The Production Credit Association of Texas, organized in 1923, are owned and operated by the farmer and rancher stockholder. They have provided more than \$2.8 billion in agricultural loans in the past 27 years.

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WHEN IT COMES TO SCHOOL PROBLEMS

Houston Reporter Explains How Others Live; We're His Example

(Editor's Note: The following article (partly deleted) appeared July 21 in The Houston Post. The author, Leon Hale, is a graduate of Eastland High School and the son of Fred Hale, 413 East Pershing.)

When somebody mentions "the school problem" what do you think of?

To a citizen living in one of the economically expanding communities of the Texas Gulf Coast, "school problem" brings to mind a vision of crowded classrooms, too many students, not enough teachers and temporary buildings, symbolizing the struggle to educate a fast growing population.

A school taxpayer of Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio or any other of the larger cities in Texas is often puzzled to hear that there is another side to the Texas school problem, and almost opposite in nature.

It could be expressed this way—too many classrooms, and not enough students.

Where does this situation exist? It exists in county after county in those areas of the state where the population and the economy are on the decline instead of the upgrade.

Take an example. Eastland County, an hour and a half's drive west of Fort Worth.

Eastland County has a population of about 19,000. Yet within its boundaries, 10 high schools are operating.

By all the rules of thumb arrived at through years of school district study by national, state and local agencies, Eastland County's population indicates it could operate most efficiently with just one high school.

Just north of Eastland County is Stephens County. It has a population of just more than half of Eastland's, maintains just two high schools, one of which is a small Negro school. Stephens County has one school district; Eastland County is cut up into nine independent districts.

While Eastland County's situation has some unique features, the area is by no means alone with this problem. Ellis County (Waxahachie), with a population of 43,000, shows in the records of the Texas Education Agency to be operating 16 high schools, counting both Negro and white.

Many other counties are in similar situations. Anderson County (Palestine), with a population of 28,000, has 11 high schools. Houston County (Crockett) with only 19,250 population has 11 high schools.

All these examples—and more could be quoted—have one thing in common. The counties are all losing population, while the metropolitan areas and industrial centers are gaining.

Viewed as a unit, can a county with 20,000 people and 10 high schools possibly be operating an efficient public education program?

J. Warren Hitt, deputy state commissioner of education, says no. How much of Texas is in this shape?

You get a hint by studying the Texas Education Agency's records, which show that 132 of 254 counties in the state have lost scholastic population in the last decade. Although certainly not every school district in all those counties is in desperate straits, the figure shows the crying need for more efficient use of the school tax dollar in depopulated areas of Texas.

To illustrate the fix in which public schools under such conditions can find themselves, go again to Eastland County.

The largest three communities in Eastland County are Ranger, Eastland and Cisco, located along US Highway 80. Each has an independent school district. The three towns range in population from 3,300 to 4,400.

And each is struggling with an old school debt.

The Eastland district went through a bankruptcy proceeding back in 1941, and is now operating under a court decree which requires a third of all school taxes collected to go into a fund to retire its indebtedness.

Until recently the Ranger district had not even paid the interest on its bond debt. It is still faced with more than \$480,000 worth of indebtedness. How is a school district to provide students modern educational facilities when it is unable to pay back what it borrow-

ed to build a school plant now all but obsolete?

Cisco, the largest of three towns, had its school debt pared down to about \$200,000 in 1929. Then the depression hit; no payments were made on the debt for nine years; when the smoke cleared, compound interest had ballooned the debt to nearly half a million dollars.

School taxpayers of Cisco are naturally gunshy of any further school indebtedness, though its buildings need to be replaced.

How do school systems get in that shape?

In the case of Eastland County, it all goes back to the days of the Ranger oil boom, 40 years ago.

Ranger at the height of the boom had 35,000 people. The oil was flowing, and the future looked bright. Local leaders envisioned the city as a future petroleum center of great economic luster, and that's when the school district took on the school debt.

But the boom faded, and so did the population. Eastland and Cisco had similar experiences. All three of the towns now are at a small fraction of their boomtime population strength, and all three lost more population with the 1960 census.

