Many Enter Fed. Employees Benefit Program

W. V. Gill, Director of the Dallas Regional Office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, announced that the Commission has tabulated the preliminary results, nationwide, of the enrollment under the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program. Under this program, the Government contributes toward the cost of Federal annuitants' health benefits coverage \$6 a month for family enrollment, \$3 for self-only enrollment.
At the time of tabulation, 249,000 of approximately 400,000 eligible annuitants had made their election. The results show that 217,000 annuitants elected to enroll, 126,000 in the Government-wide Uniform Plan and 91,000 in a qualified private plan. Of these, 106,000 enrolled for self only and 111,000 took family enrollment.
Over 36,000 annuitants elected not to participate in the program at this time.
Gill said coverage for those annuitants who elected to participate in the program will begin on July 1. The Commission will continue to accept enrollments indefinitely from those annuitants who have not yet elected. A late election will not become effective until the first day of the fourth month following the one in which it is received.

Boyett, a mechanic at the 51st Field Hospital at Fort Lewis, Wash., entered the Army last July and received basic training at Fort Ord, Calif.
The 18-year-old soldier is a 1960 graduate of Olden High School.

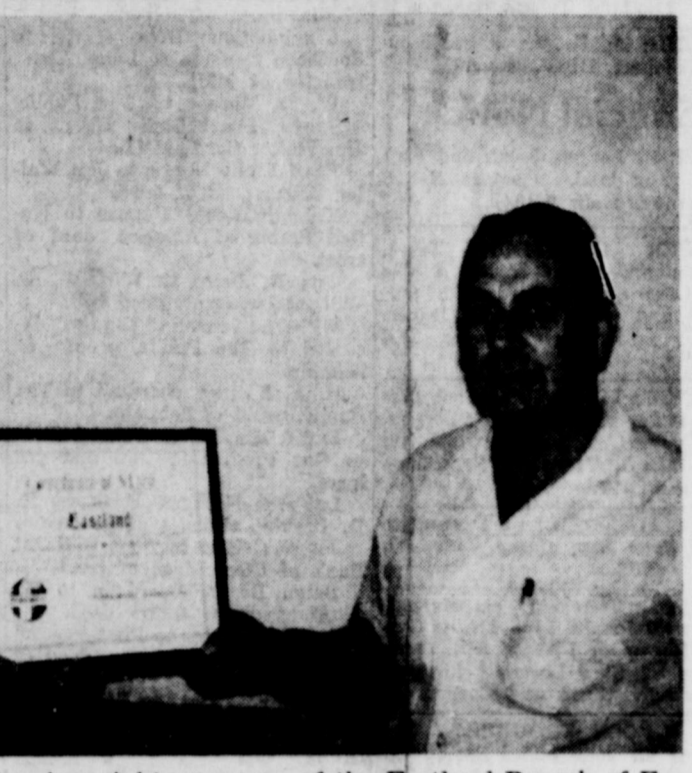

ON WORLD TOUR New Zealand Reminds Perkins of Boyhood

board cartoons are not used as much as wooden boxes. Bread and pastry is still being baked in small shops, one of which is called the "Golden Crust Bakery."
The day before we left for Australia we visited the zoo in Auckland. There we saw New Zealand's famous bird, the Kiwi. It appeared rather stupid while being exhibited in strong sunlight in daytime. It was about the size of a small hen, brown feathered with a long curved beak. It cannot fly. The female lays one 16 ounce egg which requires 75 days to hatch and the male sits on the egg all that time.
Now a few words about Abel Janszoon Tasman. Born in Holland, in 1603, he followed the sea in early life and at the age of 35 entered into the employ of the East India Company. In 1642 with two ships under his command, he sighted the west coast of the island now called Tasmania, and on Dec. 3 of that year he took possession of it. From there he intended to sail north but because of unfavorable wind he steered east and on Dec. 13, 1642 he sighted what is now South Island, in New Zealand. While attempting a landing of one his boats was attacked by Maoris in war canoes and four of his men were killed. Thus Tasman was the discoverer of both Tasmania and New Zealand and his name ranks with Cook's as a great South Pacific explorer.

Tower Is New Junior Senator from Texas

John Tower, 35-year-old college professor turned politician, is the new United States junior senator from Texas.
Tower became the first Republican ever to be elected by Texans as a senator in Saturday's special run-off election. He edged out William Blakley, a self-styled conservative Democrat, who in losing carried in Eastland County.
Tower enjoyed a narrow 8,000 vote lead statewide. In Eastland County he ran second by 534 votes, polling only 1,131 to Blakley's 1,665.
Tower is a former Midwestern University associate professor who gained a name for himself in politics when he took on Lyndon Johnson in the November Senate election and gave the now vice president a run for his money. He ran first in the first special election in a field of 71 candidates.

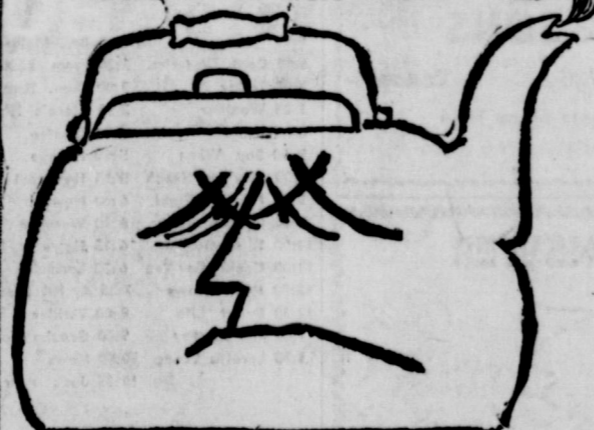
