Eastland Battles Stephenville to Scrimmage Tie

Eastland and Stephenville football teams battled to draw here Thursday night in a scrimmage game, with Stephenville taking command of the contest during the first part and Eastland coming in strong in the latter part of the match.

Stephenville scored three times before the Mavs touched paydirt, but then Coach Carrol Shelton's charges added three scores of their own. The game ended up 3-3.

Eastland's passing game was the highlight for the locals. The Mavs got good passing and outstanding receiving.

Many 4-H Club Scholarships Are Offered

Scholarships worth \$9600 await 4-H Club members who are pursuing certain college courses. Two home economics scholarships of \$800 each, four forestry at \$1600 each, and two at \$800 each in agronomy and related subjects having to do with crop protection and production will be awarded to successful applicants this fall.

The eight scholarships are part of a national 4-H scholarship fund administered by the National 4-H Service Committee, Chicago, in cooperation with the Extension Service and land-grant colleges and universities. Funds come from industrial concerns that have supported the 4-H educational program for some time.

The home economics scholarships are given annually by Sunbeam Corporation, Chicago, to girls in their junior or senior college year.

The California Spray-Chemical Corporation of Richmond provides scholarships to junior or senior students majoring or minoring in agronomy, soils, entomology, plant pathology and vegetable or fruit horticulture.

College freshmen desiring to study forestry are eligible for scholarships offered by Homelite, Division of Textron Inc., Port Chester, New York.

Students should apply directly to the state 4-H Club office for further information or contact the county Extension agent. Applicants must be present or former 4-H members, and have a good scholastic record.

Winners will be selected by a group of Cooperative Extension persons meeting at the 4-H Committee headquarters in mid-November. The winning candidate will be notified during the National 4-H Club Congress held the last week in November in Chicago.

Former Eastland Resident Dies Of Heart Attack

Mrs. Anne Clark Tornquist, 40, a former Eastland resident, died Aug. 24 in San Bernardino, Calif.

Mrs. Tornquist attended Eastland schools and was a graduate of Texas State College for Women.

She is survived by two children, Betty and Gregory of the home, 2990 Ladera Road, San Bernardino; her mother, Mrs. Alice Taylor of San Bernardino; and her father, Walter I. Clark of Rockport, Mass.

The family has requested that no flowers be sent, asking that contributions be made to the Heart Fund instead.

County Retail Sales Show Large Increase

Eastland County's retail sales in 1959 showed an increase of almost two million dollars over the preceding year, reports just issued on a study of West Texas counties reveals.

The county was a bright spot in West Texas. Retail sales were listed at \$23,317,000 for 1959 compared to \$21,769,000 in 1958 and \$23,253,000 in 1957.

The county's effective buying income also was high. It is listed at \$29,385,000, compared to 28,800,000 in 1958.

Comparisons of Eastland County with other nearby counties is favorable. A few neighboring counties are compared with Eastland in the chart below:

Clarence Mayers Suffers Injury On Road Project

Clarence Mayers, 19, of Eastland was injured Thursday afternoon when a rock, estimated to weigh about 50 pounds, fell on his head while he was acting as dumper on the highway project north of Cisco.

Mayers was rushed to Graham Hospital in Cisco where he underwent emergency treatment for a two inch gash on his head. It took nine stitches to close the wound. He was later transferred to Eastland Memorial Hospital.

His mother, Mrs. A. R. Mayers, said he did not suffer a concussion. The accident was the second misfortune to fall on the Mayers family in recent days. Clarence's father was fatally electrocuted while working on the same project Aug. 9.

A. D. Smith, 88, Dies Friday In Ranger

Funeral services for Alexander D. Smith, 88, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Killingsworths Funeral Chapel, with the Rev. Ralph E. Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and O. G. Lanier, officiating.

Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mr. Smith, a retired Eastland County farmer, died about 5 a.m. Friday in his sleep at his home in Ranger.

He was born Jan. 21, 1872, in Celeste, Texas. He had lived in Eastland County since 1929 and in Ranger since Dec. 19, 1951. He farmed for 43 years before his retirement several years ago.

He was a member of the Baptist Church in the St. Joe Community near DeLeon. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Lola V. Park of Ranger and Mrs. Gwen Helton of DeLeon; one brother, Ed Smith of Abernathy; and two grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Monroe Ainsworth of Ranger, J. D. Goswick of Snyder, Fred A. Goswick of Midland, Thaxton Gilmore of Graham and Bill Smith and Houston Smith, both of Abernathy.

Eastland Mosquitoes Eating Well... But City Announces Spray Plans

Recent rains brought Eastland more than just good crop conditions, it brought an abundance of mosquitoes as well. The only story about mosquitoes so big that the farmer caught them just after they had eaten his horse and were pitching horseshoes to see which one got the harness wasn't so funny to area residents who were being "chewed on" a bit themselves.

City Manager Jimmy Young said the city already has spent \$1,200 spraying the city, but he announced that city workers would begin spraying again Monday afternoon if it doesn't rain. It cost about \$500 to \$700 each time the city sprays the entire town.

Mosquitoes are thicker here than they have been in years. At Thursday night's scrimmage between Eastland and Stephenville football teams fans and players alike spent much of their time fighting off the night raiders. Eaters came up off the turf quick after being tackled rather than serve as still targets for the insects. Earlier in the year city officials had been happy since there seemed to be a shortage of mosquitoes and the city had not had to spray. Since then the town has been sprayed twice, however, and most citizens will agree it is in bad need of a third spraying.

