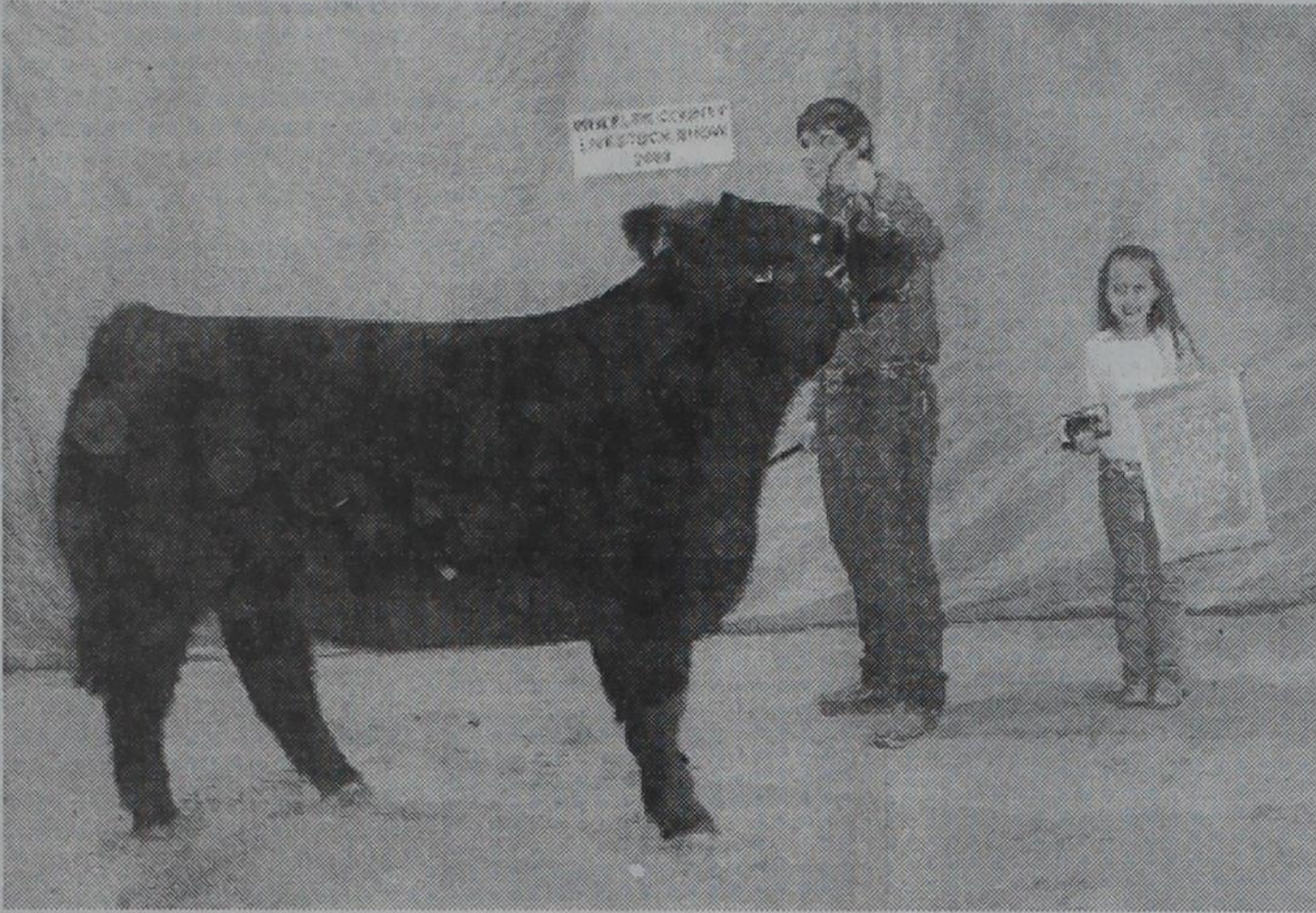

Girl Scouts To Hold Open House Jan. 29

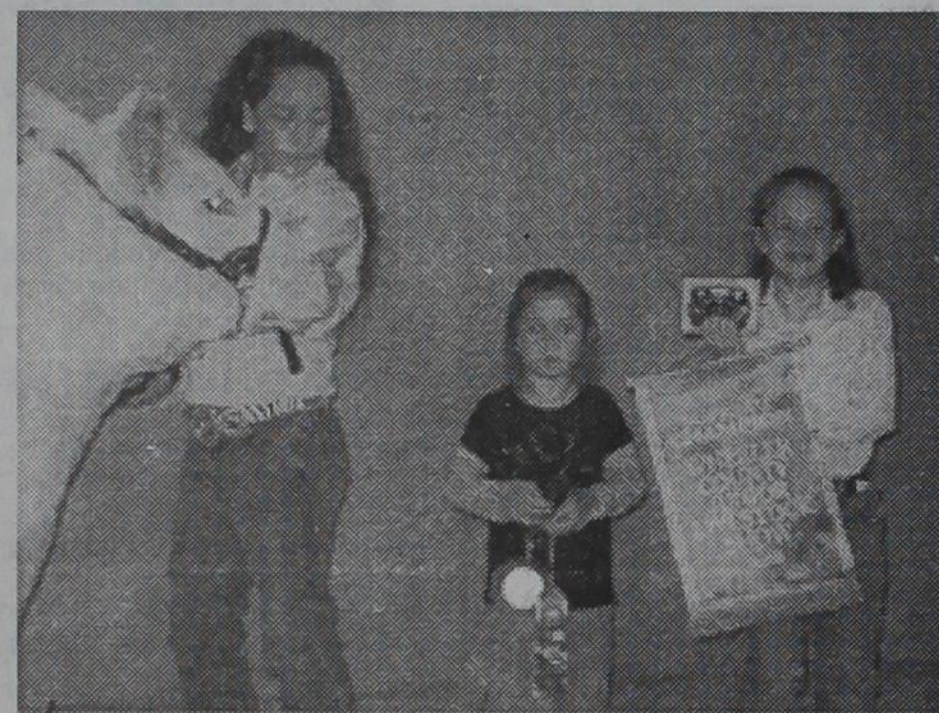

Board members of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met at Maxeys at noon on Wednesday, January 14.

After the meeting was called to order by president Frankie Jackson, the minutes of the previous meeting and financial report were approved.

Darrel Gaines reported the letters announcing the annual spring turkey hunt have been sent. Land owners are paid for allowing hunters on their land; if you have land and wish to participate, you are urged to contact Mr. Gaines.

