



Peanut Growers Will Vote In Dec. Referendum

A national marketing quota referendum for peanut growers, the first in three years, will be held on December 15, according to Searcy Ferguson, chairman, Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. The balloting will determine whether or not marketing quotas will be in effect for the next three crops of peanuts.

If at least two-thirds of the votes are favorable, quotas will be in effect for the 1960, '61 and '62 crops of peanuts. Penalties will apply to "excess" peanuts, and price supports will be available to growers who comply with their acreage allotments at the full level of support announced, said Ferguson.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose, quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1960 peanut crop, and the level of price support to eligible growers will drop to 50 percent of parity. In such a case, another referendum would be held in 1960 for the following three crops.

A grower will be eligible to vote in the December 15 referendum, Ferguson said, if he is entitled to share in 1959-crop peanuts planted for harvest as nuts on a farm having more than one acre of peanuts planted.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect each year since 1949. In the last referendum, quotas for the 1957, '58 and '59 crops were favored by 93.5 percent of the growers voting.

Farm Census Field Work Now Underway

Field work in the 1959 Census of Agriculture got underway locally on Nov. 18 when a force of census takers will start visiting every farm in the area, it was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Farm census questionnaires have been mailed to all farm operators. The census takers will visit all local farms to collect the questionnaires and, if necessary, assist the farmer in filling out the report form.

The 1959 Census of Agriculture is the 17th in a series of nationwide farm canvasses, the first of which was conducted in 1840. The Census of Agriculture is taken at five-year intervals to provide up-to-date statistical information about the nearly five million farms which supply food and raw materials for manufacture of goods used by the people of the United States, now numbering about 178 million. The current census will yield information on the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock production and inventories, selected farm facilities and equipment and selected farm expenditures.

The field director emphasized that all information about individuals and their farm operations furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to provide summary figures such as totals, averages, and percentages. The information on an individual report cannot be furnished to any one other than sworn Census employees and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation, or regulation.

A training session will be held at Cisco and will be conducted by the crew leader Neil McAnally, who recently attended a five day census training course.

Total of \$7,662 Given by Citizens

Eastland's United Fund drive for 1959-60 has been oversubscribed.

That's the good word from Charles Layton, this year's general chairman. Layton announced Wednesday afternoon that a total of \$7,662.58 has been contributed. That puts the drive over the top by \$512.58.

Layton said that the oversubscription would be saved for possible emergency grants. Of this year's goal the Boy Scouts will receive \$2000, the Red Cross \$1750, the YMCA \$1500, the Salvation Army \$900, the Girl Scouts \$400, the Rehabilitation Center \$200 and the United Defense Fund \$150.

After Layton announced the drive was over the top, Virgil Seaberry Jr., United Fund president, issued the following statement:

"It is a pleasure to note that the Eastland United Fund has exceeded its \$7150 goal in the campaign just being concluded. When our goal was set at 10 percent above last year's \$6,500 goal, we did not anticipate that we would receive \$7600, but that is the approximate amount received to date in cash and pledges. There will be a few later gifts which will increase that figure.

"On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Eastland United Fund, I wish to extend our thanks to the various chairmen, committee members, and team captains and members who have worked so hard that the drive might be a success. Our particular thanks go to Charles Layton, our campaign chairman, and to Billy Frost, the advance gifts chairman; these gentlemen have had the greatest responsibilities in the entire campaign.

The services and burial will be in Grand Junction.

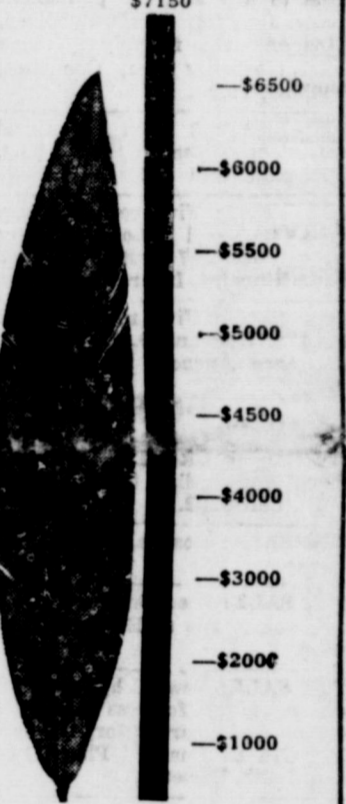

Speakers for the evening will be M. H. Perry, president of the Eastland School Board and Wendell Siebert, superintendent of Eastland schools. They will tell of plans that have already been made and for future plans for a new centrally located elementary school to be built in the near future.

A night meeting is held by the association each year in order that the fathers might have an opportunity to attend and to visit their children's school. Also all persons interested in hearing of the new school are urged to attend.

A nursery will be opened in the school cafeteria during the meeting.