Deputy Commissioner Hitt says there are two ways such situations may be relieved.

One lies in the state's minimum foundation school program, through which Gilmer-Aiken money is channeled to local schools in accordance with their ability, or inability, to support their systems through local funds.

In a county like Eastland, a high percentage of teacher salaries are paid by the state funds. In a metropolitan area, such as Houston or Dallas, the reverse is true. This tends to send the most state money to depopulated areas, where as a rule schools are less efficient than in the areas with expanding population.

As Dr. J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education, said in a recent speech, "Many school districts in areas of population decline are experiencing difficulty in maintaining a sound instructional program at a reasonable cost per pupil."

Why? Because pupil-teacher ratios are smaller, said the commissioner, and because local support of the schools is based on an agricultural economy.

try schools have been steadily fading out and sending their students to bigger schools in town.

The hue and cry and lament of those who bemoaned the loss of country schools has almost faded, too.

Gray Matter

In this election year we hardly get over one political party's national convention until we run into another. This week we're witnessing the national convention of the Republican Party.

This year is also the 100th anniversary of the first time the Republicans elected a member of their party as President of the United States. The election of 1860 brought Abraham Lincoln into the White House and a civil war upon the land.

One hundred years ago the nation was pretty well split into conflicting groups and sections. Happily for our land we aren't suffering under this conflict of issues this year, although there are some disagreements among us this year. We Americans always will disagree on some things. That's inevitable as this land is too big and too vast with too many conflicts of personal interest for all Americans to always agree on everything all the time. If we were agreed on all things there would be no need for political parties.

One of the great wonders of American politics, however, is that a country as large and composed of so many different races and sections should have only two great political parties. We don't have the problem France has had in too many parties to get anything done. Fortunately for our country we've never had the problem of too many political parties for our own good. This has been a two party nation.

Now a hundred years after the Republicans offered its first successful ticket it looks as if this country could use a realignment of political parties and beliefs. The Republicans held their first convention in 1856 out of the wreckage of the older Whig Party. Senator Goldwater and other Republicans who aren't satisfied with this platform of the Republican Party and many Democrats who aren't satisfied with the platform, or the candidates, of their party also contend that America needs a realignment of political parties.

Whether this will come in my lifetime or not remains to be seen, but I wouldn't bet on it. There are far too many people who have, for some reason or another, a sort of sentimental attachment for a party for them to change over to something else. That's one reason we find people who make excuses about not voting for the candidate of the party they grew up in.

There are people who consider themselves Democrats who haven't voted for a Democratic candidate for President of the United States since Woodrow Wilson ran the first time. Yet these people consider themselves Democrats and never find the means, or the will, to vote for the nominee of their party.

These people are attached to the party for some sentimental reason but don't agree with its credo.

Actually, America has had need for a rearrangement of political parties for a long time, but the history of this country is such that some people wouldn't vote for one party or the other even though the other party agreed with their own political ideas one hundred percent.

This week we are witnessing a great political party in national convention. This is quite a sight on television and an important thing to listen to on radio. Political conventions are our chief form of entertainment every four years

tered over the county obviously scream for at least partial consolidation. Any school superintendent in the county will say the consolidation idea has been discussed and considered among them for many years.

But community pride and spirit, the greatest of all school consolidation deterrents, makes the very term consolidation a bad word to many citizens in Eastland County.

The towns of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, all close to the same size, have been natural rivals always—in sports, in community efforts, everything. Life itself in the county has been that community competition and it revolved around the schools more than any.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

There is, or was, quite a few years ago, a railroad station bearing the sign, "Greenway, Ark."—in sight of the highway as you drive by. What is mentionworthy about that? Well, the town is a mile and a half away and the building is in a farmer's field! No, it was not carried there by a flood or a tornado. How then did it get there? That is the tragic story of a town.

I was born in Piggott, which is the county seat of Clay County. Back in 1919, when I returned to my birth place to edit the Banner, if an out-of-towner referred to Piggott as Hoggott, a riled native would likely knock his hat off.

