

TxDOT And W.A.A.I.C Meet With Commissioners' Court Monday

The Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Monday, September 25, 2006, at 10:00 a.m. in the commissioners' courtroom.

Eleven items were on the agenda. The hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment as presented.

The court voted to pay the bills as approved. Some shifting of funds within the different office was approved. No action was taken on the burn ban.

The Texas Department of Transportation met with the commissioners to bring them up to date on the planned road construction for the county. The bids for the first part of the three phase project was let in August with construction to begin in Dec. This will be from the north Wheeler city limits to the roadside park on 83 and one block east of the stoplight on the West Wheeler City limits on Hwy. 152.

Within the next year and a half, Hwy. 83 work will be completed from the roadside park to Shamrock city limits.

Also planned for the county is the reconstruction of the culverts along Hwy 152 and the replacement of the Adobe Creek bridge near Mobeetie.

TxDOT also presented a film, showing road construction in Texas since 1930's and plans for the future, including the proposed Texas Corridor.

Commissioner Puryear asked if there were any plans to resurface the Farm to Market road from the 9 mile station to Allison. He was informed that the need was recognized, but funds did not allow a project within the near future.

Wheeler Area Activities Improvements Council, Inc., represented by Charles Kuntz and Dr. Ben Ed Hillhouse, was on the agenda. Dr. Hillhouse informed the court of the need for an owner for the proposed Community Center after it is built and asked the court's consideration to assume ownership. Without an owner, there was no need to continue with the project.

Charles Kuntz said he had checked other community building budgets and learned most operated in the black through rent received for their use.

The corporation has almost raised 1/2 the funds through donations and pledges and will soon be ready to seek grants. Plaques are still being sold.

The Wheeler Library Board has expressed their lack of interest in moving the library to the new building. Therefore the drawings are being redrawn, which will reduce the cost of the project.

The WAAIC ask to be on the agenda for the next commissioners' court meeting, October 9.

Chesapeake Energy was on the agenda to discuss County Roads 28 and 29, but were not at the meeting. No action was taken.

Scott Porter presented his continuing education hours certificate received for having attended the State Conference.

The court approved the appointment

of Texas Panhandle Mental Health Mental Retardation Board of Trustees—a two year term.

The Old Jail on the courthouse square is no longer being used as an office by the District Attorney and has been turned back to the county.

Item 10 had to do with the supplementing the salary of a district attorney's secretary. No action was taken.

Item 11, "Consideration of base pay for Elected and appointed employees" will be discussed in a special meeting on Thursday, September 28, 2006, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court will be Monday, October 9.

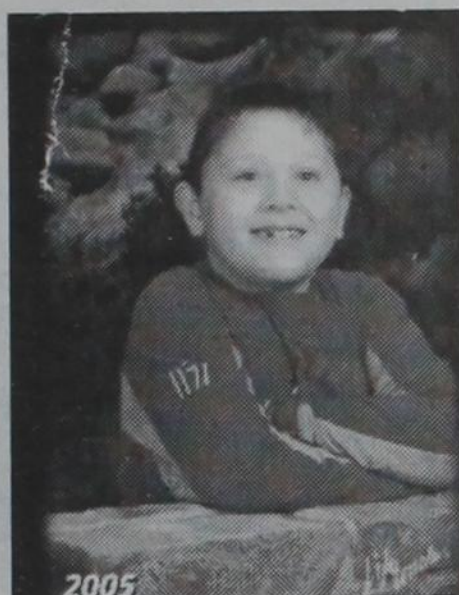

Motion by Todd Moore; Second by Dr. Hillhouse; To approve the minutes of the August 28, 2006 special meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

