

Safety Award Presented to Water District

The Eastland County Water Supply District was recently awarded an Award of Merit for their excellent safety record in the operation of its water works system for the year 1959.

The Award was made by the Southwest Section of the American Water Works Association, which is comprised of members in four states—Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas.

This is the fourth year that the Association has made these awards and each year more cities are becoming interested in the program, as evidenced by the number of awards presented.

In 1956, 28 awards were presented, in 1957, 38, and in 1958, 93 and the past year 112 awards in the four states were presented.

Purpose of the program is to promote safe methods in the operation of water systems throughout the country. The program is a continuous one and each member city may qualify for additional awards in subsequent years.

Having received this award, Eastland County Water Supply District will become eligible to receive national acknowledgment in the form of a plaque from the national association if they have continued safety in their operations.

Jarrett reminded that contestants must be FFA Chapter or 4-H Club sweethearts, and must be nominated by county agents or vocational agriculture teachers.

A \$300 scholarship to either Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University or McMurry College will be given the winner. She will be selected by a panel of competent judges, on the basis of

beauty, scholastic rating, personality and achievement.

The official sweetheart will be announced at a dinner meeting of the West Texas Fair Association Board of Directors Thursday, Sept. 1, at 7 p.m. in the Display Building at Abilene's Exposition Center, site of the Sept. 12-17 Fair.

Requirements for contestants are:

1. She must furnish the Fair Association with a "8 x 10" black and white photograph.
2. A statement from the Vocational Agriculture teacher or County Agent must be given, stating her grade average for the past 2 years.
3. FFA Chapter or 4-H Club nominating her must furnish a composition of not more than 100 words stating why she was chosen as their sweetheart.
4. Chapter or Club must also furnish a composition of not more than 100 words stating why she should be chosen Sweetheart of the 1960 West Texas Fair.
5. Contestants are required to attend the banquet meeting of the Fair Directors Sept. 1.
6. Contestants must wear street type clothes on all occasions of appearance.
7. Contestant must never have been married.
8. The sweetheart will be introduced from the Midway Stage at least two evenings during the Fair.