And yet, a hog played a decisive part in the history of Piggott, according to tradition, which goes like this:

Greenway and Piggott were about the same size. They were three miles apart. Both were on the Cotton Belt railroad. They were rivals for the honor of being selected as county seat. Paved streets were unknown and the sidewalks were made of boards, what sidewalks there were, in either town.

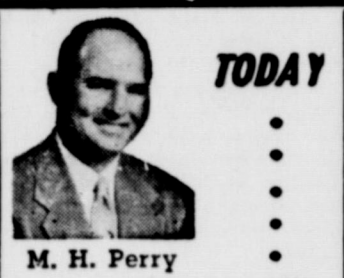
One election day, reports indicated that the contest was proving close. In the afternoon, a man arrived in a third town, which held the balance of power. He had come through Greenway, he said, horseback. There had been a heavy rain there the night before, he continued. "In fact", he added, as a seeming afterthought, "a hog drowned on Main Street."

This news — implying that hogs roved freely through the town's business section — dealt a blow to the Greenway cause and the voting turned heavily in Piggott's favor. Consequently, that city was selected as the county seat. With the county offices (which represented a substantial payroll) and with citizens having to record their deeds and pay their taxes there and court attracting big crowds several weeks a year—with all this, Piggott marched forward. Greenway, losing business to its neighbor, gradually declined until dwindling trade caused the railroad to sell the depot. The building was bought by a farmer who moved it to his place for use as a barn.

The day after the election, the citizens of Greenway learned of the report. They acknowledged there had been a heavy rain but they indignantly denied the implication that hogs were accustomed to roam through the business district, much less that one had drowned. They clamored also for the identity of the bearer of this information. But no one seemed to know who he was and he must have been a modest man for he did not come forward and make himself known.

So the decline and fall of Greenway, climaxed by the hauling away of the once-busy depot to house the corn of a hill-farmer, and the rise of Piggott—all of this was wrought about by a hog, and probably a non-existent hog, at that.

thing else. An Eastland physician, Dr. James Whittington, generated some stern reactions with the suggestion that school consolidation in Eastland County is past due.

"Eastland County now has 10 high schools, nine school superintendents, 19 principals, 10 science teachers, 10 language teachers, five school tax collectors and 10 to 15 school secretaries," he points out.

"Take the example of the school superintendents. The average salary is \$6,000 or a total of \$54,000 a year, paid by the State School Fund.

"Under consolidation, one man could handle the superintendent's job at a salary of about \$10,000 or less. In 10 years this alone would save \$440,000 . . ."

Whittington estimated the other savings from consolidation would amount to more than \$800,000 in a 10-year period, enough, he said, to build a new small high school, or pay off all the old school bonds in Eastland County.

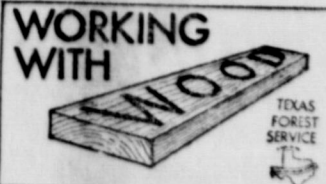

Nearly everyone has heard of "dry rot" in wood, and yet there is no such thing. Rot or decay is accomplished by the action of fungi as they consume wood for food. These fungi cannot grow without water. Wood must have a moisture content of at least 20 percent before fungi will attack it. Thoroughly dry wood will not rot. Some fungi can remain dormant or inactive for years without doing any damage. Then, when the conditions of moisture and tempera-

ture needed for their growth occur, these fungi become active. Other wood destroying fungi transport the water needed for their wood consuming activity through tube like strands or tunnels which establish contact with the ground. To prevent decay, wood should be installed dry and kept dry. Proper construction practices can help maintain such conditions and eliminate decay damage and expensive repairs to houses and other wooden buildings. Remember dry wood will not rot.

LEGAL NOTICE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS

It shall henceforth be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to move any erected or partially erected house, building or other structure upon, across, on or over any street or alley in the City of Eastland without a permit therefor issued by the City and signed by the City Manager.

In exercising such permit, permittee shall be constantly subject to the regulation of the City of Eastland as to the removing of obstructions, utility poles, trees, etc., or the non-removal of same.

Nothing herein shall restrict the right of any utility company or other persons, firm, or corporation to demand and receive payment for damages or for services made necessary by the exercise of such permit, such damages or services to be paid by permittee or such other person, firm or corporation as may be liable therefor under the law.

