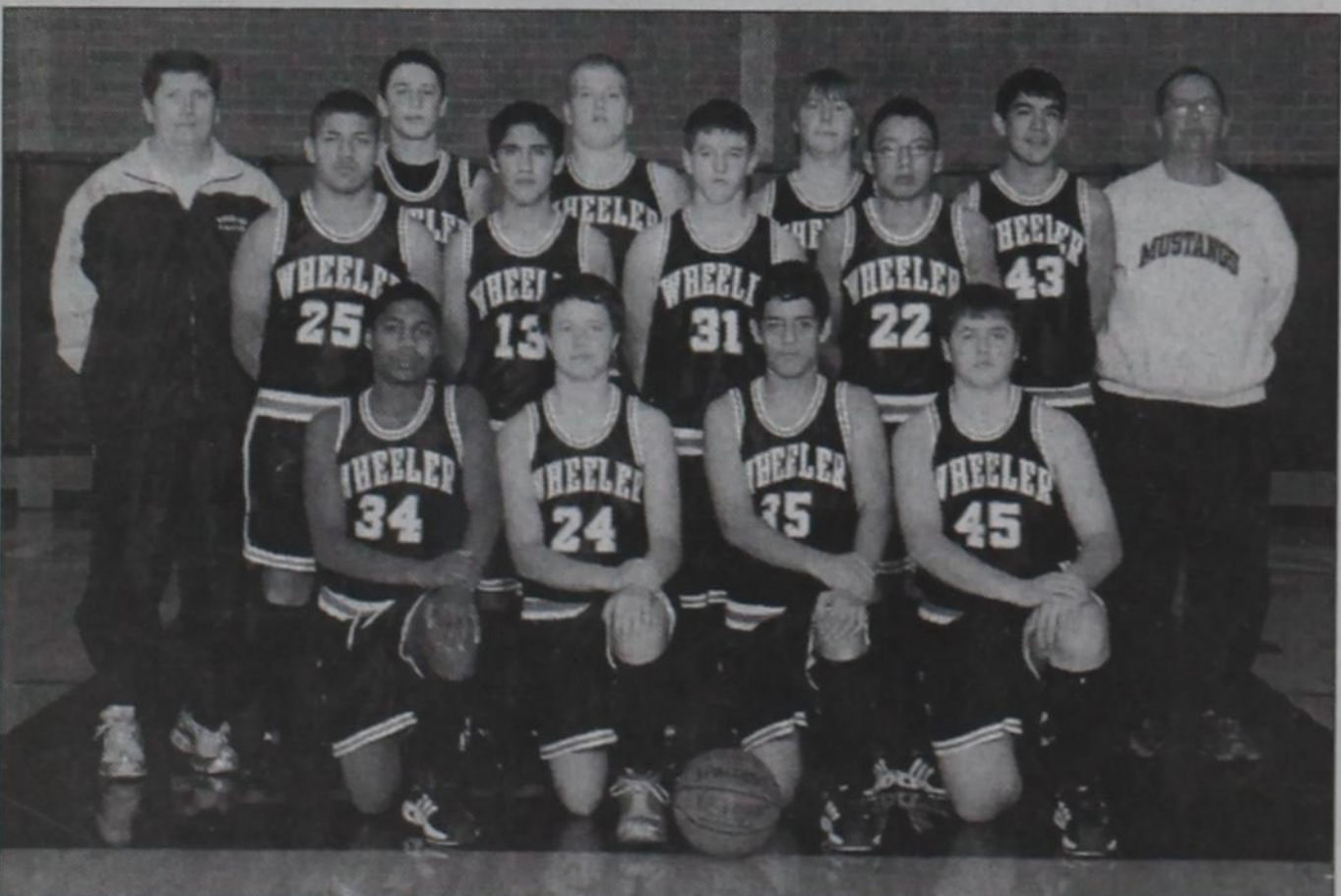

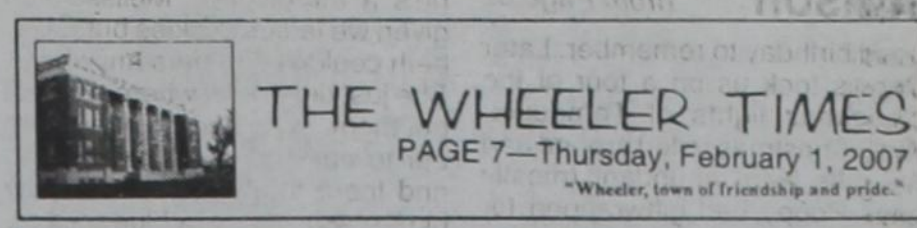

ATTENTION PROPERTY OWNERS

Property owners have certain rights that may reduce their property tax burden.

HOMEOWNERS

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 2007, may claim their home as a residential homestead. The filing of this document is only necessary if the homeowner has changed homesteads since January 1, 2006, or has become eligible for additional exemptions since last year. Persons over 65 years of age or disabled may defer paying the tax on their residence homestead if they wish. Although the tax collection is deferred, the taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, and the deferred tax remains a lien on the property. To apply for the deferral, the owner should contact the appraisal district, which appraised the property in question and complete an application.

DISABLED PERSONS

Persons who are disabled under Social Security law are entitled to additional exemptions on their residential homestead. Disabled applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see below)

PERSONS WHO ARE OVER 65 YEARS OF AGE

Persons who are over 65 years of age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2007. Over-65 persons should apply for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their area. Over-65 persons are also eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead if they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral. Details and an application may be obtained from any appraisal district or the State Comptroller.

