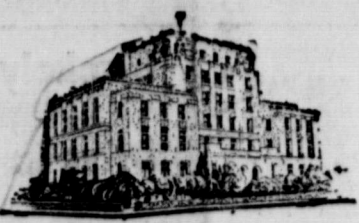

David B. Allsup Receives Science Foundation Grant

David B. Allsup, instructor in natural science at Ranger Junior College, has been granted a scholarship by the National Science Foundation to attend the Science Institute in Ecology at the University of Oklahoma June 12-August 14, 1961, in Norman, Oklahoma.
In addition to receiving the Oklahoma University grant, he was also accepted as an alternate by Florida State University, Tallahassee, Florida.
As the scholarship requires study of plants in their natural environment, he expects to travel 3,000 miles to visit various state parks and will spend much of his time camping out in the open this summer. The Allsup family plan to spend part of the summer with him in Norman.
Allsup holds both the Bachelor of Science and the Master of Science degrees from East Texas State College in Commerce, and is now working on the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. He has been an instructor in Ranger Junior College since 1957.

Summer Semester College Classes Are Announced

Ranger Junior College announced the opening of its 1961 summer session June 5. Registration for the first six weeks' term is scheduled for the fifth with classes beginning June 6. The second semester will begin July 17 and will continue until August 25.
The following courses will be offered the first six weeks: History 101 (American History, 1492-1865); Government 201 (American National Government); Education 202 (Child Growth and Development); English 101 (Freshman Grammar and Composition); English 201 (English Literature); Business Administration 106 (Elementary Accounting); and Physical Education 101 and 201.
Courses not scheduled can be offered on sufficient demand, according to Mrs. R. L. Hamrick, Director of Summer School.

The meeting is open to the public and special recognition will be given to Democratic County chairmen, Precinct Chairmen, and Blakley Campaign Officials, and other County and state officials.

More Residents Getting Social Security Checks

In the first week of January, 1961, 2,981 persons in Eastland county received \$159,886 in old-age, survivors, or disability insurance payments under the Social Security Act, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration. This was an increase of 265 persons over those paid for December 1959.
In the sixteen county district serviced by the Abilene office, 24,566 beneficiaries received \$1,304,680 in that first week of January this year, as compared to 21,836 persons who received \$1,133,406 in January of 1960. Tuley stated that was an increase of about 13 per cent.
Nationally, the number of men, women, and children who receive monthly payments from this program passed the 15 million mark a few weeks ago. The average payments made in January 1961 were \$70 for retirement or disability, \$124 for a retired couple where both received payment, and \$58 for an aged widow. These modest figures point up the continuing necessity for an individual to save and invest to the best of his ability during his earning years, so that he and his family will have other resources to supplement what 9 out of 10 American families are building under the old-age, survivors, and disability provisions of the Social Security Act, Tuley concluded.
He also suggested that all persons who have reached retirement age (62 for women, 65 for men) write him for the free booklet, "21 Questions and Answers on Retirement Benefits" which may result in many persons realizing they are due payments now instead of later, as a result of 1960 Changes in the law. Others on the program at the morning session include B. G. Hancock, Horticulturist, and C. F. Gansser, Entomologist, Agricultural Extension Service, A. and M. College.
A disease and insect survey will be made in Sims' orchard at Mangum, and at Hap Jackson's orchard at Carbon during the afternoon field trip, which will also include a spraying demonstration by

A. W. Ware, Rising Star, in the Jackson orchard.
A county pecan show, a fall tour, and a midwinter meeting are also activities of the pecan growers' association.

Another ringer tournament is now underway and will end June 11.

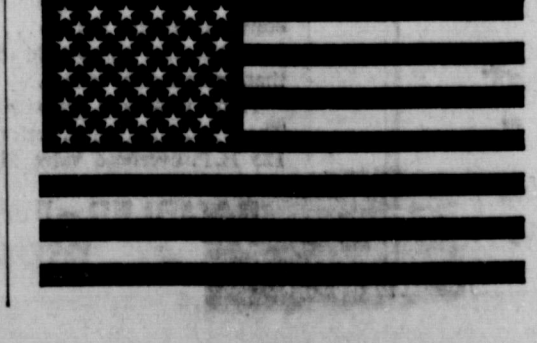
State Highway Week Proclaimed By Governor

Highway Week in Texas was officially proclaimed today by Governor Price Daniel, and will be observed May 21-27 in conjunction with National Highway Week.
Citizens and groups interested in better highways are cooperating in the observance of Highway Week in Texas—and throughout the nation—following a proclamation of the week nationally by President John F. Kennedy.
State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer called Highway Week "not a week of appreciation but of challenge."
He said Highway Week "is not to brag on what we have done, but to bring more clearly before the public eye the immense highway problems that now confront us."
Foremost among Texas' highway problems, he said, are these:
... More than one-third of the total Texas highway mileage is obsolete, or about to become so. This is the 25,000-mile system of U.S. and State Highways, which is "almost totally antiquated," Greer said, "by the enormous increase in traffic."
... The 33,000-mile system of Texas Farm to Market Roads is still expanding rapidly—but there is not enough money to maintain what is built. "Statute permits us to spend a certain amount of money annually building new FM Roads," and there isn't enough money to go around.
"The highway dollar is being stretched thinner and thinner," he said, "and it is being constantly bombarded by attempts to divert highway dollars to other purposes."
"The danger of diversion," Greer said, "is that we may be slowly strangling in our own traffic by hardening of our highway arteries."
"We cannot get by with horse-and-buggy highways in the space age," Greer warned, "and I hope that Highway Week in Texas will bring these problems more into the open so that with public support we can meet—and solve—the demands of the most motorized nation on earth."

