Memorial Day Service Tues.

Memorial Day celebration in Eastland will be held Tuesday and will be highlighted by the unveiling of the Memorial Tablet honoring County servicemen of World War II and the conflict.

Businesses will be closed from 9:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. for the service, and the offices will all be closed.

The service is under the direction of the Eastland Civic Center and the County Commissioner.

The program will begin with the playing of the national anthem at 10 a. m. on the south steps of the courthouse. A flight of jets will be given by a flight team from Webb Air Force Base.

John E. Dowd, pastor of the Methodist Church in Eastland, will lead the invocation. Tom E. Stamey, Civic Center president, will deliver a presentation.

Judge John Hart will preside and the Rev. Joseph M. Baker, pastor of the Baptist Church, will lead the prayer.

The service will be followed by an address by seven Doyers of the Eastland Base airmen command.

There will be an intermission in the service at 11:30 a. m. Next of kin of men who died in the war will be invited to the service.

Senior Class Prophecy

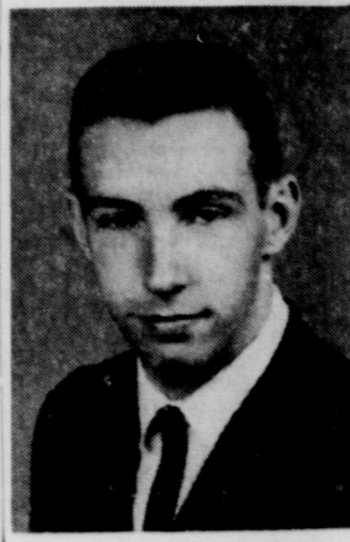

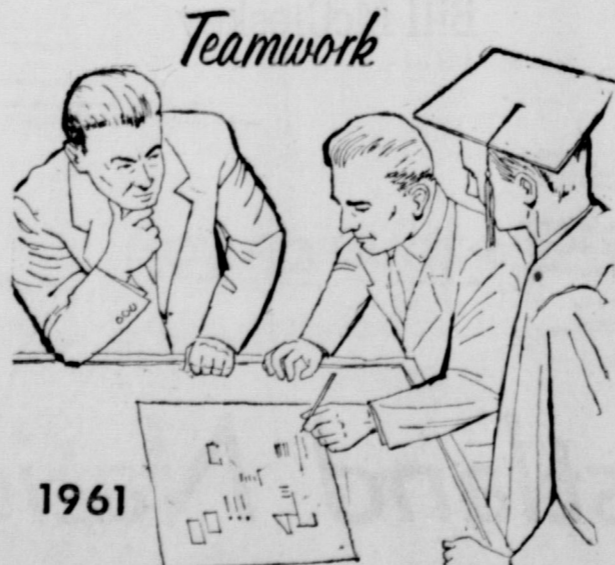

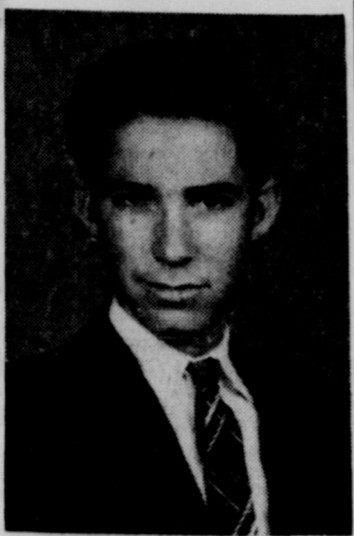

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Besides expecting warm milk or a soft-boiled egg in the mornings, the family cat may be a source of another irritation—a malady labeled "cat scratch disease."

Dr. David L. Young, Dallas physician, has written an article in the April issue of the Texas State Journal of Medicine.

"Cat scratch disease," states Dr. Young, "is associated with either a cat scratch or bite, or cat contact, in from 52 to 92 per cent of the cases. Of the 16 family epidemics reported, all have been associated with a family cat."

The ailment has been found in persons ranging in age from 1 to 70, although it is more common in children and young adults. About one-half of the patients have been less than 20 years old. In patients over 45, the disease is found predominantly in women. This may be attributed to the fact that women more commonly care for the household cat.