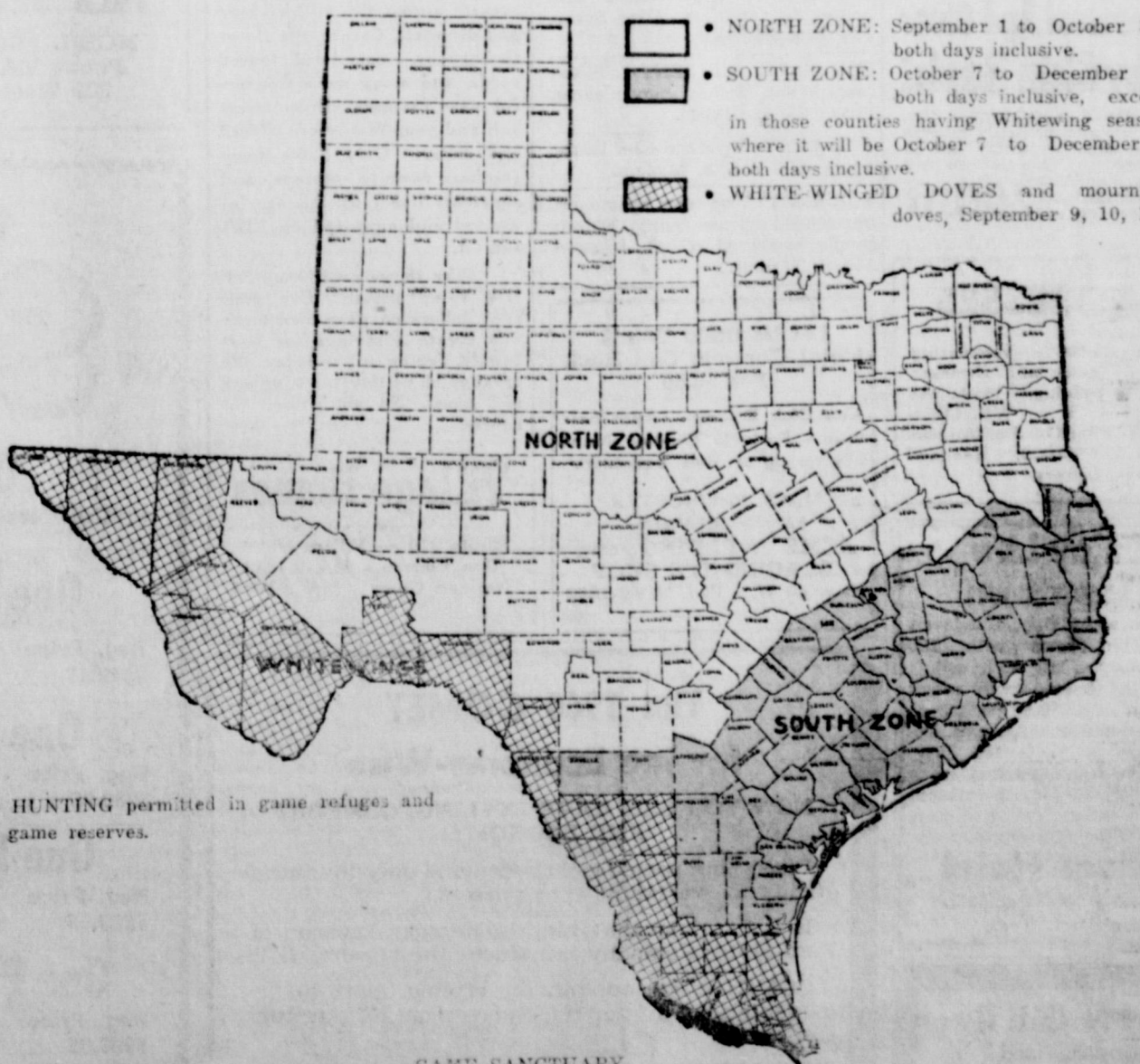
MOURNING DOVE—WHITE-WINGED DOVE

Open Seasons 1960

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit—15. Possession limit—not to exceed 30.

WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit—10. Possession limit—10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are possessed—Possession limit—30, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be whitewinged doves.



- NORTH ZONE: September 1 to October 30, both days inclusive.
- SOUTH ZONE: October 7 to December 5, both days inclusive, except in those counties having Whitewing season where it will be October 7 to December 2, both days inclusive.
- WHITE-WINGED DOVES and mourning doves, September 9, 10, 11.

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

GAME SANCTUARY

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachababers South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."

SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 9, 10 and 11 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

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Texas on Visit nnedy

eight of our friends from Texas newspapers, radio-stations and television stations. Twelve of these people represented weekly papers. You would have been proud of the way they spread Texas good will everywhere we traveled. The big turbo-prop Viscount set us down first in Kansas City. I had lunch there with the Grand Old Man of the Democratic Party—Harry Truman. He's lost none of the fire and steel of his soul that made him one of our most

colorful—and decisive—Presidents. Someone asked Mr. Truman what he thought of the Democratic ticket. "It's a winner for sure," he said. "What did you think of the Republican convention, Mr. President?" another reporter asked. "Worst in history," Mr. Truman replied.

The outreach of Hurricane Brenda delayed our arrival in Hyannis, Massachusetts for my conference with Senator Kennedy. The pilots—Captain Reuben Cage, of Blanco, Texas and First Officer Jerry Dickson, of El Paso—who became the father of a new baby girl during the trip—brought us in for a perfect instrument landing when the visibility was only 175 feet.

Senator Kennedy and I sat, up until 1:00 a. m. We talked about the program for the people; we believe Congress will enact during the remaining weeks of the session, the coming campaign (Senator Kennedy accepted my invitation to come to Texas), and we also compared grey hairs. After the young men had gone to bed, I stayed up and worked until 3:30

a. m. Lady Bird "took" to the Kennedy's home. It is a large, comfortable, pleasant house on Cape Cod. Jacqueline has furnished it with early American antiques and I almost didn't get Lady Bird away from her inspection tour in time for the press conference. Before we left Saturday, Senator Kennedy and Jackie came aboard our press bus and told our folks how happy they were that Texas had sent such a fine group of men and women along on the trip.