Cisco and DeLeon Decide Bi-District

The Cisco Lobos will be the favorite at Ranger Friday night when the first round of the State AA grid playoffs begins. The Cisco High School Lobos, champions of 7-AA, and the DeLeon Bearcats, titleholders in 8-AA, will decide who will wear the bi-district crown in a game to begin at 7:30 p.m. in Bulldog Stadium.

The teams met earlier in the season (October 2) and the Lobos came out on top, 34 to 6—a score not entirely narrative of the hard-fought contest. Since that time, both have come through district play undefeated, the Lobos now owning a 10-0 record, and the Bearcats with an 8-2 mark.

The Bearcats' only other loss was to Eastland, also early in the season. They wound up the regular season's play last weekend, trouncing Granbury 30 to 0. Other victims include Ranger, Cross Plains, Gorman, Goldthwaite, Dublin, Hamilton and Comanche.

They operate from a variation of the T-formation and draw a

good deal of strength from a large, speedy backfield, headed by 175-pound Stanley Kirk; and a strong defensive line.

At the helm of the Bearcats is Bill Little, who pushed his team into the runner-up spot in the 8-AA wars of 1958. His assistants are John Baskin, Charles Clay and James Perkins.

The Lobos have in their favor one of the outstanding AA backfields in the state, and a high-geared offense that has totaled 427 points this season. Heading the quartet are Charles Lipsey, who captured the area scoring title with 169 points, and Duane Hale, who has gained 1,018 yards this season in 138 carries.

They are coached by Zac Henderson, who is in his second year as head mentor, assisted by Jerrell Rice, Keith Miles and James Shanks, all in their initial year in that position. Henderson guided the Lobos to a bi-district title in 1958, losing to Stamford in regional play.

The Lobos, who will be looking for their eleventh straight victory of the season in the game, after defeating DeLeon, Dublin, Comanche, Anson, Haskell, Ballinger, Ranger, Eastland, Winters and Coleman. The 40 to 6 victory over Coleman clinched the district crown for the Lobos.

Cisco also has a formidable defense (on the ground), allowing an average of only 89.6 yards rushing to 10 opponents. On the

impossible to reach the press box, so I obtained permission to get on the sidelines. I made more yardage than any player because Red Rattikin, Childress' great back, ran only when he had the ball but I ran any time anybody had the ball. Unusual plays recalled: Mike Todd of Crowell, later an Aggie great, broke into the clear against Chillicothe, looked back and saw he was all by himself and so he walked the last six yards across the goal line: the giant end, Rankin Britt of Ranger, caught a pass near the Eastland goal, was tackled by three small players who turned him halfway around and he backed the final five yards for a touchdown, dragging them along; and, at Brownwood, at almost the

end of the game, a substitute intercepted an Eastland pass and ran 35 yards, with Eastland men blocking for him and then tackling him behind his own goal line for a safety which gave Eastland a one-point victory! Being a sports writer has its occasional embarrassments. I was attending the pre-season district dinner which Breckenridge used to host and, during the meal, the man across the table remarked that Coach Schmidt of TCU was listing huge Dan Salkeld, sophomore and end, at 180. In an undertone, I said to the man next to me, "Rags" Matthews, a TCU immortal, "That reminds me that his high school coach used to list Salkeld at 165." Rags, addressing the first speaker,

said, "This fellow says," indicating me, and then repeated my remark. I blushed and so did the other man. He had been Salkeld's high school coach. Among the coaches in my Oil Belt days (1920-30) were Dave Pena, at Eastland, who had been University of Texas captain; Blair Cherry, at Ranger, later head coach at Texas; Eck Curtis, at Ranger, later backfield coach at Texas, and W. B. Chapman, at Cisco, who went to Lubbock and, after his death in mid-season, his inspired team went on to win the State championship. Even when I was sports writer in Eastland or Ranger, "Chap" told me I was always welcome to attend any Cisco practice. I never

accepted the invitation but felt honored at what I considered to be a tribute to my fairness and sportsmanship. When I happened to mention this invitation, however, one fan said the coach felt that I knew so little about football that I couldn't have described a play so that the Eastland (or Ranger) coach would know what to be on guard against. But I didn't dignify this statement with a reply; in fact, I forgot the remark a long time ago.