Seasonal variation also is evident. The period of greatest incidence is from September through February—when the family cat is usually inside the house and in closer contact with the family.

First noticed as a primary skin lesion and regional glandular swelling, the disease may begin with a rash and fever.

Incubation period ranges from 3 to 14 days from the time of contact to development of the primary lesion. Glandular disease occurs most commonly from 7 to 28 days following the contact, but has developed up to 62 days afterward.

"The primary lesion may develop at the site of an abrasion, splinter, or thorn injuries, as well as at the site of an actual cat scratch or bite," Dr. Young reports, "A primary lesion is often not demonstrated. The primary skin lesion, when present, may take several forms. Most commonly it is a papule surrounded by a red halo, but it may be represented by a healing scratch or bite."

In addition, the primary lesions may be multiple and at times may resemble acneiform lesions or insect bites. Sometimes a small and previously unnoticed primary lesion may enlarge and become noticeable only with development of glandular abnormality, or it may appear at the time of skin testing.

Lesions occur most frequently in the upper extremities, face and neck, and lower extremities. Occasionally, they develop in unusual places. The nodes may vary from

a few centimeters in diameter to the size of large walnuts. They may not hurt at all or they may be very tender.

Nodes are often more visible than painful and may be first noticed by their size. They usually disappear within 6 weeks but have been known to last up to a year.

In about 75 per cent of persons with the disease, fever with or without shaking chills, headache, abdominal pain, loss of appetite, and a vague feeling of bodily discomfort may occur.

The TSCRA has 31 well-trained and coordinated field inspectors located in Texas and Oklahoma who have not only a thorough knowledge of cattle but also a working knowledge of modern crime detecting techniques.

The association offers a high level of protection for the individual cattleman. Not only do they have men to help local law enforcement agencies to catch thieves but also they have a legal department and an attorney who is available at all times to help local prosecutors in working up cattle theft cases.

This makes cattle theft—which might otherwise be appealing to the criminal mind—one of the least defensible crimes in our state.

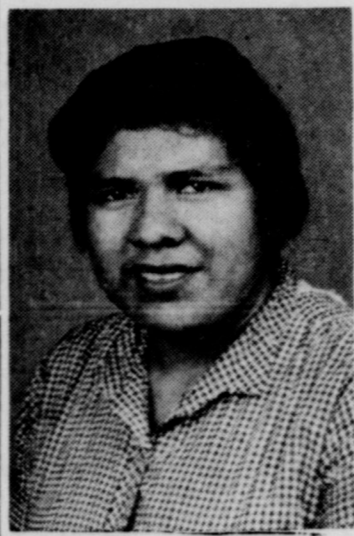
Cattle branding, as always, is crucially important for owner protection against thievery. This offers positive identification of ownership which will stand up in court.

Even with modern detection methods and updated ranching techniques, the age-old menace of pioneer days is still with us, however. And it's good to know that the cattle thief is being watched for, sought after, and, if caught, prosecuted to the fullest for his unsavory crime.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

There is a French proverb which says in effect that the more things change, the more they remain the same. History does repeat itself.

Every mail brings letters demanding, imploring or suggesting that we do something about Cuba, and in many is the question, "What about the Monroe Doctrine?"

The Monroe Doctrine was proclaimed on Dec. 2, 1823. It was chiefly directed at Russia as we might do if we were writing it today.

In the early 1800's Russia was looking to establish a colony in what is now the States of Oregon and Washington.

Just prior to this period Napoleon had been defeated and the stronger nations of Europe were looking for places to expand their empires. They were talking of sending fleets to South America to take over new governments which had been established after gaining their independence from Spain. The emergence of new nations in Latin America, the Revolution in the United States and France, caused the kings and emperors of Europe, except the British who had invested in trade in South America to feel that what was needed was to make the world safe from democracy.

The idea of the Doctrine originated in the Administration of Thomas Jefferson. Jefferson was getting old. John Quincy Adams was Secretary of State and argued with Jefferson that the Doctrine should be made to apply to all of Europe and not just Russia alone. This theory was carried forward through the James Madison Administration and finally formalized by James Monroe.

The first part of the Document is aimed directly at Russia and the second part at Emperors of Europe.