Saturday afternoon we were in Nashville, Tennessee where we were guests of Governor and Mrs. Buford Ellington.

I spoke that night to a Democratic rally of ten thousand people and when Governor Ellington introduced me, he had to send State Troopers out into the crowd to ask the folks to stop applauding. Governor Ellington told me that Tennessee hadn't seen a turnout like that "in a long, long time."

Every Southern state was represented and the Governors of Florida, North Carolina, Alabama, Virginia and Kentucky predicted a sweeping victory in November.

More than ten thousand people waited under the hot sun in Monticello, Iowa when we arrived there Sunday afternoon. Their enthusiasm got the best of me and I spoke for one hour—interrupted 61 times by applause. They listened attentively as I outlined the vigorous action I hope the Democratic Administration takes on the farm problem next January. I like these folks. They're big-hearted, friendly, eager to erase barriers between people and willing to consider new ideas. I really felt at home there—especially when Lady Bird and I visited a 300-acre farm near Monticello. The big black Angus and the Guernseys would have made us proud in Texas—and the chocolate cake melted in my mouth.

It was a good—and productive—trip. Three tangible results came out of it.

1) Senator Kennedy spelled out once and for all his convictions that the next Vice President will play a decisive role in Government affairs.

This is what he said in his press conference:

"We are very fortunate to have Senator Johnson's assistance in carrying out the program. If we are successful in November, I think Senator Johnson can play a role as Vice President greater, more influential, and with greater benefit to the public than any Vice President in recent times."

2) Southern leaders evidenced a quality of unity unlike any we have seen for a long time. I came away from Nashville convinced that the people of this country want to be free Americans together before they want to be anything else, and that they wanted me to speak to them not as a Southerner to a Southerner or a Protestant to a Protestant, but as an American to Americans.

3) Senator Kennedy and I cemented our relationship as running mates. There is no tension between us and we are not "poles apart" as our opponents insinuated in Chicago. Instead, we are united in a common purpose of opening the New Frontiers of America and bringing to all of our people a better life in the days ahead.

Arthur Godfrey To Appear at Texas State Fair

Television and radio star Arthur Godfrey will make personal appearances on the first three days of the 1960 State Fair of Texas Horse Show.

"The Old Redhead" will appear with his famous Palomino, "Goldie" at the night performances of the Horse Show Oct. 7 and 8 and at the matinee performance Oct. 9 in the State Fair Livestock Coliseum.

The Horse Show gets under way on the Friday evening before the State Fair officially opens Saturday, Oct. 8.

Godfrey has been a horse lover for more than 25 years. At his farm, Beacon Hill in Loudoun County, Va., he keeps horses of several different breeds. The most famous is his Palomino stallion, Catoctin Gold, known as "Goldie" to the millions who have seen him on the Godfrey TV shows or in personal appearances he has made from coast to coast.

Godfrey and "Goldie" will appear at the State Fair Horse Show in an exhibition of "dressage" riding, in which the horse is sent through intricate maneuvers without discernible instruction from the rider.

Godfrey has appeared with "Goldie" at a number of major horse shows in recent years, including the National Horse Show in New York and the International Horse Show in Chicago.

The State Fair's Series I Horse Show which opens Friday night, Oct. 7, will present five and three-gaited saddle horses, fine harness and walking horses, roaster and parade horses and hunters and jumpers. The Series I show runs through Oct. 11.

The opening series will be followed by cutting horses and quarter horses competing in Series II, Oct. 12-16, and by the final series, Oct. 18-23, which will feature Shetland ponies, Palominos and Arabian horses.

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eight of our friends from Texas newspapers, radio stations and television stations. Twelve of these people represented weekly papers. You would have been proud of the way they spread Texas good will everywhere we traveled.

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"Worst in history," Mr. Truman replied.

