### District Gov. to Visit Eastland Rotary Club

The Rotary Club of Eastland, Monday will be host to Robert R. King, Governor of the 579th District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 37 Rotary Clubs in North Central Texas. He will address the local club and confer with President Ronald Burton, Secretary Veon Howard, and committee chairman of Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. King is Superintendent of Schools in Haskell and is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Haskell. He is a graduate of McMurry College and North Texas State College. He was elected as a district governor of Rotary International for the 1959-60 fiscal year at Rotary's 50th annual convention in New York City, U. S. A., last June. He is one of 261 district governors supervising the activities of more than 10,000 Rotary Clubs which have a membership of nearly 500,000 business and professional executives in 113 countries throughout the world.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, President Burton asserted in discussing the governor's visit, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Eastland because they are based on the same general objectives—developing better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, promoting community betterment undertakings, raising the standards of business.

#### Kimber Named On Statewide Baptist Group

Dr. J. H. Landes, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wichita Falls and chairman of the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas has announced the appointment of a committee to select the personnel of four commissions to give general direction to the work of Texas Baptists.

#### Social Security Payments \$128,920 in Eastland County

As of February 1959, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance monthly benefits were being paid in the sixteen county Abilene district at the rate of just over \$12,000,000 a year, according to R. K. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene social security district office.

"This is an increase in money of about 31 percent over Dec. 31, 1957 and an 18 percent increase in the number of beneficiaries," Tuley said.

Tuley stressed that while the benefits are intended primarily as a foundation for the beneficiary's economic security, the payment of social security benefits at the rate of \$128,920.00 a month in Eastland County for example, helps business in the community generally because most of money is spent immediately on food, clothing, and other necessities. "In February social security benefits were being paid nationally at a rate of nearly 10 billion dollars annually."

There were several reasons for the increase in beneficiaries over last year," he said. The long-term growth of the aged population and of the proportion of the aged population eligible for benefits are important factors in the continuing increase in the number of beneficiaries. Other reasons for the increase of beneficiaries are found in the provisions of the 1958 Amendments to the Social Security Act which now make it possible

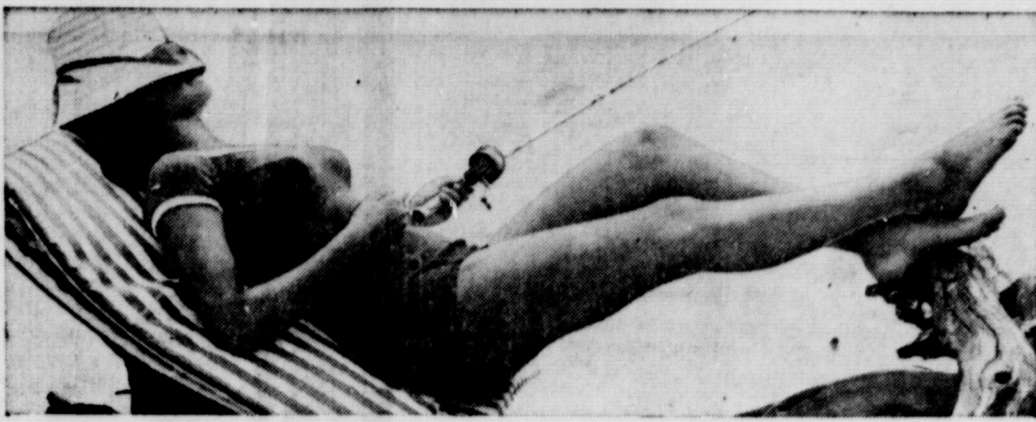

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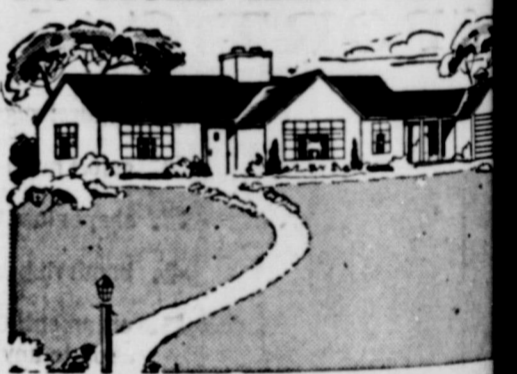
