Petition Fails To Meet State Requirements

W. D. R. Owen, attorney who prepared the petition presented to Eastland Commissioners Monday night asking for an election to decide upon Texas Electric Service Co.'s request for a new 50 year franchise, has informed commissioners that the petition does not meet state requirements.

Owen said the petition will be withdrawn for that reason. Tom Wilson, acting mayor, made the announcement at a meeting of the City Commission Tuesday afternoon. He said that Owen informed him that such a petition would require 500 signatures. Only 15 persons signed the petition presented Monday night.

Commissioners met in a called session. The only other action was a second reading granting Community Television, Inc. a renewal of their franchise for a two month period.

Overseas Mails For Christmas Starts Nov. 1st

The period Nov. 1 to Nov. 29 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels to members of our Armed Forces Overseas.

The term Armed Forces overseas includes personnel of our Armed Forces, members of their families, and authorized United States civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO, New York, N. Y.; San Francisco, Calif.; or Seattle, Wash. or Fleet Post Office, New York, N. Y.; or San Francisco, Calif.; or Navy Post Office, Care of Postmaster, Seattle, Wash.

The Post Office Department gives these suggestions to people planning to mail packages overseas.

Time of Mailing: Parcels—by surface mail—Nov. 1 to Nov. 20. By air mail—Dec. 1 to Dec. 10.

Size and weight of Packages: 70 pounds is the maximum weight except that a limit not to exceed 50 pounds applies to certain overseas destinations.

One hundred inches in length and girth combined is the maximum size except that smaller limitations apply to certain overseas destinations.

All articles for overseas delivery should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, of strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard.

All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper, which materially strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Unless completely packed and tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed.

Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package.

Addresses must be legible and complete, and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

Attorney General's Job Appeals to Carr

Waggoner Carr, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, held on to his hat Tuesday when he made a flying visit to Eastland but the West Texas lawmaker didn't leave any doubts that he will ask his fellow Texans for a promotion in the next Democratic primary.

Carr, a quiet spoken, fine featured veteran of 10 years in the Legislature, said he hadn't decided when he would throw his hat into the political ring, but definitely stated he would be a candidate for a state office in the next election.

With Carr on the trip were Tom James, Dallas legislator, and Barney Welch his pilot. The group stopped over in Eastland on their way to Breckenridge, where Carr was the main speaker Tuesday night at a chamber of commerce banquet.

Carr believes that one of the state's biggest problems concerns the legislature. He says that the state's business has reached a point now that it is impossible for lawmakers to complete their work in one 120 day session every other year. He said the answer is either annual sessions or more called sessions with more pay for members of the Legislature.

While Carr still hasn't announced, he is acting more and more like a candidate. He has numerous speaking engagements to meet all over the state.

Eastland's down but not out Mavericks face a must contest Friday night when they invade Winters in a crucial District 7-AA football encounter.

The Mavs, defeated soundly last week in their opening district tilt, must beat the Blizzards if they want to retain a chance of winning the district crown. A second defeat would automatically throw Eastland out of the contest.

In Winters, Coach Carrol Shelton's charges face a big task. The tough Blizzards will have the advantage of playing at home. Winters will also be trying to get even with the Mavs, who won the match last year.

Last week Winters downed Ranger, 22-0, to get their district race underway. The Blizzards will be favored by from two to three touchdowns to apply the same treatment to the Mavs.

Winters' starting lineup will have Sam Albro, 156 pounder, and Robert Marks, 155, at ends; Elmer Nelson, 164 and John Jackson, 156, at tackles; Carl Sharp, 177 and Rodney Butts, 158 at guards; George Scott, 171, at center; and Jerry Dunnam, 161, Joel Butts, 145, J. B. Guy Jr., 147, and Dalton Attaway, 176, in the backfield.

Attaway, who plays fullback, is the big man in the Winters' offense. The Blizzards' run from a variation of offensive formations.

In other District 7-AA games Cisco will host Ranger and Balinger invades Coleman.

Many handicapping conditions, less publicized but certainly as fearsome as polio, such as brain damage or spinal cord injuries in accidents, strokes, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis and others, are being treated effectively at the Foundation.



Irrigation On Increase In Texas

A survey just completed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service shows a continued increase in irrigated acreage in Texas. The irrigated area in June 1959 was 7,140,443 acres. Similar surveys in 1957 and 1955 showed an irrigated area of 6,962,234 and 6,208,022 acres, respectively. The data in each survey was compiled from information furnished by county agents from each Texas county, according to Wayne Keese, extension agricultural engineer-irrigation.

Reports from the counties show that some irrigation is practiced in 239 of the State's 254 counties. An estimated 6,445,155 acres are irrigated by surface methods and 695,288 by sprinkler systems. Irrigation is used on 48,110 farms, and ground water supplies obtained from 60,708 wells are used on 5,914,753 acres, noted Keese.

Cotton is the leading irrigated crop with 2.2 million acres, and grain sorghum is second with just over two million acres. Wheat ranks third with 637,000. Other important irrigated crops are rice, 436,000 acres; vegetables, 375,000; and pastures, 200,000. Corn, forage sorghum, alfalfa, oats and many other crops are produced on irrigated farms.