The United States had little to back up its declaration that foreign governments should not be permitted to gain a foothold in the Western Hemisphere, but depend-

ed on the British Navies to enforce the Doctrine. The Monarchs of Europe were angry and made open threats to ignore the pronouncement. Nothing happened a little more was heard about the matter until around 1845. Polk was President at this time and he found occasion to restate the policy.

Following this period and during the Civil War, France set up a puppet government in Mexico under Maximilian. From 1862 to 1867 the military power of France maintained the Emperor Maximilian on a shaky Mexican throne.

In this year of 1867 the United States had an Army left over from the Civil War. After a period to recoup and recover from the weariness of the conflict and the assassination of Lincoln, the United States gave France her orders to get out of Mexico. Without very much argument and less resistance, the French pulled out but left Maximilian. The emperor managed to hold together a small force of Mexicans who protected him for a short time but he was soon captured by Juarez and shot.

The United States has never permitted a foreign country to secure itself in the Western Hemisphere. In a day when all we had to back up our demand was determination, we were successful. We should be as determined today when we have the strength to enforce this policy.

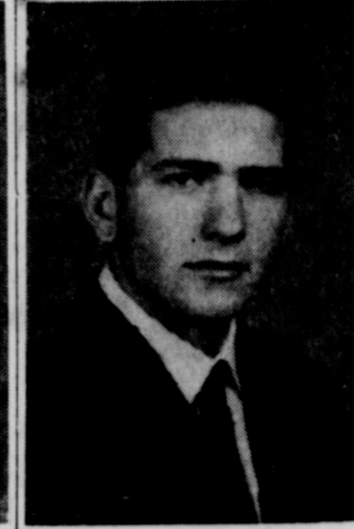
Of course this is not 1823 nor 1845 nor 1867, an armadas and armies are not invading Latin America or the Caribbean. But a different kind of invasion has taken place and it is time we expand the interpretation of the original Doctrine to include the insidious advances of Communism. If the Nations of Latin America will realize their eminent danger of this new invasion they will join the United States for the protection of their very existence as free and independent people.

The Monroe Doctrine is with us afresh. As the French say, "The more things change, the more they remain the same."

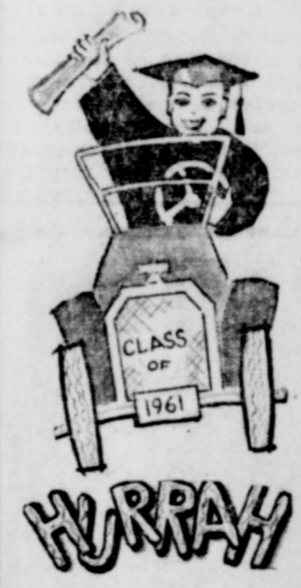

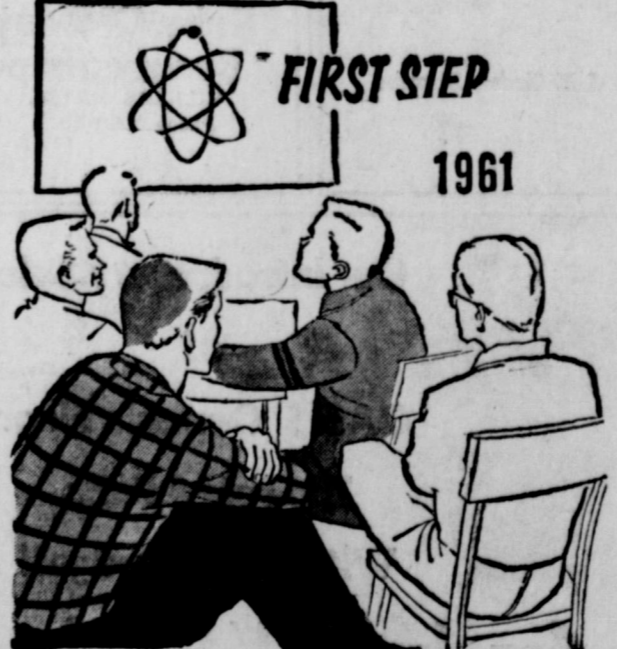