DISABLED VETERANS

Persons who have been declared disabled by the Veteran's Administration are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or if the percentage of disability changes.

ATTENCION CONTRIBUYENTE DE IMPUESTOS SOBRE LA PROPIEDAD

Duenos de propiedades tienen ciertos derechos que pueden reducir sus impuestos

DUENO DE HOGAR

Usted califica para una exención general, si es dueño de su hogar el día primero de enero, 2007. La solicitud califica para la exención es necesario si el dueño de la residencia cambio de hogar efectivo Enero 1, 2006, o califica para exenciones adicionales desde el año pasado. Un dueño de hogar efectivo de 65 años puede aplazar el pago de una porción de sus impuestos si el valoracion de su hogar de residencia aumento mas de 5% que el valor del año anterior. Un aplazamiento de impuestos sin embargo, solo pospone su deuda impositiva. Se aplica un interes de 8 por ciento al año y se mantiene una garantía sobre la propiedad. Para aplicar por el aplazo, contacte al distrito de valoracion de su condado y complete la aplicacion.

PERSONAS INCAPACITADOS

Personas incapacitados bajo la Administracion del Seguro Social califican para las exenciones de dueño de hogar. Personas incapacitados deben aplicar con su distrito de valoracion con su prueba de dishabilitacion del Administracion del Seguro Social. Personas incapacitados reciben todos los beneficios en su hogar igual que personas mayor de 65 años.

PERSONAS MAYORES DE 65 AÑOS

Personas mayores de 65 años o dishabilitados pueden aplicar para mas exenciones. Usted tambien obtiene un tope de impuestos para el total de sus impuestos escolares si usted cumple 65 años de edad durante 2007. Personas de 65 años o mas tienen que registrar una solicitud por la exención en su distrito de valoracion en su area. Usted puede aplazar algunos de sus impuestos sobre su hogar de residencia si lo desea. Los impuestos continúan a pesar del aplazo con interes de 8% anual, pero no se hace esfuerzo de abrir un juicio hipotecario durante el aplazo. La Contraloria de Cuentas Publicas de Texas le podra dar mas informacion.

VETERANOS INCAPACITADOS

Usted puede calificar para una exención del los impuetos sobre su propiedad. Debe tener documentos del Administracion de Veteranos que muestran el porcentaje de su incapacidad relacionada a su servicio militar. El distrito de valoracion solamente nesisita documentacion el primer año de calificacion o se su tasa de incapacidad cambia.

HUNTERS HELP HUNGRY TEXANS

All across Texas this winter, hunters have been donating high protein, low fat venison to people in need through the Hunters for the Hungry (HFTH) Program.

Although the general statewide deer season has ended, HFTH Hunger Relief Programs Manager Pam Robers encourages landowners possessing managed land deer permits, as well as hunters participating in the late antlerless and spike deer season, to continue donating their harvested deer to hungry Texans.

The ongoing state-wide game donation program connects hunters with 90 meat processors throughout the state who will process donated deer for a small fee. "The meat processor will usually ask for a minimal amount, somewhere from twenty to thirty dollar, and the hunter will get a receipt that they can use for tax purposes," said Robers.

After the deer is processed, the nutritional protein source is given to local area food assistance providers. "Emergency food providers throughout the state either give it to families who are in need, or use it in soup kitchens. It goes to a diversity of places that help feed low-income people," said Robers.

Last hunting season, hunters donated nearly 180,000 pounds of meat to the program. According to Robers, one in six Texas households is in need of food, especially in the form of protein. Robers said she hopes Texas hunters will consider an extra hunting trip for the sake of those who need the meat. "We have way too many hungry families to feed. Go out and take an extra deer for other people who may need the meat. Fill your freezers, but help feed other people too."

Loans For Digging Water Wells

Certain low-to-moderate-income individuals or families may be eligible for money to construct, repair or improve household water well systems through 1 percent interest loans from the Foundation for Affordable Drinking Water.

The Foundation was established through the National Ground Water Association.

Qualified applicants can borrow up to \$8,000 at 1 percent interest for a term not to exceed 20 years. To qualify, households must:

- * Own the home and use it as the principal residence.
- * Have as the primary drinking water source an individual household well system located on the property of the home.
- * Must meet income eligibility requirements.

* Be located in a city, town or unincorporated area with a population of less than 50,000.

Currently, the program is available in Alabama, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nebraska, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

The Foundation will not underwrite a loan once a project is underway or has been completed. Most new home construction projects are not eligible.

Another important aspect of the loan program is to educate loan recipients on the importance of regular well maintenance and annual testing of their well system.

2006 Fatalities; 99 Die On Area Roads

The Amarillo DPS released the 2006 fatal crash statistics today which showed that 99 people died on area roads.

This is the second year in a row that fatalities have increased. In 2004, 66 fatalities were recorded. That number increased to 87 in 2005. Factors include driver inattention, speeding, and alcohol.

Another factor in this deadly year was the number of multiple fatality crashes. There were 14 total, including 6 crashes that killed a total of 20 people.

Leading category once again was the one-vehicle crash with 46. Of these, 36 involved the vehicle rolling over. Of those 36 who died in rollovers, 26 were not wearing seatbelts.

Speed was a contributing factor in 26 fatal crashes.

Inattention was a contributing factor in 35 fatal crashes.

Alcohol was a known contributing factor in 9 fatal crashes. (There are several investigations still pending) This is down from 15 last year.
