gives the crop classification as they will be considered under the new program. All crops are classified as either soil depleting, soil conserving, or soil building.



Worked on Prairie

Abernathy is the town where Mc-Carty began his newspaper work. He worked on the Prairie while attending school at Canyon and in 1923 he went to Amarillo. "I was probably the worst sports writer that ever worked on a paper," he continued as he smiled genially over the audience. In 1929 he went to Dalhart, where he became noted for his editorial

According to McCarty, the characteristics of a good journalist are: alert mental capacity, understanding surroundings, understanding of job, speed, at least a high school education, working knowledge of the typewriter, tact and enough curiosity to enable one to gather sufficient material. All these things are important factors of a good journalist. Martha Alice Wiley, Orveta Puett, he said, but above all other things one must have his heart in his work.