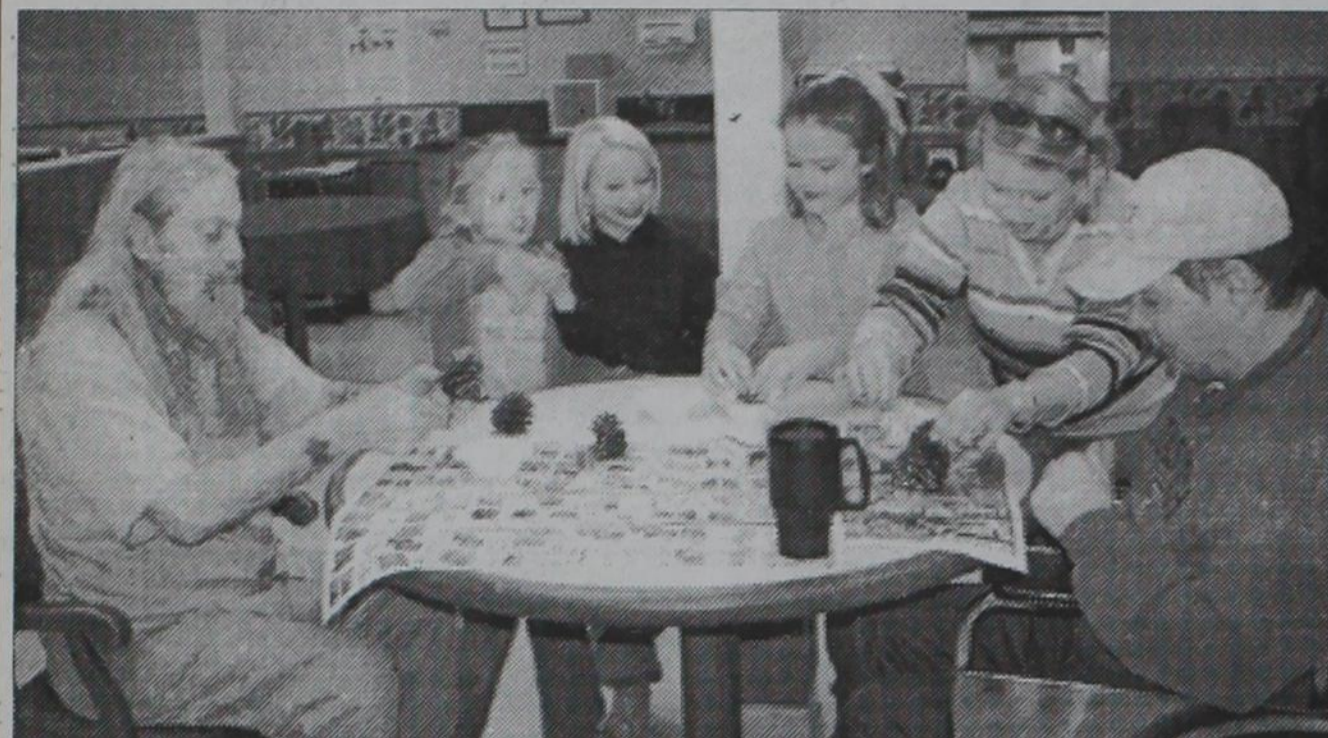

Parkview Artery Got Flu

Your head aches, and so does every bone in your body. You're cold one minute and hot the next. Your throat is scratchy and you're starting to cough. You may be getting the flu!

If you have the flu, you'll have lots of company. Each year from November to April, all across the United States, as many as 60 million people come down with the flu. Although children get the flu most often, people in every age group can catch it.

Usually when you're sick with a virus, your body builds up a defense system by making antibodies against it, so you don't get that particular virus strain again. Unfortunately, flu viruses mutate (change) each year, so you aren't protected from getting the flu forever.

Although you may feel miserable if you get the flu, it's unlikely to be serious. It's rare that healthy people have complications like pneumonia or bronchitis from the flu. Older adults (over age 65), young kids (under age 5), and people with chronic medical conditions are more likely to become seriously ill with the flu.

If you get the flu, the best way to take care of yourself is to rest in bed and drink lots of liquids like water and other noncaffeinated drinks. Stay home from school or work until you feel better and your temperature has returned to normal.

You probably don't need to contact your doctor unless you develop complications or you have a medical condition (for example, diabetes or heart or lung problems).

Antibiotics don't help people with the flu get better because they don't work on viruses. Sometimes doctors can prescribe an antiviral medicine to reduce the length of time someone is ill from the flu.

Remember, it is OK to be a couch potato while you are sick.

2008 Weather Year In Review

The year 2008 was characterized by 3 distinct pattern changes. From January through June the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles experienced drought conditions with above normal temperatures and below normal precipitation. A marked difference was noted from July through October when a cool and unseasonably wet pattern resulted in the 9th wettest July through October period on record. The pattern returned to warm and dry in November and continued through the end of the year.
 2008 was much less active in regards to the record breaking severe weather season of 2007. Only 12 tornados were observed across the Panhandles, which is almost half of what we would normally experience and much lower than the record 59 tornados of 2007. Also, no major winter storms were observed during 2008, although one 1.5 inch snow and wind created near blizzard conditions in January. This event resulted in a 42 car accident along I-40 in Amarillo in January. Listed below are the statistical highlights of 2008.