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Senator Kennedy and I sat, up until 1:00 a. m. We talked about the program for the people, we believe Congress will enact during the remaining weeks of the session, the coming campaign (Senator Kennedy accepted my invitation to come to Texas), and we also compared grey hairs. After the young men had gone to bed, I stayed up and worked until 3:30

a. m.

Lady Bird "took" to the Kennedy's home. It is a large, comfortable, pleasant house on Cape Cod. Jacqueline has furnished it with early American antiques and I almost didn't get Lady Bird away from her inspection tour in time for the press conference.

Before we left Saturday, Senator Kennedy and Jackie came aboard our press bus and told our folks how happy they were that Texas had sent such a fine group of men and women along on the trip.

Saturday afternoon we were in Nashville, Tennessee where we were guests of Governor and Mrs. Buford Ellington.

I spoke that night to a Democratic rally of ten thousand people and when Governor Ellington introduced me, he had to send State Troopers out into the crowd to ask the folks to stop applauding. Governor Ellington told me that Tennessee hadn't seen a turnout like that "in a long, long time."

Every Southern state was represented and the Governors of Florida, North Carolina, Alabama, Virginia and Kentucky predicted a sweeping victory in November.

More than ten thousand people waited under the hot sun in Monticello, Iowa when we arrived there Sunday afternoon. Their enthusiasm got the best of me and I spoke for one hour—interrupted 61 times by applause. They listened attentively as I outlined the vigorous action I hope the Democratic Administration takes on the farm problem next January.

I like these folks. They're big-hearted, friendly, eager to erase barriers between people and willing to consider new ideas. I really felt at home there—especially when Lady Bird and I visited a 300-acre farm near Monticello. The big black Angus and the Guernseys would have made us proud in Texas—and the chocolate cake melted in my mouth.

It was a good—and productive—trip. Three tangible results came out of it.

1) Senator Kennedy spelled out once and for all his convictions that the next Vice President will play a decisive role in Government affairs.

This is what he said in his press conference: "We are very fortunate to have Senator Johnson's assistance in carrying out the program. If we are successful in November, I think Senator Johnson can play a role as Vice President greater, more influential, and with greater benefit to the public than any Vice President in recent times."

2) Southern leaders evidenced a quality of unity unlike any we have seen for a long time. I came away from Nashville convinced that the people of this Country want to be free Americans together before they want to be anything else, and that they wanted me to speak to them not as a Southerner to a Southerner or a Protestant to a Protestant, but as an American to Americans.

3) Senator Kennedy and I cemented our relationship as running mates. There is no tension between us and we are not "poles apart" as our opponents insinuated in Chicago. Instead, we are united in a common purpose of opening the New Frontiers of America and bringing to all of our people a better life in the days ahead.

Arthur Godfrey To Appear at Texas State Fair

Television and radio star Arthur Godfrey will make personal appearances on the first three days of the 1960 State Fair of Texas Horse Show.

"The Old Redhead" will appear with his famous Palomino, "Goldie" at the night performances of the Horse Show Oct. 7 and 8 and at the matinee performance Oct. 9 in the State Fair Livestock Coliseum.

Godfrey has been a horse lover for more than 25 years. At his farm, Beacon Hill in Loudoun County, Va., he keeps horses of several different breeds. The most famous is his Palomino stallion, Catoctin Gold, known as "Goldie" to the millions who have seen him on the Godfrey TV shows or in personal appearances he has made from coast to coast.

Godfrey and "Goldie" will appear at the State Fair Horse Show in an exhibition of "dressage" riding, in which the horse is sent through intricate maneuvers without discernible instruction from the rider.

Godfrey has appeared with "Goldie" at a number of major horse shows in recent years, including the National Horse Show in New York and the International Horse Show in Chicago.

The State Fair's Series I Horse Show which opens Friday night, Oct. 7, will present five and three-gaited saddle horses, fine harness and walking horses, roadster and parade horses and hunters and jumper. The Series I show runs through Oct. 11.

The opening series will be followed by cutting horses and quarter horses competing in Series II, Oct. 12-16, and by the final series, Oct. 18-23, which will feature Shetland ponies, Palominos and Arabian horses.
