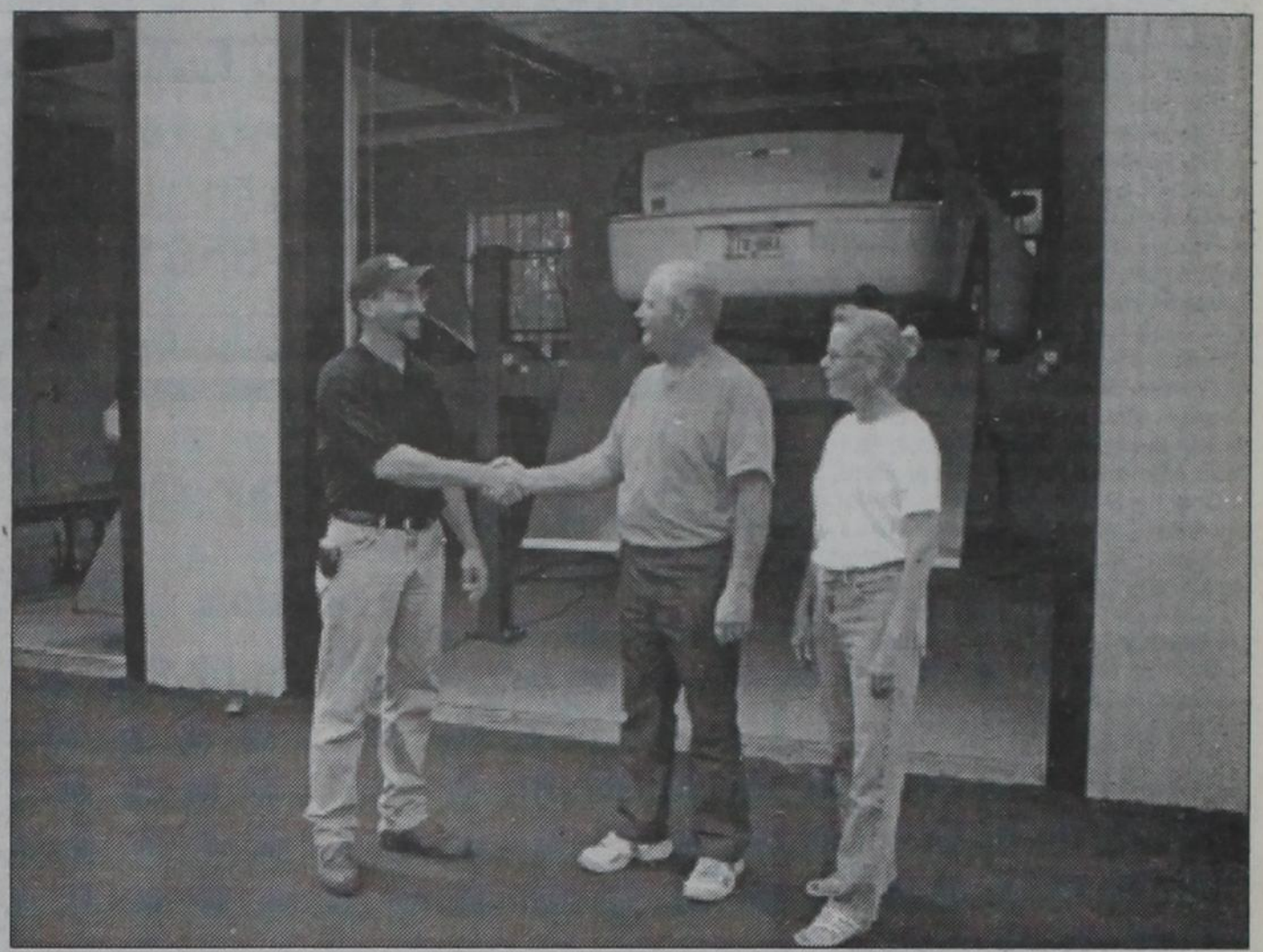

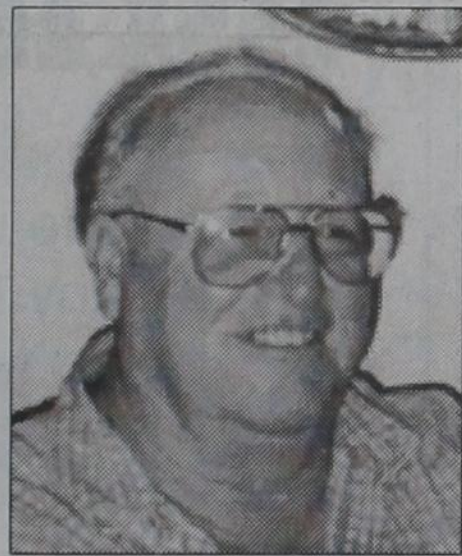
North of Briscoe for the past twenty plus years.