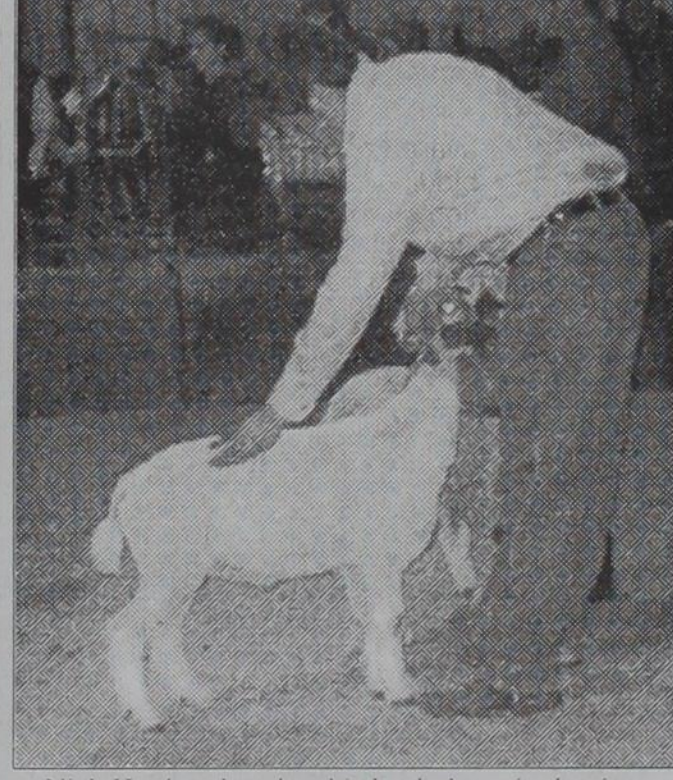

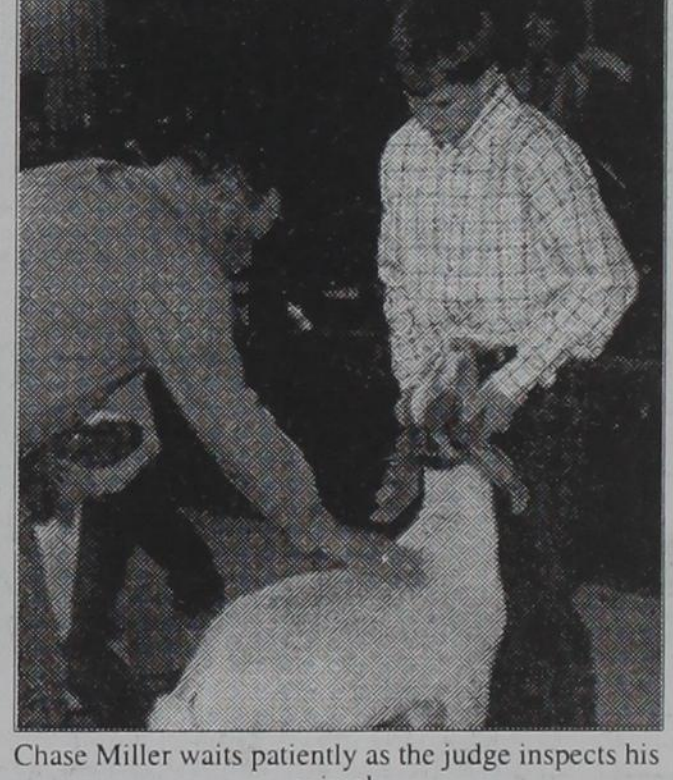

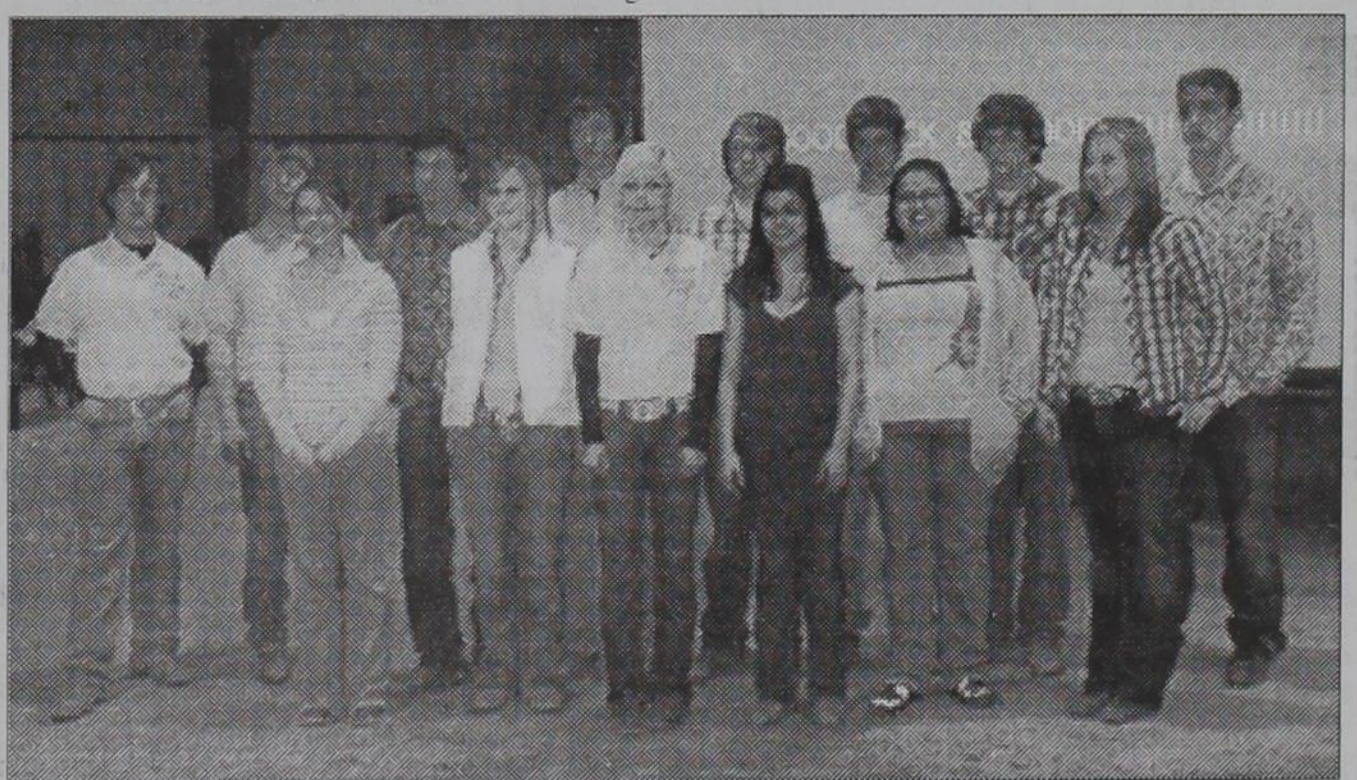

Bringing the Bible Up To Date

Matching 21st Century Reading Habits

With First Century Literature

It is the most published, most quoted, most controversial, most debated bestselling book ever written. It has been translated into practically every language that has ever been used by civilized societies over the history of the world. It's even been translated into Klingon, a fictional language of an alien race featured on Star Trek.

From the sublime to the ridiculous, The Bible is arguably the most significant book ever to see print. The word Bible has even become a term that means "a book that is considered an authority on a particular subject," according to Webster's.

Yet, even among the faithful, it may also hold the title for the most MISunderstood, most MISquoted and most unread book of all time, as well.

According to noted bible authority Val Greenwood, author of *I Will Make Thee A Great Nation: Old Testament Stories* (www.oldtestamentor.com), the Old Testament in particular is one of the grandest works of religious literature that deserves far more attention and comprehension than it receives in the modern world.

"As we consider life in our modern age, it is readily apparent that the Old Testament has influenced the history and literature of the Judeo-Christian world more than any other book ever written," Greenwood said. "It contains the stories, the traditions, and the truths that countless generations of parents have handed down to their children and that have been preached with great power from many pulpits."

However, according to recent polls, Americans' knowledge of the Bible is woefully lacking. Although Gallup found that 60% of Americans read the Bible occasionally, most cannot name even one author of the four Gospels. Harpers magazine found that 12% of Americans thought Joan of Ark was the wife of Noah.

