I Give You Texas

An early picture of Corpus Christi is given by an obscure second lieutenant, U. S. Grant, who was serving there with the army commanded by Gen. Zachary Taylor in 1845.

After reaching shore, or Shell Island, the labor of getting to Corpus Christi was slow and tedious. There was, if my memory serves me, but one small steamer to transport troops and baggage when the Fourth Infantry arrived. Others were procured later. The distance from Shell Island to Corpus Christi was some sixteen or eighteen miles. The channel to the bay was so shallow that the steamer, small as it was, had to be dragged over the bottom when loaded. Not more than one trip a day could be effected. Later this was remedied by deepening the channel and increasing the number of vessels suitable to its navigation.

Corpus Christi is near the head of the bay of the same name, formed by the entrance of the Nueces river into tide water, and is on the west bank of that bay. At the time of its first occupancy by United States troops, there was a small Mexican hamlet there, containing probably less than 100 souls. There was, in addition, a small American trading-post at which goods were sold to Mexican smugglers. All goods were put in compact packages of about one hundred pounds each, suitable for loading on pack mules. Two of these packages made a load for an ordinary Mexican mule and three for the larger ones. The bulk of the trade was in leaf-tobacco and domestic cotton cloths and calicoes.

The Mexicans had, before the arrival of the army, but little to offer in exchange except silver. The trade in tobacco was enormous, considering the population to be supplied. Almost every Mexican above the age of ten years, and many much younger, smoked the cigarette. Nearly every Mexican carried a pouch of leaf-tobacco, powdered by rolling in the hands, and a roll of cornhusks to make wrappers. The cigarettes were made by the smokers as they used them.

Up to the time of which I write, and for years afterward—I think until the administration of President Juarez—the cultivation, manufacture and sale of tobacco constituted a government monopoly, and paid the bulk of the revenue collected from internal sources. The price was enormously high and made smuggling very profitable. The difficulty of obtaining tobacco is probably the reason why everybody, male and female, used it at that time. I know from my own experience that, when I was at West Point, the fact that tobacco in every form was prohibited, and the mere possession of the weed severely punished, made the majority of the cadets, myself included, try to acquire the habit of using it. I failed utterly at the time and for many years afterward; but the majority accomplished the object of their youthful ambition.

(It is interesting to note that Grant had difficulty in acquiring the habit of using tobacco in view of the fact that we think of him as always smoking a cigar.)

The 4-H members will be required to exhibit their gilts in the County Show in September and if eligible in the area show, farrow a spring litter from their gilts, compete in the heavy litter contest and return the choice gilt pig from their first litter back to the program.

The 4-Hers winning the boar pig is required to exhibit it in the County Show, and the area show, and to furnish free service to the other Sears-Roebuck Foundation gilts.

To win a pig in the program the 4-Hers are required to write an essay entitled "Why Hogs are Important in Eastland County" and have adequate facilities for raising hogs.

And also all the right, title and interest of the Grantor in and to all of the oil, gas and other minerals in, under or that may be produced from said land, and all oil, gas and other minerals now or hereafter stored upon said land, and the proceeds from the sale of all of the same; and all of Grantor's interest in and to all of the oil or gas wells, machinery, tanks, supplies, pipe lines, water lines, casing, pumping equipment, housing, structures, improvements, and all other real and personal property of every nature, now situated upon, appurtenant to or used in connection with the operation of said leases or the production of oil, gas and minerals therefrom, and also all machinery, material, equipment, supplies, and personal property of every kind and character which may be hereafter placed upon said leases or used in connection therewith; and all easements, appurtenances and improvements now or hereafter pertaining to or incident to the said oil and gas leases or to the operation of the same and the production of oil, gas and minerals therefrom.

Being the same lien described in a certain Deed of Trust now of record in Volume 113, pages 25-32 of the Deed of Trust Records of Eastland County, Texas. \$1,048.99 of the recovery allowed herein is for attorney's fees provided for in said note.