News From Area Towns

DeLeon Rejects Plea

City commissioners rejected a petition calling for an election to amend the city charter to permit free use of local streets at the regular meeting of that body last Tuesday. The petition bore the signatures of more than 170 local citizens. Flatly stated, the election would actually have been a parking meter election.

500 Attend Homecoming

T. L. Johnson, 86, of Desdemona and Mrs. Mary Brown, 84, of Albany won honors as the oldest man and woman attending the annual Desdemona homecoming. More than 500 attended the event at the community tabernacle, only a few paces from the location of some of the more than 800 producing wells that once dotted the Desdemona oil field.

New City Hanger

Only some finishing work and adjustments on some work already done remain to be done and Stephenville's new \$20,000 airport hanger project will be completed. The airport improvement program is a joint project of the City of Stephenville and the Federal Aviation Agency.

Mineral Wells Uplifting

Nearly an entire block of buildings facing on North Oak Ave. is undergoing a modernization program and will be another link in the expanding program of face lifting of downtown Mineral Wells buildings. The buildings include that formerly occupied by Mode O'Day, the Singer business, the Main Lounge building, a dress making shop, Brazos Hotel lobby, barber shop and Service Drug Store.

Bull Catches Man

Bull chasing like bull fighting offers its hazards. Osa Gattis, manager of the dry goods department of the local Highsmith store, came out second best in a foot race with a Hereford Bull Thursday and sustained a broken left arm for the effort. Gattis slipped and fell while attempting to head the bull. His arm was fractured in the fall.

Cisco Plans Meeting

Considerable interest is mounting over the coming Town Hall meeting set for 8 p.m. Monday in the Cisco Junior College auditorium. This will be the first town hall meeting held in Cisco in many years. Its purpose is to acquaint the citizens of the town with current plans and get their opinions about the present and future problems of Cisco.

DAUGHERTY STREET IS IT

School Division Lines Announced by Siebert

Daugherty Street will be the school dividing line this year for the two elementary schools, Supt. Wendell Siebert announced Saturday after a careful study of pre-registration figures. As the dividing line is arranged, all students living east of Daugherty Street will attend South Ward school. Siebert said parents who wish to transfer their children from the buildings they are assigned may secure a transfer request from the principal of either

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South Ward or West Ward. It must be filed by Friday, Sept. 2 with the principal they secure the form from. Such requests will be reviewed at the conclusion of the first weeks operation. Siebert said Monday will be a full day of operation. All buses will make their runs beginning at approximately 7 a.m. in order to deliver children to school a few minutes before 8 a.m.

School will begin in all schools at 8 a.m. and will be dismissed at 3 p.m. except for first grades, which will dismiss at 2 p.m. Registration at Douglas School will begin at 8 a.m.

Lunch rooms will be in operation at all schools and prices will remain the same as last year. South Ward and West Ward students will be charged 25¢ per meal and Junior High and High School students will pay 30¢.

Here is the breakdown by grades: **First Grade** West Ward—(Two sections, Mrs. Homer Smith and Miss Nettie Thornton, teachers.) All bus students, all students living out of city limits, all students living east of Daugherty.

Second Grade West Ward (Mrs. Gladys Green)—All bus students and students living west of Daugherty Street. South Ward (Mrs. D. E. Frazer)—All students living east of Daugherty.

Third Grade West Ward (Mrs. Frances Cooper)—All students living west of Daugherty. South Ward (Mrs. Marjorie Young)—All bus students and all students living east of Daugherty.

Fourth Grade West Ward (Mrs. Jimmy Hughes and Mrs. Hazel Green)—All students living out of city limits, all bus students and all students living west of Daugherty.

Fifth Grade West Ward (J. W. Turner)—All bus students, all transfer students and all students living west of Daugherty. South Ward—(Mrs. Bernice Durham)—All students living east of Daugherty.

Other Towns have similar type celebrations and promotional programs. The Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce sees the possibility of promoting this ballgame into a county attraction and through the cooperation of the two colleges it can be worked into a good thing.

Peant Bowl Gains Statewide Publicity

Publicity-wise, the Jaycee's first annual Eastland County Peant Bowl game is already a great success. The bowl game has drawn statewide publicity after its announcement this past week, and more and more interest is being shown by the State's news mediums.

The game got prominent play in the two leading regional newspapers, The Fort Worth Star-Telegram and The Abilene Reporter-News, and was carried on the Associated Press state wire service. Television Station KRBC-TV in Abilene was the first of several TV and radio stations outside Eastland County to join in plugging the Sept. 24 game between Cisco Junior College and Ranger College.

The Ranger Times ran a four column front page story about the bowl game and The Cisco Press carried a two column front page story. The Ranger Times, editorially declared, "A step toward better cooperation between Ranger, Eastland and Cisco has been taken by Ranger College and Cisco Junior College. They plan to play their football game at Eastland this year. The Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce has taken over the promotion of the game and plan to make it an annual affair. They have the idea of making the game a Peant Bowl presentation and promoting it as the football highlight in the county."

"Why couldn't this be worked into an affair by which the county could promote their main farm commodity? Other areas of the state have festivals to promote their products. This county could do the same thing. DeLeon has a watermelon and peach festival, Tyler has a rose festival and many



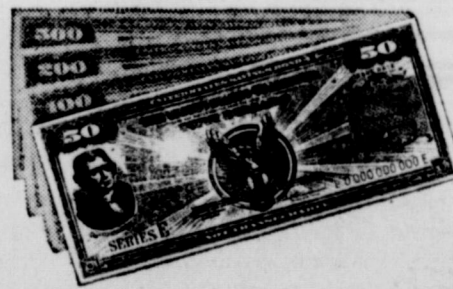