"God helps those who help themselves." It was Benjamin Franklin who coined the phrase, but three-quarters of Americans believe it comes from the Bible, according to Boston University Professor of religion, Stephen Pothero. His book on religious literacy promotes a fresh effort at biblical education. Even Jay Leno, in his admittedly non-scientific man-on-the-street interviews,

found almost no one who had heard of Cain and Abel or Sodom and Gomorrah. Several people thought Eve had been created from an apple or that there were twelve commandments. George Gallup once summed up that America is simultaneously a religious nation and a nation of religious illiterates.

A 2006 study by the Bible Literacy Project concluded that there is universal need for public school training in Bible knowledge. Project author, Dr. M. Wachlin's, survey of college professors found overwhelming agreement "that a lack of basic Bible literacy hampers students' ability to understand both classics and contemporary work." Erosion of Bible literacy "in the last three or four decades has put much of Western literature beyond the reach of many readers," adds Professor David Jeffrey of Baylor Univer-

Cooped Up, Feeling Down

The wind is howling. Temperatures are well below freezing. And you're curled up on the sofa with the cat, a good book and a crackling fire. How could you possibly feel so lousy?

Maybe it's the indoor air that's chock full of allergens or irritants.

"Depending on what you're allergic or sensitive to, winter can be a really awful time of year," says Dr. Robert Bush, allergy and asthma researcher and professor emeritus at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health (SMPH).

