Stressing the needs for the proper amount of fertilizer, Williams said, "You cannot put on too much or too little and expect to get good results." He recommended that for trees one to four years old, 100 pounds of 12-24-12 fertil.zer be applied in the fall. If no results are noted after the first year's application, he said the same amount should be applied in the fall followed by a winter appli-

The amount should be increased to about 175 pounds of the same type in both the fall and winter of the third and fourth years, he said.

#### Those False Promises

A lot of people back of the Iron Curtain are coming to take a dim view of Soviet promises about consumer goods, just as they have about many other Utopian fables.

They have plenty of reason to become skeptics about it. In fact, it has reached the point where there is open dis-sension, even among officials, in the satellite nations and there are reports of major rifts inside Russia itself. We're told reliably that the shortages are universal in housing, food, clothes, manufactured goods. For instance, here's tersely how the US News sums up the situation:

RUSSIA: The people still live on a bare subsistence basis. As an example, it takes the average man 47 days of work to buy a winter suit. Russia has fewer cattle now than in the days of the czars, though her population has jumped

EAST GERMANY: It is a real critical area with widespread discontent and growing sabotage and absenteeism. The people are hungry and cold.

HUNGARY: In a state of crisis, with mounting food shortages and declining industrial production, there are armies of unemployed

CZECHOSLOVAKIA: This little country was once among the most advanced in all Europe. The standard of living was high and life was happy. Under Communism all that has changed, and want is the order of the day.

Dismal report, isn't it? And the situation is about the same in the other satellite nations, Poland, Bulgaria and Rumania. Actually, such conditions may turn into revolt-ammuni-

For surely even those who were hoodwinked are, by this time, awake to their folly.

In the Congress, Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham holds top place in the House of Representatives, and Lyndon Johnson of Johnson City is majority leader of the Senate.

We have not been able to find another period in American history when one State furnished all three of these top officials.

Real Texas Co-operation

Although the President and the two Congressional leaders are of opposite political parties, they have been good friends for many years. There will be occasional political differences from time to time, but on the big issues you can look for real bipartisan cooperation between these Texans for the best interests of our coun-

Popular in Both Parties An unusual thing about each of these three Texans is his popularity in the opposing political camp. Despite the normal political sniping, it is doubtful if any Republican President has enjoyed higher personal popularity among prediction - that spring is quite a Rayburn, a loyal two-fisted Democrat, has scores of personal friends and admirers on the Republican side of the aisle. You should have heard the great ovation when President Eisenhower interrupted his State of the Union speech to congratulate Speaker Rayburn on his seventy-third birthday. Senator Johnson has the same type of understanding and respect from Republicans in the Senate. Believing in unity for the best interests of the nation,

he is slow to raise partisan issues. Of course, there are many other Texans with important jobs in Washington, One or more of them will be mentioned in this column each week, because Texas' contribution to the national scene may be measured largely by these