Girl Scouts and Jaycees To Sell New Fifty Star Flags

Girl Scouts and Eastland Jaycees have announced a joint project with the intention of making Eastland less complacent toward the menace of communism.
Beginning Tuesday new 50-star design flags will go on sale here. Girl Scouts will offer the flags to local citizens and Jaycees are handling promotion of the campaign.
Complete flag kits will sell for \$5. The kit includes a big 8x5 foot size flag in washable, colorfast cotton with double-stitched stripes, a six-foot, brass-joined hardwood staff with top decoration, halyard and metal window socket.
Persons wanting the flags who are not contacted by either the Girl Scouts or the Jaycees are asked to mail their checks to Box 202, Eastland, made out to Eastland Jaycees. Their flags will be delivered.
"We hope to have a flag flying in front of every business in Eastland May 30, Memorial Day, and from as many homes as possible," James Smith, Jaycee chairman of the drive, declared.
Estimated retail value of the flags are \$7.95, but the special \$5 price was made available due to a special purchase.
A Girl Scout spokesman said, "We think this will give Girl Scouts a chance to do a most worthy duty. This is the first time the new 50-star flags have been offered here."
The two organizations will urge that the flags be flown on at least 11 important national holidays, including New Year's Day, Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's birthday, Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Citizenship Day, Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day and on all election days.

Lake Sheldon Fishermen Take Fish Per Hour

The average fisherman on Lake Sheldon, near Houston, caught an average of almost a fish per hour of fishing, during the last season. This is revealed in a Game and Fish Commission report of Billy Cooper, fishery biologist who ran a check on the lake during the fishing period between April and October.

According to his report, the average fisherman spent 2.51 hours to catch 2.39 fish. The total per acre yield taken in all the public fishing amounted to 86 fish weighing 22 pounds. The total catch was estimated at 74,735 fish

Winds Affect Texas Waters

High winds have continued to harass fishermen on Texas waters, despite the fact that fish are ready to bite. Reports reaching the Game and Fish Commission from all parts of the state indicate lakes, streams and even coastal waters have been buffeted by the winds to such a degree that on most days fishing has been practically impossible.

"On the few days fishermen have been able to get out, they have come in with good strings," H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary, said. "The mackerel run already has begun on the coast. A few tarpon have been reported and trout and red fish have been hitting good when fishermen have been able to get on the water."

So far, there has been no heavy-draw-down on principal lakes of Texas, according to the monthly report of the U. S. Army Engineer Corps. The lakes have been holding their level very well for the past month. The Whitney water level was raised slightly, but others have remained practically unchanged.

Heavy rains could affect this situation almost overnight, however. West Texas lakes are down below their requirements right now, and heavy rains with considerable runoff are needed in such lakes as Lake Sweetwater, Lake J. B. Thomas at Snyder, and Champion Creek Lake at Colorado City.

weighing 10,453 pounds.

Sunfish were the most frequently caught species, making up 86 percent of the total catch. Large-mouth bass made up 8.57 percent with an estimated 7,379 fish weighing 9,366 or slightly over one pound each. There were 1,575 crappie taken. They weighed 765 pounds, or approximately one-half pound each.

Commission personnel interviewed

6,323 fishermen and checked

15,139 fish. Lake Sheldon was first opened to public fishing four years ago, after it had been developed as a wildlife management project. A total kill removed rough fish from the lake and it was restocked with game fish. Fishing is permitted only from April to October each year. The remainder of the season, the area is a refuge for waterfowl.

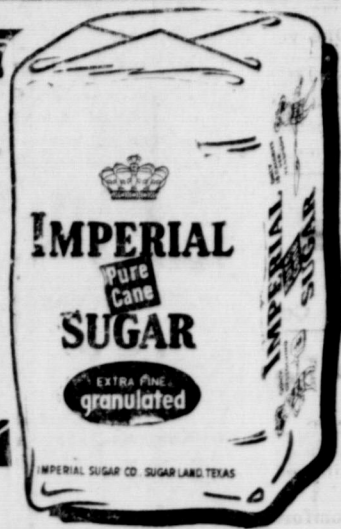

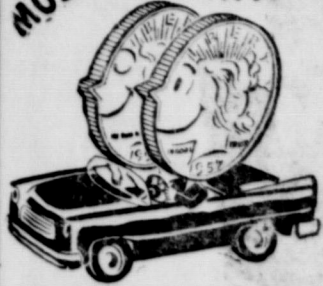

Parental Consent Needed For Child's Medical Care

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parent's consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid—but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Child-

ren cannot do this. By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them. The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but it should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.