Charge for this permit is \$25.00. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Whereas, the facts set forth in this ordinance are such as to create an emergency to the extent that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three separate and several meetings of the City Commission should be suspended; said rule is hereby suspended, and this ordinance is placed on its third and final reading and finally passed, and the same shall be in full force and exist from its passage and publication as required by the City Charter, and it is so ordained.

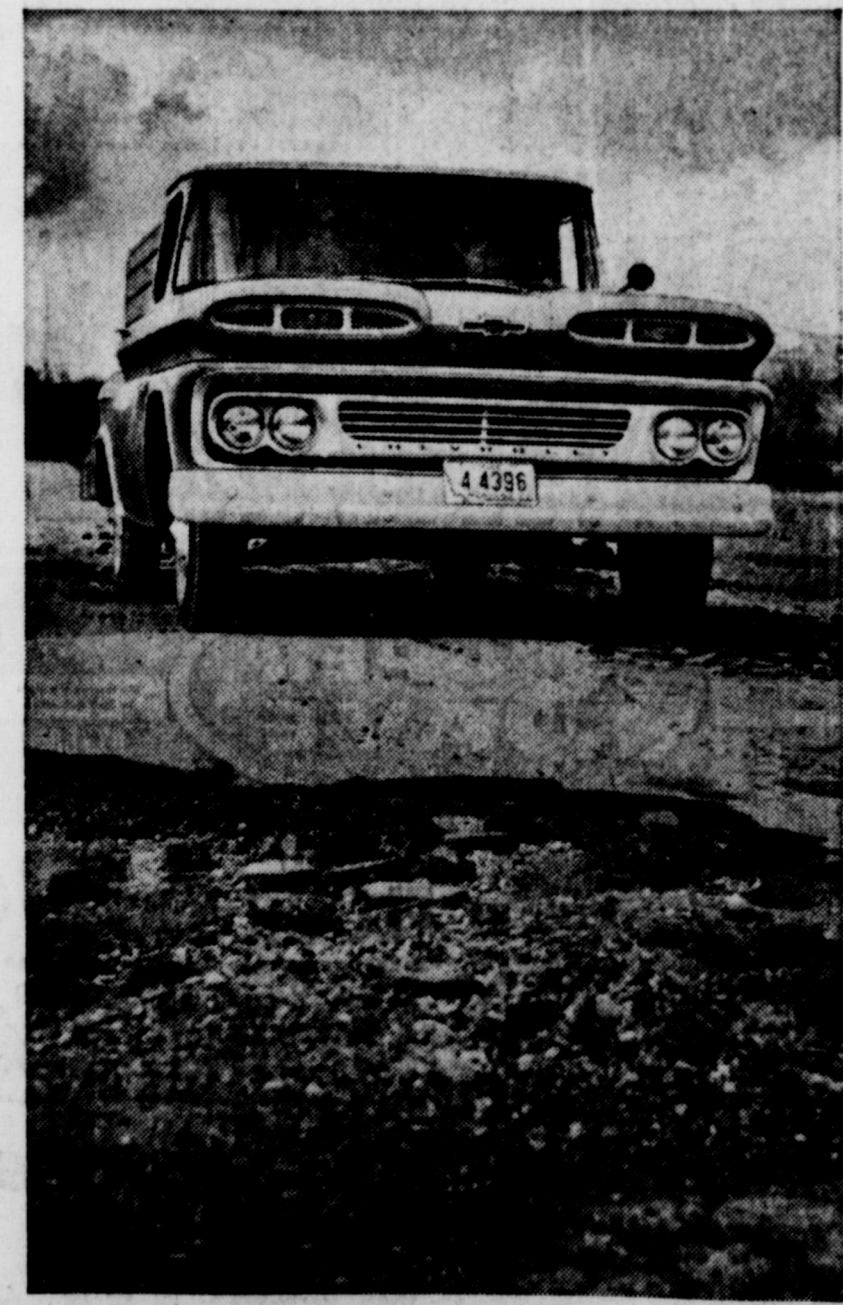