It was written and arranged in accordance with the parlance of the times, but Greenwood acknowledges that times have changed, and if the stories and lessons and faith of the Old Testament are going to resonate thousands of years past its first publication, it needs to be more palatable to the way people read and absorb information in the world today.

mites, mold, mice and cockroaches. Irritants can cause symptoms but not an allergic response. They include dust particles and fine particulates like fuels, gases and odors.

Bush points out one misconception about dust-mite allergies when people are cooped up in winter. He says dust mites can be less of a problem in winter as compared to more moderate times of the year.

"Dust mites thrive in humidity. When you turn on the heating system, the air dries out and dust mites die," says Bush.

Even so, some dust mites can survive and a tidy but closed-up house may provide plenty of troubling allergens.

"Even very clean homes have some things that can trigger allergies," Bush observes.

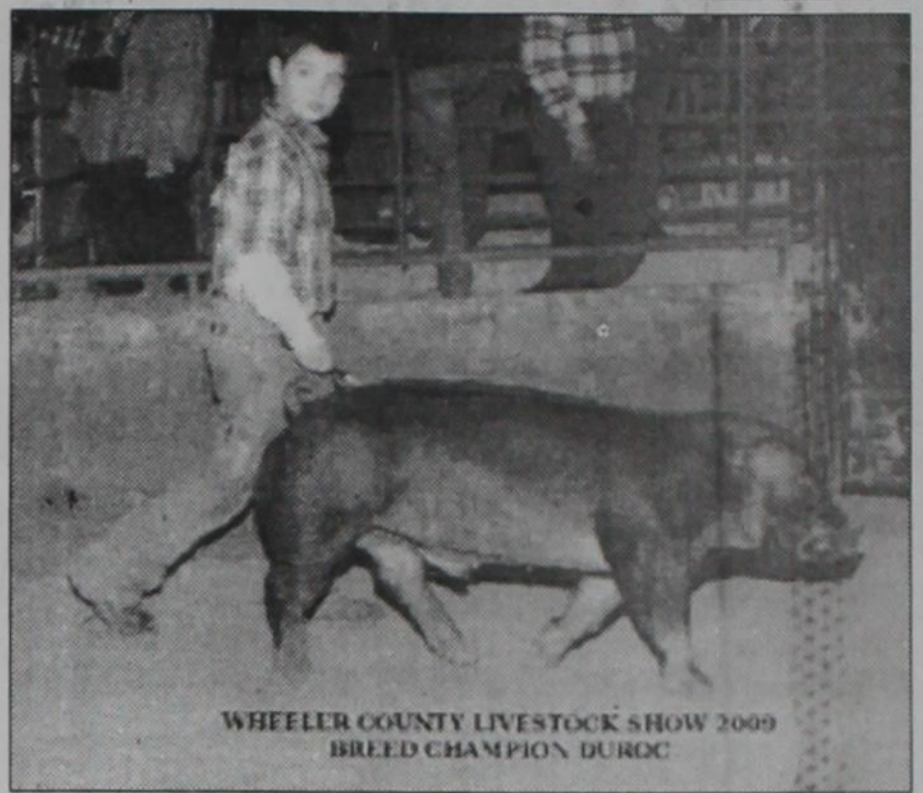
Recent research shows the average home can have several potential allergy sources. A study in the March, 2008 issue of the *Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology* said 52 percent of American homes have six or more allergens and 46 percent had three or more at high levels.

"If you're having allergy symptoms, it's tough to pinpoint the source unless you get an allergy skin test or blood test," says Bush. "You need to know what's causing your symptoms to develop an effective plan."

Bush says after you have identified what's bothering you, there are a number of steps to reduce allergy triggers or irritants in your home:

• **Control Humidity Levels**
Bush says ideally, home humidity levels should range between 30 to 40 percent. Providing an environmental balance with humidity is especially important in bedrooms.

• **Remove or Change Things that Harbor Allergens**

The American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology (AAAAI) says carpet removal can make a big difference. For dust mites, encase pillows and mattresses in anti-allergy pillowcases and covers. Wash rugs and bedding regularly in hot water.

• **Monitor Heating and Air-Exchange Systems**
Replace furnace filters regularly. Have a heating and air-conditioning engineer check your home's air exchange rate.

