"Wheeler county is one of the few counties in this part of the state to take the lead in providing proper reading material for the school children," declares Rucker. "Much credit," continued the superintentendent, "is due the trustees and teachers of the county for their splendid co-operation in getting the library started. Within a few years, it is believed that Wheeler county boys and girls will have ready access to an abundance of good liter-

During the Rural Teachers association meeting here Saturday a library committee composed of the following was appointed: W. W. Brister, Gracy; Ruth Richerson, Corn Valley; A. S. Wharton, Magic City; Novella Whitener, Twitty; Mrs. Geo. Bethel, and Vinson Younger, Pakan. A called meeting was held Saturday, followed by special meetings Monday and Tuesday.

Orders are being placed with the Southern Library association, Dallas, for a complete set of the new state reading course books, together with a book of Texas for all state aid schools; also many books for the first three grades which are not included in the state reading course. The course represents 32 different publishers and 168 different titles.

Many children are eagerly awaitng this shipment of interesting books and will try for the special reading certificates. All who read 20 of these books within one school year will receive a beautiful state reading certificate, given by the State Department of Education. The "Book of Texas" is one of the most outstanding of all library books,

Books will be classified and put in properly labeled one box for the necessary reading time, when the books will be exchanged for another lot. #### WORK RELIEF COLLAPSE DUE TO BUNGLING

(NOTE: Believing readers of The Times should have the information found in the following editorial comment taken from a recent issue of the Wichita Falls Record News, the article is reproduced).

The three great collapses of the year seem to be those of Maxie Baer, the New York Giants and President Roosevelt's work relief program.

In no case was the collapse altogether unexpected; but while the first two can be laughed off by everybody except those who put their money down on the wrong side, the work relief program's collapse is somewhat more serious.

A fund of \$4,000,000,000 was set up, if you remember. With it the administration promised to give work to no fewer than 3.500.000 people by the first of November.

Shortly after the middle of October it was disclosed that 1,310,000 people had been given jobs under this program. Bad enough in itself. this figure is even more discouraging when analyzed.

In the first place, that total includes some 580,000 CCC workers, and approximately 133,000 men working under other than federal agencies. In such jobs, however, a great deal of money has to be spent for materials. The administration decided that there would be too little direct re-employment that way. So the plan was modified. Projects for public works were scaled down ruthlessly, to make way for ventures in which most of the money would be paid out in actual wages.

The result was a revival of a long series of leaf-raking projects, and local enthusiasm ebbed. It was easy to think of big jobs that needed doing; it was hard to cook up schemes for transferring topsoil from one side of the road to the other.

The original public works program would have picked up speed as it went along. By stimulating business in the heavy industries, it would have created many jobs indirectly. The work relief stunt has no momentum of its own. An artificial thing from the start, it is bound to lag and wobble.

The present collapse is a natural result of the mistake that was made when the public works idea was shelved.

### RAISE YOUR OWN SPUDS

There is a great rumpus about whether the AAA is to enforce the Potato Control act or not. Just what discretion has the AAA, or any of its officials, to do other than enforce the law? They have not been given the power to nullify or change any law. It is not the function of any board or bureau charged with enforcement duties to say whether it will or will not administer an act.

The courts still have the duty of deciding on the legality of the acts of congress and this constitutional provision of our government has not yet been abrogated.

The quickest way for our citizens to break the legislative program to drive up potato prices is for every citizen with a back or front yard, to raise potatoes for his own use. That would also be an expression of disapproval of the new doctrine of food scarcity that is advocated to raise prices. "Every family raise its own spuds" may become a national

In carrying out her plans as farm food supply demonstrator for the Briscoe club, Mrs. John McCarroll has whitewashed her cellar and has had 14 shelves, nine feet by six inches built. She will have bins for her potatoes, apples and other stored products. All her cans of fruit and vegetables will be labeled.

That a couch can be made for the sum of approximately \$2.12 has been proved by Mrs. W. N. Pharis of the Ramsdell Home Demonstration club. by using an old iron bedstead, discarded mattress cotton and mattress ticking, slats, four new rollers, new cretonne, discarded bedsprings, card-

For the back of the couch Mrs. Pharis used the footboard of the iron bed. The arms were made from the rest of the bed and one by four planks, bradded together at the shop for the cost of 10 cents. She sawed arts, had all a family of four the 24-inch side railing with a hack saw. At the back Mrs. Pharis fastened springs in between the rods of the bed. She found that these rattled when the couch was moved so she put cardboard between the springs and rods to prevent this.

The seat was made solid with the use of the slats. Both back and arms were padded with cotton from the discarded mattress, and the two pillows for the seat were made with this cotton. 