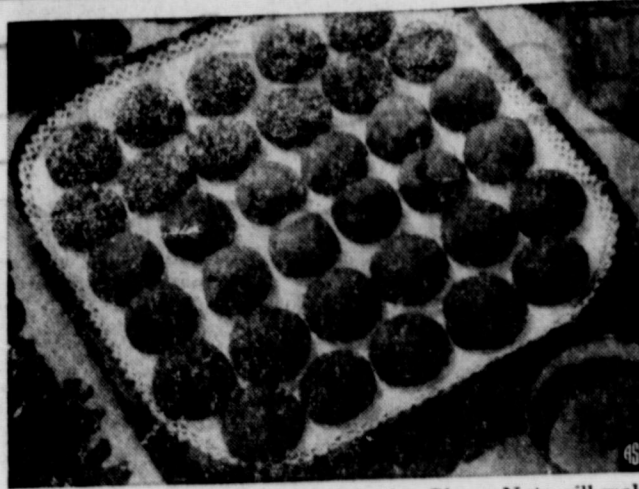

Sift together flour, sugar, soda, salt and spices. Add molasses and shortening to beaten egg. Add raisins to flour mixture and stir to coat raisins with flour. Add liquid to dry ingredients and stir with a spoon, then knead by hand until well blended. Roll dough into pieces the size of large marbles. To decorate, roll each piece in plain or colored sugar or multi-colored decorates. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 6 to 7 dozen cookies. These will keep up to 4 weeks.

Cookies may also be left plain before baking. Then, while cookies are still oven-warm, shake them in a paper bag with confectioners' sugar until coated. These make attractive cookie "snowballs."

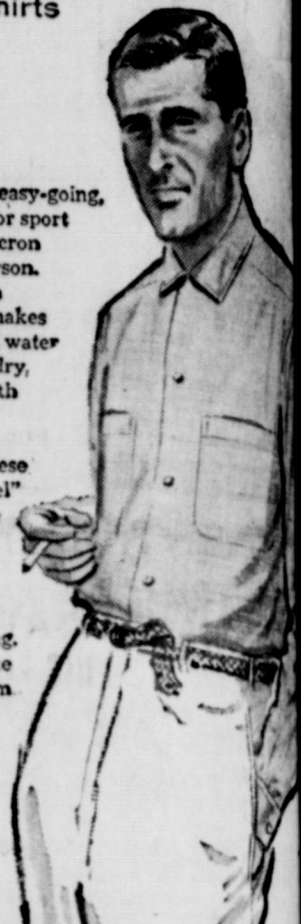

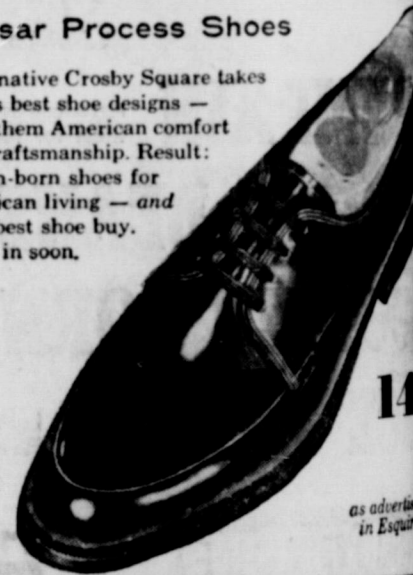

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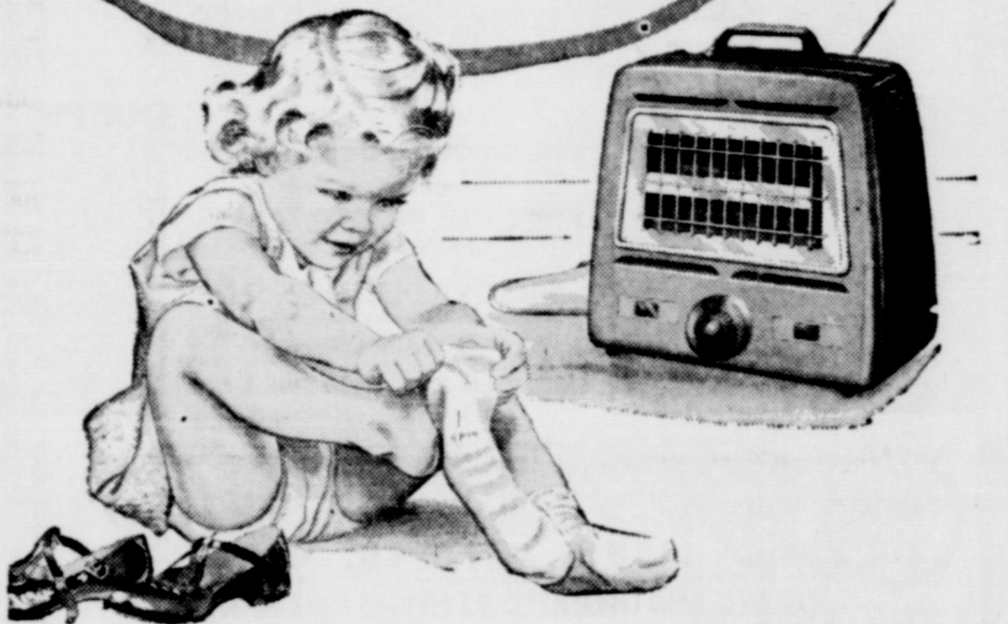