• **Watch for and Eliminate Mold Sources**

Bush says if there is a mold level in your home during winter, there is an indoor source like a water leak or standing water. The "only way to eliminate mold is to remove the moisture that's causing it. A musty or moldy smell alone doesn't necessarily mean your home has a mold problem."

• **Avoid Allergy Sources**
If you're allergic to pet dander, the only effective way to eliminate the allergen is to keep pets out of the house. Bush says it takes six months to clear a home of allergy sources from pets. If removing the pet is not practical, keep it outdoors and out of the bedroom as much as possible.

• **Take Care When Vacuuming**
Bush says there isn't much research on the effectiveness of

HEPA-filtered vacuum cleaners. He says this type of vacuum might reduce pet-allergen exposure but not necessarily dust mites. There's evidence that a regular vacuum cleaner with a double-layered bag could help with dust mites. Since vacuuming flings dust and particles into the air, it might be helpful to wear a mask while vacuuming.

Regardless of what you or family members are allergic to, a combination of steps is the best way to make indoor air more comfortable.

"Changing one thing won't do much. The trick is to find a combination that really works for you and stick to it," said Bush.

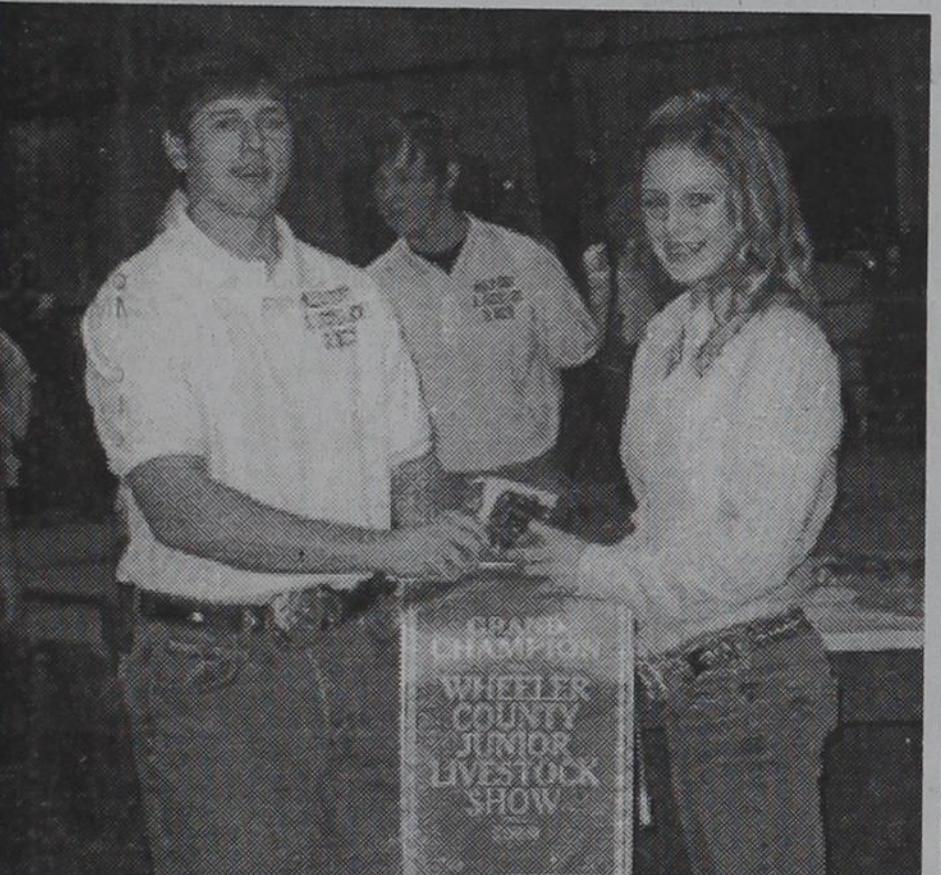

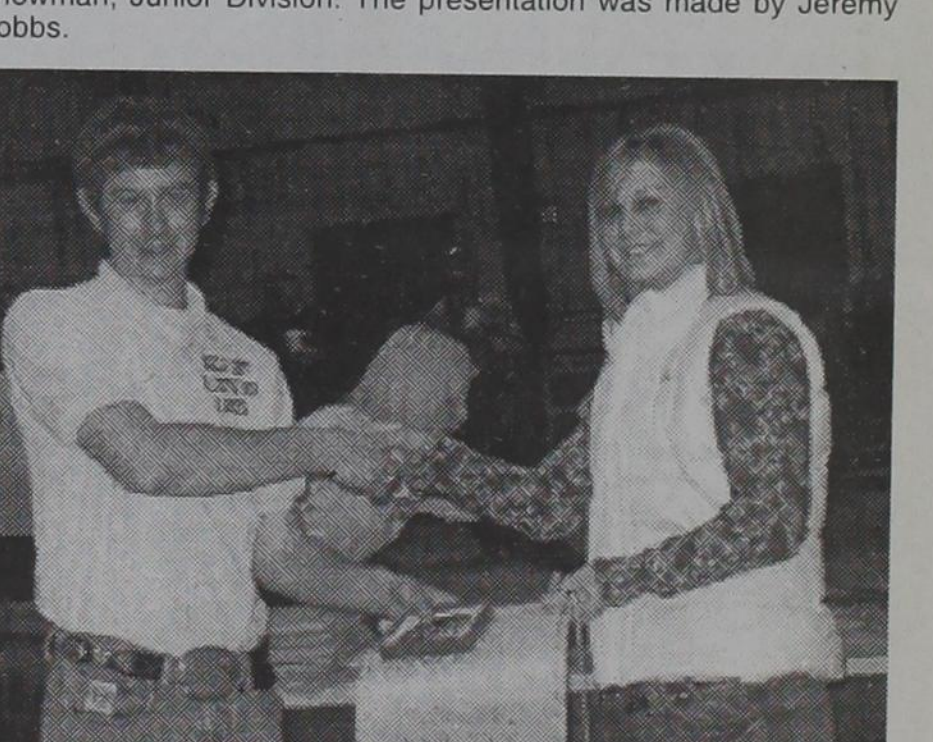

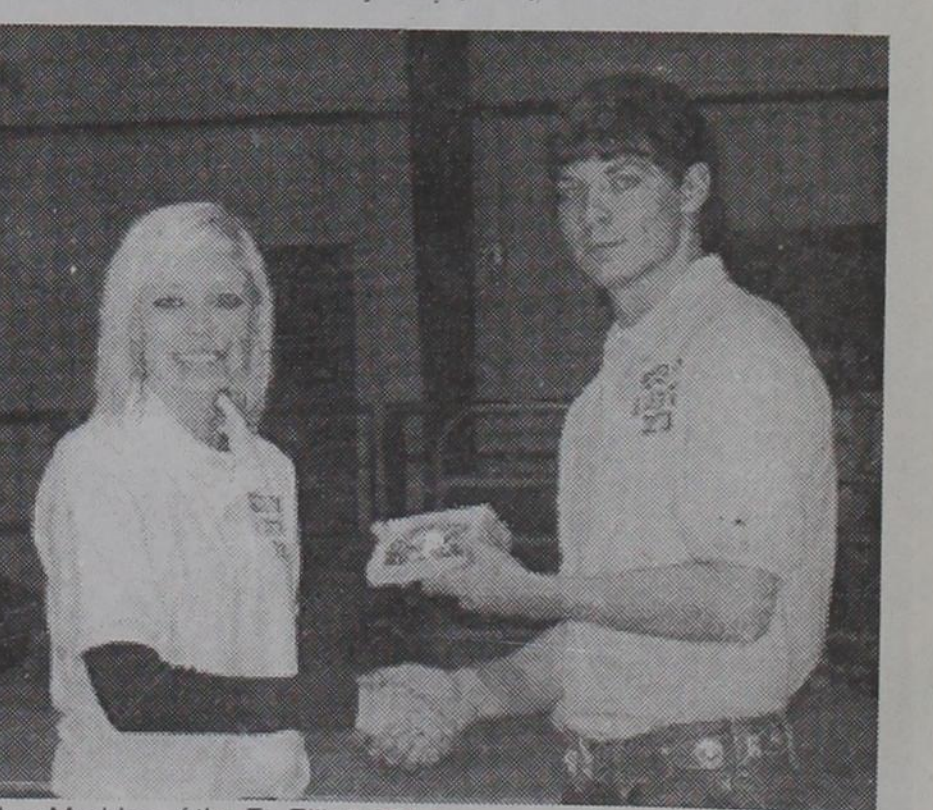