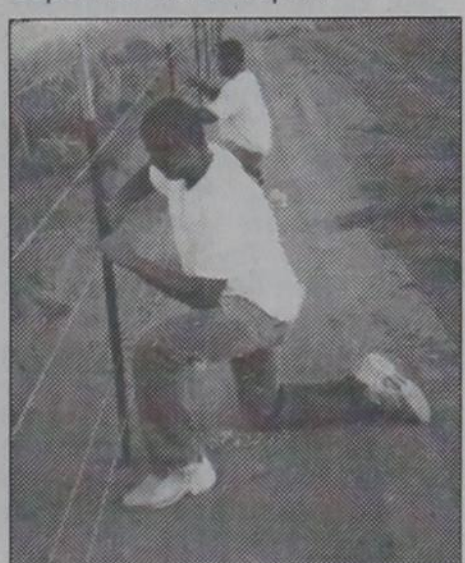
Motion by Dr. Hillhouse; Second by Kent Vise; To approve payment of bills presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Mahler gave the superintendent's report.

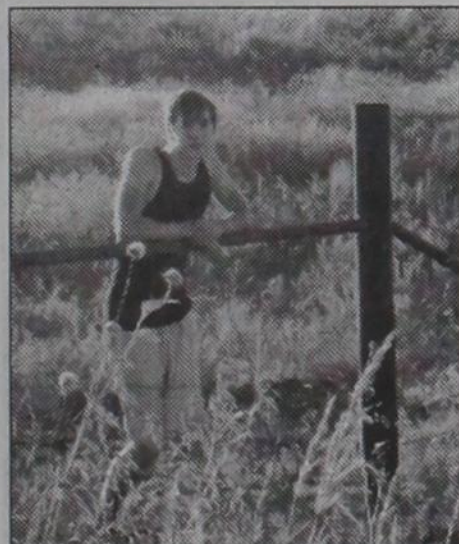

... Southern California that is.

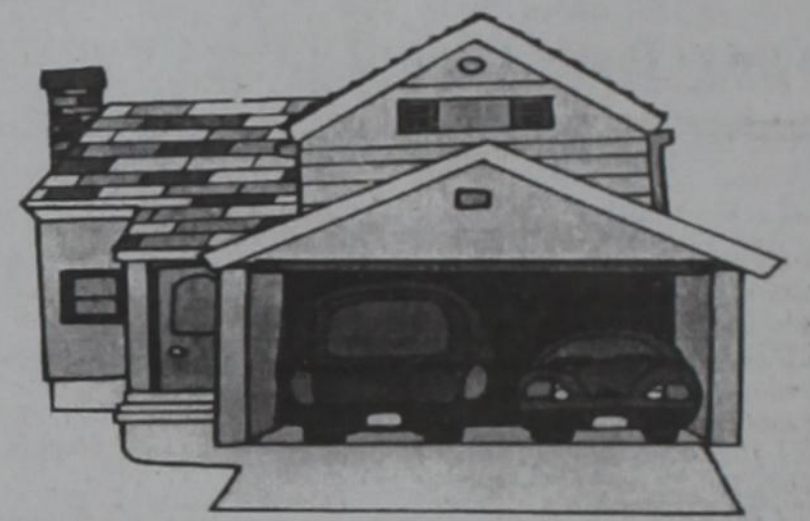

In the first chapter there are only about 120 followers of Jesus. That number is fixing to grow exponentially. After that time we see the church spread to other locations. Eventually we see a former Christian-hater named Paul become a tremendous mis-

sionary for the cause of Christ. By the end of Acts, with Paul in prison, there are churches spread throughout that part of the world.

Along the way there are stories about Stephen being stoned to death for his dedication to Christ, Philip baptizing an Ethiopian official, a good Christian woman named Dorcas raised back from the dead, the conversion of a Roman centurion named Cornelius, Peter escaping from prison after the death of the disciple James, others joining Paul on his mission journeys like Barnabas, Timothy, and Silas. There are controversies that arise as well as sad things that might at first seem to slow down the growth of the church. But the church will grow ... and still grow today. We are a continuation of the work started in the book of Acts. So come to Bible class this Sunday and study with us from the book of Acts. **Shawn D. Johnson**