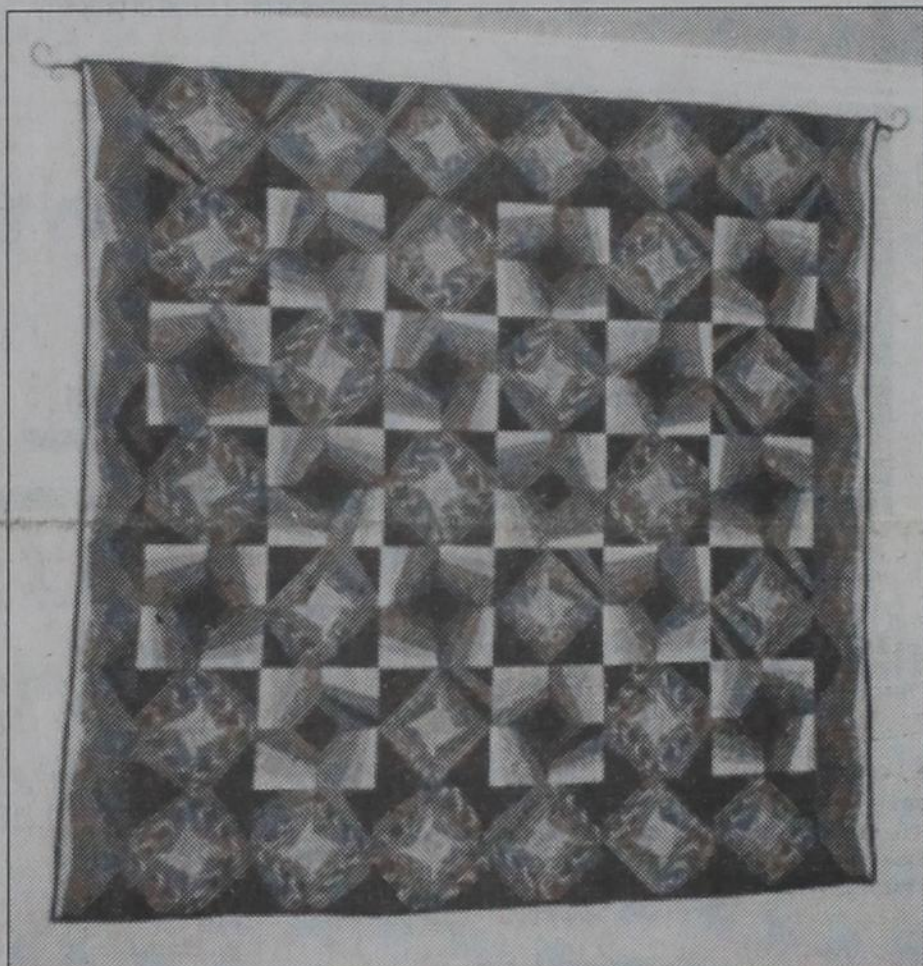