Irrigation did not expand as rapidly the last two years as in the previous two year period probably because of more favorable rainfall, explained the specialist. The increase during a period of more favorable rainfall indicates an acceptance of irrigation by farmers as a sound management practice instead of simply an emergency practice to maintain production in drought periods.

Keese added that the growth of irrigation not only indicates the farmer's continuing effort to increase his production efficiency, but also demands continued emphasis on conservation and efficient use of one of our greatest natural resources—water.

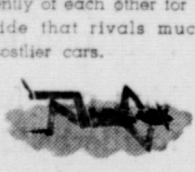

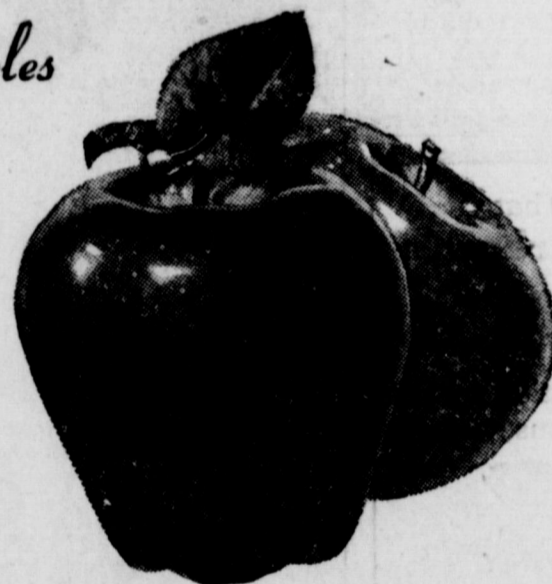

1960 4-H Tractor Program Is Announced

than 6,000 Texas 4-H Club boys and their adult leaders will get their annual 4-H Club Tractor Program underway with a series of 25 two-day leader training schools, beginning Nov. 5-6 and extending through March 8-9.

W. L. Ulich, extension service agricultural engineer in charge of the program, says leaders who attend the training schools will instruct 4-H boys in their home counties to give their tractors and other farm machinery care and maintenance, resulting in less repair expense.

Surveys show that from \$100 to \$300 can be saved per year by proper tractor maintenance, stresses Ulich. "The instruction the leaders and boys will receive includes safety of operation, kinds and uses of lubricants and proper maintenance of fuel, ignition and cooling systems."

Texas farmers own more than 300,000 farm tractors, over 2.5 million pieces of farm equipment, all of which needs proper maintenance care to keep them in operation. Often the loss of use of a piece of equipment when needed results in more loss to the farmer than the repair bill itself.

The farm machinery industry is cooperating in the 4-H Tractor Program also as often money is saved all the way-round if a farmer can make small repairs rather than call in the tractor mechanic.

In addition to the knowledge of caring for their own equipment, the 4-H Club boys who do the best jobs have opportunities to win county, district, state and national awards, which include college scholarships.

predominate. Proportions of 60 percent for a one color, 30 percent for a second color and 10 percent for accent, insure good proportion.

When you place the colors in a room, choose the color for the largest areas first—floor covering, walls and large upholstered pieces. In most cases, these should be your most livable colors, or colors

that are greyed in intensity. Next, choose colors for small upholstery and the window treatment. This treatment may be a blend of the room colors, or match or contrast with the walls. Lastly, choose your colors for accessories and small areas—pillows, lamps, ash trays, etc. Usually, this accent color is the brightest color.

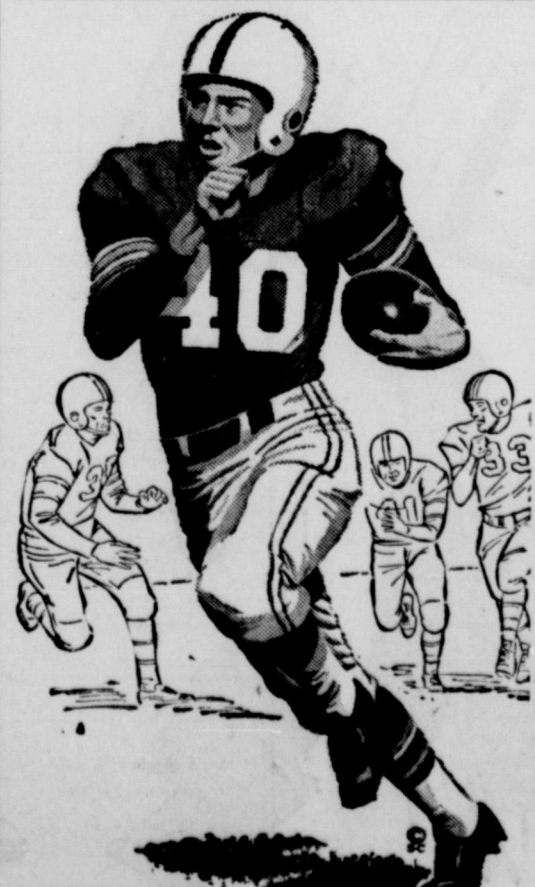
