of the worse times they ever had. In those days the Bucks weren't noted for their clean - living and clean-playing on the football field. Some of us watching that game think they were deliberately trying to injure Ed. One time they ran him out of bounds and instead of leaving him alone after he was chased out of bounds they shoved him against the stands, which then were very close to the playing field.  
 Gerald Wingate was watching from the stands at this display of poor sportsmanship. If he could have gotten his hands on one of the Breckenridge players I think he would have pulled his head off by the neck, he was that mad.  
 Eastland has had some good teams in the past. They've got a good team now. How does the present team compare with those of 30 years ago?  
 That's a question that no one can honestly answer. Teams of 30 years ago of course don't play teams of today. The rules they play under aren't the same as they were then. Just this year, for example, the goal posts have been widened. A fellow like Ranger's Buster Mills would have a lot of fun with the present goal posts as he could kick a field goal from the middle field just about anytime he wanted to. But the art of drop-kicking has passed out of the picture, perhaps the new goal posts will help bring it back.

 vide a higher quality of organic material for returning to the land. In recent years a balance commercial fertilizer has been used on cover crops to increase grazing, grain yields and organic matter or crop residue.
